Water Rescue in Mores Creek Wilderness Ranch Fire Protection District

BOISE COUNTY -- A driver was seen by witnesses to be traveling at a high rate of speed from the High Bridge along Highway 21, on an extremely flat tire. Another motorist tried to pursue and to warn the woman driver, but eventually slowed to a safer speed, unable to catch her. The Ford compact car, traveling northbound towards Idaho City, eventually left the roadway at mile marker 24. It was said that had witnesses not pursued the speeding car, looking for the possibility of it being in the creek bed, it may have gone unnoticed. The

accident occurred on March 4th, 2018.

In exploring the crash site, it was shocking for emergency responders to find that the car seemed to have gone “airborne,” for approximately 100 feet! The vehicle actually hit the opposite side of the creek bank, above the waterline, indicated by a scattering of plastic.

Boise County Deputy Steve Dorau explained that in investigating the accident, he thought it odd that there were no skid marks to measure. The car had astoundingly cleared all of the

bushes and the area was void of any tracks in the snow. It appeared that the Ford compact had continued straight, on a curve, void of a front tire on its passenger's side.

Wilderness Ranch Fire Protection District responded to this single car crash on Sunday afternoon. Melissa Fleming was first on the scene and relayed to responders en route

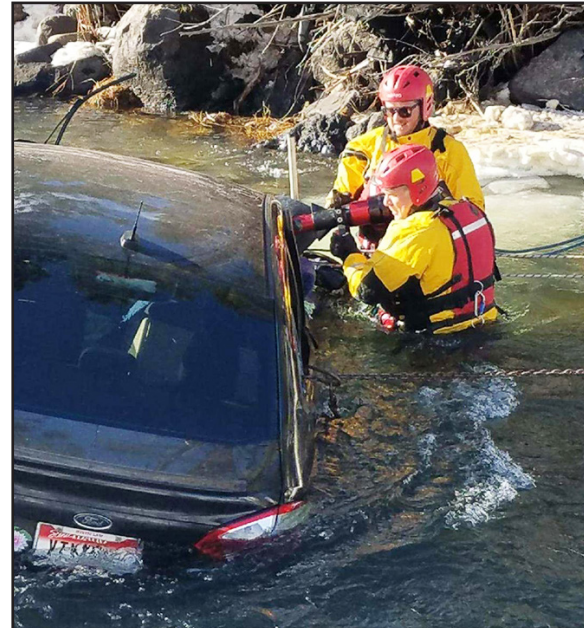
worked!” The tools worked and everyone came together with a common goal. He stated that the district brings in enough revenue that, “We didn't lack for equipment. Everything we needed, we had.”

Chief Jim Bryant thought it quite fortunate that the St. Luke's Air pilot was experienced enough to come in between the rocks and the water, to be as close to the patient as possible. Responders saw it as a good sign that the woman was able to assist in loading herself onto a backboard. The 60-year-old woman had been submerged up above her waist for approximately 2-hours in the icy water and there were other comments made by responders for her diabetic needs.

Chief Bryant stated that the woman was very lucky to be alive, considering the distance, speed and impact of the car. The airbag had deployed, causing a common injury to the head with a little bit of blood. However, the steering column and windshield were still intact. He stated that she didn't appear to be too injured, but hypothermia was certainly a concern.

Boise County's Emergency Manager, Bob Showalter was present and attentive to any possible contaminants in the water.

He proceeded to contact the downstream Wilderness Ranch Water Master, after the crash, in order to turn off pumps used to supply water to the residents of that community.

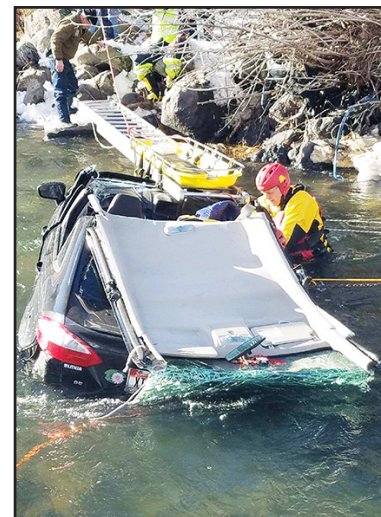

that a water extrication would be necessary. She was concerned that the woman, who had scooted to the passenger's side, may try to fall asleep so she kept her talking throughout this ordeal.

The waters of Mores Creek were icy cold, and a large chunk of ice had dislodged from the opposite bank. The department members broke up the ice in order to get two responders safely into the water.

Bob Callahan and Chuck Stamm worked in the water for over 1½ hours in specialized suits and lifejackets, tethered to the shoreline. The men helped to stabilize the vehicle and then used hydraulic cutters to perform an extrication, removing the top portion of the car, to best save the woman from the vehicle.

This was a successful team effort, made on behalf of the Wilderness Ranch Volunteer Fire Department and certainly came with much training, preparation and forethought. Wilderness Ranch Fire Chief Jim Bryant was very proud of his department saying, “It's great when you can say everything

Horseshoe Bend City Council Meeting

HORSESHOE BEND --

The following is a synopsis of the Horseshoe Bend City Council meeting held on February 21, 2018. After the call to order, Pledge of Allegiance, and the council's approval of the agenda, the council approved the previous minutes and the city's bills. Mayor Pat Goff called for a public hearing, per the agenda, regarding the rezoning of 473, Highway 55, brought forth by Horseshoe Bend resident and property owner Stephen Whiteley. Due to Whiteley's absence the hearing was tabled.

Next on the new business portion of the agenda was potential property owner Dale Ortman who was seeking to

have a water lien lifted from a property he was interested in purchasing at 4 Harris Creek Lane. Ortman explained that the water and sewer bill in question were actually the responsibility of the previous tenant, not the property owner Eric Carder. After some discussion by the council it was decided that the property owner, Carder, would need to meet with the council before any redress would be considered.

Richard McDowell brought a request to the council that his property, which was currently being charged for 7 water and sewer hook ups, be changed to the actual 5 hook ups he is currently utilizing on his property for mobile homes. After conferring with the city attorney,

the council advised McDowell that they would take his request under advisement and asked him to return to next month's city council meeting.

Whiteley entered the council room at approximately 7:20 and Mayor Goff called the public hearing on his request at 7:42. Whiteley stated that he was the current owner of the Longbranch (Restaurant) located at 473 Highway 55 in Horseshoe Bend. Whiteley said his intentions were to "add a structure and some RV spots" but the property is currently zoned as an M1 industrial lot and in order to utilize it in the way he wants it needs to be rezoned as a C2 commercial lot. The council expressed surprise that the lot was zoned

industrial. Civil engineer for the city, Amy Woodruff, told the council that "the request is generally supported by the zoning plan." Woodruff went on to say that ITD (Idaho Transportation Department) had sent a letter to the council stating that if rezoned the property owner would be responsible for bringing access encroachments up to current ITD standards. The Horseshoe Bend Fire Protection District sent a letter which advised the property owner that a fire hydrant located on the property must be kept clear of weeds and debris at all times and that emergency vehicles must have clear access right of ways. No one offered any public testimony in support of or against Whiteley's proposal. The city attorney made sure that Whiteley understood that his application before the council was only to address the rezoning of his property from M1 industrial to C2 commercial and that any future plans he had regarding the property would be a different matter to be presented to the council at a future date. Whiteley agreed that he was presenting an application for rezoning only at this time. After a short discussion by the council the roll call votes are taken and Whiteley's application for rezone is approved. EMS Director Tammy Sereduk had the following updates: 30 calls came in during January while 16 calls have

come in so far, this month. 9 trainees went through and passed CPR training, 4 more are attending EMT classes. 3 trainees will be taking a skills class on 2/23. Sereduk requested monies to purchase 3 jump bags for on-call EMT's to carry in their vehicles. The jump bags would be utilized in case of emergencies when the ambulance was already out on a call. The council approved an amount not to exceed \$ 200 for the jump bags. Sereduk told the council, "We are in a position to have 10 EMTs once everyone completes the training program." Report from civil engineer, Amy Woodruff: 3 bids were submitted for the test well project, McLeran Well Drilling was the low bid at \$10,980.00. The test well will be for quality and production analysis. If all goes well then, the production well will be dug. Goal is to be on line with the new well this fall. The city attorney will review the test well contract before council approval. A \$100,000.00 grant is available to make improvement to Madison Street. The city is currently working with property owners adjacent to Madison Street to grant the city right of way easements to make needed improvements. The meeting was adjourned at 8:34 p.m.

We Need You.

The Board of Directors of the Senior Center must, in the coming months, make critical decisions affecting the future of the Senior Center. This process could have profound impacts on both the Senior Center and Granny's. The Board can make the necessary decisions but these decisions would benefit mightily from input from the Senior Community.

If we could individually ask everyone in the Garden Valley/Crouch area why they aren't members/supporters of the Center, some would answer - I already know that not much happens at the Center. Others would answer - gosh, it hasn't ever occurred to me to join, maybe I should check it out. And, finally some would answer - I don't care, I'm just not into this sort of thing.

But before I vote to undertake any of these activities, I* will need some indication that these suggestions could develop widespread support - meaning that a sufficient number of seniors will either volunteer to spend whatever time is required to help us develop the events, or to manage a new event, or to participate in an event and at what cost. (* I will not presume to speak for the other Board Members but I'm sure that I'm not alone.)

Money, of course, also plays a fundamental role in making a commitment to an activity. We are told that there are Grants available for all the above suggested activities and perhaps for other activities.

It's been a few, OK more than a few, years since I've been involved in seeking governmental funds but it was my experience that applicants had to demonstrate support for the proposed activity. Let's assume for the moment that things have changed. Then all we would need are "helpers". The Board is only seven people - we can't spend unlimited time working at and for the Center.

Letter to the Editor

This responds to the Garden Valley Senior & Social Center (GVSC) article in the 2/21/18 IW issue. I'll give you responses to specific questions or statements made in that article in future Letters to the Editor.

In my over 20 years in GV, I've watched the GVSC go from a vital part of the community to a thrift shop. I'm a senior and miss the camaraderie I enjoyed there. The change is a direct result of the Board of Directors intention that the GVSC should not be run as a business using federal funds but rather a volunteer-only organization. All the other senior centers in the state are run as businesses and ours was set up that way to follow that successful model... all to benefit our senior citizens. The by-laws reflect that and say nothing about running a thrift shop as a primary objective but rather the health and happiness of our seniors...that's gone.

The GVSC had 150 active members in 2012 and served 250-350 meals a month to seniors. One of our members

who ran the successful nutrition program has volunteered to help this Board to make nutrition successful, so there is hope. The government went through a period of poor senior center management agencies about that time. As a result, the GVCA General Membership in May of 2012 voted against continuing with federal sponsorship of the nutrition program. That began a program to eliminate nutrition for seniors at the GVSC, now complete. Each attempt to provide meals was structured to fail but demonstrate an "effort" by the Board.

Most recently we have had two highly successful meal coordinators who both resigned from their jobs because the Board doesn't want paid kitchen staff and does not support their efforts. A kitchen staff should manage 250-350 meals served a month...unpaid? Ridiculous! The person that used to send out all the meal/activity notices denied the email list password to the new Board communications person so no "reminder" notices could be sent out. We seniors need to be reminded. Thus, the attendance at the last great meal was half what was expected. Few

recommendations of a "Senior Center Futures Task Force" in 2015 were followed. A couple were followed in name only but structured by duplicating the failed efforts of earlier similar functions. No surprise... they failed. This is an organized effort to turn the GVSC into a thrift shop.

Attend the 9:30am March 13 GVSC Board meeting to pressure the Board into bringing back a credible nutrition program guided by the volunteer who ran it back in 2012.

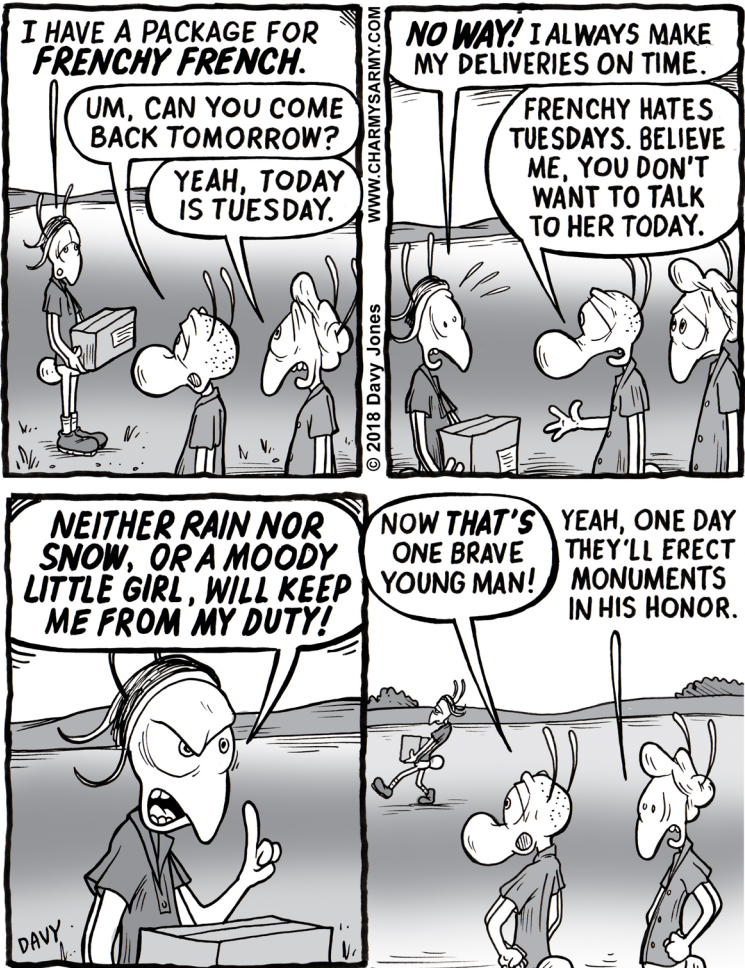

The Idaho World newspaper provides a wonderful community forum for people to share information and opinions on current events and issues which are important to almost everyone in Boise County. It also provides a historical record which is invaluable to posterity. I can only imagine how hard the IW staff works to pull this rabbit out of a hat week after week. Thank you. Two contributions in the February 21, 2018 issue caught my eye.

First, the front-page article written by Jim Kaczmarek, Boise County's Sheriff, concerning Security of Our Youth *and Community*, was very illuminating especially with regard to the roles and responsibilities School Resource Officer's play in our schools and communities. His emphasis on the teamwork approach really caught my eye. After many years of experience in military aviation and information systems security, I can totally agree his point. Security depends on a defense in depth approach. Defense in depth in turn depends on teamwork. Security is truly the whole community's business whether that community is a town, business, government organization or school. Everyone has a role to play and responsibilities to perform, like «See Something, Say Something». I passed near the Pentagon carnage on 9/11 while making my way on foot from the National Guard Bureau building in Crystal City to the National Guard Readiness Center in Arlington

six miles away. So, mass killings are a big deal to me. I went to school with the pilot of Flight 77. 9/11 changed my life and I can assure you this Valentine's Day massacre will change lives in Broward County and beyond. In my study of the plethora of mass killings since 9/11 one thing stands out. That one thing is the complete breakdown of teamwork and adherence to established security policies, procedures and emergency actions. Some serious researchers in this area stand out. If you are interested I recommend reading Rebekah Roth's book, "Methodical Illusion" to understand how the collapse of aviation standard procedures contributed to much of 9/11's death toll. Likewise search YouTube for Wolfgang Halbig videos to see how similar operational procedure failures resulted in the deaths of dozens of school children from New England to South Florida. Wolfgang is the former Florida State trooper and school administrator who helped Broward County establish their Code Red emergency procedures... procedures which weren't followed February 14, 2018.

Second, John Cottingham's excellent Letter-to-the-Editor, resonates with Jim Kaczmarek's teamwork message by showing how an otherwise fine GVCS organization can fail in its fundamental mission to provide social services for the aged by losing sight of what is clearly written in their established By-Laws.

Over the past few years we

have all watched the GCSC leadership transform a vibrant community nonprofit enterprise, which served three dinners and a breakfast each week to a membership of 175 for 30 years, into a

thrift shop serving a few narrow economic interests.

We all need to keep our focus and our eyes on the prize.

Garden Valley Hospital Taxing District Regular Meeting Continues to Explain Appropriate Medical Services

GARDEN VALLEY -- The meeting room was packed with over 30 people at the Outreach Center in Garden Valley, when the GV Hospital Taxing District had their regular meeting on February 27, 2018. Board members present were Chairman Greg Simone, Treasurer Jan Ward, Helen Beckwith, Billie DaVolt and Brandon Knuteson who represent Garden Valley area. Lowman board representatives are Beth Armor and Secretary Stephen Sylvester.

Reports are given in meetings by those contracting with the GVHTD. Kimberly Kahre, GV School Nurse, gave her report on the student care the past month and upcoming health classes and health checks. Angie Waters gave the Outreach Report and clarified what types of programs she helps the students with on the two days per week they are open. She has letters that she wants to share soon from students who appreciate the Outreach Center programs.

A report was made by Beth Armor to explain the discussions made to the Boise County Board of County Commissioners. Representing the GVHTD was Attorney Ian Gee and Secretary Steven Sylvester and Armor. She explained, "There were questions asked of us from Chairman Alan Ward as to whether or not we were complying with open meeting rules and our agendas and information that we need to get out there." Armor concluded, "That was pretty much what was in our discussion."

She said that her husband did find the Idaho Open Meetings Manual online and a webinar that the board could look at. "I am new to this, so I am coming into a board that has already been established so I don't know all that is necessary, but I am going to watch the webinar. I cannot speak on behalf of the board, as to what happened prior to my time being here."

Simone said, "We have received several public records requests coming from the Board of County Commission-

ers. The GVHTD is an elected board and a peer relationship. It is not a relationship that we are held accountable to the County Commissioners, nor do we hold them accountable. We were questioning of the appearance that is investigatory and what is the purpose. Either they received some complaints or they themselves were wondering about our history of notifications." He said they may have missed notifications from time to time.

Sylvester said he explained that to the commissioners. Sylvester added, "Commissioner Ward expressed support for the GVHTD at the meeting. But I want it to be very clear, *very clear*, is that GVHTD Board does not report to the County Commissioners, we report to the *state taxing district*. In fact, the BOCC cannot get involved in the board business. It is important to remember that. We are actually working together. We are finding out how we can better serve."

Simone continued the meeting saying, "We are in the

stages of flushing out proposals. What has come up is a traveling clinic or a rotational clinic, assisting the paramedic program, the school nurse and what is our future relationship with the OC." He said they need to look at what would it take to get in some basic medical supplies in the OC building and bring in a nurse practitioner to come on a traveling basis. Simone said, "The physical therapists and dentist are looking for more space." Helen Beckwith said that she is looking into Terry Riley Foundation and the Boise hospitals to consider coming to GV with rotating medical providers.

Simone explained the Mission of the GVHTD: "It is to provide medical services and define them. The services would be what is found in a hospital like counseling, outpatient, outreach, clinics and classes." GVHTD wants to know the numbers of people falling through the cracks for services and hopes the doctor can help with those numbers.

Sylvester commented, "If

you want to have a good time and put yourself to sleep, read the state requirements and see if you can figure them out. A Hospital District *is not the same* as a Hospital Taxing District. But you can't tell that by reading the state statutes. But we are being asked to be accountable."

Numerous questions and comments were made by the public. One community member concluded that the original intent of the board is, "Everything falls under services provided by licensed medical people. Anything outside of that you can't do." Others just wanted to understand the OC purposes better or why the pharmacy got helped. A question was asked about transparency with the attorney contract and money being allotted for services. Some comments expressed the good things about the OC and the school nurse. The GVHTD said that they would keep responding to questions at the next meeting which will be held March 27th at the OC.

Idaho CuMo Mining Corporation Importance of Strategic Minerals to the United States

BOISE COUNTY – Idaho CuMo Mining Corporation (ICMC) updated three committees in the Idaho State Legislature regarding the status of the CuMo Project exploration.

"Keeping our legislators and key decision makers up-to-date on all activities with the CuMo Project is part of our commitment to sustainability," said Lisa Anderson, Vice President of Government Relations at ICMC. "It's an opportunity to discuss new developments and answer their questions."

Anderson informed the House Environment, Energy and Technology; House Resources and Conservation; and

Senate Resources and Environment committees of important scientific data, the economic development potential, permitting delays, and the effort to add molybdenum (moly) to the critical minerals list to advance the CuMo Project.

The CuMo Project is a strategic minerals exploration located 13 miles northwest of Idaho City. Scientific research of the CuMo ore body has classified it as the world's largest molybdenum deposit and in the top 25 silver deposits. Additionally, the exploration has established the presence of substantial quantities of copper and tungsten.

On February 19, 2018, the Trump Administration posted an updated critical minerals list that contains 35 minerals considered crucial to the U.S. economy and national security. The list included rhenium, which is most cost-effectively produced as a byproduct of molybdenum processing.

"Rhenium is an important part of the economics of the CuMo Project," said Anderson. "While rhenium is in the spotlight, molybdenum should not

be overlooked with its numerous applications for national defense and emerging technologies.

ICMC launched a campaign earlier in February to add molybdenum to the 2018 Critical Minerals list which could afford special protections for the strategic metal and bring needed attention to the permitting and development of the CuMo Project and other domestic molybdenum projects.

Currently, China controls of 56 percent of the world's molybdenum compared to 18 percent controlled by the U.S. Molybdenum has been a critical part of national defense since World War II for armored vehicles, water vessels, aircraft and body armor for soldiers. Infrastructure applications for molybdenum include constructing, repairing or replacing bridges, tunnels, railways, buildings, pipelines and airports. Emerging molybdenum innovations include next-generation lithium-ion batteries with expanded capacity and extended lifespan, the only viable alternative to silicon in semiconductors which may

facilitate two-dimensional applications and advancing x-ray technology to an atomic and molecular scale.

"Molybdenum matches every criterion for the critical minerals list," said Anderson. "We want to avoid a supply chain disruption when any or all of these moly applications become major economic drivers for the U.S."

The U.S. Department of Interior has opened a public comment period regarding the draft Critical Minerals list. Comments can be submitted to the Department of Interior online through March 19, 2018. The ICMC team encourages CuMo Project proponents to submit comments supporting molybdenum as a critical mineral.

ICMC has established a Critical Minerals page on the CuMo Project website for stakeholders who desire more information about the lobbying effort and resources for engaging with decision makers.

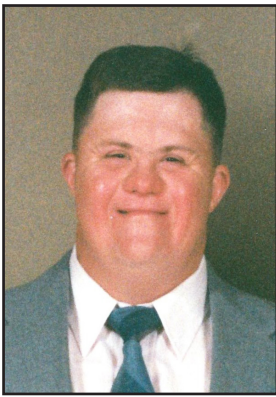

Appeal Hearing of 3 Springs Hunting Ranch Brought Before the County Commissioners

BOISE COUNTY -- In an appeal hearing brought before the Boise County Board of Commissioners, Rora Canody, Planning and Zoning Administrator, confirmed the Conditional Use Permit 2017-007 of 3 Springs Hunting Ranch LLC owned by Stuart and Raeleen Welton. Appellant of the hearing was Kerri Pattee-Krosch. She was seeking an appeal of the decision of the Boise County Planning and Zoning Commission who approved the CUP with site specific conditions. The appellant identified

site-specific deficiencies in the decisions including a failure to recognize property rights of the adjoining properties, an incomplete application, failing to provide conditions of negative impact and relying on incorrect legal counsel.

Krosch, at the time of the appeal, was no longer the owner of the adjoining property but instead worked with a verbal agreement of using the properties for grazing. Krosch felt their grazing rights were not protected. She explained that a commercial endeavor on the property would be a differ-

ent process of normal hunting. Krosch also showed her concerns for the P&Z Commissioner Edith Williams, of having some interest in the ranch since William’s father-in-law had some lifetime rights to the property. Edith Williams abstained from the discussion and votes during the initial public hearing and recused herself from Mr. Krosch's request for reconsideration last November.

Raeleen Welton spoke about the appeal and how Krosch is not an actual owner of the property stating Krosch had an unverified grazing lease, so in turn does not have a verified interest in her father’s cattle. She asked for information of how many months the cattle grazed on the leased property since the hunting ranch would operate from August 15 to April 15. Welton also confirmed that there is no economic interest for Jack Williams on the property. Welton said that their land meets historical and current hunting practices.

Plans for emergency conditions have met approval according to Welton. Fencing was approved by Fish and Game and the Weltons were issued a game permit. Many other gov-

ernment approvals were met before pheasants could be released on the property. Welton also explained that in the future they will continue to lawfully obtain permits that would include building a shop and small office. She also indicated that noise pollution will be limited because of the topography of the ranch. Ms. Welton referenced scientific reports that indicate the cattle will only be minimally affected and studies have shown that livestock adjusts to industrial noises etc.

While the Idaho Legislature allows counties to regulate shooting noises, it explicitly forbids interference of such regulations in association with lawful hunting. The County cannot regulate or limit lawful hunting on private property. During the upland game season, hunting is allowed for any hunter with a valid hunting license on a preserve. The county cannot step in and prevent lawful hunting on a designated preserve, according to the P&Z Attorney Steven Meade.

Meade indicated that Krosch did not have legal standing as an appellant because the requirement is that she have a “bonafide interest in real prop-

erty” which Krosch does not have as not being the owner of the property anymore. He stated the cattle in question are regarded as “personal property” under Idaho law. The Commissioners determined that Krosch failed to provide documentation that would establish her bonafide interest and that even if they were able to consider the grazing lease agreement, it is an agreement between her father and the current land owner, and not with Ms. Krosch. The Commissioners determined Ms. Krosch had no legal standing to bring an appeal of the Planning and Zoning Commission decision and therefore were not going to address other allegations Ms. Krosch brought forth in her appeal.

Garden Valley Hospital Taxing District

GARDEN VALLEY -- *The Garden Valley Hospital Taxing District (GVHTD) Board would like to take this opportunity to respond to additional comments and questions received at the monthly public February 27, 2018 meeting.*

It has been one month since Dr. Koenig and Garden Valley Family Medicine (GVFM) declined to accept a \$108,300 contract for services rendered in 2018. Therefore, discussion at our meeting centered around several proposals that need further study regarding how to provide for medical services and clinical services that might be curtailed in a private practice clinic.

The first order of business is to determine how to measure the impact and number of potential patients affected. We will review past projections provided by Dr. Koenig to help determine what number of people might actually be affected so that any solution is proportional to the problem. In other words, if we explore having a visiting clinic we need to determine frequency of service. Is this a full-time need or a part time need? We are investigating the services offered by St Lukes and St Alphonsus' community outreach programs that may help us survey the community. A suggestion was made to also contact Central District Health as they might be able to offer more targeted solutions and also offer a needs analysis. Several comments were received about researching opportunities for physician residencies in rural areas. In line with those comments were suggestions to contact St Lukes family practice department to explore potential rural visits. All of these suggestions will be researched.

Strong support for the school nurse was evident at the meeting and a proposal will be reviewed to extend her hours. Several public comments to the board indicated she provides a valuable service of immediate

care meaning a visit to the doctor is not necessary thereby freeing up appointments for other patients at GVFM. A question was raised as to whether or not the public would be able to see the school nurse potentially as means of replacing some services that might be curtailed. We are able to answer the nurse would not be able to attend to the general public as that is not her certification nor the role that was requested by the school district. An additional question was asked as to why the school does not support the nurse through their budget. When the proposal for a nurse was brought to the board, we asked the same questions. The answers were there was no extra funding available and Idaho does not require school nurses. The board has supported a school nurse in previous years and reviewed the request from the point of view of providing expanded medical services for an underserved population. The contract is annual meaning that if the school is able to find the funding in the future, the hospital district can reduce our funding.

There were numerous comments and expressions of support for continued funding of the Outreach Center for youth activities for programs focusing on medical needs (mental health, drug and alcohol prevention programs, depression, bullying, and emotional well-being). Non-medical programs or outreach should be funded using community support, grants, donations, or via other districts such as the Recreation District. The Board agrees with pursuing this approach and will continue to work with the Outreach Center to focus on appropriate funding.

Additional suggestions were received related to our meeting location and access to meeting information. In addition to considering a larger meeting venue, the Board will be prepared to have more copies of the Treasurer's report and minutes so public attendees can follow

along during the meeting. The Board will also consider establishing a website in the future to house our meeting notes and public comments.

There was one question asking the Board to clarify funding for equipment for a "tele-pharmacy" located in the Garden Valley Market. The new pharmacy is not receiving ongoing support from the District. Rather, much like Dr. Koenig received assistance for equipment with which to begin his own private practice, the pharmacy received a one-time grant for specialized equipment needed to operate a tele-pharmacy. The pharmacy was not recruited by the District. Only after the pharmacists' own decision to be in Garden Valley and making an agreement to locate in its present location, was the possibility of a grant by the District ever brought up. When that happened, Greg Simone, a board member with an ownership interest in the GV Market, followed statutory procedures to disclose the potential conflict and recuse himself. The remaining Board members voting on the decision felt there was strong support within the community for a functioning pharmacy. This support was shared by Dr. Koenig and local home health care providers such as Horizon Home Health Care. The location of the pharmacy was made by the pharmacy company itself. Given the parking, consistent commercial purpose and regular, seven day a week business hours, the pharmacy's location decision makes sense for purposes of providing public access to medical services.

The taxing district board members shared the comments from the Boise County commissioners meeting of Tuesday, February 27, 2018. The Taxing District sent a letter to the Commissioners and then met in person asking for the purpose behind several public records requests as the BOCC is not an investigatory

or oversight role for taxing districts. Commissioner Alan Ward responded that he is a supporter of the hospital district and that he had requested records because he felt some meeting notices had not been placed in locations as they had in the past. Idaho Code requires 5 day notice of meeting and a 48 hour notice of agenda which the Taxing District adheres to and has not missed a posting. In addition, the required posting location is the meeting place which would be the outreach center. We meet the requirement by posting in numerous locations instead of just the center and by posting the agenda between 5 and 7 days ahead of the meeting. The board acknowledged that over time posting locations may have changed and we will pick a consistent location to build up a habit for residents. Right now we post at the library, the post office, the Market, the outreach center and in Lowman at the Sourdough Lodge. There are social media postings and in the Idaho World. For now we will post at the Post Office and the Outreach Center and in Lowman and then determine via feedback if more posting locations are necessary.

At our special meeting on February 5, 2018, the board approved retaining the services of an attorney to advise the board. This is a lawful expenditure of funds and one that is necessary when legal questions are asked of part time volunteer elected officials needing to answer constituent concerns.

Our attorney is the former Boise County Prosecutor, Ian Gee, and his contract calls for as needed, as requested service. For the 2018 budget year, his fee will come from the contingency line item and going forward we will budget legal into the line item with our CPA services and annual audit services. We appreciate his services and knowledge. By retaining his services, we hope the community will recognize that we are doing what many other Boise County taxing boards or city councils do, which is to utilize an attorney to help them in areas they may need assistance in order to follow proper legal procedures and stay within the scope of their authority for the benefit of the public they serve.

The Garden Valley Hospital Taxing District Board will continue to distribute available district funds in accordance with Idaho law and in a manner that benefits the community and in keeping with our mission. We always encourage attendance at our meetings, participation on the board when openings occur, and feedback from and regarding our grants. We are particularly interested in public input regarding continuing to provide medical services to the broad population of the entire District.

Our meetings are held the 4th Tuesday of each month at 4:30 in the Outreach building. The next scheduled meeting is Tuesday, March 27, 2018.

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
