Present: Commissioners Ryan Stirm, Ted Holmes, and Steve Twilegar

Pledge of Allegiance

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Closed session per personnel and hiring of a new employee. [Time 9:04 am to 9:15 am] No

CONSTITUENT INPUT: None

MINUTES: The meeting minutes from June 22, 2021 were approved through a motion.

FORESTER: Trinia Richardson discussed an Emergency Manager / Fire Mitigation Management Awareness Facebook page. She said there were a lot of little things that came up that would be beneficial to the county. She would be one of two administrators to this

SOLID WASTE: A payroll change was made for two new employees to serve as transfer station attendants, and one would work part time with noxious weeds.

COMPUTER EQUIP-MENT: There was a quote presented to the commissioners for Dell equipment to replace all the PCs, including additional monitors. The IT person, Robert, said he's done all the software updates and all the patches. He installed all the switches to all the county buildings to connect fiber, he said the earlier ones he likely put in about ten years ago. "What really scares me is that we don't have any spares. If one were to go down, we're down for a couple of weeks." He added a line for switches too, with a couple spares.

Clerk Mary Prisco stated that they used to be on rotation to replace computers, "I literally don't remember when we last did that, probably in 2016 -- maybe. So, we have some really, really old not efficient equipment."

As part of the CARES Act, the money could be used to cover this cost, about \$113,000 was moved into the general

The county is currently operating on Microsoft 2013, more than two versions away, and will need to update next year.

Chairman Stirm made a motion to approve the purchase of all-in-one laptops, monitors, and switches for the IT department in the amount of \$76,319.89. Robert said that the price may come down from this price, and won't go above it, when they order 37 all-inones. Stirm motioned to amend his motion to not go above that amount.

SQUAW CREEK DONA-TION LETTER: The county contributes \$2,750 and the letter certifies that they donated that money. A motion was said in support.

GARDEN VALLEY MAR-KET: There was discussion that there was 50 tons of cardboard that needed disposing of, since it's not being recycled. They want to bring it to the transfer station.

WATER TRUCKS: Clerk Prisco spoke regarding dedicated funds for the Road and Bridge Department and moving those funds. Chairman Stirm motioned to adopt a resolution to increase the Boise County Road and Bridge Fund 2021 budget.

LIQUOR PERMIT: There was a permit approved for the Eagle Rodeo Grounds [in Boise County].

DEMAND WARRANTS: Capital crimes case, to pay payee #4 in the amount of \$8,015 for confidential legal services.

BOISE STREET BRIDGE DISCUSSION: Commissioner Stirm offered some background, "The Boise Street Bridge in Horseshoe Bend is currently nonfunctional." There have been several different conversations over the past four years on the question of fixing it. He said there was a letter in the Idaho World by Chuck Morgan, "not 100% incorrect on his understanding. Got his numbers a little off price-wise." Stirm continued, "The main thing that I want folks to understand as far as the bridges go, is the Gardena Bridge is a multi-million-dollar project to have it replaced." That's a bridge the county has been getting ready for a grant. They are working with the state to get a price-match bid, "the unfortunate side of that is that bridge has gone, I think, north of seven million." He also said there were thoughts of moving the bridge. He said the options would be to repair it properly with the grading, because of the noise, or to remove and condemn it.

The State Emergency Operations Plan will be researched for the county to determine if the bridge was included in the

Chairman Stirm continued, "I'm not opposed to either way. My thought process was, Horseshoe Bend was willing to take it. They won't take it broken." If the county fixes it to an operable point, then the city can annex it in and it will be their property going forward.

He explained and said his biggest concern was, "I don't necessarily have a preference either way. I just don't want to leave it up and broken. I think that that provides too much of a liability and an opportunity for people who have nothing better to do... I don't think that's fair to the residents."

One resident stated, "We don't need that bridge; there are other ways around."

Commissioner Holmes stated after listening, "I don't want to pay my tax money on that thing either."

Commissioner Twilegar asked how many households were on the other side of this bridge, and if they felt the same

way. The resident responded that they had all signed a letter and there were between 15 and 20 households. It's five minutes to go around in an emergency situation, "To me, I'm inclined to say no to it as well." The bridge is almost 100 years old. Twilegar was also concerned about the structural integrity of the Gardena Bridge, it would take an hour to go around. Curtis Dill, Acting supervisor for the Road and Bridge Department, said that "the guys are having to redo bolts on that thing at least every two weeks."

PAVING ROADS: Commissioner Holmes said there is more money to pave roads would like to look at Old Crouch Road and dump road.

ASSESSOR **APPEALS:** Chris Juszczak said there were only two appeals this year, but last year there were over thirty.

BUDGET HEARINGS: Clerk Prisco said the budget hearings were going to be July 12th and 13th.

DEPARTMENT HEAD MEETING: Clerk Prisco presented some budget training.

The tentative budget will need to be complete and established by the Board by August 3rd, when it will be published in the Idaho World. "This year, I'm including a cost of living increase of 6% across the board for all employees in every department. I am doing that because I'm looking at the Consumer Price Index from April of 2019 to April 2021 and we didn't have any compensation increases last year," said Clerk Prisco. "That's my plan. Hopefully, there's sufficient funds for that." She added, "It's very important for everyone to understand, whenever we publish in the newspaper, we cannot increase from there. We can only decrease from there and that is for every single revenue item." There will be a public hearing on the budget and testimony may be given by the public. She encouraged department heads to be present to state their case. The final budget will be adopted after Labor Day in September of 2021.

Expenditures budgeted for FY2021 were a total of \$612 million. Clerk Prisco stated, "Property taxes is the bulk of our funding and is definitely the most consistent."

Placerville Breakfast





Idaho Department of Lands fighting fire in Harris Creek

BOISE COUNTY - (July 7, 2021) Idaho Department of Lands crews, along with assistance from the U.S. Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, and Horseshoe Bend Rural Fire Department partner agencies, are working hard to contain the 20- acre Harris Creek Fire before an expected cold front brings high winds into the area tomorrow. The fire was reported on July 5, on Hoff Timber lands in the northern Deadman area. Access is currently available only by foot. No structures are threatened, and no evacuations have been

Two 20-person USFS Type 1 crews, one 20-person initial attack contract crew, and 12 to 15 IDL personnel are on the ground along with two IDL engines and a Horseshoe Bend water tender with crew. During

the daylight hours, three helicopters and several air tankers dropped buckets of water or retardant loads on the fire. A bulldozer is assisting with road construction to improve access. Fire managers are hoping to contain the fire before the cold front moves in.

The fire is currently burning north, creeping upslope. Isolated torching of trees and some spotting ahead of the fire front is occurring.

The unusually hot and dry conditions this season are causing an increased number of fires and a severe shortage of firefighting resources available. Firefighters ask the public to help prevent wildfires by acting in a safe and responsible manner during all outdoor activities.

Horseshoe Bend Fire Dept. disclosed that the suspected cause was a lightning strike.

Master Chief Schwarz was continually at sea from 1991 until his retirement in 2006. His first unit was the United States Coast Guard Cutter GLA-CIER, an ice breaker, where he made three trips to the Antarctic. He began his training as a Quartermaster, or navigator, on board the GLACIER, and thereafter served aboard the Cutters WOOD-RUSH, SORREL, RESOLUTE, ALERT, MATINICUS (where he was promoted to Master Chief), and, returning to icebreaker duty, the HEALY (where he served as Navigation Officer and Command Master Chief), and lastly, the SEA LION. He was Officer-in-Charge, and plank owner, of the United States Coast Guard Cutter SEA LION, a ship which he took to fruition during the building stage, fine tuning the ship for 6 months as it was built in Louisiana and then sailing it 6600 miles to its home port of Bellingham, WA.
