### Discovering Copper & Molybdenum Deposits: A Brief History of Idaho CuMo Project

**BOISE COUNTY** -- Idaho CuMo Mining gave a presentation at the Crouch Community Hall last week to update people about the Molybdenum (moly) mine in Boise County. By all assessments, the project is running its course, following permitting processes, staying in compliance with federal and state agencies, and carefully making sure the project would be sustainable for years to come. Every decision looks

at the environmental, social, and economic impact of the local areas. A mining project often takes 20 years or more to become a reality due to heavy regulations and environmental studies. But one may wonder.....just how did this moly deposit even get discovered? A tour to the proposed mining site was offered to people who wanted to go so that they could see the area for themselves and ask these questions. Tour guest,

Linda Ruppel of Garden Valley, explained what Shaun Dykes, M.Sc. (Eng) and CEO of CUMO had to say to the group. Dykes explained that in 1969 somebody brought in some sediment samples from the creek that contained Copper and Molybdenum. Interested people then followed the sediment along the creek up to the mine site. Amex came along and drilled another 20 holes to look at potential deposits. Unfortunately, by 1981, the Moly market had collapsed, and the project was left alone for a while.

After another thirteen years, Dykes went on to explain, "A desert rat prospector from Mina, Nevada (somewhere between Reno and Las Vegas) staked a bunch of Moly deposits that were open. He must have had a crystal ball." By 2005 the Moly market was up to \$45/lb. This prospector "walked into the CuMo office and CuMo went to look at the site," according to Dykes.

That began a process of looking at the deposits starting in 2007. This eleven-year process continues working through all the governmental requirements. The mine process is still in the "Exploration" phase which means there are core samples being taken to see what concentrations of deposits there are besides just Moly. CuMo has many permitting processes to see how animal and vegetation would be impacted. Millions of dollars are being spent to just do this part of the exploration phase.

The mine is potentially very important to the United States.

The CuMo Mine Project is suspected to be the largest Molybdenum deposit in the world. Currently, China controls the majority of the Moly found on the planet. In addition to Moly, Rhenium (a byproduct of Moly), Tungsten, Copper, Gold, and Silver are present in the mine site. Currently, twenty-one critical metals needed in our country are imported. The US developing its own resources is important so as not to be dependent on other countries. CuMo considers the mine to be a "real jewel" in helping the US keep its own resources.

CuMo also takes into consideration the processing of Moly. Dykes explained to the tour group, that "Moly is very cost-effective to separate. The rock is crushed and then placed in a tank of water. The Moly and Copper float and are easy to skim off. Then the Copper and Moly are refloated to separate those minerals. Essentially it was explained that the Copper and Silver separate together, and the Moly and Rhenium stay together. Then "Moly is then roasted" to separate it from the Rhenium.

Tailings, the ore waste of mines, contain not only tungsten but rhenium, manganite, and a little bit of moly. This byproduct is a "natural fertilizer" that enhances plant growth. In some mining, the tailings are often muddy and toxic, but the Moly mine has tailings that are

safe for the environment and will be used. This is so different from the mining of the past.

Moly is used to harden steel, but yet can be a mineral found in your vitamins. Moly is used for infrastructure construction. It is a critical part of national defense applications, including body armor. New innovations for use are constantly emerging. The CuMo website explains that Tungsten has the highest melting point of all metals and is used as an alloy with other metals. Its applications include arc-welding electrodes and heating elements for high-temperature furnaces, which are crucial to mining and petroleum industries. Rhenium has the second highest melting point after Tungsten. It has important healthcare applications as an alloy used in X-ray machines and is critical to national defense with its use in fighter jet parts. Rhenium and Tungsten are on the critical minerals list. Moly is applying to be on the list.

The CuMo Project in Boise County is comprised of 205 claims covering an area of 6.4 square miles and is 100 percent owned and managed by Idaho CuMo Mining Corporation, a wholly-owned subsidiary of American CuMo Mining Corporation. ## Judge Cockerille Swears in Volunteer Guardians

**BOISE COUNTY** -- In the 4th Judicial District last year, there were 710 children in the out of home placement. Of which, 409 were appointed to our CASA Program. Jamie Hansen, Executive Director, said, "Due to our volunteer pool and a few with our staff, we were able to serve 355 children. Our goal is to serve 100% of the children in Child Protection, regardless of their age, with a volunteer Guardian ad Litem and trained attorney. Hopefully, we can recruit and support another three volunteers in Boise County in the coming months." They are

looking for individuals willing to serve for ten hours a month.

Jamie Hansen, Family Advocates Executive Director, stated, "Here in Boise County, unfortunately, we're starting to see some numbers increase; numbers of abuse, neglect and abandonment. And it means that we desperately need to have local folks that understand the culture and the climate here." Two individuals from Ada County were sworn in by Judge Roger Cockerille, but they are hoping for three more individuals to fill the role and dedicate about ten hours a month.

She said many times these children are under the age of five and unable to represent themselves. "Regardless of age,

having an individual, a positive healthy adult role model in their life can only help decrease the trauma that they endure and more quickly find safe permanent placement for those kiddos."

Judge Cockerille stressed the importance of Guardians ad Litem to a case, "You're not on the side of the State, you're not on the side of the parents, you're on the side of the children that you get appointed. And you are bringing a fresh set of eyes to me and it helps me. The Guardians ad Litem help me to see the forest through the trees. They are incredibly valuable. They only get more valuable as time passes by. Meaning, I think if anything, I've become more ginger in my approach to families, more

careful in my approach to families, always remembering that when I encounter a family in crisis, *first do no harm*, then what can I do to fix things, what can I do to make things better. And I look to my guardians to help me make that determination."

## Extension Educator's Corner: 4-H and You

In celebration of a new year of 4-H programming, my articles this month have focused on the history of the 4-H program combined with what's happening locally. This week I want to focus on how youth can be involved in 4-H programming.

The framework of 4-H is designed for youth ages 5-18 years old. Youth who are 5-7

years old are called Cloverbuds. Research shows that this age group does not have the necessary fine motor skills to handle large livestock and are not developmentally ready for competition. As a result, there are some projects Cloverbuds don't participate in, but plenty of ways youth ages 5-7 can become involved.

In Idaho 4-H, there are five ways that 4-H programs are delivered for youth of all ages. The most common delivery method is the 4-H Club. A 4-H club is a group of five or more youth from three or more families that meet at least six times a year. Our office helps those who are new to 4-H join an existing club or start a new club. Clubs can be focused on a single project, like shooting sports for example, or they can

have several youth interested in many different projects in a community-style group. The club setting provides opportunities for leadership and community service as well as team building with youth and adults of all different ages and backgrounds.

The next delivery method is School Enrichment. We have a very active in-school enrichment program happening in Emmett, currently. In the elementary schools there, teachers have a certain slot of time that's flexible and 4-H has been invited to provide programming. Our staff member goes into each class once a week to provide an activity that's connected to grade-level learning objectives to support what the students are already learning. Activities often include an art component that teachers can then relate to a writing or science activity later in the week.

Another delivery option is afterschool programming. This takes many different forms. I've seen Lego robotics done in an afterschool setting, one-on-one mentoring, home-work help, as well as healthy lifestyles activities like gardening or physical

education. Settings for 4-H afterschool programming can be at schools, libraries, or community centers. Wherever 4-H afterschool programs exist, the basic premise of research-based, hands-on, experiential learning is the framework for learning and usually a decent amount of fun, too.

The last two models are Camps and Special Interest groups. These types of delivery methods are often short-term and can be held in a single day, a series of days or in an overnight residential setup. Each summer we hold several camps at Cascade Lake 4-H Camp near Donnelly, including a horse camp and three different adventure camps for different ages. Some of my favorite

memories as a 4-H member are from going to 4-H camp.

So, how can you sign up? The best place to start is by completing an Interest Form which can be found on our website (<https://www.uidaho.edu/extension/county/gem/4-h>). You can also call my office (208-365-6363) and we'll fill one out over the phone. Then we can match you with an active group or help you start something new. Once we get that part sorted out there's an online enrollment process and a small fee to become a member. We have a lot of room to grow the 4-H program in Boise County and I look forward to finding the best fit for you and your family.

## Partnership with Conservation Group Improves Safety Along ID-21

**ITD Office of Communication (D3)** -- In southwest Idaho, creeping brush growth along the highway creates great hiding spots for critters – posing a serious safety risk for motorists when animals suddenly jump out onto the highway from behind a bush or tall grass. But, thanks to a partnership with the Idaho Conservation Corps (ICC), one of the most potentially problematic sections on Idaho Highway 21 got a safety boost recently by clearing out adjacent plants.

The partnership is a win-win. ITD receives the benefit of the additional workforce, and ICC members learn new skills. The teens are more hireable and animals have fewer hiding spots to jump out from.

The idea of the partner-

ship came from Russ Rivera in the Office of Civil Rights. ITD covered the expense of this work without touching the department's allocated maintenance funds. Instead, Russ found training funds from the Federal Highway Administration and U.S. Forest Service.

Russ reached out to District 3 about finding a job for ICC members. With no shortage of maintenance needs, the D3's Maintenance Coordinator John Hall quickly identified the overgrown area as a target and worked with ICC to make the cleanup a reality.

Over the course of a week, the team cleared brush along two miles of ID-21 between milepost 20-22. This stretch of

road is a major migration path for big game, like mule deer and elk. After completing the brush cleanup, the ICC crew moved into Forest Service land to work on trails and forest management. They'll return to do

more brush cleanup in October. This is the second year ITD has partnered with ICC. Last year, the organization sent a crew to do work in the Coeur d'Alene area. The purpose of ICC is to provide opportunities for youth

## Opinion: Letters to the Editor

On November 6th I am voting NO on Prop 1, and not because I have a problem with gambling. I am voting no because the Prop 1 promoters have not been honest. Perhaps they are former DOJ or FBI federal employees recently fired from their high level swamp jobs in Washington DC for uber criminality, corruption and fraud. According to IDUnitedAgainstProp1.com Prop 1 promoters told Idaho citizens and lawmakers one thing then did another which included shutting down horse racing despite making millions as reported by the Associated press on 12/21/2014. Clearly the promoters couldn't care less about horse racing nor revenue for schools. For them its all about slot machines and the easy cash flow and profits they generate. This all sounds a lot like the narratives and misrepresentations we're hearing from the likes of the Two Forks Taxing District. All the technical details are explained on the website. Digging into 2018 Prop 1, Section 3, Chap-

ter 25, Title 54-2502, promoters wrote the language so they only have to run horse races 8 days a year. It should be several times that. The gambling machines are enabled 365 days a year. This language, together with 2018 Prop 1, Section 4, Chapter 25, Title 54-2512A, all but kills horse racing in Idaho and leaves just one-half cent per gambled dollar (.5%) for schools. Not surprisingly promoters are guaranteed 9% profits which is 18 times that promised schools. Our previous experience with these "promoter promises" from 2013 to 2015 is documented for posterity in the Idaho Audit Division, Report MR 33214, dated December 12, 2016. The Idaho State Auditor found that money promised to schools had been illegally taken away and misspent. Given the less-than-attractive Prop 1 "deal" offered by the "promoters" and their failure to perform as promised in the past, why would anyone vote in the affirmative? More importantly, who got us back

to this square --- square one, after the last debacle. Someone once said, "Doing the same thing over and over again and expecting different results is the very definition of insanity." One thing is for sure, we need Donald Trump making this deal and NOT the usual suspects at the State House in Boise. At every level, government employees, contractors, lobbyists and promoters need to be honest and perform as promised. I'm voting NO on Prop 1. How about you?

## Social Security & Supplemental to Increase in 2019



Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits for more than 67 million Americans will increase 2.8 percent in 2019, the Social Security Administration announced today.

The 2.8 percent cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) will begin with benefits payable to more than 62 million Social Security beneficiaries in January 2019. Increased payments to more than 8 million SSI beneficiaries will begin on December 31, 2018. (Note: some people receive both Social Security and SSI benefits). The Social Security Act ties the annual COLA to the increase in the Consumer Price Index as determined by the Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Some other adjustments that take effect in January of each year are based on the increase in average wages. Based on that increase, the maximum amount of earnings subject to

the Social Security tax (taxable maximum) will increase to \$132,900 from \$128,400.

Security and SSI beneficiaries are normally notified by mail in early December about their new benefit amount. This year, for the first time, most people who receive Security payments will be able to view their COLA notice online through their my Security account. People may create or access their my Security account online at [www.socialsecurity.gov/myaccount](http://www.socialsecurity.gov/myaccount).

### REPORT POACHING IN IDAHO

Call 24/7



**Poaching Hotline (800-632-5999) available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.**

With many hunting seasons underway, the Idaho Fish and Game asks the public to call the Citizens Against Poaching (CAP) hotline if they witness a violation of wildlife laws.

"Those who 'Make the Call' are instrumental in catching poachers stealing game and fish from the Idaho citizens," said David Silcock, Idaho Fish and Game regional conservation officer based in Salmon. "Many poaching cases would not be detected, let alone solved without the public's extra eyes and ears."

Callers to the hotline, 1-800-632-5999, can report wildlife law violations anonymously, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Cash rewards are available to callers who provide information leading to the citation of suspected wildlife law violators.

Rewards are: \$200 for birds, fish and general violations;

\$300 for most big game animals and wild turkey; \$600 for trophy species such as bighorn sheep, mountain goat, grizzly, moose and caribou. In special circumstances, these amounts can be higher.

During the 35 year history, CAP has been an important link to catching poachers. Each year, CAP receives an average of 600 calls from the public, which results in 150 citations issued and \$20,000 paid in rewards.

Those who report a wildlife violation are encouraged to note as complete a description as possible of people and vehicles involved, as well as report it as quickly as possible.

"The more detailed information you provide and the quicker your report it, the more likely a poacher will get caught," Silcock said. "License plate numbers are extremely useful, as well as exact location, time and description of suspects."

## Hospital Taxing District Facing November Ballot Vote

**GARDEN VALLEY HOSPITAL TAXING DISTRICT**  
 -- A local ballot measure on the November election which is on the minds of those living within the Garden Valley Hospital Taxing District is the decision to dissolve the GVHTD. There has been much news over the past year involving the District and some items often controversial or disputed by the community.

A petition to put this to a vote on the November ballot was started this year by Dr.

Michael Koenig when he felt the Board was incompetent in their decisions. Enough signatures were gathered. The next step was to have the County Commissioners approve the ballot measure for November and also approve the language on the ballot. Now this will be a simple **yes** or **no** answer to the question of retaining a Hospital Taxing District on November 6<sup>th</sup>.

Medical and emergency services have changed drastically in the District over the past year since the contract was

not resigned by Dr. Koenig. The District Board cut back on money for the subsidy programs run by Garden Valley Family Medicine Clinic. Now, with District Board changes and dialogue regained with Dr. Koenig, the community has a short time to decide how their tax money should be used. The decision will be decided by a simple majority vote.

Dr. Koenig, and his wife Rosemary, have been attending meetings with the newer current District Board. Discussions at the meetings and

personal meetings reflect an attempt to repair the relationship of the Clinic, the Doctor and the Board. Services Dr. Koenig is willing to contract are for sliding scale fees, and package reimbursement for home health care. He explained that he spends significant time completing government paperwork in detail that is required. He also asked for a reimbursement for obtaining free or discounted pharmaceutical drugs.

The doctor will no longer be assisting the ambulance in rides to Boise to avoid air transport. Dr. Koenig is not willing to take on liabilities of others or anything he would have no control over. He will, however, continue turning in reports to the Board on a regular basis if the District continues after the vote determinations.

Some people say they don't need the subsidy programs because they can afford their own insurance. But somewhere down the line these same people might run into hard times and lose insurance. With an older population, home health can become an integral part of medical care. Now our community neighbors are having to make the decision to move to Boise for home health care. They are forced to move away from what they thought

was their forever home in the mountains. These are things to consider when medical care is lagging behind.

Arguments can be said that the Doctor is a for-profit business and should not be receiving funds from the taxing district. Others simply felt the past Board members, who have since resigned, were doing appropriations of tax money correctly by funding other community medical services. There has been word out on the street that money helps the doctor's earnings. The community needs to do their homework and seek the truth to see what fits in their decision process.

Medical services and a facility to operate from are hard to come by in a rural area. The previous Board ran into problems getting part-time medical services for the community, though they pursued many avenues. In order to follow statutes of Idaho Law, a Hospital District must use funds for clinical services having a doctor in charge of those services. The community needs to examine what is best for the District as a whole and if medical services should be re-instated through the GVFM Clinic. This will be determined November 6<sup>th</sup> through the vote for dissolution of the District or not.

## Placerville History & Newly Paved Road

For the first time in its history, Placerville has pavement. Placerville has, like a lot of the small cities in Boise County, for nearly 156 years had dirt streets that filled buildings and homes with a layer of dust and dirt, leaving clerks and house wives the daily chore of dusting and sweeping old wooden floors. Placerville, once the 8th smallest incorporated city in Idaho, now has pavement on the main grid, starting from Mispilie and down Granite street past the Magnolia Saloon, which is now one of Placerville's two museums. Mayor Brian Davies and the city Council approved \$15,000.00 dollars to lay the first-ever pavement. The town site was

selected December 1, 1862; By the early summer of 1863, and by December 16 there were six cabins in the camp. a population of 5,000. Boise

Basin had a higher percentage of families than did most mining areas, and the major towns, like Placerville and Idaho City, acquired substantial buildings, lodges, churches, schools, and post offices. Placerville was unusual in that it even had a street grid and a town square, known locally as the "plaza." President Lincoln dedicated Placerville one square mile in 1862. Additionally, it had an Episcopal church, which is still in use currently, thirteen saloons, seven restaurants, five

butcher shops, five blacksmith shops, as well as hotels, druggists, express agents, bakeries, livery barns, carpenters, sawmills, and –attesting to the presence of women—dress-makers and a millinery shop.

With 6,267 people, Bannock City ( Idaho City) in Boise County had the largest population in the Northwest, surpassing Portland in 1863. Another 8,500 in the Boise Basin lived at Placerville, Hogem, and Centerville.

From the photographic evidence, it appears that there were two Emmanuel Churches. One built in 1894 and the other built in 1904.

From the historical records, it would seem the Episcopal presence was established in the 1870's by Bishop Tuttle.

Early Episcopal Missionary Maps list Placerville as a Church location.

Deeds to the Church and the parking lot are recorded in the Dioceses name.

Continual Episcopal presence is documented from 1870 and Emmanuel Church Placerville existence as an Episcopal Church from 1894 to the present.

The only other item of note is that, while always being an Episcopal church, strict adherence to Episcopal Doctrine has never been enforced and was never an issue. Since its inception it has always been seen as an open place of Christian worship that welcomed all denominations equally.

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

## Fun Family Outdoor Ideas...

*A lot of looking ... including at swallows*

Look down first, and you may not have to “look up” a critter in your field guide. If animal tracks hit side by side, they were made by a tree-dwelling animal like a squirrel. Rabbits and other ground-dwellers who wouldn't be caught dead in a tree place their front feet, one slightly ahead of the other as they walk. Running is a different story, of course.

The same rule generally applies to birds. Tree-dwellers such as woodpeckers and sparrows hop on both feet at the same time during the few minutes a day they spend on the ground. Quail and pheasants alternate steps, much like humans, who share their earthly domain. Robins and crows spend time both in trees and on the ground, so do a little of both.

Camcraft: Add to your camping gear: long-handled barbecue utensils, baby wipes,

hand cleaner in a pump bottle.

### Flying acrobats

All swallows feed on flying insects so they've got to be masters of flight, sight, and speed. The long, pointy wings and forked tails of barn, cave, cliff, northern rough-winged, tree, and violet-green swallows help them glide through the air, make sudden turns, and maneuver like a Porsche on the Autobahn.

They range in size from the diminutive bank swallow (5-6 inches) to the purple martin, measuring about eight inches long. With short, wide bills and strong jaw muscles, swallows are well adapted to catching insects in flight.

### Focus on the crayfish

One or another variety of this little critter lives in virtually all types of water; still, moving, murky and clear. He's a mainstay of both animal and human diets in many places. Known as the “mudbug” in Louisiana,

crawdad is another moniker, crayfish is the most popular name for this relative of the lobster.

He makes a great fishing bait, a pretty good gumbo, and in turn will eat just about anything he can catch, from small fish to aquatic insects. Crawdads' colors often reflect their environment, and I've seen them in red, white, green and brown.

And while he's generally trying to get away from you or other predators, when pressed a crawdad will stand and defend his territory with those pincer-like front claws.

### Watch

A while ago, I asked author Guy de la Valdene how he is able to so vividly describe the

natural world around him using mere words. His answer is a “how-to” guide for all of us when we walk in the woods.

- Watch what your dog watches. They are closer to the earth, literally, but also attuned to the smells, movement and natural indicators bred out of us millennia ago.

- Focus on the ground 50 feet in front of you. Much of

the natural action takes place there, and it's far enough away critters aren't spooked yet. It also awakens your peripheral vision, so you're getting feedback from both sides.

- Watch for things that appear out of place: horizontal planes in a vertical forest; bright colors in drab surroundings; movement in a still environment.

# Learning Humanity

Independent; Lester Maddox, David Duke and George Wallace himself, started sending me letters. I moved away leaving no forward address. In the back of my mind, I knew that I had topped all my previous transgressions.

Until the recent Christine Blasey Ford versus Brett Kavanaugh testimonies, the last time I had seen several hours of commercial free network television, other than a major catastrophe, was during the Clinton impeachment hearings when the meaning of the word "is" came into question and became a national embarrassment.



He was raised in Horseshoe Bend on a cattle ranch, he learned to work alongside his father, Fred Stephenson, herding cows from Harris Creek to summer pastures in Brownlee, digging irrigation ditches,

baling hay, and the myriad of chores needed to keep the ranch running. He joined the United States Airforce in 1951 and was stationed in Georgia and California. After being honorably discharged he returned to Horseshoe Bend. He married Shirley Ann Gordon in 1954 and the couple moved to Livingston, Montana where they lived for six years. Kenneth worked for Downer Lumber there. Their family grew to include two children in Montana, and in 1960 they moved back to Horseshoe Bend when Kenneth found work with Hoff Lumber Company. He never wanted to leave home again. Kenneth designed and built moulder knives at the mill in Horseshoe Bend for the next 20 years. Then he put his skills to work at Boise Moulding and Lumber for another 10 years before officially "retiring". His version of retirement involved plenty of yard work, gardening, working in his shop, and long walks every day. He spent the last four years of his life at his daughter's home near Idaho

City. Although he appreciated the loving care he received, he never stopped longing for home in Horseshoe Bend. Despite serious health challenges, he continued to walk on a daily basis and even kept himself busy shoveling snow throughout the winter at the age of 87. Kenneth leaves behind his wife of 64 years, Shirley Stephenson, and their children David, Sharon and Peggy. His legacy lives on in seven grandchildren and six great grandchildren. With one more great granddaughter expected in November. He was preceded in death by his parents Fred and Mae Stephenson, his daughter Cathy, his brothers, Howard and Wilber, and his sisters Verna and Devota. A graveside service will be held at 2:00 pm Friday October 19, 2018 at the Pioneer Cemetery in Horseshoe Bend.
