ATV/UTV Accidents are Common in Boise County

BOISE COUNTY – Boise County Sheriff Deputies responded to four separate roll-over crashes involving UTV/ATV's this past weekend. One of those crashes resulted in a fatality, which largely impacted part of the off-road community in the Treasure Valley. Sheriff Scott Turner says he understands wanting to come up to Boise County to recreate, *and he enjoys it too*, but common sense and safety considerations need to be taken into account. Oftentimes, UTV/ATV drivers don't think that the traffic laws apply to them, they exceed the speed limit and drift into the opposing lane. There are full-sized vehicles also traveling on these roads and he says it's getting to be a huge problem. The next step in preventing accidents would be to limit recreation, which would unfairly punish those who recreate responsibly.

Ambulance services and deputies have been running calls at such a high volume, reaching numbers they don't normally see until the middle of summer. Sheriff Turner says, "We're hoppin'."

In addition, the Forest Service and local county fire departments have already been burdened by several fires this year, and the drought-like conditions could warrant concern for a busy fire season.

The Boise County Sheriff's

Office reminds off-roaders of a few helpful safety tips:

1) Please wear a helmet. Of six riders injured this weekend, zero were wearing a helmet.

2) Roll cages on UTV's are meant to provide safety for very low speed rollovers. The roll cages on UTV's usually provide very hard surfaces for your unprotected head to bounce on. Please adhere to rule # 1.

3) Speed is going to be the # 1 factor in most motor vehicle injuries and deaths. We see many off-road vehicles in Boise County traveling way too fast for mountain roads and trails.

4) UTV/ATV/Motorcycle vs. passenger car is a very bad deal. Vs. tree, cliff, rock, large animals, and any stationary object is also a very bad deal.

5) Have some respect for the locals! You are usually riding near or around people's houses and properties. P.S. The locals will be the people saving your life if you crash, so please drive respectfully.

6) If recreating in Boise County, we highly advise you get a Life Flight membership. Cost of a helicopter flight from here to Boise is approximately 20k dollars. Life Flight membership is less than \$100 dollars.

7) Alcohol kills! The simple safety decisions you make or don't make when drinking al-

cohol and driving can mean the difference between life and death.

8) Tell someone where you are, where you are going, and when you will be back. We often hear the following information from family explaining the location of their missing loved ones. "I would like to report my family missing, They are on a dirt road, near some trees, and I think there is a creek nearby."

9) Seatbelts, don't be silly! Wear your seatbelt!

BOISE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Transcribed by Eileen Capson

May 4, 2021

Present: Commissioners Ryan Stirm, Steve Twilegar, and Ted Holmes

Pledge of Allegiance

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Closed session per pending litigation, personnel, and risk management. [Time 9:01am – 10:12am] Commissioner Stirm stated that no action was required.

CONSTITUENT INPUT: Trudy Jackson spoke about buying liquor within the county, "I just wanted to bring it to Any of these places that sell liquor, they should buy the liquor in-county. The price is the same, they can order whatever you need from a liquor dispensary, and it's an option." She also intended to bring the issue before the City of Idaho City. "If there's \$200,000 in liquor sales in the county for bars, that's \$20,000 to our cities and we only got \$17,000 to the county and city last year from liquor sales."

Jackson also spoke to Commissioner Holmes and said she reads the *Idaho World*. "I'm concerned we're going to end up in another lawsuit, because you're being harsh on some people. And we just paid for our last one from commissioner errors, and I would maybe have you take a step back and take a deep breath before you comment or look at the lives you can change by – anyway, I don't know, but I don't want to pay for another lawsuit."

Commissioner Holmes stated that there were some problems and he was elected to take care of them, "some of them are personnel. In the case of Bill Jones, he resigned." Jackson then spoke about being

scheduled for a COVID shot and then not being able to get it or the second one in our county. He continued, "I said I'd be transparent. You know, I'm being trashed as an elected official. I'll put this, since we're on the record, as a Navy Seal for twenty-one years, combat, decorated and retired law enforcement, so everybody knows, I was a fighter in my day in the Seal Team. I have been arrested a few times in bar fights. I've been falsely arrested. I have never been charged or convicted of a crime in my entire life, not even a misdemeanor. *I want that on record!*" He offered to sit down with her one-on-one, if there are problems. Jackson continued, "I'm just saying, *please, our county can't afford it.* That \$5 million dollars that we had to spend [for the lawsuit] could have been spent better on so many other things." Holmes replied, "I can assure you, we have a good attorney, and right now it's being handled and there's no money going out anywhere, *no matter what the rumors you've heard or the lawsuit!*" Jackson said it's been what she's read in the *Idaho World*. Holmes said he didn't read it nor was he on social media. "I just want you to be careful," Jackson said.

An individual spoke regarding the Clear Creek Lodge.

PLANNING & ZONING: The planning and zoning fees were discussed, and the lack of staff. He said that fees were coming from the cost of inspections, and said that some consider them high. "And we did a little review, and our fees, if not the lowest, are one of the lowest in the state," said the new administrator, Alex Gross.

"We're using old numbers from years and years ago, evaluations." He said the comprehensive plan says that the office should be self-sustaining, "and my goal is to get it there, so that we're not using any tax dollars to pay for the operations in my office." Chairman Stirm said it's a step in the right direction.

PEST CONTROL: There were three quotes presented to the Board. The Horseshoe Bend Annex was added to the list of county buildings to be treated. Chairman Stirm made a motion to approve the pest control for wasps not to exceed \$1,000.

ROAD DEPARTMENT: A representative spoke regarding the mechanic for the department and how he would need a procurement card to purchase parts, to get a better deal online. Commissioner Holmes agreed that they should issue the mechanic a card with a limit of \$2,000.

TREASURER / AUDITOR JOINT QUARTERLY REPORT: Chairman Stirm motioned to approve the quarterly report dated April 20, 2021.

CENTRAL DISTRICT HEALTH BUDGET: Russ Duke presented a proposed budget to the Boise County Commissioners. House Bill 316 will transition or shift the state appropriation that used to come to the public health districts, to the counties. Duke said he didn't know what the exact dollar amount would be. The budget will be voted on and approved in the latter

part of May. "Instead of saying 3%, it says 35.4%, and that makes up that difference for the March 1st thru the end of June, a shift of funding from the state to the counties." Ada County would see an \$800,000 increase and Boise County would see a \$15,452 increase. The WIC services have sharply declined for young families and they would like to increase those numbers. The Hunger Project in east Boise County has helped families and Commissioner Twilegar offered to put a brochure in each box.

GRANTS: Each grant will

be reviewed by the prosecutor prior to it being submitted. Prosecutor Strong discussed the administrative process with the grant writer. The board would like to go with one proposal. She said that she'll be working very closely with the commissioners in regards to federal grants, because there is a lot of red tape and she will get their approval first.

AVIMOR: Chairman Stirm motioned to approve the findings of fact for the conditions of approval for the land use ordinance for the planned community of Avimor subdivision.

EAST BOISE COUNTY – Before dawn on Friday morning, a young man in a restored 1979 Ford truck was headed northbound when the vehicle hit some rocks on the uphill side. The truck crossed back over the road and went into Mores Creek between Wilderness Ranch and Daggett Creek. The driver was assisted to shore by other motorists and was home by the time the accident call came in.

Wilderness Ranch Fire had help from Robie Creek Fire to shut down one lane of traffic, while they set up a rescue boat and rope system to safely get the tow truck driver to the wrecked vehicle. The emergency responders did shut down both lanes for a short time while the tow truck pulled the vehicle out of the creek.

She worked for Gran De Oil for many years and after retiring moved up to the mountain town of Lowman, Idaho. She lived there for over 30 years. She had good friends and neighbors she could call on when needed and enjoyed being a part of that small community. She enjoyed entertaining family and friends when they could come up for a visit. Drives in the mountains with Grama or trips over to the fishing ponds were always enjoyed. We could always look forward to a roast dinner and when we were old enough the drink of choice at Grama's was Vodka and Squirt.

Gramma enjoyed watching her children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren play various sports or play an instrument in a band or act in a theater production. She travelled to visit family often and was an avid quilter with her sisters.

She led by example. There was never a job too large or too small that she would not tackle-and boy did she tackle some jobs in the mountains! She and her property made it through various forest fires and drought conditions, and she was a particularly good gardener and rock collector. (a common trait in our family today)

Gramma was a strong, determined, and fiercely independent woman. We will miss her every day.

Horseshoe Bend City Council

HORSESHOE BEND -- The following is a synopsis of the Horseshoe Bend City Council meeting on April 21, 2021. Mayor Pat Goff made the call to order at 7:00 p.m., led the Pledge of Allegiance, and after unanimous approval of the amended agenda (added Horseshoe Bend Valley Chamber of Commerce), previous minutes, and the authorization to pay the city's bills, Goff opened the dais for public comments. No one came forward.

HSB Valley Chamber lead, Kimberly Welsh, presented an artist's rendering of the proposed Horseshoe Bend Veteran's Memorial. The preliminary art work was done by local resident Shaleesa Stevens. Welsh wanted the council's approval on the design before going any further. She told the council that several local residents/businesses were donating their time to help bring the memorial to fruition. The rendering depicted a 20 x 20 area in the new city park that will be established by the southern bridge on ID-55 that crosses the Payette River. The memorial will be surrounded by flagstone with a grass area that includes benches. Goff suggested that the memorial be visible from the bridge and told Welsh, "The city is wholly behind doing this. It will be a definite asset for those that came before and those that will serve."

New business: Levi Burk was back before the council regarding changing the amount of adjacent residents needed to approve his business keeping 12 dogs in a residential area. Currently 100% of residents within 300 feet of Burke's property need to approve the change, Burk was requesting that it be changed to 75%, which is the current standard in Boise County. City attorney Tony Pantera suggested it may be a moot point as he hadn't checked the zoning restrictions where Burke's property is located. Councilmember Martye White said, "I'm a dog lover. The problem I have is that every time someone wants something we change an ordinance. I'm fine with the ordinance as it stands." Burk replied, "So you want to stop people from making a living? These dogs don't cause a problem. They don't bark. We try to keep them as quiet as possible." Pantera looked up the zoning and told the council that a dog kennel was prohibited in an R1 zone. The council provided

Burk with a letter opposing him continuing to house the dogs on his property. Burk said the letter had incorrect information as his dogs "do not howl." Burk went on to read from an Idaho state statute that says dogs are property and he said he had over \$50,000 invested in them. Pantera told the council that allowing "spot zoning" in an R1 area would be against his advice. He told Burk that theoretically it was a misdemeanor every day he kept the dogs on his property. Goff told Burk he should have come before the council before he bought the property. Pantera told Burk he could apply for a waiver with the city clerk and then appeal it when it was denied. Goff added, "Well I'm at a loss. We can put it back on next month so we can see if there is anything in our purview to do. Bottom line is the appropriate course is to make an application with the city clerk and see if she finds any comparable allowances." Burk replied, "Okay."

Property owner Justin Logan asked for water bill forgiveness after a burst pipe increased his water usage from 6,000 gallons to 65,000 gallons. The council agreed unanimously to split the bill with him.

Water and sewer action item: Pantera produced three different proposals for the council regarding increases to the water and sewer rates. Pantera told the council that all of the proposals were "consistent with the water rate study you had done." He added that a public hearing would be needed for whatever proposal they decided on. Pantera suggested that the council pick a proposal to present to the public for a future vote. The increase in rates will allow the city to be eligible to apply for certain grants. The council decided to publish a public hearing date and make all three plans available.

Pantera then gave each councilmember a spread sheet showing infractions and misdemeanors within the city code. The information was provided so that the council could see if they want to change anything. Pantera offered that the council should change the trees & plants ordinance to an infraction (fine) from a misdemeanor (fine/jail) and changing the failure to have a business license from a misdemeanor to an infraction. Pantera told the council he needs their input so he can complete the updating of the city ordinances. Councilmember Ben Riley asked Pantera about the "likelihood of

getting the Sheriff to come down and do something" with regards to enforcing ordinances. Pantera replied, "That's a good question. You may want to invite the Sheriff down to take a look at these."

EMS Report: None.

Public Works Report: None.

City Grants Report: City grant writer Cheryl Pleak took the podium and Mayor Goff told her, "You only have three minutes, Cheryl." Pleak told the council that she had submitted the revised comprehensive plan with suggestions and recommendations. It included concerns about the rising cost of housing because of increases in the price of lumber. Pleak said the City Advisory Council has suggested that local businesses and tradespeople provide internships

to high school students. She will work with Superintendent Dennis Chesnut on this. She told the council that the area of city impact plan was past due, the last one was in 2011. She provided clarification that the Federal Fair Housing law regarding support service animals included dogs, cats, and maybe birds but not cows, horses, or pigs. Pleak then asked Goff, "Am I over my three?" to which Goff replied, "Five minutes, twenty-four seconds." Pleak continued to tell the council that they needed to confer with the Boise County Commissioners to discuss the city impact plan regarding trade and the annexing of county land. She provided the council with a map indicating possible areas of annexation and a timeline for the impact

plan. She discussed waivers for volunteers at upcoming clean-up day and paint the town days. Pleak is working on grants for the EMS Department. In closing she asked, "How much time was that?" Goff said, "Ten minutes."

City Engineering: Amy Woodruff told the council they're working on the new well and well house and that it was "business as usual." Goff asked for Woodruff's input at public hearing for water rate increases.

City Attorney: Pantera had nothing further to report. The council went into executive session at 8:06 p.m.

The city council meets at 7:00 p.m. on the third Wednesday of each month at city hall.
