The Solar Eclipse: Coordination and Preparedness Meetings Intensify

Garden Valley -- The Solar Eclipse of 2017 is a huge event in a very small area across the United States. This total eclipse has people flocking to the areas where there will be total darkness for over two minutes. This will happen at around 11:28am on August 21st in the Garden Valley area. This will bring upwards of over an estimated forty-thousand people, rushing to view the total eclipse in Idaho, Oregon and Wyoming. *This is a very rare event and will not happen here again in our lifetime.*

The eclipse has been on the local news channels and other media. Boise alone has sold-out all hotel and motel rooms, bed and breakfast and Airbnb already for people wanting to be close to the path of the eclipse for viewing. Garden Valley has not promoted this,

but people already know to come to Boise County, including Smith's Ferry and Silver Creek Plunge.

Sleep accommodations and camping venues have also been sold-out for a while now. Diane Caughlin, has the Uncle Billy Bob's Redneck Trailer Vacation Rentals in Garden Valley. She says people had started making reservations last year, for the week of August 21st. Caughlin knows the events that are coming in Garden Valley, but, "I did not understand why August 21st was such a big deal." Only after asking people why they kept calling to make reservations for that date did she learn that there was to be an eclipse.

Currently, the Boise County emergency responders and law enforcement are having multiple meetings in county towns to prepare for such an influx

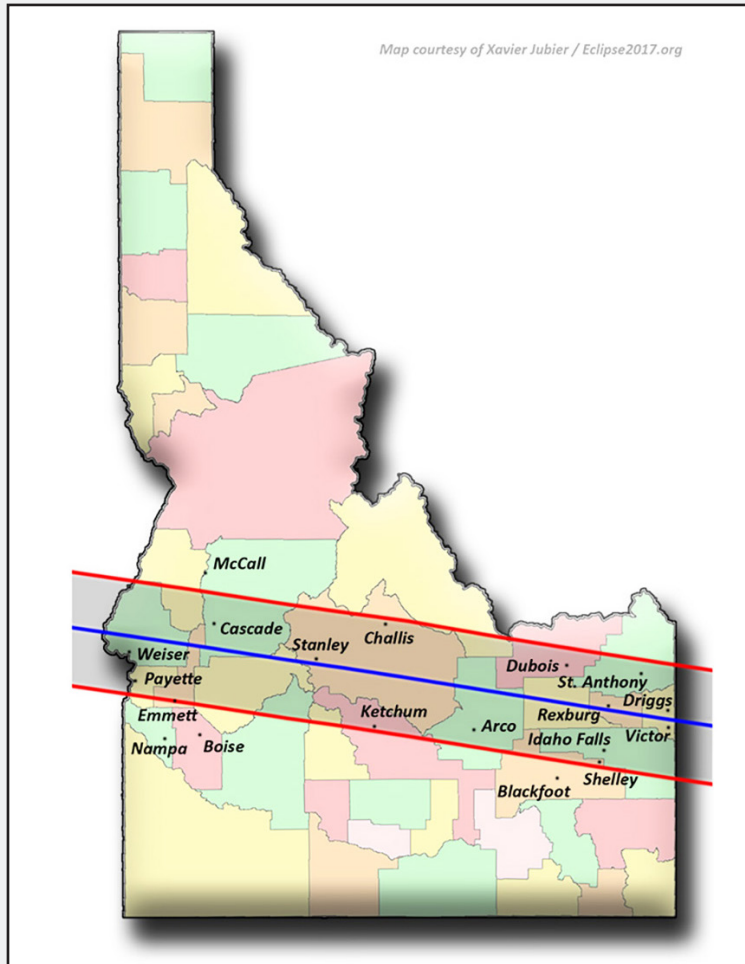
of people. They are trying to address the problematic areas, including limited roadways, public safety and health. Everyone has become keenly aware that people will come, even without advertising.

Meetings are being coordinated with other officials from Chambers of Commerce in Idaho City and Garden Valley, Fire protection, County Commissioners and the Forest Service. Business owners and community residents need to know how to plan for food, bathrooms, supplies and emergency services. Solar glasses will be needed for viewing.

Many visitors will actually be stuck in traffic and will set up in any vacant spot for viewing. This could be a serious problem. Property owners along roads have the potential to make money by charging people to camp on their property, or to allow them to stop for the viewing, otherwise they need to tape off their property from unwanted visitors. *These are some of many things to think about.*

Stanley is reported to have many bus-loads of people coming and are predicting fifty thousand people to descend on their town! People are planning to camp at Deadwood, Scott Mountain and more remote areas. Any area closest to or in the direct eclipse path are getting over two minutes of darkness and are expected to have thousands of people on the roads traveling.

Emergency officials are looking at a real problem of all those people heading home, too. In some areas, school will be start-



A total eclipse of the Sun is when a new moon passes between the Sun and the Earth and fully blocks out the Sun. Boise County is right in that pathway to see this phenomenon. The darkening may be frightening to some, but will only last about 2 minutes as the moon's shadow passes over to obscure the Sun. Eye protection, when viewing the spectacle, is highly advised.

ing the day after. Garden Valley School was slated to start on August 21st, but with the solar eclipse event, they canceled school that day. Instead, they are having a speaker come, to talk through the eclipse, to an already expected one thousand people.

In Garden Valley, there are meetings every Tuesday at the

Garden Valley School at 5:00 in the Flex Room. Any one is welcomed to attend, to understand the magnitude of the solar eclipse event on our towns. Idaho City will have a similar meeting coming up May 4th at 6:30pm in the Sheriff Office Public Safety Conference Room.

Garden Valley -- The Annual Spring Fling is arriving on May 6th with events happening all day! This is a celebration of spring, welcoming back our snowbird neighbors and all things new this year. Students Try Surveying in Idaho City

Idaho City -- Many students were enthralled with the new addition of Surveying to the Outdoor Education curriculum, held in behalf of the Boise Basin School District students. Glenn Bennett, President of Civil Survey Consultants, Inc., had an opportunity to teach some fundamentals as to what's involved with surveying. He explained, "Anyone that likes diversity in what they do, problem solving and new technologies would love surveying." The job of a surveyor can also be very rewarding.

"As I told the students, every project begins with a survey and ends with a survey," says Bennett. "Engineers cannot begin a project design without mapping to see what the land looks like or a boundary survey to determine the

limits of where they are. The project can't be built until a surveyor goes onto the ground and shows the contractor where the various improvements are to be constructed."

"Surveying is a great profession with enormous potential for anyone interested in working outside as well as in an office. Presently, there are approximately 270 licensed Professional Land Surveyors living and practicing in the State of Idaho. The average age is 57. More people are leaving the profession through retirement than are entering. It's a great career with a lot of job security going forward."

"It's also very satisfying to me when I drive through Ada, Canyon or Boise Counties and see the projects I've been involved with over the years and how it's impacted society and improved people's lives. Projects like

residential subdivisions, sewer, water and storm drainage, roadway projects and commercial development."

An elective math course will be added to next year's curriculum, which will have a focus on surveying mathematics, trigonometry and coordinate geometry. This is expected to begin in January of 2018, starting with concepts and then transitioning outside to put them into action.

"It's always fun to interact with the students," Bennett says. "Their enthusiasm and curiosity is encouraging to see. Even the wee ones in the elementary classes were excited to be outside and look through the theodolite, or telescope, as some of them called it."

Fuelwood Permits Available Beginning May 15th, for SW Idaho National Forests

Boise County -- Personal use fuelwood permits for the Payette and Boise National Forests will go on sale beginning May 15.

Permits are \$12.50 per cord with a 2-cord minimum and a 10-cord maximum per household. Permits will be available at USDA Forest Service Ranger District offices, the Interagency Visitor Information Center at 1387 South Vinnell Way, Boise, ID and private vendors in southwest Idaho, (see attached list).

The Minidoka and Fairfield Ranger Districts within the Sawtooth NF begin permit sales May 15, but permits for the Ketchum Ranger District and Sawtooth National Recreation Area (SNRA), will delay issuing permits until June 15, due to above normal snowpack. Call the SNRA at 208-727-5013 or Ketchum Ranger District at 208-622-0090 to check snowmelt and road conditions in these areas.

The Payette National Forest has four free-use areas, which are located in the Hazard Lake, Kinney Point, Steamboat Summit/Warren Summit and Big Creek areas. A free-use permit is required for these areas and can be obtained at the associated Payette Ranger District office along with specific location information and permit use requirements. Free-use fuelwood counts toward the 10-cord maximum per household.

Cutting fuelwood within a closure area is prohibited.

Check on the **Alerts & Notices** pages of Forest websites for closure information.

"Please check this year's fuelwood brochure and current Motor Vehicle Use Maps to make sure you are cutting in an area open to fuelwood gathering. Also, pay special attention to closed areas and roads with restoration activities," said Boise National Forest Fuelwood Coordinator Audrey Karpe. "Remember all Forests have regulations in place regarding not cutting neither dead nor living whitebark pine trees which are declining and are of critical importance to several wildlife species."

Fuelwood permits are valid within the Boise, Payette and Sawtooth Forests. All motorized travel related to fuelwood gathering must be in full accordance with Forest Service travel regulations for the area as shown in the Motor Vehicle Use Map (MVUM), unless specifically exempted in the fuelwood permit.

Once the snow melts, permit holders are encouraged to cut fuelwood early in the year because fire restrictions may impact the cutting season later in the summer. Early season fuelwood cutters are asked to use caution, avoiding wet muddy roads, where travel may cause resource damage. Fuelwood cutting is not allowed within riparian areas (adjacent to creeks and rivers).

Regulations for each forest are available when permits are

issued. For additional information, contact the local Ranger District offices, or Forest websites. Check with forest vendors for weekend hours.

Horseshoe Bend School Hosts Hazmat Drill for Emergency Services

Horseshoe Bend -- An Emergency Response Training Exercise took place in Horseshoe Bend on Friday, April 28th. Starting at 7:30am, the scenario included a hazardous gas leak near the northwest corner of Horseshoe Bend High School.

As a precaution to this exercise, no students were present for class. However, several students volunteered to be "victims," complaining of a burning nose, throat and eyes.

Professional participants of this exercise included Horseshoe Bend (HSB) City Officials, HSB School District #73, HSB Emergency Medical Services, HSB Fire Department, Boise County Sheriff's Office, Boise Fire Hazmat Team (Regional Response Team 4), and the Boise Fire Department Incident Management Team (IMT).

Daryl Riedinger, Boise Fire Hazmat, said the simulated "anhydrous ammonia" leak was

capped on-scene. The simulation was to help responders to better get a feel for those who may become exposed, such as Horseshoe Bend students who volunteered to be actors for the mass casualty portion of the drill. "The Civil Support Team (CST) evaluators said they did a great job acting for the EMT's," Riedinger commented.

Very little is known of the ditch tenders in the Basin. James Freaner is one who is somewhat known. He apparently came to the Basin in 1862 with the group that joined Moses Splawn in Walla Walla, Washington. He first appeared in the Idaho World when he was appointed sheriff in Idaho City on January 5, 1883. But he apparently did not hold that position long. By 1885 he went to work at the Wells Brothers mine at Grimes Pass. He continued there through 1886. But he had a cabin on Mores Creek at the mouth of Franer Gulch (misspelled on maps) and was generally working in that area. He built a footbridge over Elk Creek in Idaho City, which he completed on December 12, 1897. The Forest King and Little Klondike mines, some ten miles away were visible from the foot bridge way up on the mountain above Elk Creek at the head of Forest King Creek. Large trees now prevent visualizing the mine sites from where the old footbridge was.

Freaner's general occupation seemed to be that of a ditch tender along the Mores Creek drainage. Various ditches were in operation for some 55 years. Since ditches were often quite long, they usually rode horses. Their objective was to follow along the ditch and look for squirrel or badger holes that created a source of leaks that could wash out the ditch. When they found them in time, they usually had a shovel to fix the leaks, at least temporarily. But often, temporary was not long enough. The ditch broke anyway. Large scarred channels formed as the runaway water ran down the hillside. That shut down the water to all those placer miners on that particular ditch system. That took days to repair and shut down all mining operations on that ditch system. Since the miners were shut down, they repaired the ditch break, which took many days or even weeks to repair. The ditch breaks were large and are still quite visible, an indication that they happened often.

The same was true of flumes. Flumes were made of lumber and cracks were sealed with hot pitch. But overtime, in the sunshine or harsh weather such as winters, cracks and then breaks began to form in the pitch sealer. That created leaks that could become serious and cause a major leak that could shut down the miners for days.

Since most hydraulic placer claims produced as much as \$500/day, a shut-down was very costly. Placer mining season generally lasted from mid-April or early May to the middle or end of July when water sources got too low for washing down hillsides. That was often less than four full months of mining activity. Therefore, ditch or flume breaks were very costly.

The role, then, of ditch tenders was a daily matter of extreme importance. The ditch tender who rode a horse along a ditch had to be very observant. Some like Freaner, chose to walk. Apparently he realized that he could better find potential leakages by walking than he would see on horseback. His three most frequently patrolled ditches on the west side of Mores Creek were the Wright ditch (4 miles), the Christie ditch (5 miles), and the Plowman ditch (8 miles). These all had to be retraced back to the ditch tender's point of origin, thus doubling the mileage. For the Plowman ditch, that was a 10-mile adventure every day. However, we have no information on Freaner traversing the Plowman ditch beyond Franer Gulch. Ditch tenders often did live along a ditch because the gulches, streams and creeks ran muddy water, if not mud itself, as the Idaho World often described the flows. They needed clean drinking water. We have found numerous old ditch tenders' cabins along the ditches as we expected. John Christie was one of them. He lived for a short while in a cabin north of the Christie ditch between Walla Walla Gulch and Burnt Cabin Gulch in early years. James Freaner was no exception. The Wisconsin ditch was just above his house. Mores Creek is about 150 feet from his house. While mines often had downtimes, the number of mines simply caused ditch tenders to shift to another mine.

That was the reason Freaner went to upper Grimes Creek for awhile. Plowman, for example, went to Robie Creek to work mines there from 1879 to 1898. Meanwhile he leased out his East Hill placer diggings. The Gold Hill placer also shut down at various times but East Hill continued. Thus down times caused Freaner to do other work.

We tend to think of wealthy or popular men as being the largest cog in the wheel in the Basin. Wealthy men who came to the Basin in early days did contribute to the completion of many roads, ditches, homes or even towns. Many such as Moses Splawn, J. Marion More, K. P. Plowman, Jeff Standifer, Samuel Goldtrap, George Thatcher, B. F. Channel and even George Grimes became well known and were in the news more often than most. These men made the news because

they were the news in their day. Yet a man like James Freaner toiled daily mostly in obscurity to keep placer mining going on a daily basis. The work of ditch tenders was vital to the success of placer mining in the Basin. And Freaner is the only ditch tender for which we have any information. He was 25 when he came to the Basin. His last day of life, he was working out along the ditches. As usual he began the day walking down the Christie ditch. When he got to Bear Run, he stopped at the Whiteside house and mentioned he was feeling cold. This was in April. Mrs. Whiteside offered him a cup of coffee, but he turned it down. He went along his way, going up Bear Run and then going south to Plowman's ditch. He continued up the Plowman ditch to near Franer Gulch where he evidently suffered a heart at-

tack and died at age 81. He was less than a mile from home. *He died on the job.* James Freaner is buried in Idaho City. His grave is just to the right of the front gate.

We have researched the data we have and determined that he lived in a cabin that still stands above Hwy. 21 just west of Franer Gulch. The cabin still stands but was recently vandalized. The outhouse is a considerable distance away from the house and still stands today. Considering the distance, it was a long walk in winter. He had to start early, or be too late.

AWARD COMMUNITY GRANTS

Garden Valley -- The monthly meeting of the Garden Valley Parks and Recreation Board was quite busy. Attending board members were: Thor Oden, Don Weilmunster, Steve Menlove, Leigh Ward, Sandy McLain, and Lara Alexander. Much of the meeting was listening to Community Grant applicants, park event usage and solar eclipse planning. By the end of the meeting, all community grants turned in were accepted unanimously by the Board.

Julie Hutchroft explained her needs for the Music in the Park event coming July 1st. Weilmunster Park will hold this event July 1st from 1-7pm. This event is a kick off for the 4th of the July and will be a most likely to be a yearly

event. Her grant proposal of \$500 was for electrical usage and port-a-potties and the band performers Andy Byron and Steve Bolton. The entire event will cost around three thousand dollars and this grant proposal would help offset some costs to the Chamber. Leigh Ward said, "We look for things like this in the park." The Rec Board will work on the need for a dedicated 100 amp circuit for future music productions and bands.

Darl Allred spoke next about his ideas for an "expanded pre-4th of July and using the Weilmunster Park. Allred is planning for a family friendly event July 1-4 by having vendors, old fashion carnival games, petting zoo, wagon rides, bounce house and slides. The Chamber did not feel this will affect their plans and told Allred to

manage and coordinate this as his own. His idea is to compliment the Music in the Park and have free kids' games, July 1st thru the 4th. "Vendors need to charge and make money in order for them to want to come," says Allred. He will actively be seeking vendors over the next few weeks.

Allred compared how the Emmett Cherry Festival works and the money that comes in and commented, "Growth of events would make Garden Valley a destination." McLain agreed that it would be a good old fashioned 4th of July with the extended events. "This will bring people to come for family fun stuff and not for the illegal fireworks," said Sandy. "And it could start small this year, but could grow so that families here can enjoy the 4th." The Board passed the agreement to allow Allred to proceed with the reservation of the park.

Allred also asked that the cement slab be a space for safe and sane "personal" fireworks on the 3rd of July. Fencing off the cement slab in the park is one idea. It would be no cost, but a managed entrance. Allred

would be responsible for the events, clean up and insurance coverage. He has met with Jon Delvalle, GV Fire Chief to discuss legal fireworks. When board member Oden asked about interfering with the music in the park, Allred said, "I do not want take away from events but want to add to the fun." He feels both could happen together and Hutchcroft agreed. A decision by the board still needs to be made of where the fireworks can happen.

Adam Nokes of Mountain Skyscapes will need to set parameters for his Chamber fireworks the day of the 4th. Safety will always be priority. The park might have to close the vendors for the fireworks

around 3:00pm on the 4th. Allred will work that out with the vendors. Nokes asked for a community grant of \$500 for traveling to get the fireworks in Montana, gas, motels and training. This is above and beyond the Chamber donations for fireworks.

Other coming events at Weilmunster Park include the North Fork Championship in June. NFC people will come to the May meeting to discuss parking and camping for their event. Next, approved work plans on the pavilion is to rock the 16 columns. Marshal Herson's bid was approved using fieldstone rock and going up about three feet. Lastly, the board was also made aware that the solar eclipse could bring in upwards of 40 thousand people to the area and everyone needs to be prepared.

July 7, 1928 - April 22, 2017

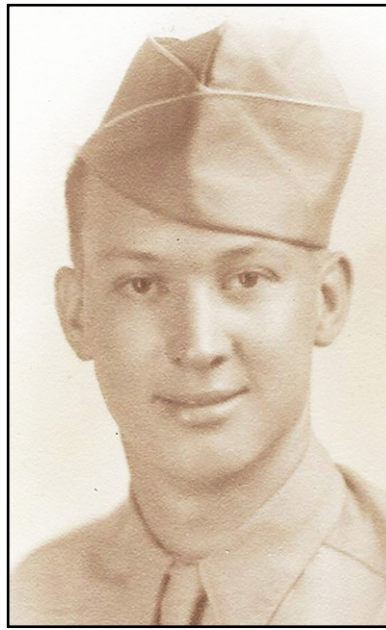

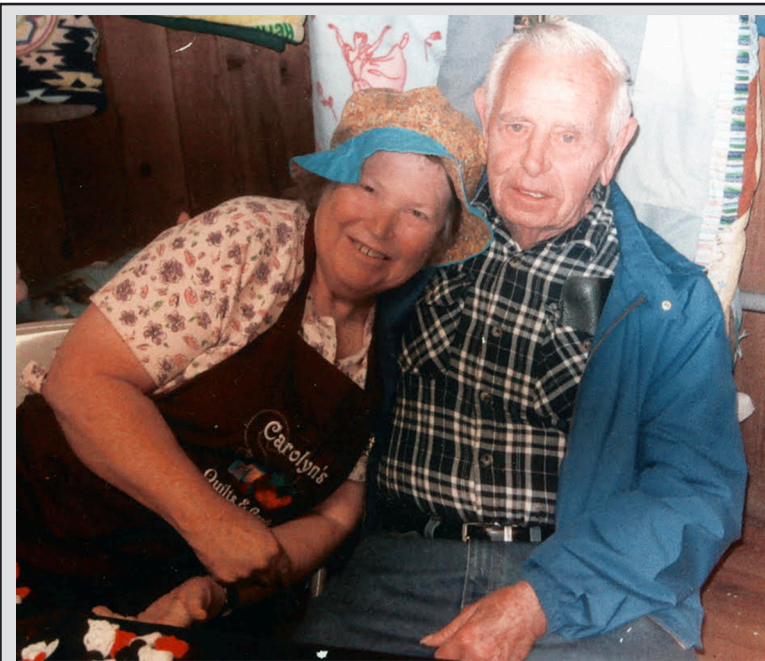


Neal E. Hawkins

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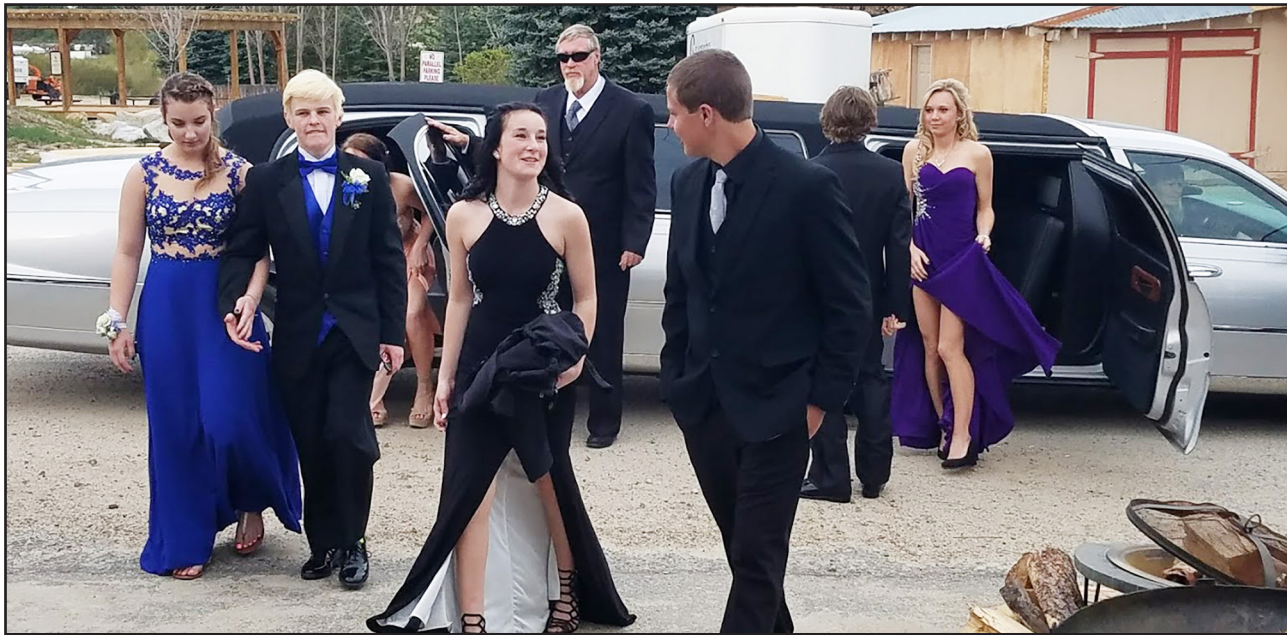
Notice of Death

In the case of election of trustees, the elector must be a resident of the same trustee zone as the candidate or candidates for school district trustees for whom the elector offers to vote for at least thirty (30) days next preceding the election in which the elector desires to vote.

Per I.C. §33-503(3): School district trustees in a school district with less than five hundred students, are not required to follow Sunshine Laws and file campaign finance disclosure reports to the Clerk's office.

BOISE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS' MEETING

Transcribed by Eileen Capson

April 25, 2017

Present: Commissioners Alan Ward and Roger Jackson
Absent: Commissioner Laura Baker

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Closed session per personnel, exempt records and hiring of employees. Chairman Ward said, "No action required." [Time 30 minutes]

CONSTITUENT INPUT: An Idaho City business owner asked about "the eclipse as far as law enforcement, city services and stuff." Sheriff Jim Kaczmarek stated, "There are multiple planning meetings going on at varying different levels." The department will be using their resources and has made agreements with Idaho State Police, the Idaho Transportation Dept. to have flaggers on Highway 55, and the U.S. Forest Service Law Enforcement. The Sheriff spoke [about the August 21st Total Solar Eclipse], "The main patch of that eclipse is through three forests on our county, mostly along the Highway 17 and 21 corridor."

MINUTES: The minutes were approved for April 17th, 2017.

SHERIFF: Sheriff Kaczmarek spoke regarding the ambulance that they acquired and converted to an "incident command vehicle." It is to set up at incidents and aid with communications and/or sleeping quarters. The sheriff also discussed the purchase of a yurt. He spoke about having a "sustained presence" during the mushroom picking. The commissioners approved the purchase of a yurt in the amount of \$11,825.

A "Safety Grant" was discussed and hiring 2 part-time positions with the boat program. The marine program boater safety job description was approved by the commissioners, per the request of the Sheriff.

SOLID WASTE: Idaho City's Cleanup Day was approved on May 5th.

ASSESSOR: Assessor Chris Juszcak spoke about the radon in the Sheriff's Office. He had

spoken with a company from Utah that will administer about 20 different tests on county buildings for about \$1,000, which is about 1/2 the cost. "To see if we do need to vacate any of the radon in any of the other buildings, besides the Sheriff's Office." He continued, "All of our buildings pretty much had certain areas, that our machine that we bought said we're above the allowable limit on radon." The new Emergency Manager spoke about his house in Idaho City, "Everybody knows that 4 is where you need to be concerned. However, my house was 42." He had a system put in and had a recommendation for a local radon company. Chairman Ward added, "We'll do what we have to do, one or the other."

ECLIPSE: John Roberts spoke about a meeting held in Garden Valley regarding the eclipse. He stated, "The eclipse is coming whether we want it to or not." Hotels in Boise have been booked up for more than a month. Overwhelming the businesses was discussed, for bathrooms, public safety, etc.

GRANT: "We've been doing this for umpteen years," commented Commissioner Jackson. Chairman Ward made a motion to approve the "modification of grant" between the Boise National Forest and Boise County in the amount of \$52,484.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: [Time 10:21am - 10:26am] Per exempt records, an appeal case will be "continued."

PLANNING & ZONING: Rora Canody, P&Z Administrator, stated that, "So far, in

this fiscal year, we've issued 62 building permits. Thirty-seven of those were new and 24 weren't in compliance, with the great help of the Assessor's Office and the Treasurer's. If we continue that route, we'll have more compliance permits than last year."

"Our department keeps track of how much postage we use every day, and each department has its own code," stated Canody. "For Fiscal Year '17, there's a difference of \$51.63 and one-half cents -- short. More money has been used from our account than we've tracked." She asked that everyone use their correct codes for the postage machine.

"Other than that, there are a lot of different people wanting to do a lot of different things that have never come to Planning & Zoning before." She said they were "staying very busy."

ASSESSOR: Chris Juszcak said they are just "plugging away" and have sent out assessment notices. They are seeing some odd land splits and some issues with Highway 55 property. Land assessments values are being set within 10% of market value.

SHERIFF: "We have more event planning going on for the morel mushroom picking season that is coming up," said Sheriff Kaczmarek. He said the Forest Service estimated between 1,500 and 2,500 people that come to pick mushrooms commercially. He added, "It brings a lot of crime with it." Additional services will be needed. "It isn't a couple week thing," the sheriff explained.

ELECTION CLERK:

There are gearing up for the May 16 election.

JUVENILE PROBATION: The administrator is seeking roofing bids, and contacted 7 companies.

EBCAD: Angie Dill, Director of the East Boise County Ambulance District, reported, "I'm just getting ready for our trauma season, mass gatherings, those kinds of things."

TREASURER: "Anybody that is behind on their 2013 taxes has gotten letters," said Treasurer April Hutchings. "But we're doing pretty good."

I think we're down to like 29 people, but there are a lot of [certified] letters."

CLERK: "The 2018 budget public hearing date" needs to be determined before the end of April. Clerk Mary Prisco recommended August 29, and should they need to continue, plan for Sept. 5. She stated that this is "the last day that we have, by statute, to have that budget approved."

The approval of time sheets were discussed. There is no "Time In/ Time Out System", employees log their own hours.
