Boise County All-Hazards Exercise Helps with Preparedness During Emergencies

Boise County -- A countywide exercise was held on May 20th for approximately 200 participants. The scenarios centered on the volunteers, who are oftentimes the first on the scene of most fires and accidents in Boise County. This

valuable training allowed these emergency personnel to talk out scenarios and actually practice in several mock emergency situations.

Robert Showalter, Emergency Management Coordinator, stated, "This year's Boise County Interagency

training exercise went very well. We had seven fire departments, EMS units along with Federal and State agencies. It's a great opportunity when you can get so many different fire departments, EMS, Federal and State agencies working together in the same space at the same time. Different departments get the opportunity to solve communication problems, meet

new people, learn to work together and know what assets and capabilities each department has. This provides for better communication and cooperation during real world events. I believe this annual

event will continually hone the skills of all involved for years to come making Boise County more prepared and resilient in all types of emergencies."

Teams of emergency responders rotated throughout the different mock emergencies,

to gain experience and the know-how of what it means to come together in an emergency situation.



Jim Bryant, Wilderness Ranch Volunteer Fire Department Chief, said it was good to be an "observer." He was able to watch how the newer volunteers worked together. Chief Bryant was also able to help train, when needed. Working as a first responder, oftentimes means that these county representatives are placed in charge of a situation, prior to a larger agency taking over.

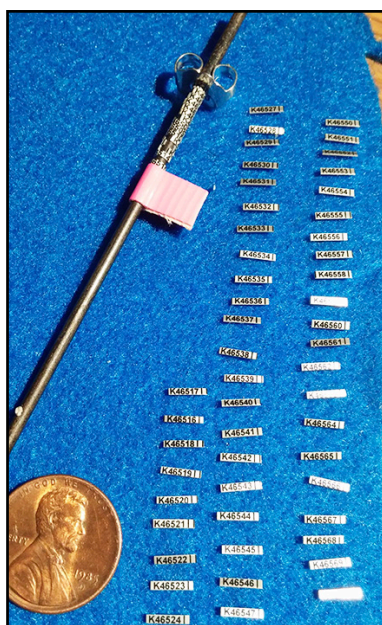

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Hummingbird Banding Continues with the Smallest Bird in North America



Calliope hummingbirds wear tiny bands. However, the female's band is slightly bigger, because her leg swells when pregnant.

Male and female Calliope hummingbirds (right) are the smallest North American birds. They have not been studied as much as other hummingbirds. They return every year to breed in the mountains.

Horseshoe Bend City Council Discusses Outstanding Water Bill, Day Care Facility & EMTs

Horseshoe Bend -- The City of Horseshoe Bend City Council meeting on Wednesday, May 17, was called to order by Mayor Pat Goff at 7:00 p.m. Keith McReynolds was first on the agenda in regards to an outstanding lien for a water bill on a property, which he recently acquired. The outstanding bill was for \$7,017.17. Council member Acacia Fisher queried, "Why would he have to pay it if he just bought the property?" Council member Teresa Cooper responded by stating «In the past we've worked with new property owners.» Council member Ben Riley suggested that the bill be split, but McReynolds countered with an offer of \$1,000.00 which the council agreed to accept after much discussion.

The council voted to give the Mayor permission to sign a lease agreement with the Army Corps of Engineers to store sand bags on city property. Discussion regarding the Timbermill grant (a traffic study for the mill) was tabled until next month so the council can review it.

Fisher presented the council with an amended applica-

tion for the purpose of operating a day care in a residential area. After more than 2 hours of discussion the council unanimously (with Fisher recusing herself) agreed to allow Fisher to proceed as long as several stipulations were met. Fisher must agree that the property in question will only be used as a day care facility as described in her original application, an easement allowing ingress and egress onto the property must be obtained, the property must have its own water meter and sewer hookup. A parking area that is fully paved must be completed within 3 years, an ADA, paved parking space must be provided, and the development must comply with the provisions of city code 9-16-05 (which pertains to "harmonious design"). Fisher will now work on the preparation of a development agreement with the city's attorney.

Property owner Jon Dufresne asked the council for clarification of an e-mail sent to him by the city attorney which stated that he was "eligible to submit an application for a "lot split" for a parcel that he had previously been told he would be unable to split. When asked for said clarification the city attorney

stated "The e-mail speaks for itself." Dufresne wanted to know if the city code even allowed for such a split and the city attorney replied, "That's all I can say on the matter due to some ambiguity in the city code".

EMS Director Judith Hutton informed the council that 14 community members had signed up for the training class being offered to become certified EMT's and ambulance drivers. She added that the city currently had 4 ambulance drivers on call. When asked if the city would be prepared for the onslaught of spectators expected in August for the solar eclipse she stated that «after the training class we should be prepared."

Michele Brothers with Public Works provide information on the city's water supply. The city is currently using approximately 68,000 gallons per day and the water has high turbidity (cloudiness), but not too high, and public works is trying to stay on top of the weeds. The city attorney stated that the city is in the process of updating the city's zoning ordinances.

The council then adjourned to go into an executive session.

Idaho City -- One of the highlights from the State Meet, held in Middleton on May 19th and 20th, was when Jason Carignan came in 2nd place in the finals. Taylor Lanham, senior hurdler, also was invited to State Finals. She was very excited for Carignan's placement and said she really admired his "form" in the hurdles. She was also impressed that he was only a sophomore!

Assistant Coach Misty Wadley said that they call all hurdlers "runners," because they really are running, with things in their way.

Rachel Cummings also did well in the 100 meters, coming in 7th in the State. Kaylene Gallegos was only a fraction of a second off, but came in 13th in this very close race. Olivia Barber, junior, came in 9th in the High Jump with a height of 4 feet 6 inches. Alexee Kline represented well in the Discus event, coming in 12th

with a measurement of 83 feet 4 inches. Taylor Lanham came in the 8th place in her favorite event, the 300m Hurdles.

Both men and women 4x100 relay teams came in fast! The men were in 5th and the women placed 4th.

The lady throwers, Gabriella Howard took 13th and Morgan Shumway took 14th in Shot Put. Howard had a personal best for this distance.

Rachel Cummings also had a personal best in the Triple Jump, measuring 32 feet 9.75 inches. Noah Howard, sophomore, came in 7th in the Triple, measuring past his goal mark and reaching 40 feet 1.25 inches with his personal best.

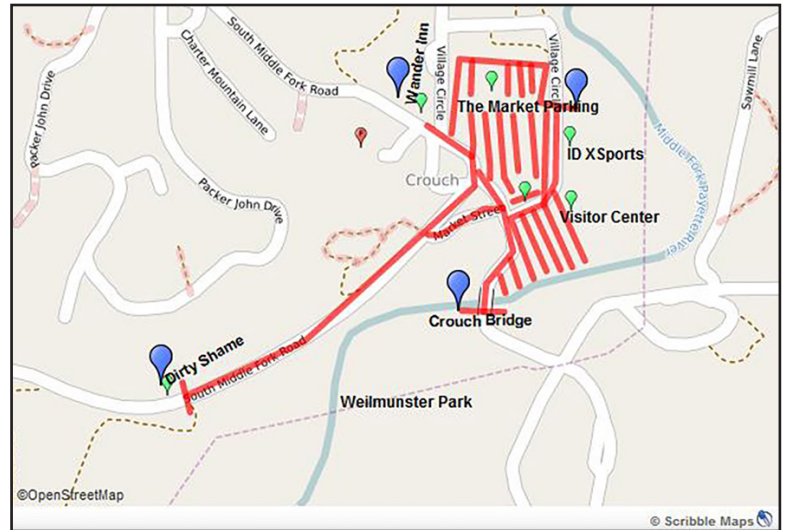
Crouch - This year there will be a different set up for the Fourth of July firework activities. A *No Discharge Fireworks Ordinance* has been approved for Crouch in limited designated areas. A map has been designed to follow the ordinance. Safe and Sane legal

fireworks will have designated places as well.

Another location is being established at the rodeo grounds for those who want to bring and set off the bigger personal fireworks so that the center of Crouch will be able to continue with events all evening. After the 6:00pm parade, events will continue in downtown Crouch and lead up to the approved and permitted Greater Garden

Valley Chamber of Commerce fireworks display beginning at dusk.

Each year the Chamber seeks donations to make sure the evening fireworks display is bigger than the year before due to the generous community. Here are the donation levels: Title Sponsor at \$2500, Platinum at \$1000, Gold at \$500, Silver at \$250 and Bronze at \$100. All sponsorships come with a

The No Discharge Firework Ordinance is described to include 300ft. on each side of the road from centerline. Here is the description: a) Middle Fork Road beginning at the East end of the Dirty Shame Parking Lot/Calvary Chapel property, Eastward on Middle Fork Road to the end of the Wander Inn property (486 S Middlefork Rd); b) Old Crouch Road beginning at Crouch Bridge Northwest to the intersection of Old Crouch Road and Middle Fork Road; c) The length of Market Street; d)The entire GV Market/MACU property including front and back parking lots and James Castle Square, Tucker Museum, Community Hall, City Hall and e) Any other areas that pose a severe fire threat based on the vegetative or other conditions during the current fire season as determined by the Fire Chief, provided that notice of such areas is given in advance.

Idaho City -
 "It is shaping up to be a busy year!!! As of today, we have received 154 calls for service. We



have 8 felonies charged and 24 misdemeanors. By comparison, on this date in 2016, we were at 102 calls for service with 11 misdemeanors charged. This is an increase of about a third on calls for service and well over double on charges. Unfortunately, we are just hitting the busy season," says Chief John Krempa.

The chief did have several calls out for service last week for an alarm that was triggered at the Idaho City Grocery store, at 4am. The manager said to her surprise that the culprit turned out to be a "Mother's Day balloon" that would dance around when the air clicked on and blew from the vent. Their first game was played on Friday versus Genesee after a first-round bye. Kate Renfro went the distance throwing 12 strikeouts and ceding only 3 hits. Offensively the Genesee pitcher walked the Mustangs 12 times, giving up 5 hits. K. Renfro came up with a double, Sage Huston, Brooke Lane, Julia Black, and Reilly Renfro had the remaining 4 hits giving the Horseshoe Bend team the 10-0 win in 6 innings and advancing them to the semi-finals.

A second game on Friday found the team facing off

against Potlatch where K. Renfro was good for another shut out with 7 strikeouts, 1 walk, and giving up 4 hits in the 4-0 win. A deep hit to center field gave R. Renfro an in the park home run and she and Lane also contributed double's while Black came up with a hit for the Mustangs. R. Renfro had 3 RBI's and Lana Larson sacrificed for another RBI.

The win took them to the championship game against Prairie where K. Renfro found herself back in the circle for 7 innings throwing 7 strikeouts, 2 walks, and giving up 5 hits. The team scored single runs in

the 1st and 2nd innings with Prairie tying it up with 2 runs in the 3rd inning. R. Renfro stole home in the 4th inning to put the Mustangs up by 1 run. In the bottom of the 5th inning the team put up 7 runs giving Horseshoe Bend the advantage. R. 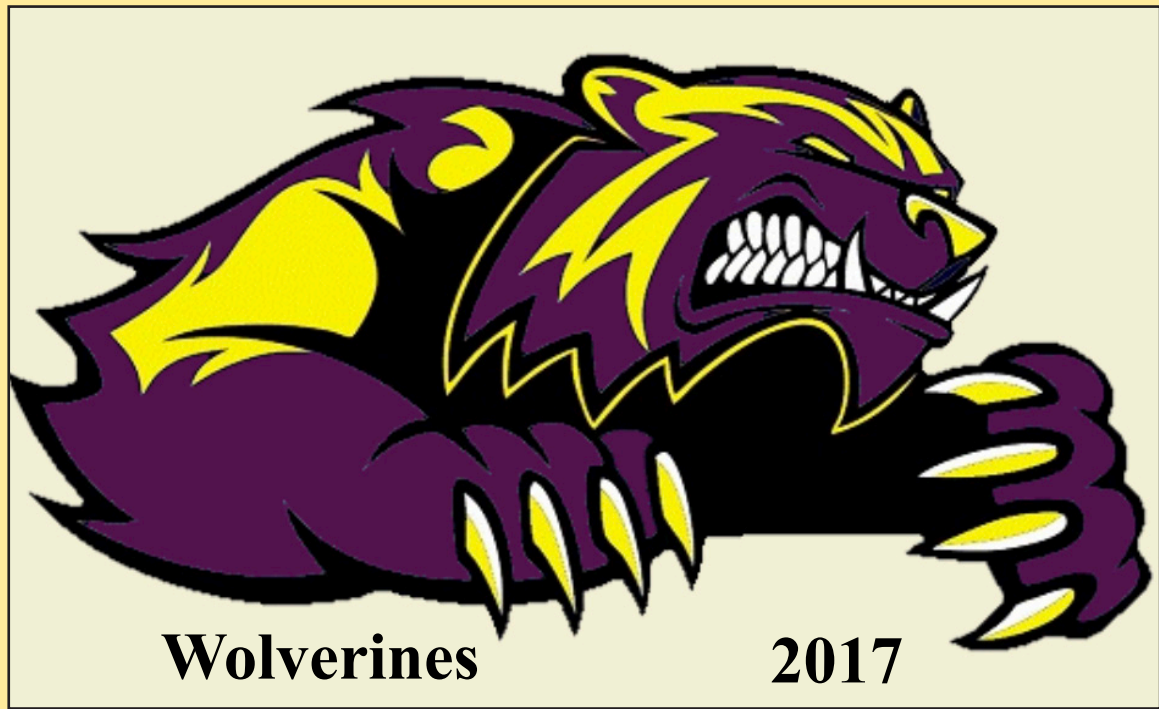

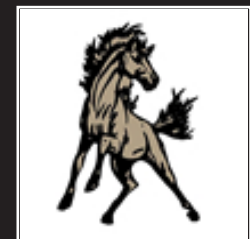

Editorial: Critical Public Meeting About the Wastewater Regionalization Project

Garden Valley -- The public is urged to attend a public meeting scheduled Thursday, June 1st, 2017 at 7pm at the Crouch Community Hall, 1022 Old Crouch Road to answer questions related to the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality (IDEQ) technically approved Wastewater System Draft Facility Plan. Facts related to the expansion of the wastewater system, project alternatives, associated costs related to each alternative, end user rates, regulatory compliance issues and project funding will be discussed by the District's Engineer. The District is requesting that the public bring their questions regarding the Draft Facility Plan.

Public support and participation in the project is absolutely required to continue to move forward. The regionalized system will be operated through proceeds collected from District customer user rates. The public must ask themselves whether they want to have a reliable and environmentally sound wastewater system to

eliminate the need for the aging and failing septic systems that are currently in use. In turn, the public must also ask what their Valley will look like in the near future without this project.

2 Forks Recreational Water and Sewer District believe that the time is now for the Valley to have a fully operational wastewater collection and treatment system. With an unprecedented \$1.4 million dollar grant already secured from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the Valley will benefit tremendously from this federal support. This project has enormous economic and environmental potential and has gained widespread support from local, county, state and national political entities and funding agencies. Without a reliable system, there will likely be stagnation in growth throughout the Valley, which may reduce quality of life and future opportunities for residents and visitors alike. Additionally, there will likely be reduction in services offered by the existing restaurants and shops in the area. Educational opportunities could be at risk

and recreational opportunities could be impacted. The District believes that this project will ensure the Valley residents have a better quality of rural life.

The District wants your input and would like the opportunity to address questions that the public has regarding this project. Please plan to attend the public meeting next Thursday, June 1st, 2017 at 7pm at Crouch Community Hall. Light refreshments will be provided.

Solar Eclipse Information: Upcoming Meeting in GV

Garden Valley -- Solar Eclipse information evening is happening this Thursday May 25th at the Community Hall. The presentation will be made by Boise State University Professor Brian Jackson. This is a free public event for everyone to find out about the Solar Eclipse and how this BIG event of historical proportions will affect the community. The Garden Valley area is in the narrow path of totality with the sun being blocked by the moon for a little over two minutes.

Professor Jackson is engaging in a tour to communities most impacted by the eclipse and how to prepare for this rare astronomical event. These tours include Weiser, Council and Arco communities who will also be in the path of totality. Total eclipses happen all over the world but it is rare to happen in the same spot for hundreds of years.

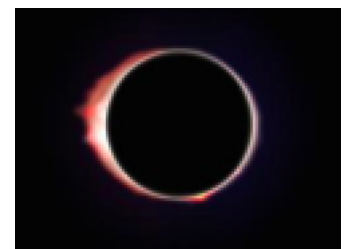
While the Garden Valley area will not be having a festival the weekend before, there still needs to be planning ahead for the heavy influx of people. Not only are all overnight accommodations filled, the camping sites are also full. There are concerns of the heavy flow of traffic as people leave after the event. Having supplies at home or in the car for traveling will need to be addressed. The importance for solar viewing glasses to protect the eye will also be explained.

Jason Sawin of Idaho X-Sports will also have a brief talk about reserved parking program he is setting up with

land owners. He has been working with the county emergency management services and the local fire department to have plans in place. Sanitation and hydration on an August summer day is crucial. Even people that plan to stay home that day need to know what is in store.

Brian Jackson is an assistant professor teaching astronomy in the Physics Department at Boise State University. Before coming to Boise State, he was a postdoctoral fellow at the Carnegie Institution of Washington's Dept. of Terrestrial Magnetism in Washington DC and before that, at NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center in Greenbelt MD. He continued on earning a PhD in Planetary Science from the University of Arizona's Lunar and Planetary Laboratory in Tucson AZ and my BS in Physics from Georgia Tech in Atlanta GA.

His focus has been mostly on orbital dynamics and transit observations of extrasolar planets, planets outside of our solar system. He also engages in planetary science field work as well. His Garden Valley tour stop will be an educational outreach to help people understand and prepare better for the Solar Eclipse 2017.

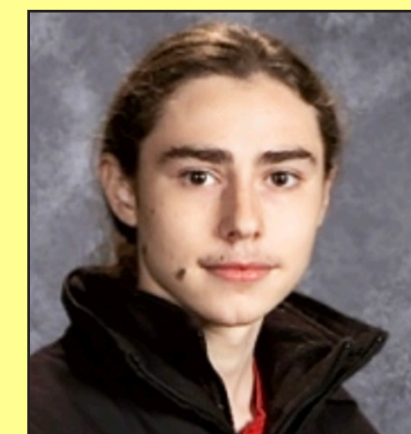
