Pledge of Allegiance

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Closed session per hiring of a new employee.

CONSTITUENT INPUT:

MINUTES: The minutes from August 3rd were approved through a motion.

TERRACE LAKES: A constituent spoke about building sooner on a property, which is back further than other properties. She said it was steep property. October and November is when it would be scheduled.

Mr. Gross, Planning & Zoning Administrator, said they had to give public notice, which is at least 35 days, and all the immediate neighbors must be given notice of the variance. She said that she did get the neighbors to sign. A public hearing will be scheduled in beginning of September or October. Commissioner Twilegar stated, "We, by law, have to follow that, the public notices and all that. And it is a pain, but as he said, we can't really expedite it." He added, "We legally have to put notice out to your neighbors too." He said the Planning and Zoning was way backed up due to a hiring frenzy and no inspectors, but they're getting caught up now.

She spoke regarding a "hardship" but Commissioner

Twilegar said they still needed to go through the procedure, regardless of a hardship.

Commissioner Holmes asked if she would like to talk to him on the side with any issues she might have, because "we work for you and we'll make sure it happens."

Commissioner Twilegar followed up by saying, "In the meantime, talk directly to Alex [Gross]."

Gross stated, "I didn't realize you had any questions."

SOLID WASTE: The Board approved a new hire.

SHERIFF: Scott Turner said they were doing pretty well with the applications for deputy. Twilegar asked how many and Sheriff Turner said more than eleven. He said, "It's looking pretty good!"

ASSESSOR: Chris Juszczak said they were significantly understaffed. There is appraisal work that needs to be done by state law.

JUVENILE JUSTICE: Ms. Leader asked the board's approval for hiring a building and grounds maintenance worker. The new job description and posting was approved via motion.

ROADS: Curtis Dill, acting Supervisor for the Boise County Road Department, spoke about an upcoming inspection by the Idaho Transportation Department regarding a property line and bridge.

Rollers for graders are being looked at and it's a couple months out. They are looking at a place in Montana, which will work well. There was

another in Australia, but they weren't able to give a quote on shipping "because of the overseas problems they're having right now." The roller will benefit the hills, and mounts to a grader. Commissioner Holmes motioned that they approve buying one for the county. Commissioner Twilegar stated, "I second that motion, let's do it! Let's do this, get this going." The two commissioners were in favor.

Dust abatement and deicer was discussed. Dill said the dust abatement unit was half-way built for sprayers, and he presented prices for the dust abatement and deicer fluid. He added that they had money for abatement through the Forest Service.

Commissioner Twilegar stated, "I say we get back on that program, at least dust abatement. If the roads can't be paved, at least we can be doing that in residential areas." Dill said, "It makes a big difference." Twilegar would like to get it on the agenda.

Old Crouch and Old Emmett were being paved, the prepping has been done. Commissioner Holmes said he wanted to go down and talk to a couple neighbors, "and assure them that we're not messing with their ditches." Dill affirmed that they weren't touching the ditches.

Holmes asked Dill to send out an email to all in the department, "We're going to have an all-hands meeting at 11 o'clock, Horseshoe Bend, Thursday... And I'll put out the word about what's going on."

Dill has done three phone interviews for hire, but only one individual is still interested and he does not have his CDL and can't operate heavy equipment. Commissioner Holmes said, "We need the bodies." Dill said the others were qualified, but could be making more money elsewhere, "We're making due with what we've got."

AMBULANCE: Commissioner Twilegar said there was some discussion regarding Horseshoe Bend and whether or not there was a mutual aid agreement, "it appears that there is. We're still looking closely at that, but there appears that there is." He added, "It definitely exists. The real question is, was it just the fire department or was it the fire department and ambulance that signed the agreement? It appears that both did." He said it sounded like, from one source, that Horseshoe Bend is taking steps, has offered an EMT class with at least six people and has one that's already an EMT. "It sounds like they are not just doing nothing. Horseshoe Bend Fire is actually taking steps to alleviate the situation. In the meanwhile, we need to iron out whether this mutual aid agreement exists or not, which it appears

that it does."

LEASE AGREEMENT:

Acting Chairman Twilegar made a motion to approve the lease agreement between the "landlord" Boise County and Armature Radio Emergency Services group.

DESTRUCTION OF RE-CORDS: Acting Chairman Twilegar asked the prosecutor to speak to the destruction of records. Prosecutor Strong said, "We have a retention schedule for all of these documents. When we pass that certain amount of time, it has to come to the Board to get rid of the records. So these are all, I believe, 2018 election ballots. We have all the ballots and keep them for, I believe it's for two years, and so we are past the two year timeframe that we are legally required to keep all of the political ballots." Commissioner Twilegar motioned to approve the resolution to destroy certain records, which will be shredded.

BILLS: A motion was said to approve the unpaid claims in the amount of \$148,848.

LIQUOR LICENSE: There was a long list of licenses approved for businesses in Boise County. The deputy clerk stated that there is a total of 34 businesses in the county that sell alcohol and need to be renewed each year for their li-

DEMAND WARRANTS:

A bill for a job came before the Board and Commissioner Holmes said, "I told him this morning, he wouldn't get paid until the task was complete. He said, yeah, I'm going to go finish it today. He'll come back when it's complete." The item will be put back on the agenda for the following week. Commissioner Twilegar said, "Just for the record, for anybody doing work for the county, you will not get paid until everything's clean, the job is complete, you will never get paid again until everything is absolutely repaired. It's put back to its original status or whatever the contract is. We will wait for two years, if that's what it takes, but you will not get paid."

Legal services in the amount of \$5668 was approved.

PROSECUTOR: Commissioner Holmes asked Prosecutor Strong what was his "least busy day of the week, if you have to go somewhere out of county for a meeting or something."

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





City Council Meeting Notes from Idaho City

IDAHO CITY -- Minutes for the City of Idaho City regular City Council meeting which was held on July 28, 2021.

The meeting was attended by Mayor Philip Canody and Council members: Tom Secor, Ken Everhart, HD Hillyard, and David Martin.

The first item of business was the checklist for the Jack Pine Round-Up presented by Dan Meyer. Commissioner Everhart asked about the insurance,

and it was mentioned that it should be delivered to the City Clerk within days. Then Everhart made a motion to approve the Idaho City event checklist for the Jack Pine Round-Up contingent on insurance. Police Chief Mark Otter had concerns regarding the noise variance for the event which was from 9 a.m. till 2 a.m. on August 27 and 28th. Ken Everhart made a motion to approve the alcohol variance for the event and made a motion to approve

the noise variance, this was seconded by David Martin and the Council agreed unanimously. The City Council thanked the Jack Pine Round-Up Board for all the work which has been put into the grounds and the improvements that have been accomplished.

Councilmember HD Hillyard made a motion to pay the bills from July 15th, through July 28th, in the amount of \$20,999.51.

The Engineer's report was presented by Kristina Gillespie-Jaques who discussed current projects, potential projects, and recommendations for the City Council. A work session was decided upon for August 11, 2021 at 2:00 p.m. At this workshop the discussion will include an ECWAG report which could provide additional grant funds for an emergency surface water intake system. This will be discussed further with the USDA Rural Development and will help to determine what the possible water capacity will be for Idaho City. This workshop will also support more information so the Mayor can sign the Idaho City Winn Grant Water Project invoice and pay the request package. Tom Secor made a motion to allow the mayor to sign the Idaho City Winn Grant Water project invoice that was seconded by Ken Everhart and all members agreed.

The Idaho City wastewater Reuse permit application has been received by IDEQ and deemed complete. IDEQ is now in the process of preparing a permit to Idaho City in draft form to be reviewed prior to issuing the permit. This permit will have conditions that will influence future wastewater system upgrades and needs. Groundwater/surface water interaction evaluation will be a compliance activity, which needs to be addressed before a new permit can be obtained. This will include the installation of additional monitoring wells and addition of new surface water sampling locations. As a background on this concern, back in 2016 due to the weather activity, Idaho City had an embankment collapse, disrupting and interfering with the Idaho City water system. This problem was not reported in the 2-year time frame to be able to get emergency funds to help the water system. Moving forward, activity last spring has further damaged and has increased the collapse of the embankment, creating new issues for the water system intake. These concerns have been brought to the attention of the USDA to discuss the possibility of receiving emergency funds to fix the issues, which might include a new infiltration gallery replacement based on the seismic activity.

Under old business, the Council allowed Mayor Philip Canody to sign a contract for legal services for Eric B. Thomson, Gem County Prosecuting attorney, to provide services for the City of Idaho City Prosecuting attorney. Ken Everhart made a motion for the mayor to sign the contract and it was seconded by David Martin. All council members agreed.

A motion was made by Tom Secor to allow Mayor Philip Canody to sign an engagement letter for legal services for Joan E. Callahan with Naylor and Hales, P.C. providing services for the City of Idaho City as the Civil City attorney. This was seconded by Ken Everhart and all council members agreed.

Steve Twilegar addressed the council and asked for a noise variance for certain dates. They anticipate going longer into the evening during these evenings with additional bands and for the music festival in September. Ken Everhart made a motion to allow a noise variance on August 27 and 28, and September 24, and 25, 2021 until 1 a.m. this was seconded by David Martin and all the Council

members agreed. Ganesh Chapagain, with AokaEngineering, gave a proposal to Mayor Philip Canody and City Council members for a plan to review and furnish building code inspections for the building department of Idaho City. Councilmember, Tom Secor, asked about the time on building plan reviews, and they responded with 4 to 5 business days for residential services, longer for commercial depending on the size and value. The inspections would be held 48 hours after notice, business days. They would operate in contact with the owners, builders, and contractors, taking the many steps to a minimum and keeping the City clerk informed of the progress of each permit. Aoka was comfortable with the fee schedule and their portion would be less of a percentage than Idaho City has currently with the State of Idaho. The City Council would like to put this on the next agenda and look over any contract, review their proposal, and pos-

sibly make a motion to approve for the services they are offering. City Attorney, Callahan, feels this is a positive direction that Idaho City can go. Idaho City has shown the need, advertising, and qualifications. She feels that the City Council should act at the next meeting if they so desire. No other applicant has been able to offer these services. Jim Tenner was also available to offer his qualifications and what he can bring to Idaho City. He is based in Nampa and would be the one most likely to handle the per-

Under the Historical Preservation Commission, Rhonda Jameson updated the council about a grant that was obtained a couple of years ago in the amount of \$1,800. This was given to Idaho City and was approved but unable to use during COVID-19. The grant is still available for use and she would like Idaho City Council's permission to submit invoices to cover conference fees. This will need to be done at the next meeting and added to the agenda for approval. An extra chair position is still needed for the Historical Preservation Commission. City Clerk Nancy Ptak will advertise on the website for that position.

Joan Callahan, City Attorney reviewed the publication notice which was in the local newspaper and determined that it was three days short of City code. This affects Planning and Zoning Commission regarding "Idaho City Estates, Phase 2-subdivision preliminary plat findings of fact." It was suggested that it go back to Planning and Zoning for another public hearing to avoid any potential risk in the future. This would allow time for the applicant to address the issues brought up by Planning and Zoning before returning to the City Council. City Clerk Nancy Ptak will contact Planning and Zoning and discuss procedures and roles of the commission to help establish understanding on the reasonability of the commission. Mayor, Phillip Canody, asked for this item to go back to Planning and Zoning for further action. There was concern from Darcelle Sander, representing the applicant, that this would set them back and wanted to know if they were going to start over? This would not be the case; the notice will be republished and have a new public hearing.



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Idaho City School Board Holds Special Meetings

Special School Board Meeting on Wednesday, August 11th.

Present: Ken Gordon (Chairman), Theresa Pledge (Treasurer), MaryEllen Mc-Murtrie, and Brent Adamson (Vice Chairman).

Absent: Brandee Kline

On the agenda was the "Reopening Plan Update," a requirement in order to receive federal funding. Ken opened by saying via Zoom, "Anyone who has a comment on the reopening plan, there will be time at the end."

Basin School's Superintendent Brian Hunicke relayed that the state and federal asked "that the plan be fluid throughout the pandemic." That was taken to mean that they could alter the reopening plan at any

Chairman Gordon spoke regarding masks, washing stations, and online learning. He then referred to the Reopening Plan and stated, "We may start experiencing outbreaks and we may need to change it. We may have to go to more stringent mitigation. That would be mask wearing, which would be the first thing that we would have to do if we have substantial outbreaks and then next thing would be go virtual." He said, "In the past, with the flu, when thirty people were out, then we would close the school down for a couple of days at a time."

Hunicke said in the past with H1N1, when they had an outbreak, with so many students missing, they closed down the school. He referred to COVID and said. "It would be treated just like the flu."

"Triggers" were suggested, with 10% of the student body sick to wear masks, 31 – 32 students, and if it went up to 15%, just sending kids home or having them work online. "We would basically shut the school down like a snow day," said Hunicke. He added that the school has accepted federal funds, for many years probably since the opening of the high school. "If you accept federal funds, you have to follow the CDC guidelines." He then stated that there was some "breathing room." He also mentioned that there was a federal mandate to wear masks on public transportation, which includes

Gordon said information on triggering the next stage level of mitigation should be included in the reopening plan for the fall. Hunicke said that the feds understood that the plan should be fluid and that it's a moving target. The board motioned to approve the reopening plan policy with the addition of the triggers for wearing masks and for going online, between 10% and 15% of the student body. The Board voted unanimously to pass the reopening plan with the caveat of the triggers. Gordon said that should they need to change it, they will do so to protect the health and wellbeing of our children.

Brent Adamson commented regarding the wearing of masks on the bus. He said if Basin School District deemed it safe, then they might be able to avoid the mask mandate. He added, "If the federal mandate is very rigid, we need to know

Hunicke said the district is going to receive approximately \$477,866 in SR3 funds, but can't use any of these funds until this document is completed. There is maintenance that needs to be done on the 26-year old HVAC system. He broke down costs and said a school district questionnaire would be sent out to parents and guardians as to what they should spend the remaining funds on. Funds are geared to go towards assistance with learning loss, math remediation, additional help in the lower grades, flooring replacement, improving air quality, cleaning supplies, and many miscellaneous items. It will also help towards the purchase of informational technology, mental health care, after school programs, school credit loss to be offered after school, etc. Hunicke stated: "It seems like a lot of money, but it goes

The board will submit their final plan by October 3, but motioned to pass the reopening plan and a preliminary budget plan to accept federal funds.

TEACHERS: Superintendent Hunicke stated that there were quite a few teachers that had retired. There were five new teachers presented to the board by name for their approval and hire. Hunicke said it was difficult to find candidates; however, "I think we're all extremely lucky. I think they're all great people and I think they're really going to help up here."

ROBIE **CREEK** BUS **ROUTE CHANGE:** The bus route will be changed to stop at the Robie Creek Fire Station from November 15th to March 15th. The road becomes much too treacherous up Toll Gate Road in the wintertime and parents will be compensated for the extra milage by the district. All were in favor of the motion to change the Robie Creek bus route.

COMMENTS: PUBLIC There was a list of those who would like to speak.

Jean spoke as a citizen of Boise County and challenged the protocol of the meeting, stating: "You have those present speak, after you approve your agenda and your protocol? That's not how it works." She added, "This is all about freedom of choice. Masking up our children is not freedom." She questioned, "so-called medical professionals" and the accepting of federal money.

Debra asked if vaccinations were going to be required. She also asked if the school were teaching Critical Race Theory instead of core classes. She questioned some of the





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things that were being asked of children by teacher(s). She suggested since officers have to have a body camera, why aren't there cameras in all of the classrooms so parents can know what's being taught?

Chairman Gordon responded, "Let me just state before we go on, we do not teach Critical Race Theory, period. And we do not have a vaccine mandate." He said the curriculum was open to the public and that they were not a political body, and do not teach political ideologies.

Kaite Callahan voiced her concern regarding the mask mandates, and stated that the parent's concerns had fallen on deaf ears. "They should not be forced to wear a mask every single day. It is wrong. It is sick. It is not freedom." She suggested there were inaccuracies in mask mandates by health officials and additional health risks to those that wear masks, and then said that the COVID survival rate was over 98%. She spoke regarding the federal funding that the school receives, "Our children are not your political pons and are not more dollar signs." She added, "Now is the time to stand up for God and to stand up for Country, for all that is good!" Callahan announced that she will be running for School Board Member, Zone 1.

Lynette said she taught at the school five years ago, but stepped away with a lot of regrets. She spoke regarding her concerns for freedom in this country and potential agendas of the government.

Boise County Commissioner Steven Twilegar advised the board to listen to their constituents, "People are very serious about this mask issue and about freedom, and about living in Idaho City." He said some of these people took time off of work to be there at 10:30 in the morning. "I implore you to rethink this decision and think of personal freedoms. If people want to send their children to school with masks, that's their God-given right. But rights don't come from governmental entities, like us. They come

from God!"

MaLeesha spoke saying, "I'm embarrassed, honestly, that I come from this school at the moment. It turns out that a lot of our problems are boiling down to -- y'all took federal money. I don't feel like anybody in this room was asked their opinion about that." She added, "We the people are not being represented." She recognized that there may be some grey area regarding the wearing of masks on the bus, "We in Idaho City love grey areas! We would just like to get back to living our lives. It's a free country! You have the right to choose what you put in your body." She stated that they were "done with the masks" and suggested, "If you are afraid, it's your turn to stay home. This is America!"

Ben and his wife spoke regarding the mask mandate being political and how they attempted last year to provide a medical exemption, citing religious beliefs, so that their daughter would not be required to wear a mask at school. "The board laughed that off; it was a joke," Ben's wife stated. She added that they are now in a "legal battle with the school, that has just begun."

Chairman Gordon stated that this issue had already been litigated and it was thrown out of the court with prejudice. She responded that they had not moved forward with the rest of

All those who had signed up to speak had spoken and no one online requested to speak. Gordon said that he would like to add one final comment, "The board makes its decisions not on political ideology. The board makes its decisions on our mandate from the state to protect the health and wellbeing of the students. And we look at the original health literature and make our decisions."

UPCOMING MEETING:

Basin School District was scheduled to hold a Board Meeting on Tuesday, August 17th at 5pm, which will be reported on in next week's Idaho World newpaper.

LOWMAN -- The Central District Health (CDH) will hold a COVID vaccination clinic this Friday, August 20 from 11:00-2:00 at the Low-Emergency Services Building in Lowman. The second dose will be offered at the same location about 21 to 28 days after the first is given. - Watch for stopped traffic and give yourself more time to get to your destination.
- · Remember to follow the school zone posted speed signs.





The HOA for Southfork Landing Cross Timber Ranch Subdivision Homeowner's Association would like to keep a lease on part of it for their deicer. An agreement was discussed. The property would be used, and is currently used, by the Boise County Road Department. This topic will be revised at next week's meeting.

City of Crouch Continues to Work on Sustainable Growth and Planning

CROUCH -- The City of Crouch had its regular City Council meeting on August 11, 2021. A few discussions and decisions were made on the full agenda schedule. This included a Conditional Use Permit Public Hearing and the annual Budget Hearing to establish the coming year budget.

The total city budget of just over \$158,000.00 was approved for the 2022 fiscal year beginning October 1, 2021. Revenues come from the state combined with some county tax revenue, Idaho Transportation Department, and state liquor revenues. Quarterly revenues total up to around \$8000.00. The city manages to stay afloat with this minimal revenue. The city of Crouch has not imposed property taxes on its 200 or less residents so far. The final approved budget, showing fund totals, is published in the *Idaho* World.

A new business called **The Hinge Wine Cellar**, a beer, wine, and cigar shop will be opening on Old Crouch Road. Dominica Mathiason, owner, represented the business during the Conditional Use Public Hearing. The CUP was approved so that she can prepare to open in September. The council will work with city code to determine if any

special conditional uses are needed to finish the CUP. City Council performs as City Planning and Zoning in land and zone matters.

Council approved the expenditure of filling various potholes in town. There were questions from a couple of audience members concerning filling potholes, with what is known as private property to the center of the road, in the city center part of Old Crouch Road. They were concerned about a potential for liability to the city, or at the very least this could set a bad precedent. Attorney Cherese McLain, of MSBT Law, reassured the council that there no need to worry about liability. Mayor Powell stated that Old Crouch Road was a "right-of-way for at least 60 years." He reiterated that a city government works to keep its citizens safe. He said it was his role as mayor to take care of these type of situations, such as filling the potholes "this time."

Water topics currently plague the city. More people want to hook up to **city water**, but the availability is a challenge. The system needs to be expanded but there is not money to develop a larger system to increase availability. The city has sought out grants to achieve a larger system without going into enormous debt. Grants have been refused since the majority of needs at the moment are for the business corridor. Grants look at residential needs first. This may be a two-year process for achieving a grant, including doing rate studies.

Terry Tucker, Crouch Water Manager, indicated to Council that a large expense is needed to fix an item failure due to aging on the city well. The expense was approved. Also, the city is looking at providing water connections for Uncle Billy Bob's Trailer Rentals and going over the original contract.

In a previous discussion with the council, water engineers and legal questions about water rates were revisited. Everyone agreed that Crouch City Water Ordinance needs to be updated. One item discussed was that the rate of \$25.00 per month has not changed since the ordinance was developed. The city has determined this is an unsustainable rate when the national rate average is \$70.00 per month for city water. More meetings will take place as the city council grapples with how to set justifiable water rates.

Another topic covered, after researching cost, was increasing security with camera options for museum buildings. Mayor Powell had a meeting with **Idaho Power** to go over

comes to ideas or needs.

the **Fire Mitigation** planning. Idaho Power reassured the mayor that they "have our backs." They have a plan to make sure cities are safe and can send a person right away in the event of fires to keep the power going. "It is complicated," said Mayor Powell, and invited anyone with questions to contact him.

A covid/vaccination meeting update was given by Mayor Powell. Boise County still has a very low vaccination rate of 29% and COVID infection numbers each week, per capita of people living in the county, remains high. School is starting in the red zone alert, according to Mayor Powell. The school will be watching for any changes to know how to proceed as school reopens.

The Local Option Tax **Committee** is preparing for the September 13th deadline. The ballot measure will be legally written up, so that the language is clear on the November ballot. Crouch residents will be able to vote on this measure. There is still pushback from locals, particularly out-of-city residents that feel this would impact them. LOT Committee person, Tim Fritzley, explained that they are using a common method that other Idaho small towns utilize for additional revenues. He explained this was the fairest way to collect extra revenues that include the tourists who frequent the town and make an impact on city resources. The committee takes into consideration Crouch's small population of under 200 people in the city limits. A property tax would hurt the lower income city residents. Another meeting will be announced to make final decisions on the LOT ballot measure, which will set percentages of limited taxable items. The "wish list" is determined later, with city and city resident input as the revenues grow There

is nothing set in stone when it

Thor Oden asked for a bond extension for **Pine Grove sub-division roadway**. There will be homes being built over the next couple of years, so the road will get "hammered" from use. He wants to wait to pave the road *after* homes are built. A new agreement and surety bond will be drawn up and noted at the next council meeting that will signify that agreement.

Crouch/Garden Valley Museum is trying to get volunteers and create a new board. Several previous members have moved, and a new board is needed. Volunteers are needed to help keep the museum open on Saturday, particularly during activities in town, including the Farmer's Market. Contact the city hall office for more information on what being involved in the museum entails.

The Chairman of the Senior Center Board wants to sell a lot that currently belongs to the Senior Center. The Senior Center building lot and the extra lot are both zoned by the city as Public. Chairman Barbara Baker felt it was improperly zoned in the first place. Attorney McLain asked her to file Zoning Change papers with city hall first and to go from there. She reminded Baker that this process could take several months, involving one or two public hearings as well. Baker also asked for the fee to be waived to rezone since the Senior Center is a corporate nonprofit. Nothing was decided this evening.

The meeting concluded with a Clerk report and Treasurer's report. The quarterly revenues have come in and are always available for review at city hall during regular office hours. The next regularly scheduled City Council Meeting is September 8, 2021, at 6:30 in City Hall Chambers. Special Meeting may be called at any time.

On the Look for a Missing Rafter, and Missing Motorcyclist is Found Deceased

BOISE COUNTY -- The Sheriff's office was advised that Ada County Sheriff's Deputies were looking for an overdue motorcyclist who was last seen in the Idaho City area on Thursday night. While searching in the Lucky Peak area, the crash site was located on Saturday afternoon by an Ada County Deputy at approximately mile post 19.5 on Highway 21. The operator, Robert Patterson, 40 years old, of Boise, was found deceased at the scene about 200 feet down from a curve in the road where there were no jersey barriers. The preliminary investigation

reports suggest that alcohol may have been a major contributing factor. Chief Deputy Coroner Mike Johnson said that the cause of death was from blunt force trauma.

On Monday, August 9th, 2021, at approx. 6:30PM, Boise County and Garden Valley emergency units responded to Highway 55 at approximately mile post 77 for a report of a kayak accident. Witnesses say that the 36-year-old, Nicholas Zawadzki was last seen going over a set of rapids when he went under the water and did not resurface. The Bear Valley Rafting Company and Cas-

cade Raft & Kayak assisted in the search for the victim. The search continued until dark and then was continued on Tuesday morning with the Boise County Sheriff's office, Garden Valley Fire, and the rafting companies providing search personnel. A private helicopter was arranged by the Sheriff's office

and has also been involved in the search over the last several days. At the time of publication, the subject has still not been located.

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
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

Garden Valley Martial Arts for Seniors

August 13, 2021, the Garden Valley Chapter of the Japan Federation Karate Do promoted its first class of the Martial Arts for Seniors students to 9th Kyu (Yellow Belt) after completing approximately 15 weeks of basic training. At the core of the principles and techniques practiced is the discipline of

maintaining proper posture and balance through structural alignment of the body while executing hip-powered movement. This class lays the foundation for a wide variety of higher learning in powerful defensive Martial Art techniques.

The promotion celebration began with Sensei James performing the traditional Samurai sword ceremony that gave honor and respect to the Martial Arts Masters. He explained to the audience that all Japanese Martial Arts have evolved from the traditions of the Samurai. The Samurai warrior lived a purposeful and disciplined life based on precision, respect, dignity, nobility, loyalty, frugality, and honor until death. Students of Martial Arts carry on these traditions.

students: The Barbara Schulz, Cathy Garner, Linda Kennedy, and Stephen Kennedy performed the required 'Kihon Practices' which involved a series of both standing and moving defensive stances, punches, and blocks. Then, the instructor presented his students with their hardearned promotion certificates,

badges and yellow belts. After this presentation, the students stood in straight-line formation holding their new yellow belts. Then, in unison, they raised up their folded new yellow belts above their heads, ripped off the protective paper while giving a loud spirited "Kiai" yell and removed their white belt, replacing it with their properly tied bright yellow belt. The yellow color symbolizes the sun. Inside the program brochure, there was a picture of a seedling under a beam of light with the following verse. "Beams of sunlight falling on the nurtured seedling represents the transition of my students from beginners who have mastered the requirements of a disciplined practice foundation and the basic martial art moves to advance into the next growth phase." Sensei James presented the promoted 9th Kyu (Yellow Belt) students to the audience. The promotion ceremony was followed by a delicious lunch of traditional Japanese-style foods provided by the instructor and students.
