The City of Crouch is Growing and Adding Resort Property

CROUCH -- The City of Crouch Council Meeting on February 10, 2021, included a Public Hearing at the beginning. Some specific topics are continually being explored, including how COVID-19 19 is still affecting the area. Only a handful of people were in attendance.

The public hearing topic was on annexing in property that is south of Banks Lowman Highway and at the intersection with the Middlefork Rd. The property is known as the Edge Resort and is owned by Tim Fritzley. This property consists of 28 acres with 2,500 feet of river frontage. There are different phases of construction, planned for the future, including 59 oversized RV lots for sale with full utilities, two upscale bathhouses, other outdoor structures, and casitas for outdoor BBQing. There is a plan for 106 Condos from sizes of 900 to over 2,000 sq ft and different location preferences. The plan for the condos is to have 16 on the riverfront, 60 on the pond and 30 with elevated overviews.

Other amenities include a recreation area and facilities, a pool, hot tubs, and activity courts. There are plans for a 5,000 sq. ft. Pub/Restaurant facility, a 5,000 sq. ft. Event Center, a gas station, and C-Store.

All this will include a wastewater treatment plant and potable water. Permitting processes have taken several years. Construction should begin soon. The City Council listened to the presentation at the Public Hearing and felt this would complement the area and potentially create more revenue for the city itself. There will be an increase in employment opportunities as well.

Friztley has been working with the Army Corp of Engineers and Department of Environmental Quality to allow for construction along the river. The Resort will start the first phase this summer and create the RV lot site prep, infrastructure, and recreation facilities. This will be Phase 1 Spring 2021. By late Summer/ Fall of 2021 there are plans to start the Gas Station/C-Store. Phase 2 Spring 2022 will be Condo construction. Phase 2A Summer/Fall 2022 is planned construction of the Pub/Restaurant. Phase 2B Spring 2023 will be the Event Center construction. Fritzley has an aggressive building plan but knows "weather permitting" can be the impacting phrase to everything being completed.

The Public Hearing was to inform the public of the zoning of the property to be Community Commercial. This will allow for the resort construction

phases to move forward as they stand. A Conditional Use Permit may come to play if there is construction of something that does not fit into zoning description. This would require additional Public Hearings. There are pictures and more information from the presentation in City Hall. Fritzley welcomes questions and invites people to come to the site. He will be able to answer questions, in more detail, regarding the plans or phases moving forward. He is often at the property site.

At the regular council meeting, the Mayor Robert Powell gave COVID-19 updates for the area and Boise County. He is often on the Governor's call and Central District Health information calls to follow the latest updates. Mayor Powell explained that Central District Health (CDH) is working through some questions about Boise County dose allocation and vaccination capacity for the county. Clinics are being set up throughout the county as vaccines is available. Some people have received their first dose already. Mayor Powell said he learned through these meetings that "case counts are dropping per week from 3 to 2. Boise County schools moved into the green category (at a rate of 4.56/100k) as of recent-



Governor Little allows for event capacity to reach 50 people. As part of the Governor's move to Stage 3, he announced the use of an "attestation form" for events/gatherings larger than 50. Large events to be held in Boise, Elmore, and Valley Counties should submit this form to CDH at least two weeks prior to their event. Ada county is currently excluded, at this time, since the CDH public health order remains in place, limiting gathering sizes to no more than 10. This form is on their website.

Due to less restrictive orders around gatherings, the open office hours at City Hall are Tuesday through Thursday from 10am to 2pm. Face mask is still required as per Governor Little's mandate. Please call 208-462-4687 for appointments needed during closed hours. City Hall will **not** have information on county matters or Weilmunster Park rental information. The Community Hall is now available for rental for a capacity of 50 people or less.

Garden Valley Senior & Social Center News

First, let me remind everyone that this is the 3rd week in February and on THURSDAY, February 18th, from 10 a.m. - 12 noon we are distributing Food Boxes again. In January, we were able to serve 88 households, providing food security for 74 seniors, 68 children, and 58 adults! We love serving our community this way. If you or someone you know needs a food box, hurry and let us know so that we can have your box(es) packed and ready to go. If you can come pick them up, it would be very helpful. We have a very tiny volunteer group that unloads the food and delivers the food boxes and could really use some help in that area. Secondly, have you ever wondered how the Garden Valley Senior Center got its start and evolved to who we are today? We have the current Board of Directors and I think most people living in the Garden Valley area today might be interested in knowing its history. Recently, while cleaning out the GVSC attic, we ran across some old documentation that is helping us piece together that puzzle and we wanted to share it with you in a series of GVSC history articles in the coming weeks.

I am starting these history tidbits with the following treasured article that documents the beginning of the GVSC story; and fits in with the pictures of our 2020 Talent Show as it was conducted in the Crouch Community Hall which was originally renovated by the Senior Citizens organization who started these Talent Shows. If you have lived here since the 1980's - 1990's, you may recognize the names of those GVSC pioneers.

GARDEN VALLEY SENIOR CITIZENS HALL BY MARIE BARBER

In January of 1987, a meeting was held at the home of Earleen Denton. Twenty people met to talk over things to do socially for the young and old of our community. Olive Huston volunteered for the older citizens and subsequently started the Senior Citizens organization. It was snowing

and raining when she went around putting up signs all ever the valley and she wasn't sure anyone would show up. Fifteen arrived the first Saturday. They met once a month in the Home Economics room. In the beginning, Olive Huston prepared the meals at home and brought them down in her car to the school For one year they met here while they searched for a location to permanently house the seniors Huston found out they were going to burn down or destroy the community hall in Crouch, because it was deteriorating. She went to the town meeting in Crouch and asked if the seniors could lease the building. She kept going back until they said "YES". Olive Huston then became coordinator, cook, and chairman of the board. Because there was no kitchen in the building, Rolla Briggs, at one time, prepared meals at his restaurant and brought them to the hall. By now the meetings were held once a week.

During all of this time volunteers jacked up the building on one corner and reinforced the flooring, put on siding, worked on bathrooms, and built a kitchen (which had been partially started). All of this work and all of the materials were donated by senior citizens. They have since added on a side porch, re-done the front porch, put on a new roof, and paneled the interior.

At one time they rented the hall to the children for skating (\$5.00 per hour rental) once a week

Community plays were produced. Talent shows, dances, community feeds were a few of the fundraising activities that helped raise money to continue the improvement of this historic building

Olive and Ray Huston found an oil burning heater that was donated by Boise Cascade and brought it up. Volunteers helped install it. It served as the heating system for several years. It was fueled by used motor oil that was donated. After a few years a new propane heating system replaced the oil unit partly financed by the Idaho Power Company employees of Emmett.

All of the original stoves, freezers, refrigerators, and kitchen tools were donated by local citizens. After attending Boise Cascade meetings for several years, Olive Huston was able to, each year, get a donation of some kind to improve the facilities. \$500.00 for new refrigerator and freezer. The stoves, sinks, coffee pots, microwave, extra pots, and pans were all donated by local citizens.

Prior to the origination of the Senior Citizens group, Larry Barnes' mother said "If you can get an organization started I will help you." So the origination money was a \$200.00 donation from this gracious lady.

The first stage curtains were made by Olive Huston and Wilma Hutchison. The present curtains were purchased from proceeds of a quilt raffle (the quilt being made by senior ladies.) Currently the Annual Quilt Show raises money for improvements. Some interesting money raisers were the sale of bonnets made by the women during the bi-centennial, a tour of interesting Valley homes, community breakfasts, and yard sales.


The hall is open to fundraisers for community people, memorials, anniversary parties, wedding receptions, disaster center meetings, and dances.

BOISE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

2/9/2021

Present: Commissioners Ryan Stirm, Steve Twilegar, Ted Holmes

Pledge of Allegiance EXECUTIVE SESSION:

Per hiring an employee and personnel. [Closed session. Time 9:02 am to 9:40 am] No motion or action required.

CONSTITUENT INPUT: Bob Showalter explained that his wife, Annette, had suggested and researched a "Second Amendment Sanctuary County." He took a resolution from another county and modified it to fit Boise County, and then sent that draft to the former commissioners, Commissioner Stirm, and the prosecutor. "I believe this is an important topic for discussion, Democrats are already making a move to regulate and impose fees, and





restrict some Americans who have not broken any laws." He added that this would be a symbolic move and would send a message "to those moving to our county, that we support our Constitution and our right to bear arms. I'm glad to see that this topic is on the agenda today and I encourage you to support it."

MINUTES: The official meeting minutes from February 2nd were approved.

senate BILL 1048: Capping the annual property tax budget by three or four percent. Clerk Mary Prisco said it was going to have quite an impact on the counties and other taxing districts in our state. She recommended that they reach out to Senator Thayne and others to "let them know this could have a hugely detrimental impact on our county, *all of our counties*, potentially."

Commissioner Stirm recapped: "Anyone who's not aware, Senator Rice is trying to sponsor a House Bill 1048 which would limit the amount of money that could be property tax levied every year, as an increase, and it would also change the way the formula works for property tax for new construction." He recounted that Boise County is growing







about 10% a year, "We could potentially lose out on seven or eight percent of that money, or more on that new construction." There is a concern for services with a lack of funding, like additional law enforcement.

Prosecutor Strong stated: "I think we have the lowest, or second lowest, levy rate in the State of Idaho, out of all the counties."

Assessor Chris Juszczak

warned regarding the taxes for new construction, "That's a lot of money that we're being limited on to provide services."

BOISE COUNTY DMV: Chairman Stirm let the board know, "In Idaho City, in all of January, 69 driver's licenses were printed for residents and 50 driver's licenses were printed for nonresidents." He said it was similar for Horseshoe Bend with 83 for residents and 63 for nonresidents. Stirm said,

"To clarify why that's an issue, our tax dollars here in Boise County, property tax dollars, are paying those people's salaries and we're not being reimbursed by the state like the plan was originally to fully fund those offices."

UNCLAIMED PROP-ERTY: Treasurer Gina Turner presented information regarding unclaimed property and claiming it on behalf of the ~ continued on page 7


Ground has not broken for Boise County yet, but they are planning roads and culverts at this time.


