BOISE COUNTY-- Boise County residents will now be able to see road issues on county roads on www.511.idaho.gov. We will post road conditions, closures, restrictions on our county roads. Deb Drake from Garden Valley and myself are now administrators so we can keep our community informed. We can post other stuff like large game on roadways, construction, congestion, and anything else that we hear about that would affect travel. We cannot post on Highways 21 and 55. Those are state highways and are handled by State Communications.

Community School with Wraparound Care

EAST BOISE COUNTY -- Basin School District has adopted the Community Schools model. This brings a culture of wraparound care and support to our school district. Last year was a year of learning what exactly that means and how best to implement such policies moving forward, exploring and understanding relationships both with students and families who may have barriers to services and resources needed, as well as with individuals and organizations who want to offer those services and resources. While still learning and growing, now in our second year, we have been able to bring needed services and resources onto our school campus. Modular building #6 is the Basin School District Wellness Center. We have a large room of donated items that are available for students and families as needed. These include clothes, shoes, hygiene items, household supplies, school supplies, winter gear such as coats, boots, hats, socks, and gloves, as well as warm bedding. There is also a small medical clinic as well as a private counseling room. We have well-established and continued relationships with Evergreen Behavioral Health, Garden Valley Family Medicine, St. Luke's, Central District Health Department, Idaho Food Bank and United Way among others who have committed to working with us, who take their time to come to Ida-

ho City and provide care and needed services that our community lacks. To give an idea, here are some current services being offered:

Evergreen Behavioral Health, mental health counseling - weekly, 1-2 days depending on client volume.

Garden Valley Family Medicine, primary medical care - open every Wednesday, the first Tuesday of each month and growing as patient volume demands.

Central District Health Department - as requested and with parental consent. October 8th, we had a Dental Hygienist from CDHD Oral Health Program provide dental sealants and fluoride varnish to K-6th grades. 34 students were seen, 57 sealants placed over a two day clinic. On Novem-

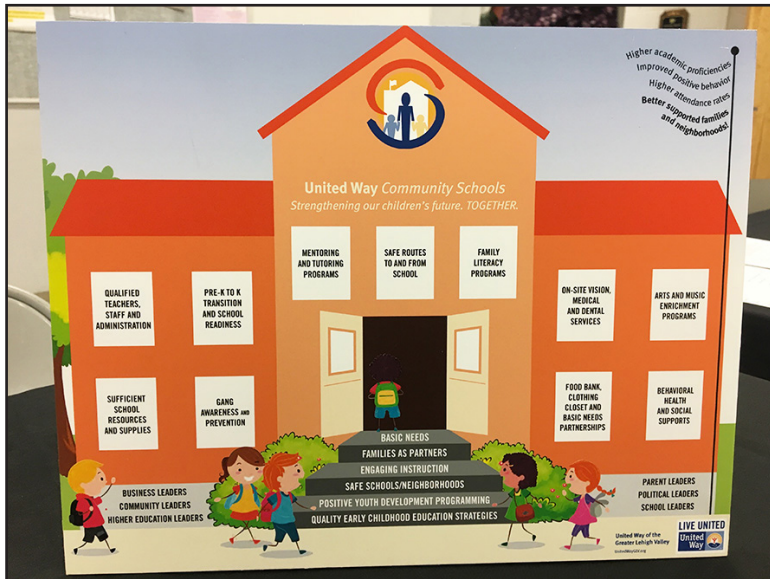
ber 22nd, we have a team from CDHD Preventive Health Services coming to offer flu vaccines to students and staff.

Idaho Educational Services for the Deaf and Blind - pending final confirmation, vision and hearing screenings scheduled November 18th and offered to all students.

St. Luke's Health System - continual support of our athletic department with annual sports physicals, concussion education, and more.

United Way of Treasure Valley - continual support of Community School work, and donations of basic needs items

Wilderness Ranch Bridge Work

EAST BOISE COUNTY -- Wilderness Ranch subdivision is in the beginning stages of having two bridges built. Due to a harsh spring runoff in 2018, the bridges became undermined and scouring occurred. One bridge will be located closer to Rush Creek's mailbox station. The other will be located on Robie Creek Road, allowing access to the community's water treatment plant.

The two new bridges will be on Ranch property, which is currently not the case. The bridge located on Rush Creek will be moved further north and placed in a much safer location. The idea is that residents and their guests would be more likely to see oncoming traffic prior to entering onto Highway 21.

The subdivision entered into a contract with U.S.D.A. Rural Development to be eligible for a program offering \$2.54 million to have the bridges constructed. The board members for the subdivision are pleased that the cost will only raise monthly dues \$54 dollars over the next 35 years. They are encouraged that this is a long-term solution with construction expected to wrap-up in the spring of 2020. The two new concrete bridges are designed to be longer and taller, and expected to withstand these harsh mountain winters for the next 75 years.

Youth Learn, Play, and Serve at ICOE Day

IDAHO CITY -- On a crisp fall morning last Thursday, Idaho City third graders lined up to taste fresh apple cider pressed before their eyes by local high school students. A few yards down the path, middle school students floated boats on the creek, calculating the speed of drift, while first graders learned to look at their shadows to orient themselves by the sun.

These were just three of the dozens of activities enjoyed by Basin School District students at their Idaho City Outdoor Education (ICOE) day, a unique blend of education, service, and outdoor recreation. About 355 students, from grades K-12 spread out across the 87-acre ICOE site, which is located near the schools just outside the Idaho City limits and is also available for use by the public.

Since the school district was granted the purchase of the ICOE grounds in 2015, staff, students, and volunteers have developed the area to serve as a huge

outdoor classroom. Past projects have included clearing trash, building trails, and installing a bathroom, as well as using the zip line, which is a favorite attraction for kids of all ages.

Students say the ICOE day is one of the most fun days of the school year, while teachers say it is a valuable opportunity for hands-on learning. Students gain a sensory experience of the natural world as they chase after glimpses of wildlife and study watersheds up close. They learn a sense of responsibility for the land as they actively restore and improve the site for future years.

This year, high school students addressed soil erosion, studied bat habitats, and learned matchless fire building. Middle grade students cleared rocks from a sledding hill, discussed environmental conservation, and studied the external and internal parts of plants. Primary grade students practiced archery, went on scavenger hunts, and helped to move rocks and sticks off of the paths.

All the students gathered at lunch to roast hot dogs and marshmallows over open pit fires under the watchful eye of teachers, staff, and parent volunteers.

"I built a shelter with logs leaning on a stump," said fifth grader Stella Fouch. "I made shade when I covered it with brush. It was a really fun way to learn."

Her brother Milo added, "Our teacher was completely tired by the time we ended."

Basin School District holds an ICOE day two times per year, with additional activities occurring at the ICOE site throughout the year. Students, staff, and volunteers continue to maintain and improve this unique resource to serve our community for years to come.

Horseshoe Bend Wins in Riggins

HORSESHOE BEND --

Horseshoe Bend took the early lead and at the end of the 1st quarter the score was 16-0 from two touchdowns by senior Austin Fry combined with two successful conversions by Fry and senior Ethan Smith. Salmon River scored 3 touchdowns with 2 conversions in a busy 2nd quarter but the Mustangs answered with three touchdowns of their own, one from Fry and two courtesy of senior Ben Howerton (the teammates both had 2 point conversions) and Horseshoe Bend left the field at the half with the 38-22 lead. Returning in the 3rd quarter the team held the Savages to their 22 points while coming up with two more touchdowns by Fry and a conversion by Smith to

increase their lead 52-22. Two touchdowns in the 4th quarter by Fry with a conversion by Smith put Horseshoe Bend in the lead 66-22 before Salmon River put up a touchdown with a conversion leaving the final score 66-30 in favor of the Mustangs. Horseshoe Bend is at home on Friday, October 18 against Long Pin Division conference rivals the Tri-Valley Titans. Kick off is at 7:00 p.m.

BOISE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

October 8, 2019
Present: Commissioners Alan Ward, Roger Jackson and Ryan Stirm
Pledge of Allegiance
EXECUTIVE SESSION: [Time 10:01 to 10:30am] Closed session per pending litigation, personnel issues, exempt records, hiring of new employee, and risk management.
Chairman Ward said, “No action required.”
MINUTES: The October 1st amended minutes were accepted by motion.
DEPARTMENTAL ISSUES:
CLERK’S PROJECT APPROVAL: There was a contract for technology per a month, fees, and the agreement. The project was approved through a motion.
EMERGENCY MANAGER: Generators were discussed, but one could not be put in Horseshoe Bend for an emergency shelter, because it’s in a floodplain. Two were considered for Garden Valley and Idaho City, with a cost share of 25%. Bob Showalter, Emergency Manager, suggested that the county consider going with the Garden Valley project, “due to the dense population and a higher risk of displacement over there due to a wildfire. It could really be our *only* project. The school is large enough that if we had to shelter folks from anywhere in the county, they could go to Garden Valley.” He is seeking a grant for a FEMA approved shelter.
BOISE COUNTY EMERGENCY OPERATION CENTER: Showalter said that although volunteers were awe-

some, he would like to have additional training for county employees. Should the county declare an emergency, the employees could be compensated.
PROSECUTOR: Complaint was received, but Mr. Adam Strong would like to discuss it in executive session or open session later in the day.
SOLID WASTE/ NOXIOUS WEEDS: Two new employees were hired.
SHERIFF: The building update on the Sheriff Office, the cracks don’t extend into the foundation. “We’ll get it fixed,” Sheriff Jim Kaczmarek said.
BOISE COUNTY POLICY: Clerk Mary Prisco discussed the hiring policy, where applications could be acquired, and what topics were okay to talk about in an interview. Sheriff Kaczmarek said that information regarding interview questions was part of ICREMP (county’s insurance).
COMPUTER ARTS: A contract was discussed to address issues. A support fee of \$9,999, on-site visit per visit \$100, annual software maintenance fees of \$19,106, and certain hourly rates.
FISHER TECHNOLOGY: A history records and scanning for three months for \$4,950 per a month.
POLLING PLACE AGREEMENT: The Ladies Auxiliary building in Horseshoe Bend, per \$75, was approved by a motion.
ATLANTA HWY DISTRICT/BOISE COUNTY ROAD DEPARTMENT ROAD MAINTENANCE AGREEMENT: Prosecutor Strong said the only changes were the date changes and sig-

natures. The money was the exact same from two years ago. The maintenance agreement was motioned and approved.
BOISE COUNTY TO OPERATE ON A CASH BASIS: Clerk Prisco explained that they did this every year. “All those dollar amounts are cash reserves for a fund balance that we have appropriated as part of the fiscal year 2020 budget for the various operations,” Prisco said. Chairman Ward made a motion for a Boise County Resolution: “To operate on a cash basis *and carryover* to appropriate into the 2020 budget.”
SHERIFF’S VESSEL FUND BUDGET INCREASE: Grant money was received for a boat, which is being purchased in the amount of \$43,789. A motion was said by Commissioner Jackson to accept the increase.
CLAIMS REPORT: Commissioner Jackson made a motion to accept the 2019 claim’s report in the amount of \$447,222. He also made a motion to accept the FY2020 report for \$199,545.
DEMAND WARRANTS: Commissioner Jackson made a motion to pay Western States CAT in the amount of \$217,260 for a 2019 Caterpillar with loader. Chairman Ward clarified that this would be the mulcher terrain loader that will be used by the Forestry and Road Department, and perhaps Solid Waste.
JURY POSTAGE: To refill the meter for jury postage, the amount of \$1,000 was paid.
COURT POSTAGE: To refill the meter for court postage. [no amount said]

IDAHO CITY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE: Annual dues of \$50 motioned and paid.
EXECUTIVE SESSION: [Time 11:22am to 11:35am] Closed session to include exempt records, risk management, pending litigation, personnel issues, and hiring of new employee. Chairman Ward said, “No action required.”
EAST BOISE COUNTY AMBULANCE DISTRICT: Ms. Melissa Potts is trying to organize a CPR class and are waiting on expensive books. She said the state is going to pick up the cost, through an application process. She recently certified as a “Traffic Incident Management and had an 8-hour EMS educator course, so I can now co-instruct this class. Once I do that, then I can be an EMT instructor.” She enjoyed the conference and learned a different way of teaching adults.
Power Lift system for the ambulance in the amount of \$25,144 was motioned and approved. All of the ambulances will now have that system, except for Placerville, which is not staffed yet. This includes: Lowman, Idaho City and More Creek.
This month the ambulances will receive annual maintenance and snow tires.
COMMISSIONERS’ FIELDTRIP: Chairman Ward said, “I think we should drive out to Centerville and go down Alder Creek and look at the rock work and road elevation work that they’ve done there in the last couple of months. Then we should drive to the Banks

Lowman Highway and drive clear to Lowman, and look at that project for next summer.”
Chip seal [?] and barrow pit work. He would like to drive up Anderson Creek Road and the full length of the Middle Fork Road, the Gardenia Bridge project, and Horseshoe Bend shop. Commissioner Stirm recommended they go through Boise, to look at the bridge and the new pavement work on Robie Creek. Chairman Ward agreed. They will also plan to go to Clear Creek to look at the work done there and solid waste. They are planning this fieldtrip for October 25th.
GARDENA BRIDGE DISCUSSION: The cost was about \$7 million, and the county would be responsible for 7% last year, so the county did not submit an application. An engineering firm encouraged that something should be done and if the commissioners would like to address this issue. Commissioner Jackson stated: “To come up with two and a half million dollars would be kind of rough.” Commissioner Ward said, “We can’t do it at the moment.” The engineer said that with an estimate, the cost may come down to \$5 million, but the county will still have to come up with the 7% match, \$350,000. Ward said they might be able to do that in a couple of years. The Gardena is a historic bridge the last pony truss bridge in the state of Idaho, Bill Jones said with the Boise County Roads Department. PILT and SRS funds will be considered when they're received.

COURT CASE MOVED TO LATER DATE

BOISE COUNTY -- During the week proceeding the pre-trial conference for Alan Ward, it was relayed that the Attorney General’s office, the prosecution in this case, was not yet ready to proceed on October 4th.
Alan Ward, the Chairman of the Boise County Commissioners and Chairman of the Garden Valley School Board had been charged with two counts of stalking in the second degree. Presently, the case has been set out, with a jury trial date scheduled for December 26th and 27th.
A protection order/no contact order was served on July 17, 2019. Ward was taken into custody on July 18th by Idaho State Police officers for two stalking misdemeanor charges. He set bail later that day in the amount of \$1,500. Currently, this case will be tried before an Elmore County Judge within Boise County.
Ward, 61, was elected for a second time in 2016, to serve a four year term as a Boise County Commissioner. He reached out to the *World*, and stated that he was determined to fight these allegations.
