Memorial Day Remembrance in Garden Valley

GARDEN VALLEY -- On Memorial Day, Garden Valley residents and friends gathered at the Garden Valley Veterans Memorial in Weilmunster Park to honor those who died in military service to the United States of America.

Of the 306 veteran's bricks in the Garden Valley Veterans Memorial, five hold a special meaning on Memorial Day because they represent men who died while in uniform. Several Gold Star family members were present to introduce their loved ones to the community.

Those honored included:

- Army Specialist Robert E. Dyas, killed in action in Afghanistan on September 21, 2011.
- Army PFC Dwayne W. Munster, wounded in action on Okinawa on May 24, 1945, and died July 2, 1945.
- Army PFC Donald L. Munster, killed in action in North Korea on September 6, 1951.
- Navy Hospital Corpsman Joseph F. Kelley, killed in action in Vietnam on January 28, 1967.
- Army PFC Thomas J. Ontiveros, killed in action in Viet-

nam on September 28, 1966.

Retired USAF veteran Cathy Garner rewrote the existing verses of "We Remember Them", listed as author unknown, and added several additional verses to make the poem appropriate for Memorial Day.

On Memorial Day -- We Remember Them

Here we stand, our American flag raised only to its half-staff this day, As we remember those who bravely served and made the ultimate sacrifice.

We envision their battles and speak the names - never forgotten, **we remember them.**

Our lives go on - days and nights pass. Yet, with every sunrise and sunset, and as every moon waxes and wanes, **we remember them.**

Following the Memorial Day observance, the 54 recently installed veteran's bricks were dedicated. Each of the 54 veterans was introduced to the community either by the veteran themselves, or a relative or friend.

In closing the ceremony, those present were reminded that Garden Valley is an amazing community filled with pa-

triotis who served in the military and with civilian patriots who love America. They were also asked to view the Memorial not simply as a bunch of bricks with names on them, but rather to understand that every brick represents a man or woman who honorably served the United States in the military, and that each of those men and women deserve to be remem-

bered and recognized.

Jennifer Rideout provided two beautiful wreaths for the ceremony which were placed on each side of the Memorial. Jennifer was present to dedicate a veteran brick for her father, Curtis Rideout, and wanted to make the day special for everyone "because her dad would have liked that."

Summer Reading activities

Preventing the "summer slide" continues to be the main objective of summer reading programs. For many families with elementary-aged children, the public library is the only community space available during the summer months where they can access free educational and cultural enrichment activities and programs.

Children who participate in summer reading programs will:

- Be motivated to read.
- Develop positive attitudes about reading, books, and the library.
- Maintain their reading skills during summer vacation.
- Have access to experiences that further their sense of discovery.
- Have access to experiences through which they can learn to work cooperatively.

2021 Program:

Daily activities (all ages): Drop by the Library and find out what this week's activity is. In the Community Room we will provide tools for fun things to do together. These are collaborative activities, such as Stick Together or building Harry Potter's Hedwig in LEGO.

Storytime Special: During the summer there will be Storytime Special in place of weekly Storytime. The first one will be on Thursday, June 3rd at 10:30 am. Every child can make their own stuffed animal (and even

Movies: During the summer we will be showing two movies. June 17th will be a kids movie about animals. July 15th will be an interactive movie experience. You will get to get up during the movie and perform fun actions! The interactive movie is a great activity for the whole family.


Reading log: The Library is providing a reading log for all ages. Keep track of your reading and win prizes. You can do it online, but there is also a paper version in the Library which you can use. The more pages you read, the better. We can provide a letter for school in which we share how many pages your child has read during the summer.

Escape Books: During the summer we will hide some Escape Books. Escape Books are small bags with a book. But there's a twist! The books are

locked up. You need to figure out the right code to open the lock. Answer three questions and find the 3-digit code to unlock the book. When you succeed, the book is yours!

Corbin Maxey: Tuesday, August 10th Corbin Maxey will visit our library. Corbin Maxey is a nationally-recognized animal expert, biologist, and television personality. He is well-known from his numerous appearances on The Today Show, Late Night with Seth Meyers, Watch What Happens LIVE, Inside Edition, The Tonight Show with Jay Leno and The Martha Stewart Show. Present: Commissioners Steven Twilegar and Robert "Ted" Holmes

Absent: Commissioner Ryan Stirm

Pledge of Allegiance

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Closed session per personnel issues. [Time 9:01 am to 9:34 am] No action was required.

CONSTITUENT INPUT: None

MINUTES: The minutes from May 18, 2021 were accepted by a motion.

PLANNING & ZONING: A cell phone plan was discussed with the administrator. A motion was made to put "Mr. Moore on the Planning and Zoning Commission Board." Commissioner Twilegar thanked him for his service and will swear him in at the next meeting.

SOLID WASTE: Commissioner Twilegar motioned to combine the two part time positions in Solid Waste into one full time position.

ROBIE CREEK ROAD: The road is estimated to have dust abatement on June 3rd. The road department representative stated that all the homeowners have gotten together and paid for it.

JUVENILE JUSTICE:

Amanda Leader said that they had received two bids for painting. There is no lead in the former paint used. Commissioner Holmes said he wouldn't mind spending a little bit more for good quality work. Replacing the Planning and Zoning fence was also discussed and the cost of wood is going up "daily." The roof and siding of the P&Z office was also discussed with possible bids. The bids were tabled for review.

BANKS LOWMAN ROAD: The match portion was discussed for the repair of the road, which was higher than initially estimated, an additional \$55,000. A motion passed to approve that amount for the work done.

AIR BRAKES: The City of Horseshoe Bend requested a letter of support from the commissioners to prohibit air brakes. Commissioner Twilegar stated, "We got told that we can't do that. We don't have the authority to do that because the Environmental Protection Agency controls noise pollution. So, we're going to try a different way and ask them to put up a sign that indicates that noise ordinances are in forced." He then motioned to approve the letter in support of Horseshoe Bend.

BILLS: Twilegar made a motion to approve the Claims Approval Report in the amount of \$78,614.24.

LETTERS OF SUPPORT: Acting Chairman Twilegar made a motion to approve the letter of support for the Southwest Idaho Resource Conservation Development. There was another letter approved for the support of a second wildlife passage on Highway 21.

DEMAND WARRANTS: The airline tickets were approved after hearing testimony from the Chief Deputy Coroner regarding his annual training with the FBI academy in the amount of \$708, which was budgeted for. A monthly lease was paid for the Prosecutor's building in the amount of \$550.

COMMUNITY JUSTICE:

They've had an increase in cases.

ASSESSOR: Chris Juszczak said they are about to send out "love letters... assessment notices." There are a few changes this year. Homeowner's exemption went up. Property tax help for the elderly, which the state funds. "With new construction, we put \$51 million of new construction on the tax roll this year. That's up from about \$31 million, and change, last year. Everybody is feeling the growth of the county. That's important when it comes to budget season."

EAST BOISE COUNTY AMBULANCE: Director Melissa Potts said they have new EMTs that have passed their tests and state licenses. They are now in the field training

portion. "There's four new ones in Idaho City that passed, one in Lowman, and one in Mores Creek. We still have a few more that have to test." They've also been doing trainings on IVs, IOs, medical care for airways, "so that we can start providing that service." Potts said the call volume was going up and travel season has arrived. They are also getting ready for mass gathering events. Commissioner Twilegar commented, "Awesome, the circle of trauma season. That's awesome."

TREASURER: Gina Turner stated that the tax bills had gone out. Payments are trickling in and expected to come in more the following week.

SHERIFF: Scott Turner said they were very busy and their

numbers are high. They have some events coming up. The Road Rally was cancelled, due to the lack of sponsorship and roles.

ROAD DEPARTMENT: Curtis Dill said there was still cleanup on Highway 17. They are working on the budget. Robie Creek Road paving project came in low and so he's assessing some other roads that would be nice to work on. They are working on training of the grader equipment, for road maintenance. Dust abatement is also being considered.

PROSECUTOR: Adam Strong said they have been busy with the civil side, a trial for pornography where the defendants were convicted of ten charges each. There have been some other trials scheduled, the Supreme Court has metrics for when they can hold them, "because of COVID, those got pushed back again. But last week's Supreme Court change, their ease on their guidelines for COVID, so I'm hoping we'll actually stop having all these cases being pushed out." The felony district court judge is also "slammed with trials" in Ada County. Prosecutor Strong stated, "It's summertime, so we're going to start getting more and more cases. There's more people up here." Twilegar commented, "Good times..."

CLERK: Mary Prisco stated that she just found out that they are losing the Court Supervisor and will be advertising for that. They are spending much

of their time on the budget. She said the tentative budget will be due by the end of August, and have been published in the newspaper. She cautioned the commissioners that they can only go down from that tentative budget, "we can't go up." The public hearing is scheduled August 31st.

PLANNING & ZONING: The administrator said they have four employees that are "working their butts off." There were more building permit applications this year than last. "We have had some people come in and ask for an extensions on their permits because of the prices of lumber, they've stopped building."

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Closed session per personnel issue(s). [Time 11:42 am to 12:09 pm] No action needed.

KIRKHAM HOT SPRINGS: Those that were in attendance included Boise County Sheriff Scott Turner, local residents, and the U.S. Forest Service said they were on their way, but did not attend. Commissioner Twilegar thought it fitting that the residents speak first and said, "What's your opinion and what do you see happening up there?" They were all Lowman constituents, and first to speak was Jeff Wright. His family has owned property up in Lowman in the 1960s, "and I've watched the progression of the Forest Service response to various policies in Boise County." He said he used to respect the Forest Service's efforts to maintain

campgrounds, and with timber sales, but since the 90s things have steadily gone downhill. He said in regards to any productive economic activities, "We're pretty much done up here, under the current administration. We were just notified this morning there's going to be - we can't cut any trees this year for the logging business... There's a whole series of things happening here. They just slapped a whole bunch of tariffs on lumber coming out of Canada." He continued, "It seems that the Forest Service can no longer do the basic job of forest management for the last 20 years, but they can't even maintain and police one campground." They've shut down Mountain View for the past 3 years. He said Kirkham is progressively getting worse, and he and his son have picked up lots of trash, needles, diapers, etc. There is no management and even though the campground closes at 9pm, there are campers overnight.

Commissioner Holmes stated that he had invited a Forest Service representative to the commissioners' meeting and with each proposed date, they were unable to attend or did not respond, to meet with the lumber community.

A woman spoke from Lowman, "We have the entire community very, very concerned

about this. And the point I want to make is, this is not just about the lack of management. It is about what is happening to those hot springs." She said people are absolutely destroying it. "It is getting downright scary!" There are upward of 70 cars parked there at a time. "They have no respect for the property." She and others have been working out a donation of jersey barriers with the Ada County Highway District that would block an area from traffic. "We've got to do something!"

Sheriff Turner said it starts at the Forest Service level, and has had good success with some rangers. They do contract with the Forest Service to do summertime patrols, and that started Memorial Day weekend, but those are limited because the dollar amount keeps dropping. "We have three daytime designated patrols and six nighttime designated patrols in the Lowman area." Turner continued that the six nighttime patrols can't start until after the 4th of July, "and it's specifically for the campground areas within Lowman and Grand Jean. We're limited on what we can enforce. We can't enforce the Forest Service regulations. We can't enforce the Forest Service rules. We can't enforce any of the federal stuff, so it becomes an issue. My guys can

roll in there, they can enforce certain things, a lot of it, we can't do." He said the current Law Enforcement person for the Forest Service has been put in charge of eight districts, all the way up to Council, Idaho. Sheriff Turner said his deputies have gone from backcountry patrols to backcountry trash pickups, loading their trucks full of trash and dumping it in the dumpster. Officers do write fines for littering.

Jeff Wright mentioned Title 31, which states "Public Nuisance on Federal Land" for county commissioners to declare a public nuisance.

Commissioner Twilegar spoke about several "starting points," including a declaration, fees for littering, and a fee to get in to Kirkham.

Another resident of Lowman suggested rewarding people for doing the right thing, by charging them \$10 on the way in to the hot springs, but give them a plastic bag, and then give them \$5 on the way out when they pack out their trash.

Commissioner Holmes said he didn't advise it because you're civilly liable, "but you can do a citizen's arrest." Commissioner Twilegar disagreed, "I wouldn't do that." He continued, "I think everybody here could agree, we have to light a fire under the Forest Service's butt."

Brant Petersen spoke with Idaho City High School students regarding the problems involving recreation at several of the camping areas along Grimes Creek. The EPA actually became involved when the water levels dropped and they noticed an increase in harmful bacteria in the water related to human waste and deemed it unsafe to recreate in. He stated that the Forest Service does not like to close camping areas, but they felt that three of the sites needed to have a chance to heal from the overuse. Many of the local Clear Creek residents have complained and picked up trash on numerous occasions. Students were taught how to plant willows along the banks of the creek, to decrease ATV traffic through the stream. They also released trout that were hatched and studied in their classroom as part of a program with the U.S. Forest Service.

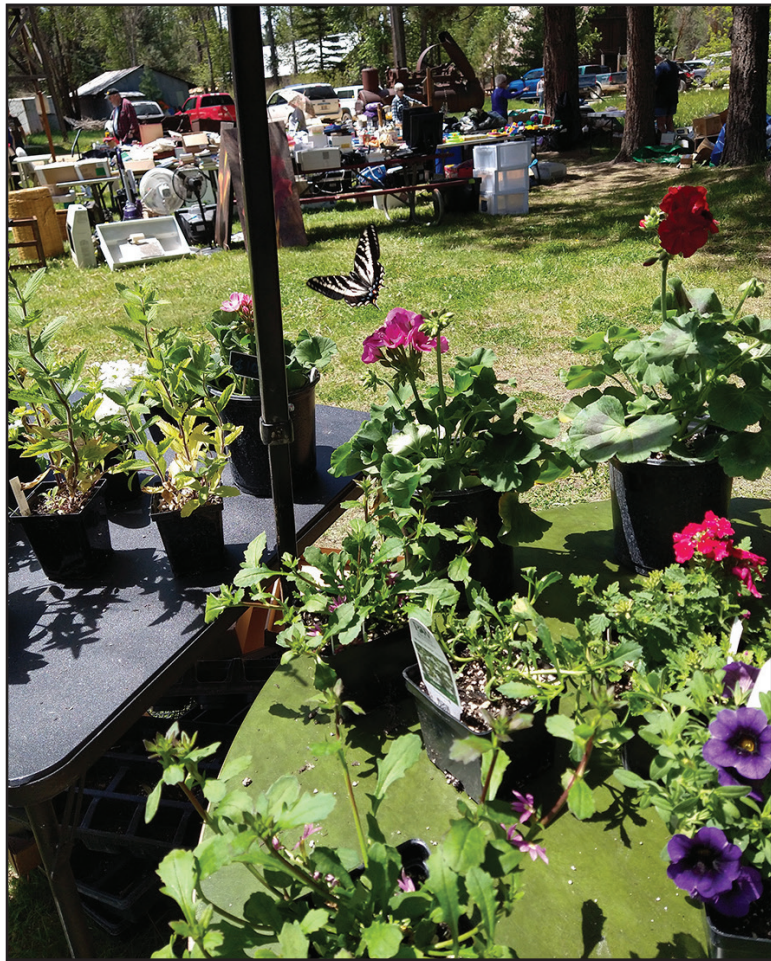
