### Lowman Emergency Services Call for a Safety Zone on Hwy. 21

**Members of the Lowman Emergency Services Erected Memorial for Duffy Zieber. Calls from the Community to Enact a Safety Zone on Route 21 Intensify**

**LOWMAN** -- On Sunday afternoon, September 13, several members of the Lowman Emergency Services along with the Lowman Community Church erected a memorial bench to honor their fellow Emergency Services volunteer, and well-beloved community member, Duffy Zieber. Duffy was killed the afternoon of September 4, 2019 when riding his ATV while attempting to cross Highway 21 near the Sourdough Lodge in Lowman Idaho. He was struck by a west-bound truck hauling a camping trailer.

This was not the first time

an accident occurred on this stretch of highway 21. Only one week earlier an accident resulting in one woman being air lifted to the hospital in Boise occurred. The stretch of Highway 21 through Lowman, particularly near the Sourdough Lodge, where more businesses and residents are, has been the location of many accidents and near misses. Often these accidents are a result of excessive speed or not driving appropriately for road conditions.

The community implored the Idaho Department of Transportation (IDT) to investigate what could be done to make this section of the road safer. The IDT responded by meeting with the Idaho State Police. Together they determined that a Road Safety Audit (RSA) was warranted for this section.

The *World* spoke with the IDT Public Information Officer, Jake Melder. He explained that an RSA is initiated by ITD but requires involvement of numerous stakeholders, including law enforcement, local elected officials, and adjacent residents and businesses. It also includes a comprehensive analysis of a roadway, examining speed, access, crash history, and driver behavior. Based on this information, traffic experts can

then recommend changes to the roadway. These changes may affect a number of features and can range from cheaper, short-term improvements to more expensive, long-range improvements. Speed limits may be changed. New signage may be installed. Access on and off the highway may be restricted. Longer term, additional turn lanes, wider should-

ers, or even more travel lanes may be recommended. When the RSA is complete, including the recommended changes, the Department will work with the local jurisdictions and law enforcement to create a plan to implement the improvements. Mr. Melder also explained that the necessary meeting between all of the stakeholders has been postponed indefinitely due to

the COVID-19 pandemic. He states, “In following health guidelines by the CDC and Central District Health, some portions of an RSA cannot be completed at this time.” Specifically, an on-site survey with a group of elected officials, transportation experts, law enforcement, and area stakehold-

### Stolen Vehicle Ends Up in Arrowrock

**EAST BOISE COUNTY** -- A call came into the Boise County Dispatch on Thursday morning, September 17th, when a car was spotted upside down in of Arrowrock Reservoir. The Bureau of Reclamation allows for the waters to flow out each fall, which had been happening over the past

several weeks, gradually revealing the white Audi to those passing by on HWY 21.

According to Boise County Sheriff's Office, the license plate was run and it was determined that vehicle had been stolen out of Boise back in April of 2020. Over the years, Boise County Deputies have occasionally come across stolen vehicles that had been seemingly dumped in the reservoir, remaining invisible until the water dropped.

A large semi tow truck was used to pull the vehicle up and over several hundred feet of the rocky cliff.

Before it was known if there had been a drowning, the owner of Trudy's Kitchen in Idaho City, Melissa Head, reflected with some concern, “I've been boating over that car this summer.”

Several agencies were involved in this incident, including Boise County Deputies, East Boise County Ambulance, and the Idaho State Police. The incident is currently under investigation and no other information has been released at this time. ## HORSESHOE BEND CITY COUNCIL MEETING

**HORSESHOE BEND** -- The following is a synopsis of the Horseshoe Bend City Council meeting that took place on September 16, 2020. Councilmember Ben Riley was not in attendance. After the call to order, the Pledge of Allegiance, approval of the agenda, previous minutes, and the authorization to pay the city's bills, Mayor Pat Goff opened the dais for public comments. No one came forward (there was in fact only one member of the public in the audience). First up on the agenda was the public hearing on the city's new comprehensive plan. City attorney Geoff Schroeder told the council that the original comprehensive plan had been revised to a legally sufficient document and reminded the council that the plan could be revised every six months. He asked the council to thank the committee that had done the original revisions, noting that they had taken the city's comprehensive plan from 2009 and updated it with new numbers and statistical information. Councilmember Martye White told committee Chairperson Cheryl Pleak that he "appreciated all her hard

work," adding "You may have thought we were throwing you under the bus; we were not." Pleak said she appreciated his comments. No one from the public came forward with testimony for or against the plan. City Engineer Amy Woodruff asked the council if she could have some more time to verify some of the numbers such as housing vacancy percentages and population predictions. Mayor Goff indicated that he believed it to be okay to adopt the plan as is and update in six months. Woodruff replied, "I don't think it (the number discrepancies) will make a huge difference in how we address zoning issues." Pleak said she believed the revised comprehensive plan was missing some information from the plan she submitted in July and wanted time to do a comparison. Schroeder told the council the missing information was "irrelevant" and the plan could be updated in six months. Goff called for written comments. There were none. The public hearing was closed. Councilmember Curtis Corvinus said, "Let's get it done." Councilmember Stephen Chartier told the other councilmembers: "We've got a pretty

good basic plan." The plan was approved unanimously. After the vote, Councilmember White proclaimed, "I don't want to see this thing again for six months." Councilmember Corvinus spoke to the council about the city's burn ban ordinance. He said the current plan was "vague" and there was "no way to enforce it." He suggested that the burn ban mirror Boise County's ordinance. Goff said the issue with that is the county's take on approved fire structures and asked the council if they wanted to make a change to that portion of the county's ordinance, going on to say, "In my opinion a burn barrel takes care of that with a screen." Corvinus said that the fire department really just wants to discourage people from burning large piles of debris and suggested that maybe they should use the county ordinance as a guideline. Schroeder told the council that city attorney Tony Pantera had already drafted a new ordinance that excluded the 5' chimney requirement on fire structures. Corvinus said that "fire pits, (fires in) controlled environments" were fine, adding, "We need to get a handle on open burns."

Schroeder said the ordinance would need to be something that the Sheriff's Department would be able to easily use to determine if a fire was compliant with the law. Goff suggested changing set burn ban dates to flexible dates determined by the fire chief's recommendations and based on current weather conditions. The council asked Corvinus to come back with a revised ordinance based on the suggestions brought forth. The council then took up the renewal of the city's Idaho Counties Risk Management Program (ICRMP) policy. According to ICRMP's website, the company was created in 1985 by Idaho local governments who were searching for a stable, homegrown source of property and casualty insurance plus risk management services, and since then ICRMP has evolved into one of the best examples of inter-local government collaboration in the state. City Clerk Gina Elmer told the council the policy had "No major changes" and City Treasurer Teri Nolan added that the policy had increased by \$388.00. The council unanimously approved to renew the policy.

EMS spokesperson Michele Brothers reported that the department had gone on 31 runs in August and that they were currently going through the department's bylaws to forward to Schroeder. The department will be advertising for new recruits/trainees in the paper and on their Facebook page. Brothers also presented the Public Works department update saying that street sweeping had been completed, maintenance for blue green algae was currently underway, and the one way street sign for Watson Road should be up by September 18. White facetiously replied, "And it will be down by Saturday." Pleak spoke about wanting to meet with the Mayor to determine what grants the city would like her to apply for. She told the council that the grant for new fencing at the water treatment plant would not be forthcoming. Public Works Department employee Jobie Catherman told the council that they had received a bid from the Heartland Post & Pole Fence Company that was very reasonable. He will present a proposal to the council at next month's meeting.

Pleak said that she would get word on the EMT grant she applied for by the end of the week. Woodruff rounded up the department reports and told the council they were "finalizing the well and the intake structure at the water treatment plant and we're working through the Tamarack property specifics." The meeting adjourned at 7:32 p.m. to go into executive session. The council meets next on Wednesday, October 21, 2020 at 7:00 p.m.

ers cannot be done while maintaining social distance. This item is postponed until such time that it can be completed safely. Melder stated that in the meantime the ITD is currently working on other parts of the RSA for this section of highway. That includes an analysis of traffic speeds and travel patterns, an engineering investigation into current roadway conditions and features (for example, line of sight at access points, road curvature and elevation changes, travel lane, and shoulder width), and an inventory of current signage.

Highway 21 through Lowman has seen a steady increase in traffic, with this year topping all others. Particularly as a result of the pandemic, many folks use this Scenic Byway as a passage to get out into one of our treasured National Forests. It is common on Friday or Sunday for traffic to be backed up, with multiple trucks hauling campers. Speed limits vary through the approximate 12 mile stretch from the South Fork Lodge to the Sourdough Lodge. Many people drive exceedingly fast on this winding country highway. This past weekend, I personally was passed by a car and a truck hauling a camper while I was traveling at 55 mph. In addition to the increase in traffic in Lowman, there is also an increase in residents, falling loose rocks are common, and of course, there is a lot of wildlife. These factors combined make for a

very dangerous stretch of road. Duffy's fellow Lowman Emergency Services Volunteers and other community members hope this delay in the RSA is short-lived. For Duffy's friends and family this tragedy will never be rectified; however,

at least his death will not be in vain if a future tragedy can be avoided.

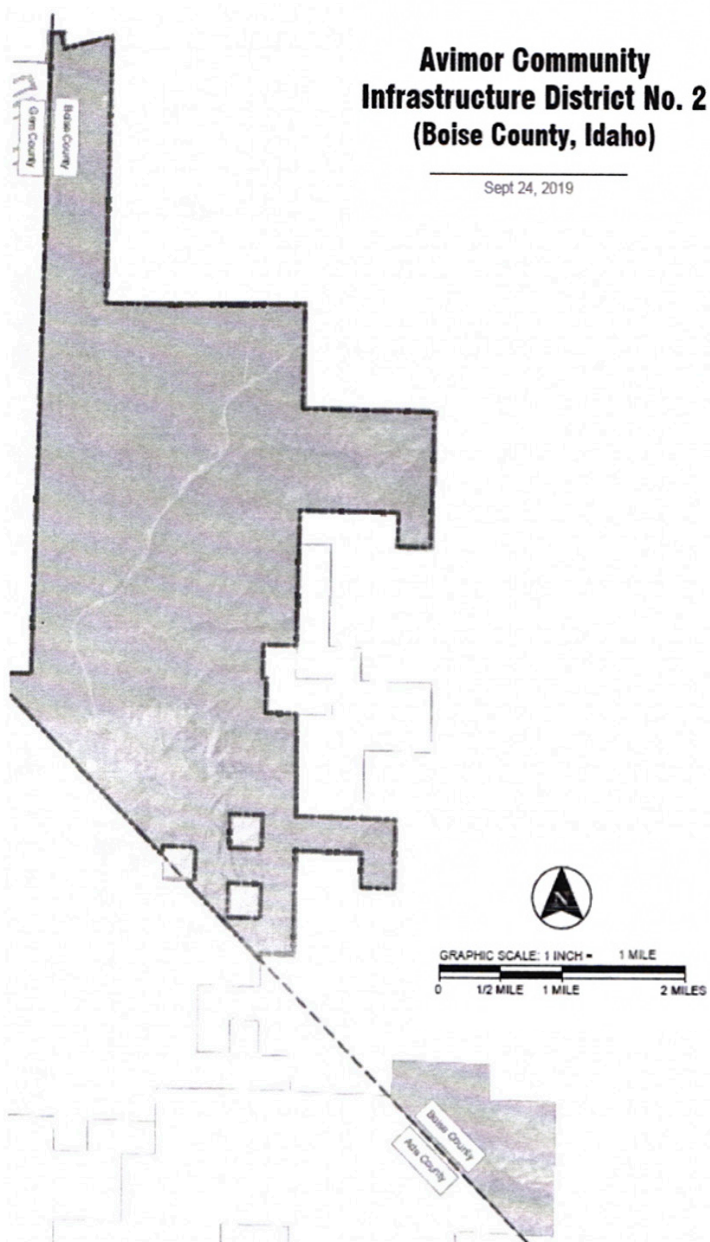

This notice is published pursuant to Section 50-3103(2), Idaho Code: A petition requesting the formation of the Avimor Community Infrastructure District No. 2 (Boise County, Idaho) was filed with the Clerk of the Board of Boise County Commissioners on July 21st, 2020. The petition was filed by all of the owners of the property that would make up the proposed district. The Board of Boise County Commissioners has set a public hearing for October 6th, 2020 at 1:15 PM in the Boise County Commissioner Room In Idaho City Idaho. The public hearing will be held to consider the petition and to provide an opportunity for any person who is a resident of or a real property taxpayer within the proposed district or any political subdivision of this state within whose jurisdiction the proposed district will be located, including, without limitation, a highway district, a school district, a fire district or an ambulance district, on the date fixed for the public hearing, to appear and offer testimony pertaining to the formation of the district and the boundaries thereof.

After hearing and considering any and all of the testimony given, the Board of Boise County Commissioners may approve a resolution either denying the petition or granting the same and, if granting the same, shall fix and describe in the resolution the boundaries of the proposed district and order the formation of the same. A resolution granting the petition may also include the approval of any district development agreement that has been approved by the governing body in the process of considering and approving the formation of the district.

The property making up the proposed district is shown in the map and boundary description attached hereto. The proposed district is generally comprised of undeveloped land in Boise County on the east side of highway 55 south of Horseshoe Bend, Idaho and Just north of the border with Ada County. **HORSESHOE BEND** -- The Horseshoe Bend Mustang Junior Varsity and the Varsity Volleyball teams traveled to Garden Valley High School on Tuesday, September 15 to take on their Long Pin Division rivals, the Wolverines. The Junior Varsity team won their match in 2 games, 25-11 and 25-11. The Varsity team had to play a few more to get the match win, losing 15-25 before coming back for a 25-15 win followed by a 25-21 win. They lost the 4th game in the match 17-25 before sewing it all up with the win, 15-11 in the final game. Varsity statistical standouts were freshman Annelie Wilson with 20 kills (an attack on the ball which is not returnable by the opposing team), 4 blocks (blocking the ball into the opponent's court leading to a point or side out), 3 aces (a serve which is unable to be played or returned by opposing team), and 10 digs (passing a spiked or hard hit ball). Junior Kenzie Renfro had 7 kills, 4 aces, 7 digs, and 3 assists (pass, set or dig ball to another player who gets the kill). Freshman Abby Howerton contributed 3 kills, 1 block, 19 digs, and 5 assists. Senior libero, (the libero is a player specialized in defensive skills: the libero must wear a contrasting jersey color from their teammates and cannot block or attack the ball when it is entirely above net height. When the ball is not in play, the libero can replace any back-row player, without prior notice to the officials), Natalie Newell had 3 kills and 18 digs while freshman Torey Tschida had 18 digs and 22 assists. The team traveled to Council to take on their fellow Long Pin Division Ponderosa High School Lumberjacks on Thursday, September 17. The Mustangs took the win in 4 games going 25-22, 25-18, 24-26, 5-21. Wilson had 20 kills, 5 blocks, 1 ace, and 18 digs. Newell had 3 kills and 28 digs. Tschida had 2 kills, 2 aces, 21 digs, and 8 assists and teammate Howerton had 1 kill, 13 digs, and 27 assists. The team was in Parma on Saturday, September 19 for tournament play, defeating
