# Vehicle Collision at Lowman Injures One

**Lowman** -- A vehicular collision occurred Friday morning just past MP 84 on Highway 21 in Lowman. The driver of a Toyota pickup, driving westbound, collided with a GMC truck also going westbound, rear-ending a trailer being pulled. The driver of the GMC was returning from a short trip to the refuse transfer station, a mile-and-a-half from the accident site. The accident occurred at approximately 9:40 am.

The female driver of the Toyota was injured, but was awake and talking to first responders and emergency personnel. She was not removed from the vehicle until life flight arrived from St. Luke's Medical Center arrived about 10:45 AM. An ambulance dispatched from Idaho City arrived at about the same time, but the decision was made to use the St. Luke's team to transport the injured woman to Boise. The male driver of the GMC was apparently uninjured, but the

GMC truck he was driving was damaged, front and back, and the trailer he was towing was demolished. The injured driver was airlifted to Boise at 11:05 am.

The cause of the accident was unknown, but witnesses stated the driver of the Toyota was noticed driving erratically before the collision, both driving very fast and very slow. It was stated she was a resident of Salmon on her way to Boise, while passing through Lowman, but that was not confirmed. The driver of the GMC is a local resident of Lowman.

This latest accident was just one of a continuing string of accidents along the South Fork of the Payette River corridor, from Garden Valley to Banner Summit. Local residents say that each year, with the increasing traffic on the winding canyon road, the number of single- and multiple-vehicle collisions are becoming distressingly frequent, summer and winter. The primary causes cited have been excessive speed, inattentive

driving, and failure to drive the conditions, especially in winter. The Labor Day weekend, just ended, was a very busy one for the Sheriff's department and Emergency Responders throughout Boise County. As traffic and incidents increase, it is increasingly difficult for the departments affected to respond to all the calls. All the County employees and volunteers affected urge that, visitors and residents alike exercise much more caution, especially those unfamiliar with mountain driving and conditions during different seasons of the year.

A significant number of single vehicle collisions occur from encounters with deer, elk, and other wildlife along the canyon, along with collisions with rocks and debris on the highway. This is primarily due to unstable conditions in the steep parts of the canyon leading to rock slides, mostly in the spring and winter. In the upper canyon and through the Canyon Creek section up to Banner

summit, treacherous conditions may exist due to snow and ice and avalanche danger in the winter.

At the time of publication, no further information on the condition of the driver of the Toyota pickup was known.

**IDAHO CITY** -- Jessie Severns, 15, was able to cheer on the Lady Wildcats to victory for their opening home match of the season on Thursday evening against Greenleaf.

Life changed dramatically when Jessie was diagnosed six months ago with T-Cell Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia, which is a very fast and aggressive form of Leukemia. She has since endured 100 chemo infusions, had twelve lumbar punctures with chemo in her spinal fluid, and two bone marrow biopsies. She has also needed twenty blood transfusions, and had twenty-three platelet transfusions since her diagnosis. The treatment for this childhood cancer is expected to last a total of two and a half years.

Although she had received chemo that very morning, Jessie wanted to be there to surprise her teammates. Having played as a freshman and as a middle schooler on the volleyball team, she felt right at home among these girls and it brought a bright, much-needed, smile to her face.

**Wilbur Wilson "Handsome Bill" Stirling**, 85 of Idaho City, Idaho passed away on August 28, 2019 surrounded by family and dear friends. Bill was born in 1934 in Salt Lake City Utah to Wilbur Wineger Stirling and Agnes Armstrong Wilson Stirling. He was blessed with two wonderful sisters, Wini and Kay, who he was always so proud of.

Bill enlisted in the Navy at 17 and served for 3 years and 7 months. He was a machinist and was well-respected as a team leader fixing ships during the Korean Conflict. He principally served aboard the USS Bryce Canyon AD-36. Upon his separation from the Navy, the Navy hired him to work at the INL to develop the Nautilus class nuclear submarine. He continued to be a nuclear worker until 1974. A true entrepreneur, Bill had several businesses on the side and eventually they became his life's work. He always liked to have a salvage business as a base to support his many properties and

developments. Along the way, he became a pilot even running an air service in Astoria, Oregon. Eventually he found his way to Idaho City which was prime for his interest in making the world a better place the "Cowboy Way." Much of present Idaho City is a better place for having felt Bill's influence for the last 46 years.

In 1953 he married Glenda "Sherry" Nelson. Bill was the proud father of his four girls and one son. Later in life, he married Joan Fleming and cared for her boys as if they were his own. Bill was an honorable man in his own way and though that did not always make it comfortable for his spouse, he was a devoted father. He took his responsibilities seriously teaching his children to ride, shoot, work hard, and think straight. This included guiding an all-girls Horse 4H Club with activities including competing in rodeos, participation in parades, camping, and trail riding. With this kind

of upbringing his children have prospered and given Bill many grandchildren all of whom look up to their Papa and his wit and wisdom, including the infamous rope trick.

Bill Stirling is survived by his children; Sherry with Ken Fernandez, Virginia (Gigi) with Brent Davis, Jamie with Roger Metz, Billie-Jo with Keith Hess, Charlie Stirling with Jenn Lemons, 23 grandchildren and 42 great-grandchildren. **GARDEN VALLEY** -- A fire was started by mile marker 2 on the Banks Lowman Road last Friday, on August 30th. A forested area burned up to 70 acres in the Garden Valley area. The Garden Valley Volunteer Fire Department was first to the scene and remained on the fire for two days.

The U.S. Forest Service helped to construct a fireline around the fire, with a 60 person crew. There was also received air support from helicopter water drops.

This fire is still under investigation, but officials are looking into a possible trailer that may have sparked when it broke loose from its hitch, after a bump in the road, starting the MM2 Fire.

The fire was contained and in "mop up" stage by Sunday.

## PUBLIC NOTICE OF INTENT TO PROPOSE OR PROMULGATE NEW OR CHANGED AGENCY RULES

The following agencies of the state of Idaho have published the complete text and all related, pertinent information concerning their intent to change or make the following rules in the latest publication of the state Administrative Bulletin.

The proposed rule public hearing request deadline is September 18, 2019, unless otherwise posted.

The proposed rule written comment submission deadline is September 25, 2019, unless otherwise posted.

(Temp & Prop) indicates the rulemaking is both Temporary and Proposed.

(\*PH) indicates that a public hearing has been scheduled.

### IDAPO 02 – DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

PO Box 7249, Boise, ID 83707  
**02-0212-1901, Bonded Warehouse Rules.** Allows for issuance of electronic warehouse receipts for commodities that are stored and establishes procedures for proper usage.

**02-0301-1901, Rules Governing Pesticide Management Plans for Ground Water Protection.** Reauthorizes the previously codified rule that establishes a process for responding to pesticide detections in ground water.

**02-0303-1901, Idaho Department of Agriculture Rules Governing Pesticide and Chemigation Use and Application.** Reauthorizes the previously codified rule that regulates the use and application of pesticides, licensing of pesticide applicators, registration of pesticides, and responsibilities for chemigation in Idaho.

**02-0415-1901, Rules Governing Beef Cattle Animal Feeding Operations.** Reauthorizes the previously codified rule that establishes standards for the storage, management and application of manure on Beef Cattle Animal Feeding Operations that manage over 1,000 cattle in Idaho.

**02-0417-1901, Rules Governing Dead Animal Movement and**

**Disposal.** Reauthorizes the previously codified rule that establish standards for the management and disposal of dead animal bodies, carcasses and body parts to best protect the environment and human health.

**02-0420-1901, Rules Governing Brucellosis.** Reduces the Brucellosis test eligible age of cattle/bison to 12 months; removes "Idaho origin" as a prerequisite for adult brucellosis vaccination of cattle/bison.

**02-0421-1901, Rules Governing the Importation of Animals.** Amends Extended Validity Equine Certificate to allow participation in an electronic certificate program and modifies certificate requirements; amends entry permit language to allow for the use of Idaho's online livestock entry permit database; removes the brucellosis testing requirement for import of domestic cervidae that originate from a state/region that is declared free of brucellosis.

**02-0423-1901, Rules Governing Commercial Livestock Truck Washing Facilities.** Reauthorizes the previously codified rule that establishes standards for the permitting and management of commercial livestock truck washing facilities in Idaho.

**02-0432-1901, Rules Governing Poultry Operations.** Reauthorizes the previously codified rule that establish standards for the storage, management and application of nutrients from commercial poultry facilities.

**\*07-0101-1901, Rules of the Idaho Electrical Board.** (PH\*) New chapter consolidates previously approved and codified rules of the electrical bureau and aligns rule to SB 1008 (2019) by easing reporting requirements for apprentices; defines continuation training

**07-0501-1901, Rules of the Public Works Contractors License Board.** (Temp & Prop) Reduces renewal fees for public works contractor licenses. (eff. 7-15-19)T

**07-0701-1902, Rules Governing Installation of Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning Systems.** Changes base permit fee calculation; provides a way for an apprentice to renew a registration and stay in the trade without enrolling in or successfully completing school; eliminates and simplifies provisions in compliance with the Red Tape Reduction Act.

**07-1101-1901, Rules of the Division of Building Safety.** New Chapter provides processes, criteria, or both, to accept military education, training, or service from military members, former military members discharged under honorable conditions, veterans, or their spouses (Military Applicants) toward the requirements for a professional license with the Division of Building Safety; and issue licenses by endorsement to Military Applicants.

**09.01.30 - Unemployment Insurance Benefits Administration Rules**

**09-0130-1902,** Defines the circumstances under which an unemployment insurance claimant can leave the local labor market area to attend training or school; and specifies unemployment insurance claimants cannot leave the country while collecting benefits.

**09-0130-1903,** Clarifies unemployment insurance benefit eligibility for individuals with disabilities is determined by Idaho law; identifies unemployment insurance claimants as responsible for providing competent evidence they are qualified individuals with disabilities under the ADA; and removes language concerning long-term disability inconsistent with the definition of disability under the ADA.

IDAPO 13 – DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND GAME

**13.01.08 - Rules Governing the Taking of Big Game Animals in the State of Idaho**

**13-0108-1903,** Allows Commission to make a controlled hunt applicant wait up to 5 days to buy a general hunt tag for the same species in the same calendar year for specific hunts having limited tag numbers.

**13-0108-1904,** Limits number of non-resident deer or elk tags available in a specific general hunt unit or zone to no less than 10% of the average hunter participation estimated for that zone or unit during the preceding 5-year period.

**13-0109-1902, Rules Governing the Taking of Game Birds in the State of Idaho.** Allows Hunting Passport holders ages 8 through 17 to hunt turkey in general season turkey hunts, youth-only general hunts, turkey landowner permission hunts, and depredation hunts with the appropriate tag; replaces references related to requirements for the Department's stocked pheasant program; replaces specific refer-

ences to the "WMA Upland Game Bird Permit" and "Wildlife Management Areas" with more generic references to support potential expansion of the Department's pheasant stocking program.

**13-0110-1901, Rules Governing the Importation, Possession, Release, Sale, or Salvage of Wildlife.** Because of the threat of chronic wasting disease, the Department will not issue any permit for import into Idaho of any live cervid into Idaho not regulated as a domestic cervid by the Idaho Department of Agriculture, including mule deer, white-tailed deer, moose, and wild-origin elk.

**16-0102-1901, Emergency Medical Services (EMS) – Rule Definitions.** Amends definition of "EMS" to align with statutory changes.

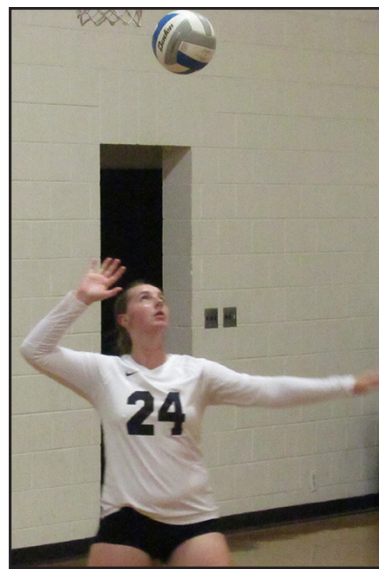

## Idaho City - City Council Meeting Increased Fees for Liquor Sales

**IDAHO CITY** -- Heated discussion at the Idaho City Council Meeting on Wednesday August 28<sup>th</sup>, 2019. There were increases for Licensing Fees, which affected beer, wine and liquor. These increases are: Beer consumed on premises went from \$125.00 to 150.00; beer not consumed increased from \$35.00 to \$75.00; wine consumed increased from \$75.00 to \$150.00; wine not consumed on premises stayed the same at \$75.00; liquor consumed was raised from \$225.00 to \$400.00.

Those who attended the meeting reported that they did not know these increases were going to take place. Councilmember David Martin stated: "this notice of a public meeting was in the Idaho World, why are you showing up now?"

Steve Twiliger, owner of The Gold Mine, stated: "I am running three businesses, I don't have time to sit and read a paper every day, if I would have known, I would have attended

the meeting."

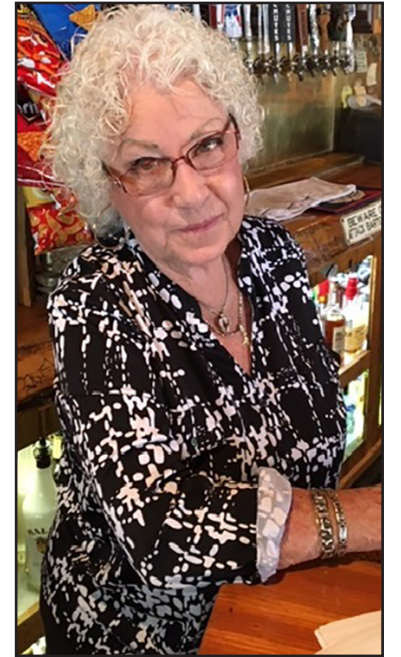
Councilmember Ken Everhart said, "This is already done, we followed the State statues by publishing it in the paper and posted it at the Post Office."

The business owners were upset that they were not notified when it was being passed. Cathy Stanert, owner of Harley's Pub, said, "How much effort would it have taken to send us a notice, because it definitely affects our businesses? If we didn't show up to participate, then apparently we didn't know anything about it?"

Cathy Stanert and her daughter, Kimberly, argued that their business hasn't any options to help them with these increases, like bars that serve food can use those sales to offset the higher taxes. Instead, they serve only alcoholic beverages which have been raised 115%. They hinted that they might not be able to keep their doors open with these increases.

Councilmember Ken Ever-

hart stated that this is an "across the board fee," it will affect grocery stores, and restaurants. "We haven't raised the fees in the past, but now we need to get Idaho City to a reasonable level to keep up with the infrastructure of this city, for our sewer, roads, and water costs."

# Your Decks & Wildfires

**BOISE COUNTY** -- In this article, I want to address one of the areas around your home that is most vulnerable to wildland fires... decks. Many homes located in wildfire-prone areas have attached decks which can potentially spread fire to the house when the deck is ignited during a wildfire. A burning deck can ignite siding or break the glass in doors or windows, allowing fire to gain entry into the house. Consequently, making decks less vulnerable to wildfire also makes your house less vulnerable. Reducing the deck's vulnerability requires an approach that focuses on the materials and design features used to build the deck, and creating a noncombustible zone around and under the deck.

The first risk associated with decks is the collection of light fuel, i.e. pine needles, under the deck. The deck tends to allow accumulation and actually protects this fuel from getting very wet from rain or snow. Light fuel ignites easily and dry fuel ignites easier than wet fuel, so light dry fuel is susceptible to ignition from ember from wildfires. Light dry fuel also tends to burn hotter than other fuels. The horizontal nature of decking is another risk. When you have pine needles burning under your deck, it doesn't take flame to ignite the deck, radiant heat from the fire under the deck can cause the decking material to exceed its ignition point and burst into flame.

Walking surfaces of decks are either a solid surface or constructed using deck boards (with between board gaps). Solid surface decks are commonly light weight concrete or

tile. Combustible deck board types include: solid wood and wood-plastic composites (these products are more widely used than noncombustible deck boards). Noncombustible deck board types include: metal and fiber cement. Recent testing at the IBHS Research Center showed embers mostly lodge between deck board gaps and where deck boards rest on joists. Embers can accumulate and potentially ignite decking and combustible joists. Embers can also fall through board gaps and land on materials stored beneath the deck. It's critical to remove all combustible materials from the under-deck area to minimize the opportunity for ignitions; where resulting flames would impinge on the decking (some wood-plastic decking products are vulnerable to flaming exposures). IBHS tests also showed that even without vegetative debris in between deck gaps, medium density softwood decking products, such as redwood or western red cedar, are vulnerable to ember ignitions. Most wood-plastic composites, along with higher density tropical hardwood, and fire-retardant treated decking products are less vulnerable to embers. The vulnerability to embers in these locations is a reminder to remove debris that accumulates in these areas.

In addition to fuel under the deck, the horizontal nature of the deck is in itself a risk. The deck may accumulate embers and firebrands, like falling limbs, from trees burning around your home. Its flat nature won't shed these like the side of a wall would. Re-

member the lighter the fuel the lower the ignition point temperature. The accumulation of these burning elements may ignite the decking material.

Embers that pass through deck board gaps will land on the ground, or on combustible materials stored under the deck, as shown during this IBHS test. The near home noncombustible zone that surrounds the foundation should include a noncombustible area underneath the deck. Vegetative debris in between deck board gaps will make this location even more vulnerable to ember accumulation.

The International Wildland Urban Interface Building Code (IWUIC) and the California Building Code are the most commonly referenced construction codes for wildfire-prone areas; both include requirements that focus on the walking surfaces of decks. Noncombustible products are allowed by both codes. The California Code provides provisions for accepting combustible decking products. These types of products are more commonly used by homeowners living in wildfire-prone areas across the country. Their requirement governs the amount of heat released when combustible decking is ignited by a gas burner. This mimics burning debris that could be located under the deck, or burning vegetation impinging on the underside of the deck, but does not mimic ember exposure. The IWUIC prohibits common combustible deck boards with the exception of fire-retardant treated decking (rated for outdoor exposure) and other mate-

rials that meet the requirements of an Ignition Resistant Material. However, as of this date, no other materials meet these requirements. The IWUIC allows an enclosed deck option that uses a horizontal construction attached to the bottom of the deck joists. This option should only be used with a solid surface deck. Using this option with deck boards (and the associated gaps), will cause moisture-related degradation problems (corrosion of fasteners and wood rot). Water from rain or melting snow will easily get into the enclosed space and will have a much harder time getting out.

So how can you mitigate the risks of your deck catching on fire? First and foremost, keep light fuel from accumulating under your deck. You should clean down to mineral earth, dirt, or install some type of fire proof material, like stone tabor, under your deck. If you install material, remember to install something that you can clean easily and thoroughly. Gravel, while fire proof, isn't easy to clean pine needles from. Also, routinely remove debris that accumulates in between deck board gaps and debris that can accumulate at the intersection between the deck and house.

After you have thoroughly cleaned under your deck, you might consider installing a fire retardant screen, like the spark arrester mesh in your chimney cap, around the deck. This will tend to keep pine needles out from under your deck, as well as any floating embers from a wildfire.

Another mitigation step is, if

the deck is a non-fire-retardant treated softwood deck, consider removing and replacing deck boards within a few feet of the house. Be careful to match the deck board thickness. As far as what you can do regarding the accumulation of embers and firebrands falling on your deck, wet fuel, is harder to burn than dry fuel so keep the deck wet if, and only if, you can safely defend in place. Once it becomes too dangerous to safely defend in place, or if an evacuation order has been given, leave.

The deck material isn't the only fuel source related to the deck, it's also all the stuff we put on our decks, like propane grills and furniture. You must assess these fuels and get rid of any risks you can. That means moving all your furniture into your yard at least 30 feet away from your deck, house, and outbuildings. This is especially true for grills with propane tanks. If you can safely bleed-off the propane gas in all your tanks, that would be a good idea, otherwise get them as far away from your home as possible. Don't forget combustible materials should not be stored beneath decks. These mitigation steps are designed to create a noncombustible zone under the entire footprint of the deck.

## Boise County Court Update:



**Sara Schaeffer charged with the Hwy. 21 / MM21 Fire**

Sara Schaeffer was sentenced in District Court to Arson III – an apparent suicide attempt to light a ring around herself with a butane torch lighter and a can of spray paint, then lit a bush, causing a wildfire by Hwy. 21 and Lucky Peak Reservoir. The heat got too much, she escaped and was picked up in a boat. A psychological evaluation revealed

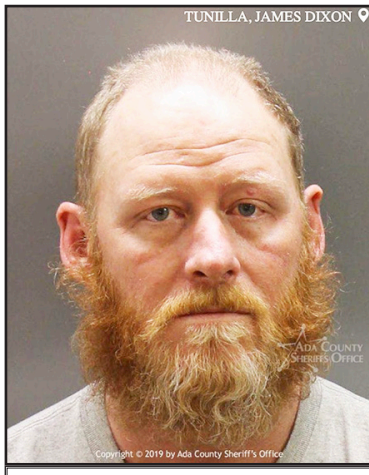
mental illness and heavy substance abuse, including methamphetamine.

Schaeffer stated: "I am extremely, extremely sorry for starting the fire. I was in a really dark place."

The sentencing from the July 15, 2018 fire that burned over 500 acres of private and state land resulted in six years of probation -- with two years fixed, but suspended.

**Bessie Peterson** was charged on July 16, 2019 with two felony charges—First, a lewd and lascivious charge with a child under 16, and the second with the possession of Methamphetamine. These hold a maximum sentence of life in prison, a \$65,000 fine, and a requirement to file as a sex offender.

The prosecution stated that there was extensive and strong evidence in this case. He indicated there were concerns that she would leave the jurisdiction, stating that when the couple fled to Las

Vegas, after being notified by law enforcement, as a courtesy. Deputy Prosecutor Lay said there were passports found and, "When you go on a trip, you don't typically destroy your phones." The District Judge would not reduce her bond from \$250,000, Peterson remains in custody of the Ada County Jail.

**Jeremy Hansford** was also arrest for lewd and lascivious with a minor under 16, possession of meth, and delivery of cocaine. The maximum could carry up to two lifetime sentences and \$90,000. He had been staying in a home owned by his mother in Idaho City since May of 2018, but she had left for health reasons.

Judge Hoagland did not reduce the bond set in this case from \$500,000, because the couple proved a flight risk. Hansford and Peterson are due in court on Sept. 20th.

**James Tunilla** was charged with 16 counts video voyeurism, which carried up to 5 years imprisonment and \$50,000 for each count. In other words, 80 years, \$800,000 fines, and having to register as a sexual offender. He plead: "Not guilty." This case is set to go to trial, which the deputy prosecutor said would take three

days and they would have to show a number of videos. The trial was set for January 8th.

# BOISE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Transcribed by Eileen Capson

August 27, 2019

**Present: Commissioners Alan Ward, Ryan Stirm, and Roger Jackson**

**EXECUTIVE SESSION:** Per personnel, hiring of a new employee, pending litigation, exempt records and risk management. [Time 9:02 – 9:29am] Coming back into session, after the closed session, Chairman Ward said, “No action required.”

**CONSTITUENT INPUT:** Mr. Barber of Placerville asked for speedbumps to be installed through town, due to the speeding problem over 20mph. He presented a petition and asked for a permission to proceed with the speedbumps already purchased. Commissioner Jackson asked if there were signs going to be posted, and Barber said they could do that, or the county could. Chairman Ward asked if they would be picked up in the winter, and Barber agreed, saying that they were portable, but will be spiked down.

The President of the Wilderness Ranch Homeowner’s Association spoke regarding two bridges. The association has received funding through the USDA Rural Development in the amount of \$2.54 million, to replace both of the bridges. This will increase the dues at the Ranch approximately \$50 a month for the next 35 years. They have a contractor on board, and will complete construction in March or April in 2020.

**MINUTES:** The August 20<sup>th</sup> meeting minutes were accepted.

**CREMATION FEE:** The county has been paying \$750. Deputy Coroner Mike Johnson spoke about issues and problems throughout the years, in relation to fatalities and/or suicides, rotation of funeral homes and whether funds are available from the family. Chairman Ward asked if only the funeral homes would transfer the bodies. Johnson did add, “I want to compliment the ambulances that we have in the ambulance districts: Garden Valley, Lowman, Idaho City. They will transport for us, back to their station, and that is a major plus to our traffic or the mechanics of deaths involved.” Funeral homes are now owned mostly by corporations, not families. They charge approximately \$3 a mile to pick up a body, plus \$750 for direct cremation. The funeral home is noted and then the home can be changed, per

family request.

A woman said the county has paid \$900 and \$750. She said there was never any discontent with the funeral homes with the \$900, but there was with the \$750.

Johnson said the deaths can play, “An emotional mess and it takes it out of everybody.”

A policy for non-medical cremation, up to \$900, will be prepared by the clerk.

**NEW RADIOS:** The Clerk, Juvenile Justice, and Assessor’s office are looking to install new radios in their vehicles and quotes from vendors are being gathered.

**CORONER BUDGET ADJUSTMENT:** Due to the extensive autopsies being overbudget, the budget was increased through a motion.

**GENERAL OPERATIONS BUDGET:** Clerk Prisco said within the Professional Services budget the amount needed to be increased, “Because we had unanticipated costs associated with 2018 audit,” due to federal funding amounts. A resolution was said to increase this budget.

**RESOLUTION:** To increase the Boise County Community Justice fund and Sheriff’s Department for FY2019 budget.

**CENTRAL DISTRICT HEALTH BUDGET:** A resolution was said to adjust and increase this budget.

**RESOLUTION:** A motion was made for a re-evaluation fund change for FY2019 per salary change.

**ALAMAR PAYOFF:** Clerk Prisco said, “This is our final payment on the 2012 bonds issue, to help us pay our Alamar Judgement debt. This is it!” Commissioner Jackson made a motion to pay Zion’s Bank in the amount of \$420,201 for the final payment on the revenue bonds. Chairman Ward cheered and said, “I just hope that Boise County never ever has to do anything like this ever again.

And I think that in our term here as Commissioners, over the past few years, we’ve gone forward and changed things and we’ve setup opportunities for information. Whether it’s through Planning & Zoning having a very confident legal firm, information to the Commissioners and to the community, *that this never ever happens again in Boise County. That is my hope.*” The commissioners agreed to motion and pay this remaining debt. Ward concluded with relief, “*Mission accomplished.*”

**BILLS:** Commissioner Jackson motioned to pay the Claims Approval Report in the amount of \$103,272.

**CLERK BUDGET ADJUSTMENTS:** It was discussed that there was an adjustment to be made in the amount of about \$80,000 for indigent funds, mental holds, medical reviews and public defender costs. “It’s real ugly. It’s so frustrating because for both of those programs, we really have no control over the expenditures,” Clerk Prisco said.

Road and Bridge “have quite a few negative accounts. In total, they still look to be okay, but we’re going to need to work with that department.”

**ALCOHOL LICENSING:** The federal license applications were accepted by motion of the Board for a long list of businesses located within the county.

**LETTERS OF SUPPORT:** Garden Valley Family Medicine for grant support, including Horseshoe Bend Taxing District.

Idaho City Water Plant upgrades letter of support was motioned to approve to the Idaho Dept. of Agriculture for drinking water.

**EXECUTIVE SESSION:** Per exempt records. [Time 10:19am to 10:34am] Coming back into session, a denial was motioned for the emerging

case.

**ROAD DEPARTMENT:** Absent due to paving the Middlefork Road.

**FORESTER:** There is a “prescription” for Clear Creek that they will finish up and then move to focus on Robie Creek in a forest health project.

**EBCAD:** An EMT class will be held in the fall. They have an Emergency Room Nurse that will be filling in with the ambulance. There are also others interested.

**PLANNING & ZONING:** Land on Highway 21, mile marker 20, was approved for a 99 foot cell tower for possible vendors, like Verizon. They have need of two individuals to fill seats on the Planning and Zoning Commission. There is a lot of building going on, with the number of permits way up in comparison to previous years.

**SHERIFF’S ACADEMY:** There were eleven graduates. “It was good, we learned a lot -- the graduates.” The next academy will be offered in the Horseshoe Bend/ Garden Valley area during the winter, Jan. or Feb.

**TREASURER:** Gina Turner said they just sent out their 2016 delinquent notices, the first warning, currently at 140. Manufactured homes will be sold.

**PROSECUTOR:** Adam Strong said they are continuing with their normal criminal and civil case load. There is a large increase in mental holds, both in county and those from outside our county.

**CLERK:** Mary Prisco said everything is coming up quick

for the November 5<sup>th</sup> election.

**FIELD TRIP:** Commissioners went to the Boise County Road Department in Idaho City to view where a building could be built to protect the vehicles with a snow roof. Commissioner Ward said they had some extra money, “to keep them in good condition for years to come.”

**PUBLIC HEARING FOR THE FY2020 BUDGET:** Clerk Prisco made a presentation to share: “This year’s budget is a total of \$13,773,000. The 2020 budget is definitely focused on capital projects and operational projects that look to improve our county’s infrastructure.” She said there were large grants received for the Banks Lowman Highway and wildfire mitigation.

Property taxes this 2020 year total \$4,741,900, department revenues - \$5,109,000, transfer from carryover is almost \$3,000,000. [Shared revenue include state’s sales tax, liquor distribution, PILT, Property Tax & Agrivultural Replacement Dollars, totalling \$982,169.] “In the General Funds carryovers, we have \$495,000 for capital improvement projects.” In Road & Bridge they have \$600,000 for future paving. She added that \$317,000 was transferred into the PILT trust. The Disaster Declaration Department was allocated \$160,000. Cost of living for employees went up 3%.

A constituent inquired about some significant increases, one was due to a grant and the other was in regards to the indigent fund -- increase caseload to cover public defender costs.
