CuMo Project ~ Shaping Communities



IDAHO CITY -- Phil Bandy, Executive Vice President of Operations for Idaho CuMo Mining Corporation spoke regarding the ongoing project in Boise County and its potential effects on the region. "The Company is committed to exhaustive adherence to modern mining practices, stewardship of all natural resources, reclamation of the preexisting historic mining damage, and meaningful community engagement," Bandy said. The Idaho City Chamber of Commerce arranged primarily for key groups, individuals and

representatives from the Idaho City community to speak at this open meeting held on July 18th.

In his presentation, Bandy explained more about the hiring of "native Idahoans – like myself – or long term residents of the state." There is some speculation that the mine could be ready to enter the production phase in five years; however, it is still considered an "exploration project".

American CuMo, a Canadian based company, recently announced 100% ownership of the land, which increases the value of the project.

"Modern mining practices are critical to the responsible development of the CuMo Project. Strategic partnerships

with public and private entities will produce positive community outcomes and ultimately result in a well-developed project plan," Bandy said. "Should the CuMo Project advance to construction and production, it is projected that it could contribute millions of dollars in taxes, fees and other payments to the local, state and federal governments. It's estimated that the CuMo Project could, "create as many as 5,000 jobs during the mine construction phases and 1,000 jobs for 100 years during production." The average wage in Idaho would be \$65,000, according to the Idaho Mining Association.

"The CuMo Project has the potential to produce 70 million pounds of molybdenum per year for decades," along with substantial amounts of silver and copper. Molybdenum is used to strengthen and extend the longevity of steel used in infrastructure, such as buildings and bridges.

Phil Bandy addressed the question of how the CuMo Project could shape the future of Idaho City, "With the continued backing of Idaho City and Boise County residents, the CuMo Project has the potential to significantly benefit the local population through the creation of direct and indirect employ-

ment, skills transfer, enhancing the capacity of health and education services, improved infrastructure and business opportunities."

"We will ensure that local people and local companies receive prior consideration for employment and business opportunities, based on qualifications and merit."

The CuMo Project plans to continually work with local residents, communities and governments, in being "open, honest and forthright." The company also plans to hold an upcoming community meeting, in Placerville, which is open to all Boise County residents.

Get Ready to Soar! Flight Park in HSB

HORSESHOE BEND -- Horseshoe Bend may have a 910-acre Flight Park in their future, featuring free-flight sports. The Boise County Planning and Zoning Commissioners will have a chance to review the Conditional Use Permit on Thursday, August 17th, 2017, at the Horseshoe Bend Ladies Club Hall, 121 W. Boise St. in Horseshoe Bend. The CUP Hearing begins at 6:30pm.

The park would be operating a place for free-flight paragliding and offer instructional training. Camping would also be available. The location is set to be adjacent to the HSB Transfer Station which is on the Old Emmett Road. CUP 2017-008 applicants and owners are Justin Boer from Hawaii and Scott Edwards of Boise, Idaho. The owner of the acreage is Steve Loomis, Manager of Jesse LLC in Boise, has set an agreement for the land to be used as a flight park and school.

A Flight Park will provide an area for sports enthusiasts who enjoy learning recreational flight activities. This would include flights with the use of a parachute or fixed wing equipment, normally considered as motorized and non-motorized paragliding and hang gliding. These are considered a more

gentle and slower approach to sailing through the air.

A newer winter activity such as *speed-flying* (or speed riding) is an extreme sport that involves a combination of paragliding and skiing. This air sport is also being considered as part of the HSB Flight Park business plan. The glider is a smaller fabric wing and the person stays closer to a steep hill to get a fast ski ride. Speed Range can be between 20-90 miles per hour. This sport is gaining in popularity.

According to the application, the Flight Park wants to capitalize on the growing interest of the sport and bring people to HSB for that experience. Along with having a place for experienced "pilots" to fly, people can come and obtain USHPA free-flight certifications with tandem flights and "first time students who want a conservative approach to paragliding progression."

Training at the site would consist of no more than 25 people. In the application, morning would be set for the novice pilots to attend the schooling and practice on training hills. Experienced pilots will need to meet requirements, certifications and sign waivers before they are shuttled to the top of the hill and fly down to the

landing zone. There is also the opportunity to just hike and fly for pilots seeking more of an adventure on trails.

The HSB Flight Park wants to also host some events to bring more awareness and exposure to the sport. Applicants see this as a positive experience for the whole community. Camping on site can be available for events and limited to 25 sites with same for parking spaces.

The public can submit written comments to P&Z Dept. no later than 5:00pm on August 10, 2017. A comment form is available on the county website. Oral comments can be made at the public hearing. The local community is always encouraged to attend these meetings.

Considerations by P&Z commissioners is that the park be conforming to the Unified Land Ordinance. Structures, facilities, health and safety will be reviewed. The applicants also will comply with the Boise County Comprehensive Plan's goals and objectives. 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WEST BOISE COUNTY**Garden Valley School Preparing for the Upcoming 2017 - 2018 Year**

GARDEN VALLEY -- Garden Valley School Board continues to meet through the summer and tackling topics in preparation for the coming year. The last meeting on July 11, 2017, set the board for the coming fiscal year. One change was Alan Ward stepped off the duties as Chairman with Rosemary Koenig acquiring that position. Ward will now be Vice Chair. The Board of Trustees also retained Pat Marion as Treasurer and Trustees, Tom Swanson and Mark Krepps. Superintendent/Principal Greg Alexander was also present at the meeting.

Approval of continuing posting the Agenda was set for The Garden Valley Post Office, Lowman Ranger Station and the Garden Valley School foyer. Designated times for

the Regular meetings for the school Board is the second Tuesday of the month at the Garden Valley School Flex Room at 6:00pm. Committee assignments were also established and Assistant Treasurers are Stephany Corn and Lydia Callaway.

Nurse Kim Kahre reported on school required vaccinations. She stated that there were some families that still need to meet those requirements. The Board was interested in following Idaho Code to make sure either vaccines are completed or Exemption Form be filled out. In order to be allowed to attend school students must be maintaining the vaccination schedules. Exemption forms can be obtained by the school nurse and would be required if parents do not want to follow a vaccination

program. There will be notifications sent out to parents to follow requirements by a set date or students cannot come to class.

Sports schedules will be coming up and not much in changing coaches, with the exception of, Mike Chandler becoming the coach for the girls' softball. Christy Morgan lead a discussion about the potential for a softball diamond at the school. The trustees were asking for a report back with a more detailed plan of location and what it will take to maintain the area. Christy had people who might volunteer to get the diamond set up with no cost to the school.

Currently there is not a place for "realistic" softball practice at the school. Nor is there a place for other schools to come and play in Garden

Valley. The girls practice at the local Community Church fields, but often are busy with leagues using that field. Games are played in Horseshoe Bend at their school diamonds. The people supporting girls' softball want to develop a place for the school sport. Christy will come back with another report to the board.

The Solar Eclipse planning on school grounds is mostly in place. Kim Kahre has portapotties ordered and they are hoping that many will come to see the eclipse with a speaker from Boise leading everyone through the eclipse viewing. There will be food and water. Different school clubs and sports groups will be having food and beverages as a fund-raising event for their own projects. Viewing on the property will be for the day of

the eclipse only. Pricing will be twenty dollars per car and one-hundred dollars for an RV space.

New teachers are Jeanine Bailey, Science and Math teacher John Hawoth.

As always, the Board of Trustees goes over school policies to see if there needs to be updating at least every other year. The policies are grouped so that the trustees can look over each one carefully to see what might need updating to current protocol and activities.

High school football practice begins on August 7th with the first game at Notus on August 25th at 7:00pm. HS Volleyball Practice begins August 11th with their first game at home against Liberty Charter School starting at 6:00pm. **Remember: School starts Tuesday August 22nd.**

IC Mayor's Corner Water Issues

IDAHO CITY -- The City folks all stepped up and did a fantastic job dealing with our water issue and deserve our thanks.

Councilmen Everhart and Secor (our "go to" guys for all things water) both spent multiple hours working to get us back on track, besides doing their normal jobs.

Our City Public Works folks, Tami Franklin and Gene Bettys both spent many hours at the water plant running it manually when it would not operate automatically- *and I am talking throughout the night and day.*

Chief Krempa spent time helping when and where he could, as well as Clerk Nancy Ling. All the City folks did a great job handling a rough situation.

With the loss of our Certified Water Plant Operator, Butch Anderson, these folks fell back to some of the lessons Butch had taught them and got us through this trying time.

And last but not least, the folks here in Idaho City stepped up and cut our daily water consumption by about 70,000 gallons per day! The water restrictions were on the honor system, as we don't have the personnel to go around checking that everyone is doing their part- *they just did it.* A big "Thank You" to them as well.

Please know that the City will be working to correct the things that led to this issue and our folks are at the ready to do whatever it takes to resolve these problems.

Excessive DUIs & Accidents

Boise County -- It proved to be very busy night for county emergency responders on July 23rd. In fact, Boise County officers had 13 events between 6:00PM and Midnight last Sunday, in addition to several traffic stops.

At about 9pm, a driver headed north on Highway 21 lost control at about mile marker 17.5 and eventually came to a stop facing north in the southbound lane. The driver attempted to turn around, but in his efforts, went over the edge backwards, down a steep incline of over a hundred and fifty feet towards Arrowrock Reservoir.

Located near the High Bridge, he and his passenger miraculously survived this crash with little to no injuries. Their Subaru Outback did not tumble or roll. The car came to an abrupt stop at the large game fence by the water's edge.

The passenger scaled the hill to the top, but the driver received assistance with the help of the Boise Fire Department and their

rope system. The driver refused emergency medical services, but was then arrested by a Boise County Sheriff Deputy for having a blood-alcohol level of three times the legal limit.

In the meantime, while Boise County emergency crews were responding to this scene near the High Bridge, further down the highway, another accident occurred. A driver [pictured] of a silver Toyota was traveling northbound, over the line, and in the southbound lane. She nearly collided with responders, burning a skid of 180

degrees, which turned the car facing south, into the rocks and hillside, by the entrance to Robie Creek. The woman was charged with an "Excessive DUI" for a blood-alcohol level well above the legal limit.

Law enforcement confirmed that these individuals did not have Boise County license plates.

Halfway through the "100 deadliest days of driving," there have been an estimated one death per day since Memorial Day weekend, according to the Idaho Transportation Department.

Their location is on the boardwalk next to the radio station and will be supplying the area with products suited for the activities of outdoor enthusiasts.

No stranger to the Idaho back country and activities related to the outdoors, the Rich family comes from the Melba and Nampa areas. Selling their working ranch was the goal the Rich's made so they could move to Garden Valley and start a business. Their son, Billy Joe, now 16 years old and actively working in the store, said, "This type of business in Garden Valley has always been their dream and that is why they worked so hard farming and ranching for so many years."

The Rich's are preparing for the official opening and still stocking many supplies this week. Theresa explains the concept of how they want to please the community with useful products. Obituary

Leland E. Grint was born November 11, 1933 to Sydney and Josephine Grint in Sargent, NE. At the age of 83, after a brief battle with Leukemia, Leland passed away peacefully on Wednesday, July 12, 2017 at his home in Nampa, Idaho with his family by his side. The 4th of 6 brothers, he was raised on the family farm. Early in his education he attended a one-room country schoolhouse. Later he attended high school in Sargent where he walked 4 miles, both ways, uphill, barefooted.

Leland and his family moved to Idaho in 1964 where he started working for Hoff Companies at their saw mill in Horseshoe Bend. Leland was a member of the volunteer fire department, as well as the local chapter of Jaycees. He was awarded their first "Community Spirit Award" in 1974-1975 for his unselfish dedication in community improvement projects. He also served on the board for the Community Hall and Grace Lutheran Church, and was the Scout Master for the local troop. Leland was elected to serve one term as City Councilman before moving to Caldwell in the summer of 1976.

Leland loved camping, fishing, and hunting in the mountains of Idaho.

Leland was an avid sports

fan, especially Boise State football where he was a season ticket holder for over 30 years. He shared his love for the Blue and Orange where it later became a three-generation family tradition. He and his wife Jean also never missed an opportunity to follow any of their grandchildren's events.

HOMESTEADING AND STORY OF GRANDJEAN ~ LOWMAN SERIES

This is a repeat from several years ago before I knew what I was going to write about Lowman. I have not included some of Emile Grandjean's private life in order to focus on his role in forest management and especially wildlife protection. But he was a major player in the homesteading that was necessary to live on the Payette east of Lowman, because of the basic lack of mining activity and the many places for ranches. He formed a policy and stuck with it. Specifically, no one could homestead a piece of land if the land contained more than 35% of trees. But prospective land owners got around that by cutting down trees. This often happened at many locations. Such land owners as the White brothers at Archie Creek, John Ort at Five Mile, Peter Storseth at Eight Mile and John Penrod at Warm Springs Creek, had real encounters with Grandjean over this issue. This will become evident as this series on Lowman history develops. Therefore, I believe it is necessary to repeat Grandjean's view of the land and its use and become a thorn in the side of many agencies and potential land owners. Still, he was a man of devotion to the natural state of the land and wildlife especially. He believed that cattle and sheep were denuding vegetation from the land that wildlife needed and opposed them on the forest constantly. He believed in a healthy forest. During his tenure from 1908 to 1922 and beyond, he banned all livestock from the game preserve he created except on homesteaded land. That continued until 1963 when the game preserve was abolished. Live-

stock then was allowed to roam the preserve area and increased until feed for wildlife was reduced drastically and cow pies was ever present.

Grandjean was born in Copenhagen on October 31, 1861. His full name was Hans Axel Emile Hansen Grandjean. His name was French for "Big John", which he was not. He was a descendent of a French Huguenot family of Lyon, France. He came to the US in 1883 and was inspired by the gold strike in Idaho Territory. He moved originally to the Wood River valley because the big mine operation had begun there. He was joined by his brother, Sophus. They built a cabin on Valley Creek northwest of what is now Stanley, which is south of Cape Horn. They also built a small cabin on a small creek on the south Fork of the Payette. The small creek would become known as Grandjean Creek. Sophus was known as "Gus" and Emile was known as "Charlie". Their mother Natalie, joined them shortly after their arrival and lived in the cabin with them. Their mother died at the cabin near Cape Horn. She is buried in the Ketchum cemetery. His

sister, Igeborg and husband, Otto Lefling, also came to Idaho and raised horses at Gimlet south of Hailey.

Emile and his brother, Sofus, went to Alaska for a short while, in 1900. They soon came back to the Seattle area. After a short stay in Seattle, Emile returned to the old cabin in Ketchum while Sofus remained in Washington state. Sophus was killed in 1902 and is also buried in Ketchum. He died trying to arrest two robbers who shot him. He was working at a cranberry farm at Grey's Harbor in Washington state.

Emile went to work for the newly created US Forest Service and worked under Major F. A. Fenn. In 1906 he got involved with a fierce battle between cattlemen and sheep men in a fight over USFS land. He defended written policy USFS policy of that time. His stance was upheld in court. In 1908 he was appointed to the game preserve on the south fork of the Payette River. He became the National Forest Supervisor in 1908 also. He immediately got in a dispute over the lax attitude of game warden W. N. Stephens who was permitting poaching deer and some were using venison to bait traps for predators with no interference with Stephens. Again he locked horns with the legislators in Boise. Gov, Brady settled the disagreement with the legislators and Grandjean became the game warden as well. He was responsible for creating the Payette River Game Preserve on the Payette from just above Lowman to the whole Sawtooth range. It continued from 1910 to 1963. The demise of the preserve created a huge slaughter of game on the Payette drainage that lasted for a couple of years. Game did not

fear people much back then. Senseless hunters slaughtered game, shooting from their vehicles anywhere and everywhere.

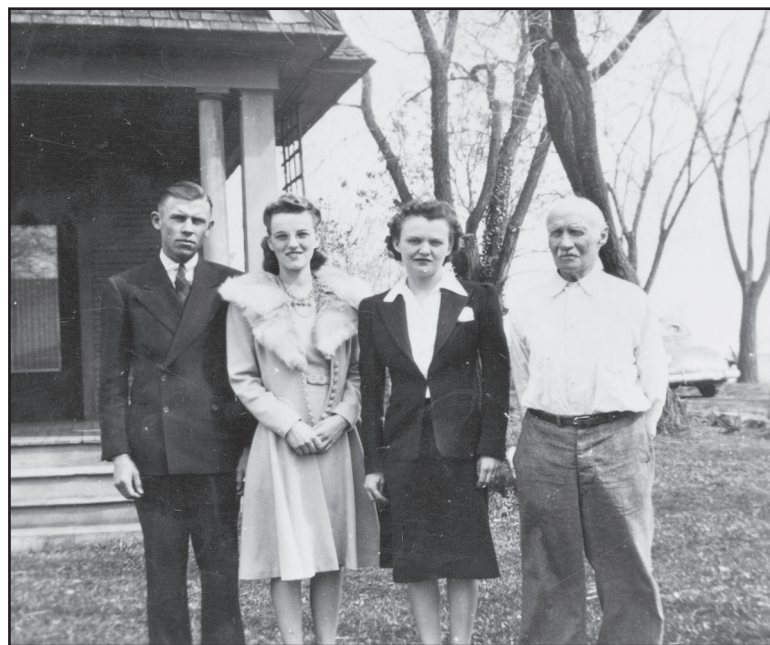
Grandjean had built a small, log cabin on what is now Grandjean Creek in the late 1880's. By 1909 he returned there and built a much larger log house, then tore down the old original cabin. The first cabin stood right on the bank of the creek about 100 feet from the present Sawtooth Lodge, which consisted of Grandjean's second house and an addition. It was later was used as a forest guard station and then became the lodge which was enlarged to its present size.

Later on, while living at

backside to those who desired to homestead on the Payette.

In the fall of 1924, he sold his house in Boise and moved to Caldwell to a plot of land where he could grow a large garden. He remained there until he died on August 8, 1942 of a heart attack. He and Mary are both buried in Canyon Hill cemetery in Caldwell. A monument for him should be placed at the site of the beginning of the old boundary for the Game Preserve.

Having lived through much of this period at our place east of Lowman, I dealt with the messes of cattle and sheep every year they existed once the game preserve was abolished. The Branson family still owns

Bear Creek, Grandjean built a wood "tub" at the hot springs and called it Sacajawea Hot Springs. It was a great place for a bath. But it also honored the Shoshoni who had frequented the area for hundreds of years.

Grandjean bought a house in Boise at 1506 N. 11th Street in Boise to use as a winter home. Mary R. Bushfield came to Boise in 1905 and married Emile on February 3, 1915. A horse accident at Meadow Creek southeast of Idaho City on September 9, 1922, crippled him. The Idaho legislature finally was still being bombarded by the cattlemen and sheep men over grazing issues. With his crippling the legislature forced him to be reduced to deputy Forest Supervisor. He resigned on October 19, 1922 from the USFS. He returned to the Bear Creek place in 1924 and became the game warden for the game preserve. Between 1900 and 1922, he was a thorn in the

the old Storseth homestead west of Eight Mile Creek. The wildlife has diminished by huge numbers since the game preserve was created by Grandjean. In 1963, people were shooting game everywhere. We had to wear red or orange when going out away from the house. One bullet hit our cellar roof and ricocheted onto the ground. The smoke stack on our compressor house was shot full of holes.

Today, most of the ranches are now subdivisions full of houses, trailers or cabins. Cattle have disappeared altogether. I certainly do not miss the cow pies.

Written by Tracy Koslosky HORSESHOE BEND -- While the Boise River may not be open to floaters yet due to it's speedy 1,800 cubic feet per second (cfps) flow rate and the hazardous debris still wafting along the river's surface, the Payette River through Horseshoe Bend has been seeing brisk business along it's shores. Myriads of people from locals to those displaced by the closure of the Boise River have been flocking to the the fast running waters of the Payette. With an average flow rate of 2,970 cfps, the Payette River is currently speeding along at a healthy rate of

3,400 cfps, perfect for weekend rafters and tube floaters who are looking to get a break from the blazing summer heat. The influx of Bosieans looking for available river space has slowed the ID-55 traffic on weekends to a crawl. Vehicles are loaded with floaters and their river paraphernalia can be seen coming and going from Friday to Sunday. From simple inner tubes, kayaks, and inflatable rafts to Super SUP's (8 person stand up paddleboards) the Payette should remain congested until the Boise River opens for floating business.

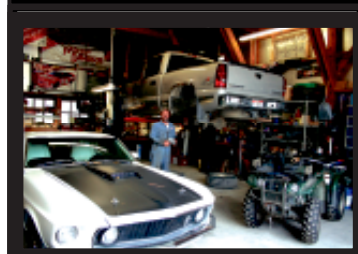
well as tribal, city, and county governments may apply. Grant projects funded in 2017 must be completed by May 31, 2018.

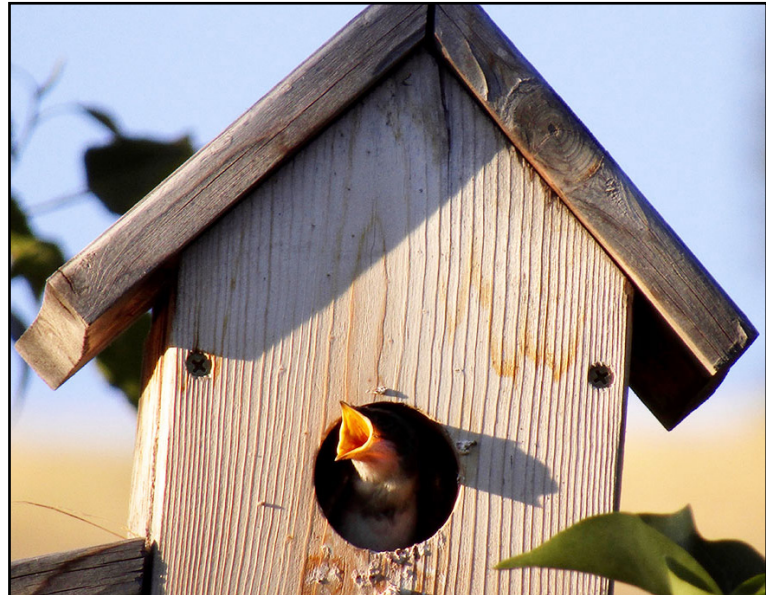

Transcribed by Eileen Capson

July 11, 2017

Present: Commissioners Alan Ward, Roger Jackson & Laura Baker

EXECUTIVE MEETING: [Time 10:02 am to 10:35 am] Closed session personnel, exempt records, pending litigation, Prosecutor issues and hiring of new employee. "No action required," said Chairman Ward.

CONSTITUENT INPUT: None.

MEETING MINUTES: Meeting minutes for July 7th were approved as presented.

DEPARTMENTAL ISSUES

PLANNING & ZONING: The administrator presented two street names for the Board's approval. "Joyous Lane" in the Terrace Lakes/ Garden Valley area, and "Ruby Hills Road" that is in the Banks/ Lowman area. She said each meet the criteria for the Unified Land Use Ordinance. Commissioner Jackson asked if there were any objections, and there were not. The two-name changes were approved.

Ms. Canody said that when property owners come in for a business permit, they will be given a notice to sign, "to be made aware that they do need to call the 811, which is dig-line, prior to moving any dirt." Even excavating driveways will still require they fill out the form and call. Chairman Ward asked, "No matter what excavation you're doing. Even if it's a bare lot with no activity." Canody confirmed that they still needed to call dig-line first, before starting activities. The response time by dig-line is 2 to 10 days. Commissioner Ward asked about the cost and there was no estimate, but Commissioner Jackson thought the service was free. "We are required to put the property owner on notice, 'So here's your notice. It's up to you.' This gets the county off the hook, if anything happened." Commissioner Baker read the notice and asked, "So, will you not issue a building permit until this has been done?" Canody answered, "That is correct." Chairman Ward asked when the legislature implemented this. Canody answered, "I really don't know if it's a new law they've just adopted or revised." Commissioner Baker stated, "So, this would just take the liability off of us, but I don't think it should hold up the building permit." Canody said this form will be a part of their

"building permit packet."

Ms. Canody notified the Board, "I received my current bill for outside legal counsel fees and I'm now at zero in my budget."

SHERIFF: A volunteer / unpaid position was discussed for the Sheriff's office.

CLERK UPDATES: Clerk Mary Prisco spoke about the Title 3 budget and Emergency Manager budget. Both men have been pulling funds from the Emergency Manager Fund, and the amount is expected to run out, if changes are not made. She expects to have a dollar amount next week, and a resolution to move money.

BURN BAN: An ordinance for outdoor burning was signed into effect, with its publication on July 12th. Chairman Ward said there had been 2 incidents in Garden Valley where there had been unattended campfires.

DRUG & ALCOHOL TESTING POLICY: There was a motion to approve the policy and it passed unanimously.

DECLARATION OF EMERGENCY FOR SOLAR ECLIPSE: A Declaration of Emergency was discussed, reviewed and offered for signature for the following week. Emergency Manager Bob Showalter said that there were already 2 counties that had declared, and "more are expected." He added, "And obviously, we wouldn't be able to enact that emergency until after the fact. It would be cleanup or whatever happened after the eclipse [on August 21st]."

Commissioner Ward asked if the interest and "excitement" of the eclipse were continuing to build. Showalter confirmed that it was continuing to build. There is a concern if county and governmental entities advertise, the county would not be viable for State emergency funds. Showalter stated that the real traffic concern will be after the eclipse. "Having porta potties on Banks/Lowman, although it could play into a traffic issue, I think it's necessary. Because they're going to use the restroom whether there's a facility or not. So, are they going to go down to the river and use the river resource that goes into the Horseshoe Bend water system? I think it will be good to have at least two." The toilets will all be serviced as necessary. The cost is estimated at \$3,400 for 11 toilets, which are not insured. This was motioned and approved by the Board.

ATLANTA HIGHWAY

DISTRICT: A traffic count was presented from 2015 on the entrance of Boise County and onto Elmore County. "Pretty substantial traffic," said a representative. The Atlanta Highway District (AHD), covering Arrowrock Road, said he expected the count has gone up. Their contract with Boise County is up in October. The contract states that they are to do "a spring maintenance" and Boise County does the snow removal in the wintertime. Mr. Lake stated, "Our contract with you has been \$40,000 per year. And our documents show that we've been extending that \$57.5 per a year over the last two years. So, we've been supporting that of course," and taking about \$17,000 out of the Elmore County account. Lake quoted Idaho Transportation Department payments for Boise County, "Fiscal Year 2016, received \$1.1 million dollars. And two years before that, before the new taxes kicked in, you were receiving \$808,000. That's just a 40% increase. And so, if you look at our request, coincidentally, it runs about 40% in addition," to what was drawn up in the old contract. Lake did not ask for more money, but did ask for the same amount.

The Boise County Road Department representative said, "We expend a lot more money than what is paid to the Atlanta Highway District." He said they "bladed" Arrowrock Road, the first 7 miles, twice or three times this spring for maintenance and "has the most impact" with moisture. They cleared all the "pipes" and did work up to the county line. Commissioner Baker asked, "So each year we've just done what we could do according to the weather and the road condition." They focus on the lower end where there is the most travel.

Chairman Ward communicated that the county had quite a "tremendous shortfall" in the budget this year. "Money's hard to come by. We don't have anything to give away, that's for sure."

An AHD Commissioner said that last year, between State and Federal money, Arrowrock Road produced about \$180,000. He continued, "Now that is substantially more than you all pay to maintain it. But that's okay, according to state code, you don't have to do that."

Mr. Jones, Boise County Roads, said that they spend

quite a bit of money on that road, including about \$7,000 in spraying for weeds. "There's a lot of other problems or issues on the road that we spend money on. We're probably going to spend \$30 or \$40 thousand dollars on it this year, cleaning ditches, and throwing \$20 thousand dollars of material on it."

The representative said, "We would be more than happy to take upon 90% of the maintenance of the road, if we got 100% of the income that the road produces. We would do that." He said they were refused by the previous County Board of Commissioners.

Chairman Ward said they would look at it and make a decision by October, when the contract was due. Ward concluded humorously, "So, we will look at all this and see what we can do. You probably won't like our answer, but we'll get you one anyway."

The AHD representative thanked them for the consideration.

CLERK: Per budget, Clerk Mary Prisco said, like many of the other offices, "I have requested a 3% increase for everyone. My salary is the same number that was in the salary survey from last year. Commissioner Jackson said, "That's quite a bit more than 3%!" She asked if he heard what she said. Jackson replied, "I did hear what you said. I thought that got raised last year for that amount!" She said, "I think the salary survey was a little bit less than is close to that, then also the Sheriff." Commissioner Baker was unsure if there was an increase in the Clerk's

salary last year.

Clerk Prisco spoke about Drug & Alcohol Free Policy, that will be effective as of August 11. Money has been allocated for testing, "We'll try to get a better feel if \$1,500 is sufficient or not."

In reviewing the budget, Commissioner Jackson asked, "How come you didn't put any tort claim for the judgement in here?" Clerk Prisco said, "We need to inactivate that account." The account was used to "capture" the 3%-dollar amount in the "Tort Fund" and then that amount would be transferred to the [Alamar Ranch lawsuit judgment] bond fund. She said, "We are not doing that this year, because we don't need to. At the end of June, in the Bond Fund, we had cash reserves of one million, two, twenty-six, and six hundred thirty-three dollars." She said a payment was due in August of \$415,787.50, which leaves a balance of \$910,846 that will "carry over to the next year." There will be another payment in 2018, leaving \$48,771. Commissioner Jackson asked, "What can we do with that?" She suggested moving it into the General Fund and Chairman Ward agreed to help with those "expenditures." She added, "That ending amount is going to be higher than that, because we have years that we did levy under the bond fund and when all property taxes, everybody has paid, so you've got a carryover. Well, it's not huge, but there'll be additional monies that come in here. So, we're looking good!"

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
