Billowing Clouds and Lightning Strikes Cause Fires



Several water and fire retardant drops were delivered to a brush fire off Highway ID-55 by milepost 66 between Sportsman Access and Porter Creek Road in the afternoon on Monday, August 2. The cause of the fire was unknown at publication time. However, there were ten reported fires in the county from lightning.

Horseshoe Bend City Council Meeting

The following is a synopsis of the Horseshoe Bend City Council meeting on July 26, 2021. The meeting was rescheduled from July 19 after a quorum could not be met due to the absence of councilmembers Stephen Chartier and Curtis Corvinus. (Councilmember Curtis Corvinus was not in attendance at this meeting) Mayor Pat Goff made the call to order at 7:00 p.m., led the Pledge of Allegiance, and after unanimous approval of the agenda, previous minutes from the meeting in June, and the authorization to pay the city's bills, Goff opened the dais for public comments.

Marvin Grover came to the podium to ask the council to explore all feasible options regarding the city's ambulance service. He requested that a public hearing be held before the council makes any decisions about what to do. "Absolutely, thank you," replied Mayor Goff.

New Business: City treasurer, Teri Nolan, presented the proposed budget to the council. After the council looked it over and had some discussion amongst themsleves, the budget was approved to be published with a public hearing date to be set.

City Engineer Amy Woodruff presented a proposal to vacate a common property line within the city to facilitate the building of a new home. She explained that combining the two lots reduces density with-

in the city and that the comprehensive plan supports the proposal. Mayor Goff then identified himself as the party making the request after an audience member asked the council to tell the property owner that once the two lots were combined they could not be split in the future. "I think it's something we would do for anyone else, not just the Mayor," councilmember Martye White told the council. Councilmember Ben Rilev made the motion to combine the two lots and the council approved it unanimously.

Public works employee Jobie Catherman came before the council with a request to purchase a new ozone generator. The current main ozone generator was purchased as a used piece of equipment in 1996 and the back-up is currently down, leaving the city in a precarious situation should the main ozone generator fail. Catherman explained that both the generators are obsolete and that repair parts are no longer available for them. Rebuilding the back-up generator would take 10 or more weeks and would run \$13,000-\$15,000. New generators are priced at \$150,000 per unit. Catherman proposed that the city purchase new generators and utilize the control panels they currently have which would save the city as much as \$70,000. Catherman said, "I think we're running on borrowed time. I'm losing sleep over it." Woodruff added the following about the generators, "This is the disinfection portion of the plant. It's very, very critical." White asked, "We're talking how much to get us up and running?" Catherman told him \$62,000 for the generator, plus an additional \$6,000 for subcontractors to install. White asked if there were any other options. Catherman said, "Not really, we could use chlorine but people wouldn't like it and we'd open ourselves up to potential fines." According to Catherman, the biggest advantage to the ozone generator is better taste and smell. Goff said, "The number one thing is to make sure we have safe drinking water." Because the ozone generator replacement wasn't listed as an action item on the agenda, city attorney Tony Pantera advised the council to set up a special meeting to discuss and make a decision on the matter. The council set a date for the meeting on Monday, August 2.

Brandi Eller, who was on the agenda regarding the ambulance service, was a no show.

City attorney Pantera presented a revised ordinance for beer, liquor, and wine sales changing penalties from misdemeanors to infractions.

An audience member spoke out against last month's animal ordinance amendment (which changed the penalty from a misdemeanor to an infraction) accusing the council of trying to conduct business in secrecy. Several audience

members argued that infractions (tickets with fines that do not require court appearances) were harsher penalties than misdemeanors (Court appearance with fines and possible jail time). Audience member Jon Dufresne spoke up, telling the crowd, "You don't lose your right to due process (court appearance) if you are charged with an infraction." Pantera replied, "Correct." Goff then interjected, "If you guys want to get on the agenda and discuss this at a future meeting, we can do that."

Department Reports: EMS had ten runs last month. The ambulance was taken in for service after making odd noises, but there were no codes that popped up.

Public Works- Ozone gen-

erator breakdown taking up a lot of time. A substantial water leak was reported on the redwood tank. They need to find a solution sooner rather than later. The current liner in the tank is over 30 years old, but it's too early to tell what will need to be done to repair the leak. The leak was described as 8 feet in length on the side of the tank.

Grant Writer- Cheryl Pleak reported that she had secured a grant to pay for 50% of the landscaping at the new park. This will include sod, trees, and fencing. She will present 3D renderings of the proposed landscaping project to the council at a later date.

Horseshoe Bend resident, Laressa Gilleard, broke in to ask what the park's impact on the highway would be and what type of liability would the city face with a park by the river? Gilleard stated that neighboring residents were not informed about the park. Goff answered that the property was always slated to be a park adding, "It's not going to happen in a day, we just don't have the money." He went on to say that many cities in Idaho had parks by rivers. Pleak said, "It will be done in phases."

City Engineering- No new updates.

City Attorney- "We've covered all my stuff." Someone in the audience wanted to address all the "eyesores" coming into town. After the laughter died down, Pantera said, "That's one of the reasons we're going over all the ordinances."

Someone new to the community asked if there were any plans for a grocery store or a hospital. Goff replied, "Not at this time."

The meeting adjourned at

July 27, 2021 Pledge of Allegiance

Present: Commissioners Ryan Stirm, Ted Holmes, and Steve Twilegar

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Closed session per personnel matter. [Time 9:03 to 9:27 am] No action required.

CONSTITUENT INPUT: Steve Moore, Chairman of the Boise County Firefighters Association, spoke regarding the size of campfires. "With the influx of new people into the county, all the residents need to be reminded or informed of these requirements." He said the Boise County webpages do not emphasize anything, or bring attention to the burn ordinance. "The fire chiefs of Boise County respectfully request the Boise County Burn Ban Ordinance and Campfire Regulations needs to be brought to a more prominent place on the county's webpage for easy access."

Clerk Mary Prisco said she had not been aware of this issue and will "figure it out." Sheriff Scott Turner said he would get it up on his page, too.

Commissioner Holmes stated that he understood campfires could only be in campgrounds. The Sheriff corrected him and said they could also have campfires on private property. Holmes followed up, saying everything else is illegal. Moore continued, "According to that [ordinance], they need to have an actual fire ring and not just a bunch of rocks stacked up or an open fire in the middle of the ground."

MINUTES: Commissioner Stirm motioned to approve the July 12th and 20th official meeting minutes.

PAVING: Commissioner Stirm spoke regarding the Knife River Corporation proposal for paving Old Crouch Road and Old Emmett Road. He motioned to approve a Change Order for Knife River for \$382,162 for paving Old Crouch Road and Old Emmett

Road. This passed unanimously. "There you go, we're going to get a couple more roads paved this year." Mr. Curtis Dill, acting supervisor for the Boise County Road Department, stated the company estimates they will start the project around the end of August. He will look into permitting with the Idaho Transportation Department because they will be connecting with Highway 55.

IDAHO SEARCH AND **RESCUE:** They asked to place a repeater [for radios] and they will take care of all the maintenance. Commissioner Twilegar said he was all for it and thought this is what they should be doing, but would like the prosecutor to look it over prior to approval. Commissioner Stirm agreed considering a Memorandum of Understanding, "I want to make sure it's done right." The topic will be put on next week's agenda.

SERVICE REVOLVER: This was in regards to giving a deputy his service weapon when he leaves. Commissioner Stirm motioned that they transfer Deputy Hastie's revolver to his possession upon his depar-

PLANNING AND ZON-**ING:** Mr. Gross spoke regarding the Firefighters Association meeting and the concerns that they had regarding people who are buying property, steepness restrictions for driveways and sanitary issues. He spoke about the county's ordinance, Unified Land Ordinance, and says he speaks with those that will be putting in driveways and goes over specs regarding pullouts,

Curtis Dill said that they have applications for driveways that come into county roads and could work with P&Z.

There was more talk about a 10% grade for driveways. Twilegar said, "I get why. If you're smart, you're going to make every effort to make it easy for emergency vehicles to be there." Commissioner Holmes

agreed, "You can't regulate common sense."

GRANTS: Commissioner Stirm said he had talked with a former commissioner, Jamie Anderson, and there were some grant opportunities that the county missed. "We were too late to ask for any funds this year," Stirm said. He planned on contacting Congressman Fulcher, "because he's on that committee, and see if we can get him to put some pressure on the federal side of it, to stop the R.A.C. [Resource Advisory Committee funding] conversation and we open it for application."

Commissioner Holmes said Anderson also called him and she was thrilled to find out that Boise County had a grant writer. He suggested that it might be best to have the grant writer contact the former commissioner directly.

Twilegar asked who normally did the grant writing? It was answered by the Clerk that it was normally done by the departments.

Stirm said some roads in Boise County would "count" because they lead to the National Forest and there was several million dollars to apply for. "So, that's even more paving potential, more road maintenance, or whatever we need to get done." He added, "Anything that has to do with forest, forest access, and preservation and all that, that's what that R.A.C. money is for. That's a huge pot of money for almost every department." He said that there were approximately five counties that were missed. Notification was supposed to have come via email, but the email addresses used were over ten years old. He would like to see the money opened back up to the counties. He encouraged others to contact Congressman Fulcher.

SNOWMOBILE: A resolution was adopted to reflect an increase for the Garden Valley snow groomer fund budget, for additional money that came in.

CLAIMS: Chairman Stirm motioned to approve the claims approval report dated 7/23/2021 in the amount of \$95.187.

BUDGET: Clerk Mary Prisco spoke to the department heads and elected officials regarding the budget, payrolls, and provided worksheets. She spoke regarding some changes, including an increase for elected official compensation for the Prosecutor, Sheriff, and Treasurer based on an average wage among other similar Idaho counties. The Board approved several items for the Sheriff's department, including a new Sheriff's deputy, full-time investigator, and fulltime dispatcher. There was an increased amount put towards

the court supervisor position, to attract someone to fill it. A new appraiser position was approved for the Assessor's department.

GARDEN VALLEY FIRE DEPT: Fire Chief Jon Delvalle spoke regarding a property transfer, which is not suitable for a station. It could be used by the county for sand storage by the Road Department.

There is currently a cinder block building on the property in Southfork Landing. The topic will be on the agenda for next week, to discuss it with the prosecutor. Delvalle said, "It should be a real simple transfer."

CROUCH BRIDGE PROPERTY DISCUSSION: This will be put on next week's agenda.


I can't believe you made such a calloused statement and at a public meeting. Have you no compassion? I'm sure the owner of the trailer feels bad enough without you calling him stupid!


I think the Fire Dept. would be better off without people like you. Our rural Fire Depts. and EMS folks are the best and we are so lucky to have them. They are so professional and caring.







City Council of Idaho City

IDAHO CITY -- The regular Idaho City Council meeting was held on July 14, 2021.
Those present were Mayor Philip Canody, Councilmen, Everhart, Secor and Martin.
Councilman Hillyard was absent.

Robert Showalter addressed the Council with information on grants that may be available to Idaho City. He is currently working towards grant writing and would like to offer his services. He would be willing to meet with the engineers on specific grants and information.

Under the Public Works, Director Tami Franklin updated the council on the meter change outs, and the proposal for water sewer rates. She has been working with Idaho Rural Water and hopes to work towards a rate study to address the rate proposal. Councilman Secor offered to help her move a meter pit.

Chief Otter's vehicle is in the shop and he is looking at the possibility of leasing a vehicle from Mountain Home Auto Ranch. Chief Otter and Clerk Ptak will be working on the budget, and money from the "Cares Act" grant will be used to help the cost of the possible vehicle purchase.

Clerk Ptak presented the water bill updates and explained that she and City Attorney Joan Callahan are working toward a solution on how to collect on two of the accounts that have multiple users, trailer parks, and one account which is sewer only. They are trying to figure out how to turn off services and collect money. Many of the tenants are "State subsidized" and that makes it more difficult, but hopefully a solution will be coming soon.

The 3rd quarter budget was presented. All funds are showing less than 75% for spending and all funds are showing reve-

nues higher than expenditures.

Idaho City held a Special Council Meeting July 16, 2021. Mayor Canody called the meeting to order. Councilmen Everhart and Martin were present, Councilman Hillyard was in attendance by phone, and Councilman Secor was absent

Chief Otter presented the council with information to lease a new 2021 Ford Police Interceptor Vehicle. City Attorney Joan Callahan has been working with the Bancorp Bank on the legal wording of the lease, she also negotiated with the Mountain Home Auto Ranch and had the vehicle outfitted and lowered the price. The total amount for the lease is proposed at \$39,601 and \$9,998 for outfitting.

Councilman Everhart made a motion to allow Mayor Canody to sign documents and this was seconded by Councilman Hillyard.

- Have access to experiences through which they can learn to work cooperatively


