Invitation to Honor the Fallen Aaron Butler Memorial Purple Heart Run

GARDEN VALLEY -- The Aaron Butler Memorial Purple Heart Run will be held on Saturday, 9:00AM, August 15th, 2020 at Weilmunster Park. This run will carry an emotional and educational message and purpose to remind people of the sacrifice of the military, Purple Heart recipients and so many other first responders. Families and the community are welcome to participate. The courses will be lined with pictures and stories about Purple Heart Recipients, who gave their lives in the Global War on Terror (since 9/11/2001).

So, who is SSG Aaron Butler and why is he honored in this race? Aaron was a Green Beret, a son, a brother, a friend. He was referred to as adventurous. He volunteered in his church, excelled in school, music, and football. He was a four-time Utah State Champion wrestler, a mixed martial artist, and a U.S. Army Special Forces soldier. His sacrifice for his country came when he was 27 years old while fighting ISIS-K terrorists in Southern Nangarhar Province, Afghanistan.

On August 16, 2017, after a day of fire-fights, an abandoned building that Aaron's team was taking cover in exploded, killing everyone inside except for Dan Nelson, who was Aaron's team leader in Afghanistan. Dan was standing right next to Aaron. Dan, humbled by the tragedy, wanted to remember his fellow comrade and team member. The concep-

tion of creating a fundraiser to remember Aaron and all other Gold Star families who have lost loved ones in combat. The event expanded to include and connect Military, Veterans, First Responders, and the local communities. It is an event to make sure no Gold Star family member is forgotten.

The race can be a 5K, 10K or an Unknown Distance Run celebrating U.S. Service members who have given part of themselves or perished in combat operations globally. According to Kacey Nelson, spouse of Dan Nelson and the Secretary of Aaron Butler Memorial Foundation (a 501C3 nonprofit), the course will be lined with pictures and stories about Purple Heart Recipients who gave their lives in the Global War on Terror (since 9/11/2001). There will be stories from Gold Star families, Vietnam War Purple Heart Recipients, and Purple Heart Recipients from the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. This is a unique opportunity to see and hear from local community members who have given more than most for our Nation.

The event ended up in Garden Valley when they were asked to cancel at the last minute in Ada County. Prior to cancellation, everything seemed to be in place, with commitments made, food planned, and speakers reserved. Many involved in the event last year did not want to see this go away. Event planners saw Garden Valley and

Weilmunster Park as a location where CDC guidelines of social distancing can be followed in an outdoor environment. There is an added benefit to the community if this can become an annual event.

Kacey adds, "We are not a political event, and everyone is welcome. We will have masks for all attending, and we will provide ample opportunity to maintain and adhere to the National CDC guidelines. Big K BBQ will be serving the participants a delicious BBQ lunch and Bear Island Brewing is providing Mission Purple, a **new purple beer**, in honor of Aaron and our event. Our speakers are Gold Star Brothers, brothers of a fallen service member. This will be an emotional and educational experience and we are so excited to hold it in beautiful Garden Valley!"

The event is about community and sacrifice, according to their website. Participants can feel free to wear traditional running attire, or load yourself down with a ruck sack, military/LEO uniform, or boots and body armor for an added degree of commitment. Aaron was a Green Beret, a son, brother, friend and teammate. One of eight children, he was a 4-time Utah State Champion wrestler, skilled in martial arts, and was a U.S. Army Special Forces soldier who died while serving his country in Afghanistan in 2017.

The Aaron Butler Memorial Foundation was created to honor the fallen and engage communities throughout the Nation in meaningful social action events, bringing together a diverse pool of like-minded veterans, military, first responders, challenged athletes, and civilian supporters.

City of Horseshoe Bend Holds Community Workshop

HORSESHOE BEND -- The City of Horseshoe Bend held a community workshop on Wednesday, July 29 at 7:00 p.m. The workshop was to discuss the proposed Comprehensive Plan and to allow community input. Mayor Pat Goff, Councilmembers Stephen Chartier and Martye White, City Clerk Gina Elmer, Public Works Department representative Michele Brothers, and City Attorney Geoff Schroeder were in attendance.

One community member was in the audience. Schroeder provided the council with the Idaho statute (Title 67; Chapter 65 Local Land Use Planning) that details the required elements of the comprehensive plan. It requires 17 specific components to be documented or to be provided reasons as to why a particular component is

unnecessary. Schroeder went on to tell the council that the comprehensive plan was not a zoning document and was not law. According to Schroeder the plan only guides zoning and planning decisions and that the adoption of a comprehensive plan is a prerequisite to adopting zoning ordinances, the caveat being that the zoning ordinance cannot be in conflict with the city's comprehensive plan. Schroeder indicated that he had changed some language in the comprehensive plan that had been recently drafted by a community committee to make it statutorily correct. His opinion of the plan as written was that it is "verbose to say the least but it is legally sufficient unless there are items you want to take out."

White commented that the council "made a mistake by

letting this happen. The majority of the committee doesn't live in the city."

Goff had a problem with the length of the plan, "15 pages in housing alone." Schroeder told the council they could condense the document. He also advised that the chapters should match up in the same order as they are listed in the statute.

Goff said that he wanted the plan to be "clear and concise." Schroeder agreed that there was a lot of extra language in the plan that could be eliminated. He gave an example of how the transportation chapter only needed to deal with traffic infrastructure, not modes of transportation. Goff suggested including an option in the plan to explore traffic control methods along the Highway 55 corridor. White said, "Less is more, there is a whole bunch

of Ernest Hemingway stuff that doesn't need to be there."

Councilmember White went on to state that he had received concerns from citizens about the zero lot lines and the air quality provisions on the comprehensive plan; however, Elmer stated that no written concerns had been received by the city. Schroeder reiterated that the comprehensive plan has no mandates, it is merely a working guide for the city and that zoning ordinances were the mandate. He suggested that each councilmember take a few chapters and amend them

before sending them to him. Schroeder will then correct and compile the chapters and get them back to the council to be released to the public.

The public hearing is scheduled for August, during the council's regular meeting on the 19th, and will most likely have the council voting to adopt the comprehensive plan as it is currently written and to make changes/adaptations at a later date, or the council will present an altered version of the plan and the public hearing will be held in September.

Horseshoe Bend School District Update:

Horseshoe Bend School District Opens in Category 2

HORSESHOE BEND -- The Horseshoe Bend School District has modified its plans for reopening to students this fall. The basis for these changes is outlined in the Idaho Back to School Framework that has been adopted by the Idaho State Board of Education. The school district will be opening in Category 2 of the plan, due to community spread of COVID-19 in the Horseshoe Bend area.

The community spread has been determined by data provided by the Idaho Central Health District. School will now begin on Monday, August 24, instead of August 19.

Because the community transmissions seem to be minimal, the district has stated that campus buildings will be open and both students and teachers will be in classrooms but there will be some operational procedures put in place to ensure that students and staff remain safe.

Students grades Pre-K through 6th will have their temperature taken using a no-touch thermometer at the beginning of each school day and upper grade students will have

temperature readings taken if they exhibit symptoms of COVID-19 (7-12 grade students will complete a symptom questionnaire at the beginning of each day). Any student or staff member that shows indications of symptoms will be isolated and sent home.

The use of masks will be strongly recommended and secondary students may be required to wear them in classrooms of highly vulnerable teachers. At a student's request, disposable masks will be provided free of charge.

No unscheduled visitors will be allowed inside buildings. No school assemblies or field trips will be allowed during this time.

Physical distancing will be observed in the following ways: Classes with a roster of more than 15 students will be split into two groups, with one group in the class with their teacher Mondays and Wednesdays, and the other group on Tuesdays and Thursdays. On days that students are not with their teacher, they will be in a different location on campus doing class work. Elementary school students will be working with a paraprofessional and secondary students will be working independently but with adult supervision.

Lockers will not be accessible to middle school students and their use will be discouraged in the high school.

Hand hygiene stations will be located in all classrooms and in heavily traveled areas. Frequent cleaning of high use areas will be ongoing throughout the day, including the elementary playground. The schedule will be adjusted to allow for staggered lunch periods.

Transportation: Those students that can safely walk to school are encouraged to do so. Payments may be available to parents that transport their children to the school as opposed to using school transportation. Other safety measures will be taken to decrease the likelihood of a COVID-19 transmission, such as requiring students to use hand sanitizer before boarding the bus, students from the same households sitting next to each other, and possibly requiring mask use if seat spacing is not possible. Athletic competitions are still set to start but may change based on findings from the Idaho High School Activities Association. Boise Basin School District Update:



Basin School District Fall School Opening Update

The Basin School District received news from Central District Health on Monday, August 3rd, placing the Basin, Horseshoe Bend, and Garden Valley districts in a category 2: Mild to Moderate Community Transmission, while our neighboring Boise School District is listed as a Category 3: Substantial Community Transmission. An important factor to take into consideration is the fact that the zip code 83716 or any COVID-19 tests with a Boise address are being counted in Ada county, which student wise contains the majority of the student population for the district.

If the Basin School District opened today, the school week would be Monday through Thursday and conducting an online class day on Friday, to prepare students for the possibility of online school in the future. The Basin School Board will approve the specific detailed plan at the next board meeting on the 18th of August. Central District Health will monitor the spread of the virus and advise the districts every Friday. The district will adapt to changes as they occur, which may mean dropping back down to a Category 1: No Community Transmission, school conducted as normal, or ramping up to a Category 3: Substantial Community Transmission and running an online school. The district is planning on opening school for K-12 on Monday, August 31st, and September

6th for preschool. The closer we get to August 31st, the more we will know, and each day/week may look different until the virus is manageable. The best approach is for students, parents, and staff to prepare for the worst-case scenario and as a community, we can adapt to anything less.

Please be advised that as a community we can minimize our exposure to the virus by social distancing and wearing masks when appropriate. The community has until August 31st to lower community spread enough to bring our category down to a level 1. Keep in mind, the Basin School District has a very small staff, the district can adapt to one or two staff members taking sick leave, but beyond one or two the district will have to move to online education. For this reason, the Basin School District has been preparing for the worst-case scenario of teaching online. The district will not be caught by surprise this round and expects there to be complications once the flu season comes into play in October and November.

Extracurricular activities as of today are still a go. The

district is taking precautions to keep the staff and students safe. Central District Health will guide the district on a weekly basis of if or how the district conducts extracurricular activities.

BOISE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

July 28, 2020

Present: Commissioners Alan Ward and Roger Jackson. Ryan Stirm via phone.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Closed session per personnel and risk management. [9:04 am to 9:25 am] No action required.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Closed session per pending litigation. [9:26 am to 9:40 am] No action required.

MINUTES: Commissioner Ward motioned to approve the minutes from July 21st.

DEPARTMENT ISSUES:

WASTE: Waste tires into the state of Oregon and an application with a \$5,000 bond were briefly discussed for the DEQ. A motion was said to sign the application.

JUVENILE JUSTICE: The community justice report was put on the county's website. Chairman Ward commented, "There's lot to look at in there."

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT: COVID-19 ex-

penditures were discussed through "documents" and fees. Bob Showalter spoke regarding a purchase. Chairman Ward asked about the shelf life of disposable masks and gowns, in the amount of 3,800, for emergency services for Garden Valley and Wilderness Ranch, Coroner, and East Boise County Ambulance. Emergency Manager Showalter responded, "About two years." There will be a 90% reimbursement.

Clerk Mary Prisco stated that they still don't know what the November election is going to look like and are planning to have poll workers and masks will be required.

Showalter would like to be covered through the winter.

A motion was said to cover COVID-19 products, not to exceed \$40,000.

RECOUNT: Clerk Prisco spoke about a letter of confirmation and said the votes had not changed for candidates.

AVIMOR: Clerk Prisco said they received an application for a community infrastructure district. She said that the Board of County Commissioners will be setting a Public Hearing in the next 30 days. The city of Eagle has given consent, because it was in an area of impact, although it is in Boise County.

EARTHQUAKE CLAIM: Clerk Prisco stated that engineers had inspected three buildings: The Miner's Exchange, Idaho City Courthouse, and the Public Safety Building [Sheriff's Office]. The Public Safety Building will need some repairs and potential contractors were discussed. The county will seek an estimate.

FIRES: There are two fires currently burning in the county, said Emergency Manager Showalter. He passed the EMT training.

ASSESSOR: Chris Juszcak said they were getting into the cycle of going around and appraising houses.

TREASURER: Gina Turner said they were making collection calls on the delinquent 2017 taxes and trying to collect on those that have not paid for 2019. They are planning on getting new paint and carpet for the office soon.

SHERIFF: Scott Turner said

they had a couple of fires, one up by Bull Trout and another by Pioneerville. "We facilitated the evacuation of Bull Trout [campground] last night. I was up there late."

He's also been in discussion with the Idaho Transportation Department regarding a reader board to help with crashes, to update motorists. The cost is about \$250,000.

Sheriff Turner said, "Other than that, it's busy."

JUVENILE JUSTICE: They will be doing community service projects this month at Placerville Cemetery. Next month, they will be doing work at the skate park in Idaho City. Their caseload remains the same.

SOLID WASTE: The representative said they've been busy; out of Horseshoe Bend they had four trailer loads, which is 100 tons in a week. They are sending a lot of garbage to the landfill.

They have three spray trucks circulating in the county spraying for weeds and fulfilling the contract with the Forest Service.

PROSECUTOR: Adam Strong said that on the civil side of things, they are getting busier. They are also going through contract agreements. "On the criminal side, things don't slow down. So, we're staying busy," said Prosecutor Strong.

COMPUTER ISSUES: There are programs running in the background that are running, bogging down the computers in several departments including the courts. There is a new IT person working remotely on computer issues.

AVIMOR: An agreement that the county would not pay any outside fees or consultants per their application.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT MUTUAL AID: Chairman Ward made a motion to accept the mutual aid agreement between Boise County, Gem County, and Valley County as per emergency management that Emergency Manager Showalter had been working on.

BILLS: A motion was made to pay the claims report dated 7/24/2020 for Boise County in the amount of \$122,491.

CENTRAL DISTRICT HEALTH: Clerk Prisco said they had a contact that could provide some detailed information "about what communities are being hit the hardest with the COVID-19 cases. So, that's important for us to know." Showalter said she had given him some accurate numbers that are not being displayed on Channel 7.

DEMAND WARRANTS: Commissioner Jackson made a motion to pay Oregon's Dept. of Environmental Quality \$225 for a waste tire carrier permit.

Motions were said for \$10,530 and \$1000 for confidential legal services.

Central District Health: Schools and COVID-19



Central District Health provides community spread categories for school districts in response to COVID-19

BOISE COUNTY -- Central District Health (CDH) began its official weekly assessment and reporting of categories of community spread for use by school districts in Ada, Boise, Elmore, and Valley Counties in their decision-making processes and operations for COVID-19. The categories are defined in the Idaho Back to School Framework, as approved by the State Board of Education in early July, and indicate what level of in-person learning and response is recommended.

The categories referenced below are only recommenda-

tions for the week indicated; final decisions are made by local school boards. Private and charter schools are recommended to use the category based on the address of their facility and associated school district boundary.

The metrics used to make the category determinations include local public health data, and hospital and primary care operational indicators.

Weekly assessments of community spread will be updated on Mondays at <https://www.cdh.idaho.gov/dac-coronavirus-schools.php>. If category designations are adjusted, then schools and families should expect transition time as changes may or may not be immediate.

- **Category 2:** Mild to Moderate Community Transmission
- Category 3: Substantial Community Transmission

Bureau of Reclamation Seeks Public Comment: Future Raising of Anderson Ranch Dam



Reclamation seeks public comment on potential changes to water storage in the Boise River System

BOISE COUNTY – The Bureau of Reclamation announced today it is seeking public comment on the draft environmental impact statement for the Boise River Basin Feasibility Study. Reclamation and the Idaho Water Resource Board have been studying options for increasing water storage capacity within the Boise River System through an ongoing feasibility study.

“Planning for future water needs in the Boise River basin is essential to ensure a secure water supply for future generations,” said Snake River Area Manager Lanie Paquin.

Three alternatives are analyzed in the draft EIS:

- No Action Alternative – assumes no federal action would be taken
- Alternative B – preferred alternative, a six-foot raise of Anderson Ranch Dam
- Alternative C – a three-foot raise of Anderson Ranch Dam

Additional water storage capacity could help offset changes in precipitation patterns and enable storage of more runoff in high water years, enhanc-

ing long-term water supply for critical irrigation, domestic, industrial and municipal needs while continuing to meet environmental and power generation needs.

Due to social distancing requirements at this time, Reclamation will be conducting virtual public involvement to seek public comment on the draft EIS. The public will have the opportunity to participate through a web-based virtual meeting room from July 31, 2020, to September 14, 2020. Lloyd Kalblinger was born in Crookston, Nebraska to Roy and Leona on June 12, 1931 as the youngest out of four children. When Lloyd was three, the family relocated to Nampa, Idaho from Valentine, Nebraska. Those that have had the opportunity to know Lloyd, know that Lloyd was always willing and able to tell colorful stories of his life. It was one of Lloyd's favorite stories to share about when he was a young boy in Nebraska that the Native Americans would come down to the watering hole to water their ponies and try to "barter with Mom for the little yellow haired boy." It was this knack of rumination that set Lloyd apart from many and how many of us will remember him.

After living in Nampa briefly, he and his family moved north to Moscow, Idaho where Lloyd finished out his youth. Lloyd was always a hardworking man with integrity and work ethic. As a young boy at the age of twelve, he worked on the Moscow area farms and provided to his family. He would be the first to arrive to the fields and the last to leave; he was even known to sleep on his foreman's porch in order to get to work first thing in the morning. All of his hard work paid off continually through his life; one of his first major accomplishments as a result of his strong work ethic was that he paid his way through college and graduated from the University of Idaho.

After finishing his degree, Lloyd joined the United States Airforce and became a First Lieutenant in the 341st TCS as an accomplished fighter pilot of the F-86 air combat swept wing

fighter plane. Lloyd loved flying and continued to do so later in life. In addition to excelling in flight, Lloyd also loved to play baseball and was a member of the Great Plains Conference team that earned a runner up title in the United States Air Force Worldwide Championship games. During this season in Lloyd's life, he also married his first wife and had a son.

Once Lloyd was finished with his commitment to the Air Force, he returned to Nampa where he began his success as a celebrated business man. With a little financial help from his parents, Lloyd began the prominent country western store, Lloyd's Country Store. It was in this course of his life that Lloyd fell in love with all things rodeo and country western.

Lloyd was a trusting and non-nonsense person. He would often conduct business the old-fashioned way with a handshake and "your word", but you had better have kept it. He was proud of this principle and made many life-long friends with this attitude. He was also able to cull out those who had alternate approaches to his ethics.

Lloyd was a people person and he found his calling when he owned and operated the store. Lloyd thrived on the energy of the customers that came through his store and many became more than just customers in his store, but became allies, partners, and dear friends. You could often find Lloyd visiting and connecting with people at the coffee bar at the store, or laughing and telling stories with those that came to visit him.

The combination of his busi-

ness savvy and enthusiasm for life, created many successes for Lloyd, as he was an unmistakable and memorable character. Every Christmas he would have a Christmas tree in his store filled with ornaments where every child that came into the store would be able to pick one of the ornaments to keep. He loved to give and provide for all of those around him; he loved the innocence and hope in children. Throughout his life he always would be delighted and amazed by children and the world through their eyes.

In addition to being a leader in his industry, he was a major supporter of high school rodeos, snaffle bit futurities, and ultimately served as a long-time board member and avid supporter of the Snake River Stampede. He generously donated his time and supported the Nampa Lions, Snake River Stampede, Miss Rodeo Idaho, Idaho's Snaffle Bit Futurity, Idaho Golden Gloves, and several other organizations throughout the Treasure Valley.

After many decades and many successes with his retail stores, Lloyd decided it was time to move onto the next season in his life and slow down. During this time, Lloyd met and committed to Niki, his life partner and companion for over 25 years. The two of them traveled extensively and spent ample time in Mexico, tooling around the United States and visiting Alaska. They would travel many miles to a horse auction or estate sale just because they could. Lloyd and Niki were known to go for a Sunday drive on a Tuesday and come back home the next Saturday! They enjoyed their adventures together and would never miss an opportunity for a new experience or to learn something new. Lloyd was constantly seeking knowledge and new things as he was grateful to always get to learn. Lloyd and Niki built their home together in the Garden Valley area.

Together with two of his close friends, Pat Sweeney and Boone McCurly, Lloyd built fence, barns, out buildings, and sheds on a parcel of land outside of Garden Valley. The three comrades worked and built and created Lloyd's version of a mountain oasis to spend the rest of his days with Niki and the many animals they cared for.

Lloyd had a full, blessed, life that he was continually grate-
