Tragic Youth Drowning on the Payette

LOWMAN -- In the last six weeks, there's been three tragic drowning accidents and one near-drowning. The latest occurred last Wednesday, in the evening of August 14th on the South Fork of the Payette, near Lowman Ponds.

Most tragically, the latest victim was just 10-years old and had relatives and ties in the Lowman area.

Maximus Samuel Hansen was kayaking with family members on the upper South Fork about 300 yards upriver from the bridge at

Lowman Ponds. It was a peaceful, quiet evening and the river was mostly calm with the water flowing languidly around the bend at late-summer flow. The Kayakers had put in a ways above and were going to take-out around Lowman ponds.

Unknown to the kayakers, a green tree had recently fallen into the river at the bend. In trying to avoid it, Maximus went into the river and the swirl of the current must have drawn him back in and under the tree where, even with his life jacket, the current was too strong. He was trapped. Family members were unable to get to him immediately to pull him from under the water.

By the time they were able to free him, he had been under water too long. They immediately began to administer CPR and a call was put out to the Lowman EBCAD about 6-miles downriver. When Lowman Emergency response personnel and the ambulance arrived, they immediately continued with CPR, relieving the first responders.

Air St. Luke's was dispatched for the 15-minute flight to the Lowman area and landed at the Ponds. When the Air St. Luke's medical personnel arrived on-site they immediately took over for the first responders and Lowman EBCAD personnel checked for vital signs. However, the young kayaker had been unresponsive for nearly 50 minutes at that time.

While continuously administering CPR, young Hansen was prepared for transport about 300 yards out of the river bed, through the forest and to the waiting chopper, where he was airlifted straight to St. Luke's Regional Medical Center.

At St. Luke's, emergency personnel continued to work on the young victim without response, until he was pronounced dead at 8:40 pm.

A notice was published for a memorial to be held at the Cloverdale Funeral Home in Boise; "Max Hansen passed tragically on August 14th, 2019 at the tender age of 10 years old. An adventurous, loving, friendly child, Max will be sadly missed by all who know and love him. Full life trib-

ute coming soon."

A celebration of Max's life will be held on Saturday, August 24th in the Cloverdale Event Center of Cloverdale Funeral Home beginning at 1pm.

With the rash of accidents going on in Idaho's rivers this summer, it's clear that the necessity for caution can't be emphasized enough for caution outdoor enthusiasts. Even a calm, quiet river poses potential danger around any

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New Changes at HSB Schools

dents in the Horseshoe Bend School District may notice some changes when they arrive on campus Wednesday, August 21. Digital cameras and two-way speakers (with school bells) have been installed in the classrooms, along with keyless entries. New carpet was installed in the high school over the summer break and the gymnasium foyer got a facelift with new flooring and trophy cases, while the main gym had security cameras installed.

This school year, students will have the use of all the supplies necessary to complete their school work, thanks to the district and several generous donors. Backpacks will also be provided to any student in need of one.

Two new additions to the teaching staff were made. The elementary school welcomes 3rd grade teacher, Susie Vavra, and K-12 has a new Physical Education/Health teacher, Jeff Longacre.

This school year the district will be readying for the Northwest Accreditation Commission (NWAC). Schools with grades 9-12 in Idaho are reviewed every five years for compliance with standards of quality by the NWAC in conjunction with the Idaho Accreditation Council, which reviews compliance reports and issues accreditation status to schools.

website http://www.hsbschools.org. The website provides the community a wealth of information, from schedules to student grades through the Lumen portal. Coming soon to the website will be a Mustang Team Store where school patrons will be able to purchase a variety of school-related apparel.

Starlight Finishing the Season with a Funny and **Emotional Family Story**

Over the River and Through the Woods closes out Starlight Mountain Theatre's 20th Anniversary season in a story about family that is sure to tug at heartstrings and remind viewers of the reality of family ties. The Broadway plays under the stars have had delightful weather that has been cooperative through most of the season. The selection of performances has brought locals and out-of-towners to Garden Valley. The newest production, Over the River and Through the Woods, has already started and runs through August 30th. The audience is the mouse on the wall watching the family sort through a very common issue of change, as a son contemplates a move far away from family. His family works hard to keep those ties, sometimes though food and fun dialogue and those habits that drive us nuts! Laughter will come from watching this overzealous Italian family. They are often loud and passionate. Yet the audience will witness their struggles and feel a part of a family.

Davis commented that this production "will make you laugh but tears come as well," as the characters are brilliantly played by some local faces, such as Skye Davis playing the adult son, alongside others that were handpicked perfectly for their roles. "Rob and Kathryn Shields, actors extraordinaire, light up the stage whenever they perform, and we are all so excited they are returning to Starlight to star in this amazing show", says Davis.














THE WILD WEST OF DUKE DAYS RODEO

GARDEN VALLEY --

Duke Days Rodeo lived up to their promise yet again, to be bigger and better with each passing year. The music and running commentary from the announcer keep the crowd cheering and entertained. Held at the Youren Arena, this rodeo has a distinct old west feel, with a unique lineup of events that can't be enjoyed anywhere else in the world!

They started off this year's event with a cowboy shooting demo, a friendly competition between a mother and daughter. A beautiful tribute was then paid to John Wayne, and to this great country in which we call home.

The rodeo was like no other, besides the usual Bronc riding, they have their very own special events. The Rawhide Run consists of one person on a horse, pulling another person riding on a patch of rawhide. The objective is to stay on your respective "rides" and complete the run as a team. Of course, there is always that element of the unexpected, which makes this rodeo a hoot and a holler.

The Bottle Run is yet another event enjoyed by audience members over 21-years of age. The rules are simple, the contestants run after a calf and try to grab an object off from around its neck. Whoever successfully gets that object wins a bottle of Pendleton whiskey!

The Egg Run starts off with everyone holding a raw egg in their mouth. They complete two laps around the arena, where various hay bales are placed, which have to be jumped. The first one to the finish line -- with an intact egg -- is the winner.

The Milk Run is yet another event where members are of age. A team member on horse-back chugs a beer and then ropes a cow. His or her team member must then milk the cow, filling the empty beer can. First one across the finish line wins!

An unusual observance is the

numerous old cowboy boots set up and duct taped atop the fence surrounding the arena. Raffle tickets can be bought and placed inside of the boot in front of the rider you hope to win the insane ride around the hillside. The winner of the run splits the winnings with the winning ticket in the boot. This year they split \$621!

The Duke Days Rodeo is an event unique to Boise County, the rodeo circuit, and honoring the crazy days of the old west.

Minutes for Monday, July 29th, and Tuesday, July 30^{th} , 2019were approved. A discussion ensued concerning the possible purchase of a skid steer. BOISE COUNTY -- Fall is in the air and the summer boating season is starting to wind down at Lucky Peak Reservoir, Arrowrock Reservoir, and all waterways across Idaho. Sad news for boaters who enjoy skiing or fishing sunny, warm days on the water. Surprisingly, many Idahoans utilize their recreation watercraft year-round. Sportsmen are beginning to gear up for the upcoming hunting and fishing opportunities. These folks often access their favorite tucked-away areas when the reservoir water levels drop and the rain or snow begins to fly. Common sense is often clouded by anticipation to be the first boat launch in the morning to reach their favorite destination. Cutting corners is a recipe for disaster when extra time isn't taken to balance gear on boats. Examples happen every year when a boater doesn't adhere to the vessel's U.S. Coast Guard capacity and weight rating placard, no one on the boat checks the latest weather forecast, and passen-

gers are negligent in wearing their life jackets, with some even found in their original package. As a result, a large storm approches the horizon and the small lake ripples turn into a turbulent swell. The unbalanced and overweight boat overturns and the occupants are left clinging to the hull of the boat.

The weather element in Idaho, especially in mountain regions like Boise County, can be unpredictable and change rapidly, thus water safety is imperative. These mariners are often the only ones out on

the water and need to make extra preparations and take extra precautions. Follow this quick boater's checklist to maintain a safe venture:

- Create a float plan. Tell a contact where you are going and when you will be home.
- Always wear your life jacket. Inaccessible or stowed away is no good.
- Research weather forecasts and review updates. You don't want a surprise.
- A dry kit with extra clothes, batteries, matches, snacks, flashlight, first aid kit, VHF radio or cell phone.

- Attach an engine cut-off cord to a boater's clothing. Stopping the engine in an emergency.
- Equip vessel with a platform. If you fall, it's easy to get back on board.
- Dress in layered clothing versus bulky clothing.
- Utilize survival suit or keep small raft on board your vessel as a backup.
- Properly balance gear & don't overload boat. Use U.S. Coast Guard weight and capacity rating placard.
- Bright-colored flag or distress signal.
- If you fall into the water, try not to panic, & control your breathing.
- Vessel safety inspection every year. This award signifies that your vessel has met safety equipment requirements.

Safety first, remember that no trophy buck or fish is worth your life. Never take unnecessary risks that can put you or your passengers' lives in jeopardy. A bit of planning and taking the time to properly outfit your boat will make it an enjoyable winter weather outing and keep you out of harm's

SUSPECTED FIRE FROM CAMPER



WILDERNESS RANCH FIRE DISTRICT -- A fire was reported last Wednesday afternoon, August 14th, at mile marker 24 along Highway 21. Wilderness Ranch Fire Chief Jim Bryant said the fire appeared to have come from an abandoned campfire that was not out.

One Boise County resident has kept watch on that area, a pull-out located north of Wilderness Ranch, because there was a fire there the previous year. People seem to enjoy camping along Mores Creek, but it has become a problem when they don't fully extinguish their campfires. The fire was quickly contained by area resources: Wilderness Ranch Fire District, Robie Creek VFD, wildland firefighters, U.S. Forest Service, and Idaho Department of Lands. It burned less than an acre, but as the winds intensified, could have threatened the closure of the highway.
