GARDEN VALLEY -- The Garden Valley Wolverines varsity football team lost Friday's home playoff game against the Carey Panthers by a score of 46-28. The Wolverines fought valiantly but one blow away quarter had the Panthers sprinting ahead.

Carey scored first in the game during the first quarter with a touchdown and a successful two

point conversion. But the Wolverines quickly came back at the Panthers with # 11 Covy Kelly (Sr) taking the ball into the end zone for a touchdown of their own. Unfortunately, the two point conversion was no good, putting the score at Carey 8 to Garden Valley 6. The Panthers dug teeth and claws into the Wolverines in the second quarter. The Wolverines were able to get a touch-

down when #23 Josh Gillespie (Sr) caught a pass thrown by quarterback #21 Corban Fields (Sr). Along with a good two point conversion, this gave Garden Valley a score of 14; however, the Panthers were relentless and put 24 points on the board in the quarter. ARM Hosting First Annual Horseshoe Bend Turkey Shoot

By Tracy Koslosky HORSESHOE BEND --

Wes Barrus and a group of partners began a journey into gun powder technology that led to the creation of a gun powder that has no visible flash. That original venture has now morphed into ARM, American Reserve Munitions.

In the spring of 2017, they opened up shop in Horseshoe Bend, Idaho where they manufacture ammunition that is available on site to the consumer, as well as to wholesale businesses. They carry a full line of popular calibers including a line of defensive ammunition, their Gatekeeper series, an all-copper engineered projectile. Their Gatekeeper 12 gauge fragmented expanding slug weighs in at less than one ounce and has a muzzle velocity of 1,270 feet per second. A YouTube review of that prod-

uct has over 700K views and can be seen with the following search "The BEST 12 ga. Shotgun Slug-You have never heard of. The reviewers had high praise for the ammo, stating they had "never seen such controlled expansion of a fragmented slug" before. ARM is also importing 12 gauge semiautomatics from Strom in Turkey and they are expecting to carry other models in the near future.

Local artisans such as Pete Moore's gem State Knives are available in the retail store's showroom, as are Dan Bittick's hand-tooled custom leather holsters, wallets, and

ARM is a member of the newly formed Horseshoe Bend Valley Chamber of Commerce and Barrus was the featured speaker at last month's meeting. The company is currently

preparing for their first annual Turkey Shoot Social, a marksmanship contest, which will be held on Saturday, November 21st. Subsequent shoots are planned for the first Saturday before Thanksgiving. The shoot will be held at Dobson Gravel, LLC located at 7015 ID-55 in Horseshoe Bend. Registration begins at 9:30 a.m. and the competitive shoot is scheduled to begin at 10:00 a.m. Spectators are welcome and encouraged to attend (bring your own chair). A cowboy action shooter will be on hand performing and those in attendance will have the opportunity to try their hand at quick-draw for an additional

The following classes will be available and open to all ages and abilities (youth will need a current hunting license or need to be accompanied by

a parent or guardian): Black powder, pistol, .223 and smaller rifle, greater than .223 rifle. Registrants will be grouped based on ability. A youth air rifle/BB class will take place if there are enough participants. Registration fee is \$10 at the door and \$5 if you preregister. All extra proceeds will be donated to the Horseshoe Bend Food Pantry (there will also be a canned food drive taking place the day of the shoot).

Winners in each class will


win a turkey (dressed and ready to go for a Thanksgiving meal).







<u>HSB LOSES CHANCE FOR 1A DIVISION II STATE CHAMPIONSHIP</u>

The 383 mile trip to Mullan, Idaho was one of comfort and style as the Horseshoe Bend Varsity Mustang Football team made the journey in a luxury motor coach on Friday, November 6. Family, friends, and the Horseshoe Bend Fire Department, Emergency Medical Services Department, and the Boise County Sheriff's Department helped send the team off in grand style at 8:00 a.m.

The Mustang's long trek to Mullan, Idaho was to compete in the Idaho High School Activities Association's Idaho Football State Championship Quarterfinals. After the Mustang's 34-28 win last Friday at home, the team was looking towards a quarterfinal win against the Mullan, Idaho/St. Regis, Montana Co-op team, the Mullan Tigers and a chance at the Idaho State Football Semi-Finals. The games take place on Friday, November 13 and Saturday, November 14.

The team left Horseshoe Bend under cloudy skies and cool temperatures on Friday morning and ended up in Mul-

lan on Saturday where the game time starting temperature was 36° degrees (with a wind chill factor making it feel like 32° degrees) at 1:00 PST. A sloppy, wet snow blanketed the ground and continued to fall throughout most of the game.

The weather was a big contributing factor in the game with both teams slipping and sliding along the field. During the first quarter, the Mullan Tigers took advantage of a Horseshoe Bend turnover and parlayed it into a touchdown, putting the Tigers up 0-6 at the end of the quarter.

In the second quarter, the Mustangs hit back with a carry by Horseshoe Bend's quarterback, junior Colten Meyer, but Mullan countered with a touchdown of their own and the addition of a two-point conversion put Mullan back on top 6-14. Meyer came back with another carry but a flagged call for a block in the back penalty brought the ball back and three additional penalties of sideline encroachment by the Mustangs put Horseshoe Bend back at first down, but this time on the 35 yard line

where everything snowballed into a delay of game against the team, and on 4th down Mullan intercepted the ball before the signal for half-time. The teams traded touchdowns in the third quarter with the Tigers scoring first, followed by a touchdown by sophomore Blayne Meyer which took the score to 12-20 in Mullan's favor. In the fourth quarter, Mullan had the ball just outside their 15 yard line, when a series of penalties against Horseshoe Bend brought the Tigers to just outside their 5 yard line setting Mullan up for the final touchdown of the game. The Tigers connected for the two point conversion and the final score was Mullan 28, the Horseshoe Bend Mustangs 12.

The Mustangs came off a great season finishing second in the 1A Long Pin Division II Conference behind the Garden Valley Wolverines, who also lost their bid at an IDHSAA semi-final berth with a loss on Friday night. Horseshoe Bend's first round win against Castleford on October 30th was the team's first state playoff win in 16 years.









Louise Sweeney - 2020

Louise Sweeney, 89, passed away peacefully at home on October 31, 2020 surrounded by her family. She was born at home to Porter and Marie Sexton in Klamath Falls, Oregon, the youngest and only girl of four children. At 17, she met and married Herbert Sweeney and together they had four children. They remained married for 22 years, spending the majority of this time in Winnemucca, Nevada.

She later married Harrold Sweeney, staying married until his death for 31 years. They lived in several places, including Star, Boise, Wilderness Ranch, and Crouch, Idaho. After Harrold's passing, she moved to Payette to be near her daughters.

Louise was first and foremost a mom to her 4 children and later to stepson Allyn.

She had a love and uncom-

mon tolerance for any and all kinds of animals her kids might bring home including but not limited to dogs, cats, rabbits, horses, goats, rats, lizards, a monkey, tortoises, and a variety of snakes. She often used these "guests" as an opportunity to teach us responsibility, compassion, care, and how to be respectful of all living things.

Mom loved and valued learning and taught us to be curious and in awe of the world around us. She would often break out the occasional library book or the World Book Encyclopedias, saying, "Let's look it up!" in an effort to supplement these lessons. She loved to sew and created everything from our school clothes (mending included) to stunning quilts. She was game for any adventure that might present itself.

Mom and Harrold bought a houseboat after retiring and explored the shores of Lake Meade. After they tired of life on the high seas, they sold the "Desert Gypsy" and traded it for a small travel trailer. They were able to visit national and state parks, as well as many interesting spots along the way. On one of these trips, they befriended a couple from Switzerland who invited them there for a visit, one of life's highlights for her.

Following Harrold's death, she adopted a sweet little dog named Molly, and together they trained and were certified as pet therapists, visiting patients at St. Luke's Boise and

Holy Rosary Medical Center in Ontario. She continued to serve as a volunteer at Holy Rosary for many years, a job she loved, as she always had a heart for others. She was a genuine Christian, not only reading her Bible but LIVING the principles it held within its pages. She was the same person in private as she was in public, always friendly, forgiving and kind to all she met, choosing to see the good in people or circumstances. She was always gentle in spirit and unwavering in her faith. She chose to love rather than judging others.

Mom could be mildly corrupted to participate in all forms of silliness, exercising her delightful sense of humor. She always led with a smile.

She is survived by her daughters Eilene and Karen, sons Herb Jr. (Joy), Alan and Allyn (Mary) as well as numerous grand and great grandchildren.

One of Mom's greatest joys was reading, but in her later years her vision declined until she could no longer see to read. She was able to continue by listening to audio books and spent many hours in her recliner holding a dog and listening to her beloved stories.

This 2020 General Election day ended with 6,022 registered voters in our County with 347 of those voters registering at the polling locations on the day of the election.
