Descending Trailer Takes Out Truck Accident that Detoured Traffic

BOISE COUNTY – A strange accident occurred on Sunday, July 8th, when a truck and trailer dropped approximately 750 yards from the top of the canyon to the bottom, striking a moving vehicle on Highway 21. Miraculously, no one was injured in this accident. According to officers, Michael Tetrick of Middleton, 56, said he was at a home when the brakes failed on his 2001 Ford F-250 truck. The truck apparently rolled backwards towards the cliff and fell off, breaking trees in its wake. The accident was called into Boise

County dispatch at 1:28pm; the roadway was closed soon after, because the accident impeded both lanes of travel. The highway was reopened 3 hours later, at 4:30pm.

Jason Partch of Boise, 25, had just bought a 2008 Chevy Silverado truck, the day prior. Taking it for its initial test drive, he and his passenger, Brett Park, loaded up some motorcycles to ride the trails around Idaho City. They drove northward on Hwy. 21, and at about milepost 22.5, the actions were already in motion, the F-250 was coming down the steep cliff. The rented hy-

draulic trailer broke loose from the F-250 and was headed for the highway. Partch explained what happened next, "I was driving and heard trees breaking. I looked up and saw the trailer. I had no time to do anything. I put both hands on the wheel and braced myself and bang. The trailer landed on my truck and caused me to go off the road." He then recalled looking up at where the trailer had come from and seeing Tetrick, "I saw him standing on the edge of the cliff, when I got out of my truck." The trailer had damaged the hood and cab of Partch's Chevy. Officers were able to contact family members to come and pick up the men, since their truck was now undriveable and needed to be towed.

Traffic was detoured up to through the Mores Creek Rim Ranches subdivision. Heavy Sunday traffic lent to 20 minute delays. Robie Creek Volunteer Fire Department and Wilderness Ranch Fire Protection District helped to manage traffic around this accident. They organized stopping points, to stream traffic from one direction at a time down the narrow

dirt roads.

The Boise County Sheriff's Office responded to the scene,

but the Idaho State Police took over this ongoing investigation.

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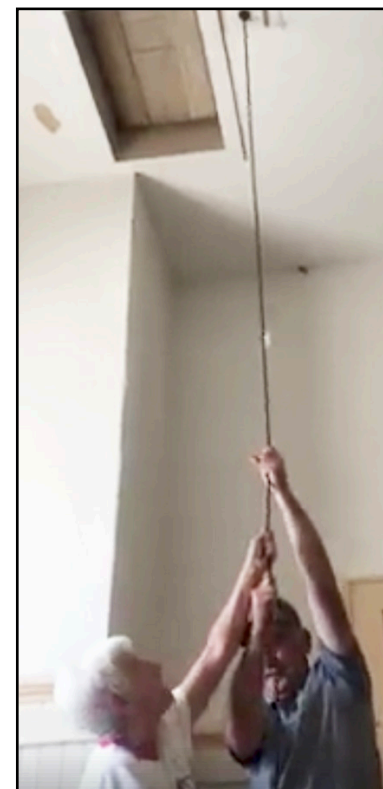
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School Bell Rings Again

Smoke Plagues Garden Valley from a Prescribed Burn

GARDEN VALLEY -- Fire crews continue work north of Crouch at the Lodgepole prescribed fire, located approximately 14 miles north of Crouch, near the Silver Creek Plunge recreational area. Smoky skies, particularly in the morning, have brought on concerns of the public. The prescribed burn was initiated on April 24 with the objective to reduce ground fuels, improve forest vegetation, and improve wildlife habitat conditions. That is the typical

goal of any prescribed burn. The area covers approximately 1,250 acres. Michael Williamson of the US Forest Service, out of the Emmett Ranger District, has been releasing updates of the conditions by phone and email. Many calls have been made to agencies about the smoke seen on the hill or the smoke laying on the valley floor in Garden Valley. Residents have been chasing the theory that the fire is now "out of control". Williamson explains what is happening, saying, "We are send-

ing more resources to work the area and shore up fire lines. There was a question [amongst the firefighters] about one area where the fire has bumped up against the project boundary, though it's not clear if it has gone over or not at this time." The 68 firefighters are on vigil to make sure the area is burning safely within the project boundaries and are making considerable progress. The warmer weather and windy conditions have not been helpful. This would be true in any fire condition.

Needles dry out and have been shedding. The winds encourage this process to happen faster by gathering needle litter on the ground. This will cause a lot of smoke and add to the fire conditions. These heavier fuels, according to the USFS press releases, are rapidly drying out which allows the fire to slowly spread to adjacent unburned areas within the containment areas. Williamson adds, "Smoke will be more prevalent in the mornings when the air is heavier. The smoke then follows the Middlefork River and onward south towards Crouch." In a Press Release dated July 9, Williamson wants the area residents to know that the USFS "greatly appreciates the Community's patience as we work to relieve the area of smoke."

Fire Prevention public awareness personnel for our area is Jessica Kearney-Reeves. She will continue to distribute information to the radio station, gas station, food store, and a few other places,

so that locals can learn about the progression of the fire containment. She will be the "eyes on the ground" for the USFS and provide the best source of information.

Fire suppression efforts are being maintained and the USFS has a handle on the Lodgepole prescribed burn. Despite rumors, the fire is not out of control and there is no "forest fire" the USFS is diligently overseeing the fire and bringing in fresh crews as needed. The area will have some road closures on spurs 671B1 and 671A. Signs will indicate closures. The USFS also wants the public to exercise caution on the road leading up to Silver Creek Plunge, as fire crews will be traveling along that route.

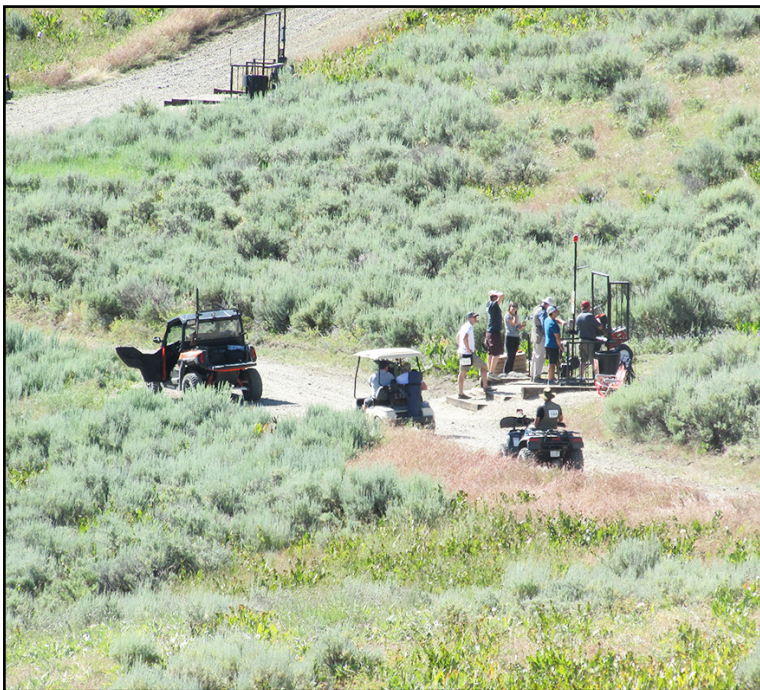

CHAMPIONSHIP SPORTING CLAYS SHOOT

Rock Creek Shooting was the host for the 2018 Idaho State Championship Sporting Clays Shoot held June 27-July 1. Participants from all over competed in several sporting clays and 5 stand competitions. A total of 12 target matches were held. A Federation Internationale de Tir Aux Sportives de Chasse (FITASC) was also part of the championship events. FITASC sporting is an international form of sporting clays. Gun position in FITASC is monitored closely and a variety of targets are employed. The event had 166 shooters from all over the country with 95 from Idaho, 19 from Nevada, 12 from Washington, 8 from California, 7 from Utah, 6 from both Oregon and Texas, 5 from Montana, 2 each from Arizona and Wyoming, and singles from Kansas, Michigan, Florida, and New Jersey. 14 ladies competed as well as 5 juniors. Horseshoe Bend resident Keith Clements competed in 8 disciplines in the Master Class designation. Clements best finish was 6th in the 20 gauge-50 target event. Rock Creek Shooting owners Phil Roark and Rex Blackburn competed as well. Roark (Class B) entered 10 events finishing 3rd in 28 gauge and

4th in 410 gauge. Blackburn (Class AA) opted for the Prelim 5 Stand competition and finished in 5th place. Over 19K in prize money was awarded. Next on the calendar is the Mule Shoot on August 4, the Blue Grouse Shoot on September 1, and the Partridge Shoot on October 6. Rock Creek Shooting is currently registering teams for their fall RCS league. The league consists of teams of 7 and runs 8 weeks from August 9-September 27. There is a \$100 sponsor fee for each

team and participants pay an entry fee of \$10 plus club clay charges. Teams are invited to an end of league party hosted by Rock Creek Shooting with food, beverages, shooting, and an awards ceremony. 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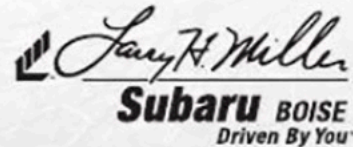

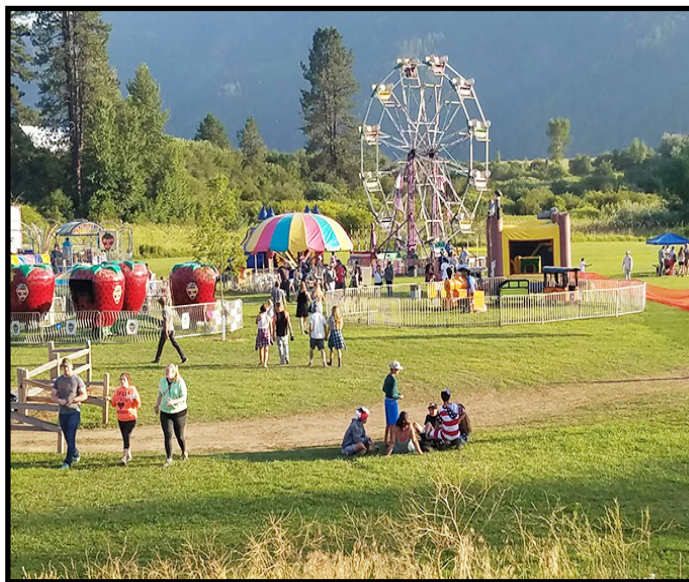

PLACERVILLE -- Placerville held its Independence Day celebration on Saturday July 7th.
