COVID-19 Testing for County Employees and Emergency Volunteers

BOISE COUNTY -- Boise County employees and emergency volunteers received an opportunity to be tested for COVID-19, in order to reduce the spread of this global pandemic. There were forty-one signed up for the testing on July 7th, but only thirty-six were administered to with a quick nasal swab. The goal of "Crush the Curve Idaho" is to provide testing resources, training, and ongoing education in an effort to keep employees healthy and to safely reopen schools.

These tests were flown later that evening to a Tennessee lab facility. Rapid results were sent to individuals tested and to the Center for Disease Control. Boise County is looking into possible grant money to fund community testing; however, this idea is still in the planning stages.

USDA Designates Disaster

WASHINGTON — Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue designated three Idaho counties as primary natural disaster areas. Producers in Blaine, Camas, and Custer counties who suffered losses due to recent drought may be eligible for U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) emergency loans.

This natural disaster designation allows FSA to extend much-needed emergency credit to producers recovering from natural disasters. Emergency loans can be used to meet various recovery needs including the replacement of essential items such as equipment or livestock, reorganization of a farming operation, or the refinance of certain debts.

Producers in the contiguous Idaho counties of Bingham, **Boise**, Butte, Cassia, Elmore, Gooding, Lemhi, Lincoln, Minidoka, Power, and Valley, are also eligible to apply for emergency loans.

The deadline to apply for these emergency loans is March 2, 2021.

FSA will review the loans based on the extent of losses, security available, and repayment ability.

FSA has a variety of additional programs to help farmers recover from the impacts of this disaster. FSA programs that do not require a disaster declaration include: Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program; Emergency Conservation Program; Livestock Forage Disaster Pro-

gram; Livestock Indemnity Program; Operating and Farm Ownership Loans; and the Tree Assistance Program.

Farmers may contact their local USDA service center for further information on eligibility requirements and application procedures for these and other programs. Additional information is also available online at farmers.gov/recover.

Bogus Basin Recreational Association and EPA Settle Alleged Stormwater Violations at Ski Area

U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the Bogus Basin Recreational Association, Inc., have settled a Clean Water Act enforcement case stemming from alleged violations of construction stormwater permit re- observed during an unanquirements at the ski area and recreation complex located 16 miles northwest of Boise, Idaho. Bogus Basin is a 501(C)(3)non-profit organization which operates by a Special Use Permit within the Boise National Forest under the U.S. Department of Agriculture.








Recount for County Commissioner, District 1

BOISE COUNTY -- The Office of the Attorney General has issued a mandate to Boise County Clerk Mary Prisco, with an additional copy sent to Boise County Sheriff Scott Turner. "You are hereby ordered that all business and excuses being laid aside, by virtue of the authority vested in the Office of the Attorney General pursuant to Idaho Code §34-2304, you are hereby directed to conduct a recount of all ballots cast in Boise County for the County Commissioner, District 1, 2020 primary. The recount shall commence on Thursday, July 16, 2020 at 10:00 a.m., at the Boise County, Idaho City Courthouse, located at 419 Main Street, Idaho City." Notices were sent to the four candidates: Kenny Everhart, Roger B. Jackson, Rhonda Jalbert, and Steven Twilegar.

The Sheriff for Boise County will deliver the ballots, absen-

tee ballots, tally books, spoiled ballots, and appropriate keys to the courthouse in Idaho City in time for the recount to commence. When the results have been declared, these items will again be placed in the custody of Sheriff Turner until the time of the appeal has passed.

The voting margin was very narrow between all the candidates and Kenny Everhart requested that there be a recount after the votes were first canvassed on June 2nd.

If you met Lisa Kirkland 2 years ago, you met an independent, fun-loving, happy Army/ National Guard service member with unrivaled grit, wit and passion. On her way home one evening, she was in a car accident and she luckily walked away with very minor injuries...or so we thought. GARDEN VALLEY ~ THE GLENNONS

GLENNON FAMILY EARLY SETTLERS OF UP-PER PAYETTE

Patrick Glennon was born in Athlone, Ireland in 1831 and traveled to the California mines via the Isthmus of Panama. He married Mary Naylor of Garden Valley at the Carrigan ranch, who was from Boone County, Missouri, in 1842. He often told his sons that he almost choked to death for the lack of a drink. Patrick was not able to walk in his later years. He had a favorite race horse while in Garden Valley. He rode it regularly in horse races, because he was successful.

In 1872, Patrick Glennon bought the old Carrigan ranch in Upper Payette. It was in the S1/2,SW1/4 Section 15, T9N, R4E. It consisted of 120 acres. That land was likely a help to the Carrigans. Today, the land has been changed a lot by the construction of the park and picnic area. Only the two old barns remain on the open land. At least one house remains on the property. Two additional houses exist, but all have been renovated. I talked to one homeowner, but she

had no idea who had lived there so many years before.

Patrick and Mary Glennon had three sons and three daughters. Their youngest son lived on the old ranch for many years. Many of the children lived in the Boise Valley for a long time. Patrick loved his grandkids and often had them over to his house for meals. Mary Glennon loved to serve the kids.


Nellie Ireton Mills mentions them. One daughter, Mary Jane, died June 26, 1883 in Garden

Valley. A granddaughter, another Mary Jane, died in Garden Valley on April 27, 1897.

In 1897, son John Glennon married Clara Soward.

Harry Carter was the brother of Mrs. Glennon. He moved next door to the Glennons, though information as to exactly where remains uncertain.

On March 13, 1907, John Glennon took a load of hay to Idaho City, an indication that the Glennons were still taking hay and

produce to Idaho City and around the Basin. The Glennons delivered produce and hay to the Basin throughout their lives.

In October, 1908, the senior Glennons had diphtheria.

In March, 1909, Pat Glennon's house burned down. That same month, Pat Glennon died at home. That may have been a result of the diphtheria. He was buried in the Garden Valley cemetery.

On January 16, 1914, The Idaho World mentioned that Mrs. Clara Glennon was a daughter of Louis Albright. I could find no Louis Albright or any further references to Glennons published in any Idaho

World newspaper up to 1918. That was the last newspaper article about the Glennon family.

The Glennon farm location is somewhat of a mystery. It may have been down at the river level where the new park is now. Apparently, the Glennons lived there a long time. But the park and pavilion have long since obliterated any farm.

Idaho Power's Helpful Summer Tips

Beat the Heat with Summer Energy-saving Tips

Summer is finally here, and that can mean increased energy use as people keep homes and businesses cool. And for those still spending more time at home, energy use this summer could look different than in past years. Idaho Power has a few tips for staying cool and managing summer energy use.

- · Close doors, windows, and blinds during the day, especially on the east and west sides of the house. If safe to do so, open windows at night or early in the morning to let in cooler air.
- Do laundry and run the dishwasher in the early morning and late evening hours to avoid adding heat in the warm-

est part of the day.

- Consider installing an attic fan to draw hot air out of the
- Consider installing a ceiling fan in rooms used frequently and run it counterclockwise (to push cool air down) during the summer. Moving air can feel up to four degrees cooler than still air. Ceiling fans are effective in homes both with and without air conditioning.
- Turn the air conditioner off if the home or business will be empty for an extended period.
- Check the air conditioner's air handler or furnace filter. Dirty filters reduce a system's efficiency.
- Consider installing a programmable thermostat to allow for higher temperatures at night

and when no one is around.

• Weather-strip doors and windows to prevent losing cool air to the outside.



Carter S. Duke 1951 - 2020

Carter S. Duke, 69, of Horseshoe Bend, Idaho, was killed on May 25, 2020, at his home in a tragic farming accident

He was born in Fort Smith, Arkansas, on April 22, 1951, son of the late Walter and Marion Duke. Preceded in death by his sister, Sandra Lethem, his only sibling. He is survived by his spouse of 47 years, Gail R. Duke, several in-laws with spouses, and numerous nephews, nieces, great-nephews and nieces, and a large extended family.

Carter graduated from Del Norte High School, Albuquerque, New Mexico, in 1969 with ROTC 4-year and music scholarships. He graduated from New Mexico State University, Las Cruces, New Mexico, in 1974 and was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in the United States Air Force. Due to the times (post-Vietnam), his start on active duty was delayed. It was during this time that he took his first job with the U.S. Forest Service and received his first wildland firefighting training with the Carson National Forest.

His first love has always been flying. At 16, he learned to fly and bought his first airplane. His goal in life has always been to fly for the Air Force. Receiving orders for Mather AFB, California, to begin Navigator training was a start. Out of nav school, he selected fighters and became an F-4 Phantom Weapons Systems Operator (WSO). With experience, he was selected to attend the USAF Fighter Weapons School and graduated as an F-4 Fighter Weapons Instructor and the top WSO of the class. Over the course of his career, he was stationed at multiple locations in the U.S., Europe, Asia and deployed to numerous locations around the world.

Upon retirement from the USAF, he continued to serve – as a dispatcher for Otero County Sheriff's office and a volunteer firefighter/EMT for Boles Acres, New Mexico. Relocating to Mountain Home, Idaho, he recertified as an EMT in Elmore County and continued to provide support as a "dispatcher" for Saint Alphonsus' Life Flight. He moved to Horseshoe Bend in 2000 and began supporting Boise County as an EMT, eventually becoming the Horseshoe Bend Director for Emergency Services. Carter supported the community and Volunteer Fire Department as an active firefighter. He served in various positions within the department - Training Officer, Vehicle Captain, and administrative support, to name a few. As he stated in his bio, "The real enjoyment of Emergency Service is the comradeship of working with a motivated, well-trained team and the gratification of helping someone in distress." Carter was known for his dedication and willingness to serve his country and his community.

Throughout life, Carter loved flying, skydiving, music, and children. He was actively involved in 4-H, doing the "behind the scene" things that helped the children succeed. In Idaho, he was introduced to ice hockey. Carter was an avid fan of the game ("season pass holder" supporting the Idaho Steelheads). However, watch-

ing hockey was not enough, he began playing hockey and became a goalie. He even played goalie for Boise Fire in the annual "Guns and Hoses" hockey games.

The memorial service will be held from 4 - 8 PM on Sunday, July 19th, at the Horseshoe Bend City Park, Highway 55. Military honors will be rendered at 4 PM. Family and friends are welcome. This will be a casual service, so please bring your fond memories or funny stories to share with all, a covered dish, and join us in celebrating Carter's life. You will need to bring lawn chairs or a blanket. Bottled water will be available but otherwise, it is BYOB.

The family is in the process of establishing a firefighter scholarship fund in memory of Carter. Watch the Horseshoe Bend Volunteer Fire Department Facebook page for details.

The family understands if you do not attend due to CO-VID-19. The last thing Carter would want is to have someone become sick with the CO-VID-19 virus because of him. We do ask people to wear masks and comply with "social distancing" rules.

Dale Hanson was born on April 29,1934. He was preceded in death by parents Arthur and Myrtle (Rhodes) Hanson, sister Dolores, three sons William, Dale, and Robert. Preceded in death also by wives Lola (Harper) Hanson, Josephine Hanson, and companion and friend Margaret Drake. He is survived by sons James and Jonathan and daughters Debra and Leola Hanson, nine grandchildren, thirteen great grandchildren and one great-great grandchild. Horseshoe Bend has been his home and logging the woods of Idaho his life. Having a successful logging company for many years, then later serving two terms as Boise county commissioner, his passion was benefiting the community. He played high school football in Cascade, earning a college scholarship. Always a sports fan, he later sponsored the Hanson Logging baseball team. A lover of animals, as a child he once had a pet bear cub rescued from the woods

and has taken in many a dog or cat. He also has rescued many a person who needed a helping hand, offering them a job, a place to stay, or a bag of groceries. His life was always about work, friendships, and helping those in need. A graveside service will be held on Thursday, July 16, 2020 at 2:00 PM at the Pioneer Cemetery in Horseshoe Bend, Idaho. Services are in the care of the Potter Funeral Chapel Emmett.

Pledge of Allegiance

EXECUTIVE SESSION: [Time 9:07am - 9:31am] Per personnel, closed session. Coming out there was no action required.

CONSTITUENT INPUT: None

MINUTES: Commissioner Jackson made a motion to accept the June 29th and June 30th meeting minutes.

DEPARTMENTAL SHES

PLANNING & ZONING **ADMINISTRATOR: "Please** accept my formal resignation from Boise County... I'm so grateful for the opportunity to work under your leadership for the citizens of Boise County," Bret Caulder. The commissioners motioned to approve the resignation letter.

ROAD & BRIDGE: Water

truck discussion was tabled. An amended motion was made for the purchase in the amount of \$44,550.

A paving project and drainage issues were discussed.

BOARDWALK: The work done to replace the boardwalk in and around county offices was discussed, as well as addressing the problem of buckling, unsupported concrete creating a tripping hazard.

SHERIFF OFFICE: Sheriff Scott Turner reported that their dispatch advisor put together some numbers and read that just on Saturday they had 45 events, 1155 radio transmissions, 264 calls into dispatch, two felony arrests, two stolen cars, and nine crashes. He said Friday and Sunday weren't any better. "It was probably the busiest for law enforcement 4th of July that I've had in the twenty years that I've been around," Sheriff Turner said.

Some easements were discussed as a necessity for widening and turnouts. The Highway District Deed was accepted and signed by a motion, with the federal government.

DISASTER EMERGEN-CY DECLARATION: A motion was made by Commissioner Stirm to continue a disaster emergency declaration.

FINANCIAL ASSIS-TANCE FOR DEFENSE: An eleven page document was discussed by the Clerk briefly, which will be tabled until next week.

SQUAW CREEK SOIL **CONSERVATION**: Support for the agency was discussed. A letter of support will be sent to the agency.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Per exempt records. After coming out of a closed session, Commissioner Ward motioned to put on a lien.

IDAHO CITY OF COM-BOGUS BASIN ROAD: MERCE: Lisa Hanson, Presi-

dent of the Chamber of Commerce in Idaho City, said that the presence of the county as a listing on their membership portrays the support that we receive and the desire to achieve our goals, which is to bring tourism to the county. She brought updated information and a certificate. She spoke about the goals they have achieved, which included painting the Visitor's Center, new signage, and lighting. There are visible welcome signs from all directions into Idaho City.

They will be making four seasonal videos. She spoke regarding funds attached to Parks & Recreation and motorized recreation. A presentation is being planned through the Chamber including topics like "Safety" and "Pack in and Pack out".

They reported that there were no firework injuries over the weekend.

The Boise County Solid Waste Transfer Stations are Up & Running During the Pandemic

BOISE COUNTY -- The transfer stations are a wonderful advantage of living in Boise County. Regardless of a pandemic, the trash goes on. The transfer stations in Boise County are essential and have kept on a continuous schedule. They do, however, ask that you minimize contact with the onsite worker(s) and try to consolidate your trips, so you make only one big trip instead of multiple small ones.

Many people know that dropping off regular household garbage is always free, but you can also drop off yard waste, used motor oil, car batteries, and antifreeze. Also, for

a small fee, they will accept appliances such as freezers and air conditioners, personal tires in excess of two, mattresses, and larger items such as a camper shell or hot tub. They will also take vehicles with the fluids drained and the battery removed, but the titles must accompany each vehicle.

Transfer stations are located in Idaho City, Garden Valley, Lowman, and Horseshoe Bend. Hours of operation differ with each location. For more information on pricing, days of operation, and the services provided, call the Boise County Solid Waste Department at 208-793-2447.




