On Wednesday, December 11th at 3:57 in the morning, Wilderness Ranch Fire was paged out to respond to a structure fire in the Wilderness Ranch subdivision. As Fire Chief, I try to keep track of who is responding, so I can make a decision which personnel to send with what truck. Being a volunteer organization, you never know who is going to show up. In this case, when I arrived at the station, I was met by three of our newest firefighters. They have been on the Department for about a year and a half, and had responded to other structure fires within their time on the Department, but with supervision. There were other veteran firefighters responding; however, they wouldn't get to the firehouse before we left. So, the decision was made to get two of them in route in our structure engine 201 containing 500 gallons of water. The third firefighter and I would follow in our tender 222, containing 3,000 gallons of water.

The structure on fire was only about 5 minutes from the Wilderness Ranch Fire Station, which made a huge difference in the outcome. When engine 201 arrived on scene, the structure had already been fully engulfed, and collapsed on the ground.

One of our veteran firefight-

ers was already on the scene to size-up the threat. The burned structure had been a detached shop. The nearby house was beginning to catch on fire, as well as two large pine trees and a smaller shed. The guys were spraying the 500-gallons of water from the engine. I sent the firefighter that was with me to go help the others, while I positioned the tender. By the time I had it in place, the first engine was shutting the pump down because it was out of water. At this time, one of our other firefighters arrived. We connected the tender to Engine 201, and within two minutes we were back in business again. The crisis had passed. In the time it took me to get to the fire, drop off my firefighter, and position the tender, the guys had deployed two hose lines, got the pump going, knocked the fire down on the deck, and the wooden stairs leading up to the house, extinguished the two large pine trees, and the ground fire that was threatening the house.

During this time, our other engine from Osprey arrived, and we hooked their engine up to our tender. Robie Creek fire had been paged out for mutual aide, and they brought two trucks with four personnel. They helped us check for hot spots, and helped tear down the stairs that had been threatening to catch the house on fire again. After that, it was pretty much routine: Check for any more signs of fire in and under the deck, around the house, in and under the eaves. There was work done to cool what was left of the shop and more water was applied.

Although the shop was beyond our control, as a whole, this was a save. At the time we were being paged out, the fire in the shop had already breached the windows and the eaves. However, with a quick response, the house was within our control. Obviously, the three newer initial attack guys, Josh Owens, Matt Shaul, and Tony Boniovano, paid attention at our trainings, for which I am so grateful. I'm thankful to Tom Horner, the veteran firefighter on the scene, and Drew Bodie, our training officer, for providing the extra training these guys needed. The hose lays were deployed correctly, the pump was engaged properly, and the guys recognized the fact that the shop was lost and directed their efforts to the structures that could be saved. Each of the firefighters had all the proper gear on. Thanks to all the Wilderness Ranch firefighters, Robie Creek firefighters, Unit 15 with Paul and Barbara, Deputy Archer, Melissa Potts for making coffee, and Brian Doran with Robie Creek for helping her bring it to the fire before the break of dawn.

BOISE COUNTY -- Boise County Commissioner Alan Ward took leave of his duties as Chairman of the Board, during the regularly scheduled Commissioners' meeting, to walk across the street to the county courthouse in Idaho City. There he waited for his pre-trial conference to begin at 10 am on Tuesday, December 17th. Ward's attorney and a prosecutor from the Attorney General's office discussed the case behind closed doors, while the defendant waited in the gallery for nearly thirty minutes.

The Honorable David Epis, an Elmore County judge, presided over this case. He re-

layed that while in chambers they had discussed a limited jury pool during the holiday season and recommended that thirty such individuals would not satisfy a jury selection. The case was pushed out to March 19th at 2 pm, when the next pre-trial conference will be held in regards to two stalking charges.

Prior to the proceedings, Ward disclosed to *The Idaho World* that he was no longer able to have lunch with his daughter in Crouch, due to a restraining order, but he could shop for groceries. He expressed the heavy toll these charges had had on his life in Garden Valley.

Basin Elementary Holiday Concert

Children grades K-6 dressed up in red, green, and white and performed holiday favorites for an appreciative crowd of parents and extended families.

The Kindergarten class wore paper reindeer antlers and red noses while they danced "The Reindeer Pokey." The first grade class sang several songs, including "Santa Claus is Coming to Town," while different groups of sixth graders accompanied them on the ukulele. A stand-out crowd pleaser from the higher grades was fourth grader Georgia Shaffer's appearance in a reindeer suit, dancing enthusiastically while the fourth grade class sang "Blitzen Boogie."

Elementary music teacher Jennifer Exon does all the musical arrangements and choreography, as well as playing the piano during the concert. Her most ambitious piece this year was a rendition of "Feliz Navidad," sung by the second grade with third graders on xylophones and sixth graders on ukuleles. Exon said, "It's really funto see the classes come together and play."

Most students would agree that the holiday concert is fun. But the event is also an important part of the school's musical education program. "Fourth through sixth grades learn to play a new instrument each year," explained principal Jamie Pilkerton. "Our students are getting exposure to multiple instruments and are able to perform for an audience."

The holiday concert also presents an opportunity for the community to come together at the school. In the hallway, among clusters of chatting parents, representatives of the sophomore class sold specialty coffee and hot cocoa to raise money for their senior prom. Sixth graders sold pizza orders to fundraise for their "Snooze at the Zoo" event, and elementary school writers sold a printed collection of poems and stories, raising money to print their next collection on colored paper.

Pilkerton said, "I am proud of the effort that our students and Mrs. Exon put into preparing for the concert. There is much that goes on behind the scenes both in the logistics as well as in the students learning to play new instruments and sing new songs."

In the next room, more volunteers help the little ones write out tags and wrap their gifts in white paper bags, stapled shut so that parents can be truly surprised on Christmas morning. Fifth grader Delaney Volker explained, "It's thoughtful to buy something for other people and to donate to the preschool. It's also a cheaper alternative to buy Christmas presents for your family and friends." When Volker had a few dollars left over after making her purchases, she chose to leave them behind as a donation to the Santa

ing gifts for their family," Allen said. "I think they get a kick out of it."

If the smiles of children carrying their wrapped bundles back to the classrooms are any indication, Santa would approve.

HSB Varsity Boys Basketball

The Horseshoe Bend Varsity Mustangs were at home on Tuesday, December 10 where they faced off against a non-conference opponent, the Wilder Wildcats. At the opening, Wilder won the tip off but sophomore Decker Larson was first to score. Senior Austin Fry followed up with a 2 point basket. Senior Calvin Drake drew a foul but was unable to capitalize on it. With 1:12 on the clock Wilder scored for the first time; Fry scored with 30 seconds remaining in the quarter and at the end of the first the score was 6-2 in Horseshoe Bend's favor. The Mustangs began the 2nd quarter with only 4 men on the court. The home team crowd noticed the error and began shouting at the bench. The coaching staff called a time out with 7:46 on the lock and corrected the problem. When play resumed Fry drew a foul and added 1 point to the Mustangs scoreboard. Forty seconds later Fry goes in for another basket before Wilder successfully shoots two 3 point shots and takes the lead for the first time in the game (9-8). Junior Logyn Bromgard scores next for the Mustangs followed by another 3 point shot from Wilder to tie the score 11-11. Wilder hits twice for 4 total points and Drake answered with 2. Wilder scores 2 points before Fry draws a foul for no return. Junior Caedmon Graham gives Wilder a point off a foul and Wilder adds 2 more baskets. Graham travels turning the ball over to Wilder with 1:50 on the clock. Wilder scores before Bromgard gets one in. Wilder hits for 2 more points and Fry draws a foul with 56 seconds remaining but doesn't connect. With 45 seconds in the half Wilder steals a passed ball from junior Hunter How-

erton to Fry and attempts to run out the clock but Drake steals and hits for 2 points ending the quarter with Wilder in the lead 33-17. In the 3rd wilder hits 2 baskets for 4 points. Fry followed up with a 3 pointer as did Caedmon Graham. Bromgard added two more. Larson fouled Wilder with 2:31 remaining but Wilder gets no return. Drake scores with 1:38 left in the 3rd followed by 2 points from Wilder. Fry ends the quarter with a basket and shortens Wilder's lead by 4 points (33-29). The last quarter had Drake scoring first for 2 points, Wilder followed up with a 3 pointer before Fry added two more points. Drake fouled Wilder and the basket extended Wilder's lead 37-33. Wilder answered with 2 points and Graham drew a foul good for 1 point. Wilder scored next with

Bromgard making the next basket for 2 points and drawing the foul for an additional point. Wilder scores on their next possession. Drake gets 2 points before Wilder gets 2 baskets and draws a foul off Fry for 2 points. Wilder scores again and with 30 seconds remaining and the 52-39 lead, the Wildcats pass around the ball to run out the clock before Fry steals the ball and makes a fast break to score right before the buzzer ends the game 52-41. Fry was the high scorer with 18 points, Bromgard had 9 points, Drake had 8 points, Graham had 4 points and Larson had 2. The team will compete in the Truck.com Christmas Tournament at The College of Idaho December 19-20. The face off against the Tri-Valley Titans in their first conference game of the season will be in Midvale on Tuesday, January 7, 2020.

The goal for Phase One (January 2020-August 2020) is to raise \$20,000 to purchase new equipment, along with electronic locks, and security cameras. Boise County Clerk's Corner

BOISE COUNTY ELECT-ED OFFICIALS, THE ROLE THEY PLAY IN ELECTIONS, AND THE GARDEN VALLEY SCHOOL DISTRICT ELEC-**TION OF NOVEMBER 5, 2019**

Written by Clerk Mary Prisco **BOISE COUNTY --** In reading

a social media post recently, regarding the Garden Valley School District (GVSD) Trustee Zone election, that took place on November 5, 2019, I saw an opportunity to educate the public. Not only on the election process itself, but also on the authorities of certain elected officers.

As the elected Boise County Clerk, one of my statutory duties is that of the Chief Elections Officer. Within the elections realm, my duty is to administer elections falling under "consolidated elections" as well as Primary/General elections. Prior to 2011, the Secretary of State's Office administered the taxing district (also known as separate political subdivisions) elections. Beginning in county fiscal year 2011, the responsibility to administer these taxing district elections moved to the county lev-

el, under the elected clerk.

An elected commissioner does **not** have a voice in the elections process itself, and has no authority as an individual commissioner. A commissioner has authority only as a member of the Board of County Commissioners, acting as a whole, or body, of members. An individual commissioner has no authority to act alone! Additionally, the election process is governed by the Secretary of State and Idaho statutes (law).

The Board of County Commissioners acts as the Board of County Canvassers following an election. This means they are authorized to approve the results of an election in public session. The results of an election are provided to the Board by the Clerk, after the Clerk has performed an internal audit of the election results by precinct.

The social media post I make reference to stated in part that, on "election day, Boise County decided to implement new maps of all five GVSD zones." This statement is incorrect and it is of interest to note that I confirmed with the Boise County Assessor's Office (which is where our Boise County maps are maintained) that there has not been a public records request of the GVSD Trustee Zone maps by the author of the social media posts or anyone else, before or after the election.

It was also stated that a "new list of eligible voters for Trustee Zone 3 was created". This statement is also incorrect.

The author of the social media post was correct in one statement, when he wrote "Boise County has absolutely no authority to alter trustee zone boundaries." As Boise County does not have authority to alter any other taxing district's district, zone (i.e. trustee zones), or sub-district (i.e. fire district sub-district) boundaries, Boise County **<u>did not</u>** alter trustee zone boundaries.

In August of this year, the Boise County Elections Director, Valerie Dresslar, went back through historical election records and could not find any evidence of a prior trustee zone election for GVSD. This is most likely due to what often happens with volunteer board positions of our County's taxing districts - only one candidate comes forth for the position. In that case, an election would not be held. What it meant for the Boise County Elections Department was that the population of registered voters with the Idaho State Voter Registration System (owned and managed by the Idaho Secretary of State), for the GV School District, had never been separated by Trustee Zone (it was not needed until this year).

Normally, the Elections Department would use the Voter Registration System to validate the Declaration of Candidacy and accompanying petition of signatures. We could not do this with the GVSD Trustee Zone candidates because streets and addresses in the registration system had not been separated by trustee zone. With the assistance of the Boise County Mapper, an employee of the Boise County Assessor, we individually looked up every candidate and petitioners' address information on the existing maps, as part of the validation process.

We (Dresslar and I) utilized those same maps, which have resided within the mapping system for an undetermined amount of time, to designate voters by trustee zone within the Voter Registration System. Those maps have been in the system prior to our tenure at Boise County and we are not aware of how they came to be. Our mapper took those maps and broke out the zones into "booklets" which created a readable map with streets and addresses. These are the maps that were displayed at the GV School election precinct, all five zones, on the day of the election. There was nothing new about them and they were displayed at the precinct for the benefit of the voting electorate.

Regarding the "new list of eligible voters for Trustee Zone 3," the database of registered voters for that Zone 3, as well as the other four zones, continued to be refined up until we produced the poll books off of the Voter Registration System, at the end of the week preceding the election. We spent an enormous amount of time during the months of October and November, reviewing Voter Registration System reports by Zone, against the Zone maps, to achieve the most accurate list of eligible voters for the election poll book.

Present: Commissioners Alan Ward and Roger Jackson

Amended Agenda: EBCAD conversation on an issue regarding ordering books for an EMT class and executive session was included.

Pledge of Allegiance

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Chairman Ward motioned for an executive session, closed session, for personnel, risk management, and human resource update. [Time 10:04am to 10:35am] No action was required.

CONSTITUENT INPUT: None

MINUTES: The November 26th and December 3rd minutes were discussed.

TIME SHEETS: Clerk Mary Prisco said that the county has Christmas Eve and day as a paid holiday. She was concerned that, with Christmas on Wednesday, checks won't be sent out until Thursday, so employees may not get checks until Saturday, unless they have direct deposit.

SNOW GROOMER: A new payroll addition was approved for an Idaho City snow groomer. There was an application and payroll addition for an individual to operate a second snowmobile snow groomer, which would be on a part-time as-needed basis in Idaho City.

Chairman Ward stated: "Hopefully they'll get some snow and have some activity."

SHERIFF: Jim Kaczmarek said they had received the full payment from the county's insurance in the amount of \$41,649. He asked for approval to purchase the new vehicle, "We are going to come out about \$150 under budget for the new vehicle." Commission-

er Jackson joked, "You should have bought Chevys instead of Fords." Sheriff Kaczmarek said plainly, "I don't think either would have survived that impact." Commissioner Jackson asked if that made three vehicles, and the sheriff replied, "That was the only one that was our fault, but yeah."

There is a salvage proposal that the sheriff will bring to the Board next week.

Chairman Ward motioned to approve the purchase of a new vehicle for the Sheriff's Office.

The heating repairs on the Sheriff's building were discussed. The other heating unit had gone out earlier in the year, so the exact cost was known, \$8,417. It's a four to six week delivery from Texas. "We are using space heaters right now, which is driving our electrical costs up," Sheriff Kaczmarek said.

Commissioner Jackson commented, "I don't think they can do without it." Chairman Ward motioned to approve the new heating unit for the Sheriff's Office.

Commissioner Ward asked: "New cars, new heater, what's next?" Sheriff Kaczmarek said, with some humor, "I'd like a backhoe. *I'd like to give it to the deputy that keeps getting his vehicle hit.*"

GENERATOR DISCUS-SION FOR GARDEN VAL-LEY: Emergency Manager Bob Showalter said, "The cost of that project was more than anticipated." The generator project will be put off until next year and discussed at budget time. It would also be something the school could assist with funding. Chairman Ward indicated: "We would *definitely* want to do that in our next budget cycle."

ROAD DEPARTMENT:

The groomer shed contract is all in place for the groomer shed in Garden Valley, the lumber and trusses are coming later in the week.

The engineering company wants to change the scope of work for a preliminary design for an intersection.

WEED DEPARTMENT: A county representative said the contracts had not been filled. "There's a lot of land out there that the Forest Service is responsible for, but they're not taking the responsibility." He said that the work they do in Centerville and Robie Creek they will continue to do on their budget. "There's nothing in it for us to go to Atlanta, to spray private land. Elmore County does what they can. The Forest Service agreement for last year was only \$10,000, and for four ranger districts." An agreement was approved by the commissioners to accept state funds for the weed department.

GARDEN VALLEY SNOW GROOMER AGREEMENT: The contract was reviewed in detail.

DRONE WORK: Commissioner Ward motioned to approve the agreement with the Boise County Emergency Manager and Great Basin Aerial Imaging for contract drone work as needed, for example: during a fire.

SNOW REMOVAL: A contract was approved by a motion from the Board for the removal of snow among county office buildings in Idaho City.

BILLS: Chairman Ward made a motion to approve the bills in the amount of \$143,843.

A motion was said to pay for the court book scanner, \$4,950.
