Local Fire Chief Recognized by American Legion

CLEAR CREEK -- "You're only as good as the people around you," says Clear Creek Fire Chief Sam Bonovich. He recognized that the department used to be the laughing stock of Boise County. One volunteer remembered, before Bonovich was selected as chief, the county would page out the department from the local bar. In 2008, all of that changed with Bonovich at the helm. He was talked into becoming fire chief, then he set up some new policies, and even learned how to become a firefighter. Chief Bonovich was recently honored in Coeur d'Alene by the American Legion and presented with the Idaho Firefighter of the Year Award.

Matthew Wrobel, American Legion Commander Post 113 in Meridian, wrote this nomination for consideration: "Sam Bonovich is the fire chief of a small volunteer fire department in the mountains above Boise. He is a tireless and dedicated leader. He, along with the other volunteers, are always training for both wild land and structural fires. Not only does he train alongside his peers, he attended classes to become certified in teaching the men and women who work for this department. Sam and his people are on call 24/7 for many different types of emergencies other than just fires. Ask Sam about the great bird rescue. Sam dedicated all of his attention to the things that matter most to him. He selflessly took care of his elderly parents up until their passing and devoted himself completely to the care of his wife who recently passed. Over the years I have known him, he has had equal dedication to his family and to his department. Through the years, I have come to know Sam and it has become evident that he is the finest kind of person that one could call friend."

Nancy was always there for encouragement, saying, "you'll learn as you go." Sam had always wanted to be the guy who gets all dirty, coming out of the smoke, but ended up on the radio. He admits that, "it's not so bad, now that I'm old and fat."

Chief Bonovich would like to sincerely thank Knute Sandahl – State Fire Marshal, ev-

eryone at IDL (Rick Finis & Tyke Loafing), the Clear Creek Volunteer Fire Department, David Haney - grant writer, Vicki Lane, Kelly Kissle, Pete Peterson, Nancy Bedard, and Centerville Fire Chief Bruce Baumhoff. Chief Bonovich said he would not have made it this far without these good people and volunteers. "I'm blessed with an awesome group of people who do anything they can for their community," Bonovich said. "I owe this to all the men and women on this fire department."



John Thomsen & Friends: Songs from Loafer's Glory features an array of favorites by Hank Williams, Hank Snow, Roger Miller, Tex Ritter, Sean McCarthy, and others, as well as a couple of Thomsen originals. Despite decades of making music at folk festivals, weddings, birthdays, political events, plays, dances, funerals, and backyard barbecues, Songs from Loafer's Glory is Thomsen's first CD. "I've marveled at Johnny's stamina, repertoire, musicianship, humor, social conscience, and wordsmithing," says fiddle player and longtime Mores Creek String Band collaborator Dave Daley. Preservation of Folk Music "The Result was a Joyful Magic"

Recorded by Sam Aarons of Idaho City Sound over several daylong sessions, the long overdue recording offers a candid sampling of Thomsen's musical versatility.

"Johnny is a walking library of songs," says Idaho City resident and fellow folk musician Beth Wilson. "He knows so many verses and choruses and the stories that go with them, that he has to keep his interest by rewriting some with words most clever and slightly scandalous . . . I've been honored to play along, harmonizing on the fly."


The CD, which includes a colorful booklet of old photos and good words from friends, features Thomsen's own "Idaho Spud," a bitingly satirical songstory about nuclear waste, the Atomic Energy Commission, and raising kids on "nuclear taters."

Limberlost Press publisher Rick Ardinger likens the recording to the work of Smithsonian folk music preservationist Alan Lomax, who saved so much American folk music from obscurity during the 20th century.

"I don't know why it took so long to get John to do any formal recordings," Ardinger

says. "For the sessions in Sam Aarons studio, true to form, there was no rehearsing a set list of tunes in advance and no re-dos of anything if any of us screwed up," Ardinger said. "So the collection has that 'live' feeling. When John began a song, we did our best to find his key and rhythm, and any musical flourishes or embellishments were spontaneous, improvised, or accidental. The result was a joyful magic."

ORDINANCE NO. 356

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING OR-DINANCE NO. 263 ESTABLISHING THE FEES FOR PURCHASE OF A GRAVESITE IN IDAHO CITY PIONEER CEMETERY, AND ESTABLISHING THE PURPOSES FOR WHICH SAID FEES MAY BE USED.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Idaho City, Boise County, Idaho:

SECTION 1. RESOLUTION OF FEES. The cemetery fee imposed and collected for purchase of a gravesite in the Idaho City Pioneer Cemetery shall be established by resolution adopted by the Council of the City of Idaho City.

SECTION 2. USE OF FUNDS. All fees collected for the purchase of gravesites in Pioneer Cemetery shall be set aside in the General Fund to be used for maintenance, upkeep, and for any other expenses that shall be incurred by the City in the

operation of Pioneer Cemetery. SECTION 3. SAVINGS CLAUSE. If any section, paragraph, sentence or pro-circumstance shall ever be held invalid or unenforceable, such holding shall not affect the remainder hereof, which shall continue in full enforce and effect and applicable to all circumstances to which it may validly apply. SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force upon its passage, approval and publication in one (1) issue of the Idaho World, a newspaper of general circulation and the official newspaper thereof.

SECTION 5. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 6. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force upon its passage, approval and publication in one issue of The Idaho World, a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Idaho City, and the official newspaper of said City.

Horseshoe Bend City Council

Written by Tracy Koslosky HORSESHOE BEND --

The following is a synopsis of the Horseshoe Bend City Council's 667th meeting on July 17, 2019. Absent: Council member Curtis Corvinus. After the call to order. Pledge of Allegiance, the council's approval of the agenda, previous minutes, and the authorization to pay the city's bills, Mayor Pat Goff opened with new business. The city's tentative budget for fiscal year 2020 was discussed, including the addition of a new full time employee and raises for current city staff. At the conclusion of the council's discussion a motion was made and unanimously passed to publish the budget. Next up for new business was a water/ sewer fee increase workshop. City engineer Amy Woodruff led the workshop and presented the council with various plans for a conservation-based water rate increase during the months of May, June, July, August, and September. The plans called for a base rate usage of 3,000 gallons with tiered increases up to 4,000 gallons, 5,000 gallons and more than 6,000 gallons of usage per month. Residents in attendance peppered the council with questions regarding the rate increases and council member Marty White told those assembled, "If you use more than the average amount of water it's going to cost you more." Woodruff added,

"Five times as much water gets used in July than January and the bulk of it goes to irrigation", adding "It's a big stress on the (water) plant". Woodruff went on to explain, "The primary goal is to encourage people to conserve water, the LDS church used 1 million of the 6 million gallons the plant produced last July." Council member Ben Riley agreed that the rate increase was a good idea but wanted to know how many residents it would affect. Woodruff replied that most residents would see an increase of five to ten dollars per month while the conservation rate is in effect. Regarding the sewer rates, the council discussed raising rates from between \$4 to \$9 and installing a mechanical reader for the sewage being dumped at Valley View Chevron by recreational vehicle owners. A public hearing will be held at a future date to determine the exact rate increases.

HSB Fire Chief Jason Gifford presented an offer to buy the city's extraction truck for \$6,000, telling the council it would cost the department over 2K to get the vehicle road ready. Gifford also told the council about an ambulance for sale for \$6,000 by Magic Valley Ambulance. The purchase of the ambulance would enable the city to have a backup vehicle when the main ambulance is down, as it currently is. Horseshoe Bend's ambulance is under warranty and was taken to dealer Corwin Ford for repairs. The city was told it could take from three days to three weeks for repairs to be completed, leaving residents relying on Garden Valley for ambulance services.

Per the city attorney, Tony Pantera, the city must publish the extraction truck as surplus before a sale can take place and the purchase of a backup ambulance must be placed on the agenda to discuss. Mayor Goff agreed to get more information regarding the ambulance being offered by Magic Valley.

Woodruff told the council that a contract had been procured for the new water production well and that it would be completed by November 1, 2019.

A workshop for the new animal/livestock ordinance was held. A tentative ordinance was disbursed to those in attendance. Council member Riley stated. "Some of it's redundant, I think it can be cleaned up." Council member White suggested that something be added regarding 4H animals. Several residents agreed that there needed to be wording specifically addressing 4H animals within the city limits. One resident complained of allergies, suggesting, "If people want to have these animals, they should have them outside the city limits," to which another resident stated, "I'm allergic to perfume, but I can't stop people from wearing it." White said, "The reason cities have ordinances is for accountability, that's why we have to do something." A resident asked the council to keep the fee "cheap enough so it's affordable." Goff replied, "Absolutely, we're looking at five to ten dollars per year." Pantera said the city needed to clarify some things, included in sub section A: temporary permits, establish fees, a 4H provision, and a grandfather clause, before passing a new ordinance.

The EMS report was given, stating that the department had been on 14 calls so far in the month of July.

Public works reported that they were trying to keep up with an increased water demand and that a "new", used riding lawnmower had been purchased. City Engineer Woodruff told the council that Madison Street repairs had begun and that they were working with Barreto Manufacturing (Barreto is in the old Boise Cascade mill). She also told the council that no contract had been made by the Idaho Transportation Department with regards to the construction of the new bridge on Highway 55.

The meeting adjourned at 8:48 p.m. The HSB City Council meets next on Wednesday, August 21, 2019 at 7:00 p.m.

Forest and rangeland fires can cause power outages, either because fire damages electrical equipment or because service must be interrupted to ensure fire crew safety. While the average Idaho Power customer is without power less than two hours per year, some outages last several hours or even days.

There was no public comment. Commissioner Jackson made a motion to change it from Reed Lane to Rohr Lane. which was passed and they were very appreciative.

BUDGET: The budget expenses for the road depart were discussed, a repeater, fuel tanks, etc.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: [Time 2:19pm - 3:13pm] Per personnel at the request of Clerk Prisco. Chairman Ward said no action required.

REPORTS: Commissioner Stirm reported that the National Association of Coun-

ties was well done. "Of 3,000 counties that had different commissioners, I learned that in Cook County, if you are a commissioner, you get a team of people to follow you around and your own lawyer. So, that's pretty cool." The couple of commissioners there from that county had six individuals each "and they didn't write one word." He found out about a culvert cleaner and sheriff's information from there. Stirm will serve on the Public Lands Committee.

Commissioner Jackson had no report.

Commissioner Ward spoke very briefly about the road department and a possible waste site.

FUTURE AGENDA: The Board spoke about scheduling a van ride, and taking a trip with the HR director and Clerk.

Present: Commissioner Alan Ward, Roger Jackson, Ryan Stirm

Pledge of Allegiance

EXECUTIVE SESSION: "Thank you and good morning everybody," Chairman Ward said. Per pending litigation, personnel issues, exempt records, hiring of a new employee, and risk management. [Time 9:01am – 9:37am] Ward coming back into session: "No action required."

CONSTITUENT INPUT: None

MINUTES: Commissioner Jackson made a motion to accept the minutes from July 16th.

DEPARTMENTAL IS-SUES:

SHERIFF DEPT: Sheriff Jim Kaczmarek said the funds have been released from grant money for a new patrol boat, and they were looking to take the bid that was least expensive, which was local for \$43,597.85.

The sheriff's office has industrial carpet left over from a donation and is looking at bids to get the thread bare, twelveyear old carpet replaced. Commissioner Jackson made a motion to accept the bid for \$1,565.

Sheriff Kaczmarek gave an update: "The remodel in Horseshoe Bend Annex started yesterday, they've already got the floor demoed and poured, new walls put in. They are working on painting right now, and plumbing. Chairman Ward said, "Great!"

Commissioner Stirm had a thumb drive of all the Ford fleet vehicles, including police vehicles, and all their options with prices. The sheriff said **CLEAR/ROBIE PROJ-ECT:** A motion to request the reimbursement in the amount of \$19,720 to the Idaho Department of Lands for the Clear Creek/ Clear Robie tree mitigation work.

FORESTER: She said that a lot of the insurance companies are pushing for, when a new homeowner comes in, they are requiring Firewise work to be done and an assessment.

An additional piece of equipment was discussed, with possible partial grant funding. There was some discussion about if it could be used by the Road Department, or for independent contractors. It could be used for Firewise projects. Emergency Manager Bob Showalter said it could be used for saving homes.

RESOLUTION: Adding old law books to the county auction, select items from the courthouse. Chairman Ward joked, "Good, because I'm going to need them," and others laughed. Sheriff Kaczmarek stated: "I actually found a book that is General Laws of Idaho signed down through sheriffs from 1898, and I put that back in the Sheriff's Office." Commissioner Jackson noticed there were law books from the 1866 and 1890, and suggested that may be something they want to give to the museum. Clerk Mary Prisco said they will look into that, but would still need to surplus it. The motion was approved to put the law books as surplus.

BOISE COUNTY SNOW AND ICE REMOVAL POLI-CY: This policy was motioned and approved.

DEMAND WARRANTS: Motion to pay IAC Unemployment in the amount of and we're going to ride through there. The route that they sent stayed on the Banks Lowman Road and on Highway 21, and on Highway 55... We never did see anything on the Middlefork [Road]... Again, it's not illegal, as long as you're not riding three abreast." Chairman Ward said he didn't want to run anyone off or make them feel unwelcomed. Sheriff Kaczmarek again spoke with the organizers and they assured him that they were not supposed to be on the Middlefork Road. They can do what they want, but it wasn't scheduled. Chairman Ward stated: "When I looked it up, it was right on there, it showed them going up the Middlefork. I inquired of some of the folks that were doing it, and I don't know what's true and what isn't, that their job was to ride down to Crouch and ride up to the end of the asphalt on the Middlefork Road and ride back to Terrace Lakes. But there was an awful lot of complaints about them. So, is there any solutions?"

Sheriff Kaczmarek suggested they invite them to come before the commissioners next year prior to the event.

Emergency Manager Bob Showalter suggested a notification process. It was said that there was a reservation of 220 people in Terrace Lakes. Law enforcement provides services. Chairman Ward would like to write them a letter to be more specific, and to reach out to the Emergency Manager.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: [Time 10:26am – 10:52am] Per exempt records, pending litigation, personnel issues, hiring of new employee, and risk management. Indigent records were motioned and assigned numbers. TAX DEEDS: The 2015 delinquent tax deeds were discussed. Chairman Ward motioned for a tax deed per parcels in the county. This was approved through a motion and signed. BUDGET 2020: Clerk Mary Prisco lined out what she would be talking about in regards to the budget, and then added that she would like to discuss some personal issues in executive session. She said the allocation of the Commissioner's Budget, "basically, your compensation. We've only been doing 25% and I don't think that's sufficient; because, if you think about it, I mean, you guys are the executive board. So, I don't know what the percentage will be, but I think we are going to recommend increasing that." She added about herself, "I don't want to change the budget officer at this point, because there are too many different schedules." The admin fees for East Boise County Ambulance District will remain the same.

For the Elections Department, under the Clerk, she submitted a request for \$15,000 to purchase more express vote machines. The county currently has seven, one for each precinct. They would like two machines at Horseshoe Bend, Garden Valley, and Mores Creek. Chairman Ward wanted to know the savings or advantages. She replied that she couldn't quantify the savings, "but the biggest advantage is that we use thermal paper for the ballot. Well, the ballot is programed onto a USB drive. There is a setup fee that is required for each election for that USB, but versus a true paper ballot, we have to print X amount of paper ballots, and whatever we don't use, we have to throw away and it's wasteful in that sense." They have to make sure their election team will have access to the proper colored paper and a copier. Clerk Prisco also said that it helps move voters through. To feed through a counter, they would all have to be express counters. "We are one of the few counties that are still paper ballots." She said, "There were some people concerned about secrecy, which those thermal ballots are folded... They have

privacy blocks on either side of the machine. And some people were concerned about having the ability to have the election process hacked or fidgeted with. That's not an issue either, because it is not connected to the internet. It's just a standalone piece of equipment that utilizes that USB information." The machines cost approximately \$4,000 with additional costs of maintenance. Commissioner Stirm pointed out that we have over 7,000 people that could potentially come out and vote. They joked about having them onboard before the presidential election. The clerk explained that these machines keep Boise County in compliance with ABA federal law, for those with disabilities.

The Sheriff's Department said for vehicles they need to record mileage on current vehicles and proposal for leases.

The deputy reserves are budgeted by mass gatherings, but would like to include more instead of correcting the budget later on.

The Gem Plan is up 5% for a Budget Officer.

Commissioner Ward asked about fuel and if there were any increases. She said the Sheriff's Office has been increased \$10,000.
