



GV Fire Protection Ushers in a New Chapter

By Janet Juroch GARDEN VALLEY -- The Garden Valley community was stunned by the passing of their



Fire Chief, Jon Delvalle, last month. Chief Delvalle contracted COVID-19 during his work. His passing has left the Fire Protection District to regroup and find a path to keep moving forward with the good procedures Delvalle created for a robust fire department and emergency services.

Robert Glankler has been appointed Fire Chief to keep this new chapter going forward. In

Chief would want and expect. He and I had long discussions on his visions.....it is not to be rushed. Our current task at hand is the continued growth and smooth functioning of the Garden Valley Fire Protection District and EMS Services."

His commitment to the community began when Glankler and his wife, Cheri, and two dogs moved to retire in Garden Valley. He became involved in the Garden Valley Fire Department and quickly became Assistant Chief and Training Officer. His credentials speak for themselves. He is respected throughout California Fire according to Cheri. He is a graduate of Stanford University Paramedic Program, achieving the Bachelor of Science Degree in Fire Administration. Glankler has been a professional Firefighter for 35 years. He has worked in every position from Firefighter/Paramedic, Engineer, Captain, Fire Investigator, and on to Battalion Chief. This includes serving as a Fire Science College Professor and Academy Instructor. He has also served as a Strike Team Leader for wildland fires.

His letter states how important it is to keep a "cohesive team" and will keep communications going to meet challenges which Glankler states are "ever changing." He promises His old crews respected him a lot because he always helped, never would ask a firefighter to do anything he wouldn't."

Recently, Chief Glankler had actually retired and hung up his suit only to be called back when Chief Delvalle went into the hospital. Glankler felt the call to return, mainly because he cares so much about the community he resides in. The hole left by Chief Jon Delvalle is far too great to ignore but the community will feel a seamless transition in leadership with the GVFPD staff and volunteers. Cheri has mentioned before, "You just can't take [firefighting/EMS] out of him. No such thing as retiring! Firefighters are Firefighters forever."

This is good news to the community as well.

In his letter, Chief Glankler stated, "We are not at an ending with the close of [Delvalle's] service but at a beginning, the beginning to carry on in emergency services, and let it not be forgotten in the memory of the Chief....it is time to heal. We must move forward as the to keep an open door to everyone, so that he can engage in the concerns and suggestions, seek solutions, and make any transition easier. He understands the commitment the volunteer crew makes. Glankler is making sure the visions of the former Chief are followed through as needed. A seamless change will be the focus.

Chief Glankler is a soft-spoken man in conversation, but he has no problem getting in the trenches. "He always led by example," according to his wife. She revealed that his favorite job was the "Truckie." Truckers are the heavy workers, especially with structure fires. Cheri says, "He is very quiet, and he has seen so much.

September 30, 2021 Pledge of Allegiance

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Closed session for personnel. [Time 9:04 to 9:33 am] No action required.

CONSTITUENT INPUT: None

MINUTES: Chairman Stirm made a motion to accept the official meeting minutes from Sept. 21 and Sept. 23.

SOFTWARE VENDOR: Chairman Stirm opened a discussion regarding the county going with someone else rather than Computer Arts. Clerk Mary Prisco stated: "There's definitely a consensus among the other counties that we've reached our tolerance level with them, but there's also recognition that there's a lack of other alternative softwares."

Prosecutor Adam Strong said that Computer Arts runs the Assessor's Office appraisal system, indigent, financial, Treasurer's Office, and many components. He said it was possible to go with different companies for different things, "I don't think you're going to find one company like Computer Arts that services the needs of the Assessor's Office - unless you have someone go out and design," like Ada County did. "We're probably not big enough for that." Commissioner Stirm suggested reaching out to the other counties who are unpleased with Computer Arts.

Commissioner Twilegar said, "It sounds like there's no solve for this." Prosecutor Strong did point out that Computer Arts does cater to Idaho law. Twilegar would like to contact the National Associa-

tion of Counties.

POLLING PLACES: A motion was made to approve the agreement for polling places for the Ladies Auxiliary Club hall in Horseshoe Bend, the Garden Valley Senior Center, the Centerville Fire Station for the Placerville Precinct, and the Clerk's office in Idaho City for absentee voting.

TRUCKS: There were trucks discussed for purchase with a plow, sander, etc. They are surplus from the Idaho Transportation Department. Chairman Stirm made a motion to approve the purchase of three Mack Trucks from ITD surplus, not to exceed \$40,000. All ayes.

PUBLIC DEFENDER: Chairman Stirm motioned to approve the 2022 contract for the Boise County Public Defender with a fee schedule.

TRAFFIC ENFORCE-MENT GRANT: An agreement with ITD allows for the Sheriff's office to apply for grants. Chairman Stirm motioned to approve the traffic enforcement grant project agreement between the Sheriff's office and ITD.

JUVENILE DETEN-TION: Chairman Stirm made a motion to approve the Boise County/ Canyon County Juvenile Detention housing agreement.

GARDEN VALLEY SRO

AGREEMENT: Sheriff Scott Turner explained, "This is our yearly agreement. We have a yearly agreement with all three school districts. They don't contribute funds to help pay for the SRO [School Resource Officer]." He said there were no changes from last year, and Sheriff Turner is waiting for the other two agreements to come back from the schools. Commissioner Stirm motioned to approve the Garden Valley agreement.

SOLID WASTE FEES: A motion was made for extraordinary waste fees, per Boise County Resolution 2021-46, which set for those extraordinary items [like hot tub disposal]. Another resolution [2021-47] was adopted for an increase of solid waste fees.

OPERATING ON A CASH BASIS: Commissioner Stirm motioned to adopt Resolution 2021-48, "operating on a cash basis. It's a Boise County resolution to operate on a cash basis and carryover for fiscal year 2022 budget." The motion carried.

AUTOPSY: Chairman Stirm looked at the budget and stated, "It looks like we've gone a little bit over our autopsy budget."

BILLS: Chairman Stirm motioned to approve the claims approval report 9/24/2021 in the amount of \$84,458.

EAST BOISE COUNTY AMBULANCE DISTRICT: Chairman Stirm motioned, as the EBCAD Governing Board, to approve the final payroll budget for FY2022. He then motioned for EBCAD to operate on a cash basis and carryover to the FY2022 budget.

CRISIS STANDARD OF CARE: Ms. Potts said, "I just wanted to make you guys aware that this is implemented now." She continued that it has a much greater burden on them, if someone calls 911 and they're not sick enough to be taken by ambulance to the hospital. Potts said they are legally required to transport a patient to the hospital if they want to go. "Now it's on us to try to convince them not to go to the hospital. The hospitals are full." She added that they may need to transfer patients to alternate facilities like Twin Falls.

Taking a volunteer and paying them through a FEMA grant was discussed, because there is money available for health care workers.

JUVENILE JUSTICE: They helped with the kid's carnival for Idaho City Days. Ms. Leader said it was a fund-raiser for the department.




WILDERNESS RANCH FIRE DISTRICT OFFERS FREE SMOKE DETECTORS







were making COVID preparations and made sure EMS was aware.

PLANNING & ZONING: Mr. Gross said that they are a little short-staffed due to illness. They are getting some backlog. He said there is more work that needs to be done on the Unified Land Ordinance. There is a cell tower hearing on October 21st at the courthouse in Idaho City with the Planning and Zoning Commission.

WEEDS: Boise County Weed Dept. is still spraying for weeds, as long as the weather holds. "We'll try and get some of the sterilization chemicals down, which we always do in the fall anyways," said Mr. Rekow. "For bare ground around fire breaks and some of the guardrail stuff on the Banks Lowman Highway."

SHERIFF: Sheriff Scott Turner said that they have not slowed down. They will be bringing on new people and hope to get caught up.

He was concerned because he received word that the dealership they go through for replacement police vehicles is not going to manufacture any $\frac{1}{2}$ ton pickups.

CLERK: Clerk Mary Prisco said they were working on submitting all the taxing district information to the State Taxing Commission.

She said that next they will be focusing on some policies, "Number one, personnel policy because it has not been updated since October of 2014." The insurance for the county has a templet she will be using.

PUBLIC HEARING: Commissioner Stirm motioned to approve the partial plat amendment [to share the property with his son to build a home] with the stipulation that the proposed conditions be met on a property in Clear Creek. **HEARING FOR BUD-GET 2021:** Clerk Prisco said that they are required to open the current year budget and the yearend for a Public Hearing. They will look at an amendment budget. There was no public comment and no public present. Chairman Stirm motioned to adopt Resolution 2021-49, a resolution as an amendment to the adoption of the 2021 budget "for paying current expenses for Boise County, Idaho for fiscal year beginning on the first day of October 2020 and ending on the 30th day of September 2021." The motion carried.

EAST BOISE COUNTY AMBULANCE: Commissioner Stirm motioned to adopt Resolution 2021-07 adopting an amendment to the FY2021 budget to pay the current expenses for the EBCA District.

Adjourned at 2:33 pm.

A plat amendment for lots for a public hearing last week was discussed briefly. Chairman Stirm motioned to approve the findings of fact for the partial plat amendment. **DEMAND WARRANTS:** Chairman Stirm made a motion for the trucks that were ordered last week to pay the Idaho Transportation Department \$36,000. He then motioned to pay Payee #4 [death penalty case] in the amount of \$4,837.50 for confidential legal services. **INDIGENT:** None

STATE EMS: Stirm said he had invited a gentleman from State EMS, "Just so everybody knows, they offer a service to counties where they will evaluate your EMS program for free. So, I think with the current situation with the county in general, with losing Chief Delvalle and all, and Horseshoe Bend and all that, that it would be a good opportunity to start looking at what we can do to make changes to benefit everybody."

PUBLIC HEARING ON A VARIANCE: A gentleman said he had a piece of property in Terrace Lakes with a steep slope and put fill in over a year ago. He's concerned about building on it. Immediate neighbors signed off on the conditions of the variance. Mr. Gross with P&Z presented the findings and referenced the ordinance.

There was no public comment.


Chairman Stirm made a motion to approve the setback for the property owner due to the undue hardship to have to add more fill and level it out on the backside. The property is far too sloped on the backside to make an accommodation. It was seconded by Commissioner Twilegar, and approved.

Public Announcement

A logging operation is taking place along Granite Creek Road from Placerville, and will continue on through Alder Creek Road in the coming weeks. The purpose of this operation is to clear trees hindering the future path for Idaho Power to run another line to improve reliability to Placerville, Idaho City, and other areas throughout east Boise County. This new line would create power redundancy. The logging operation will likely continue through the middle of December 2021.


Boise County's Road Superintendent Curtis Dill said that motorists should expect long delays, lasting up to one hour, to allow trees to be taken down and cleared from the roadway. Flaggers will be controlling traffic and operations will take place from Monday through Friday. Signage will be placed in strategic areas and motorists are advised to consider alternate routes of travel during this time.

In addition, motorists should expect to see increased logging traffic along Harris Creek Road. Renfro Logging in Horseshoe Bend anticipates that there will be four to five truck loads a day.







Digital Land Records Become Searchable





Sophomore Annelie Wilson brought in 15 kills (an attack on the ball which is not returnable by the opposing team), 3 aces (a serve which is unable to be played or returned by the opposing team), 5 digs (passing a spiked or hard hit ball), and 1 assist (pass, set, or dig ball to another player who gets the kill). Sophomore Abby Howerton had 5 kills, 2 aces, and 3 digs. Freshman Aliyah Meyer had 3 kills, 3 aces, 1 block (blocking the ball into the opponent's court leading to a point or side out), 8 digs, and 26 assists while senior Kenzie Renfro contributed 9 digs.

The Lady Mustangs hosted the Tri-Valley Titans for Horseshoe Bend's Homecoming game and Senior Night on Friday, October 8. The assembled crowd honored seniors Lilly Fellom (who was also crowned as Homecoming Queen before the game), Kloe McReynolds, Lexi Roberts, Kenzie Renfro, and Katie Vavra (also a Homecoming Princess) as they played their last home game of the season against the Titans.

Stat leaders for the game were Renfro with 8 kills and 3 digs, Wilson (Sophomore Homecoming Princess) with 8 kills, 2 aces, 1 block, and 6 digs. Fellom was on the board with 4 kills and 4 blocks and Meyer (representing the Freshman class as their Homecoming Princess) had 1 kill, 5 aces, 9 digs, and 29 assists in the 25-10, 25-11, 25-8 match.

The win put the Varsity Mustangs 8-0 in conference play and 14-0 overall for the season. The Junior Varsity team won as well, going 25-23 and 25-13 against Tri-Valley.

Standing 6'1" Wilson is a dominating presence on the court and she's well on the way to all-conference and all-state honors, duplicating her freshman year's outing.

The Lady Mustangs finish up regular season play on Monday, October 11 in New Meadows and on Thursday, October 14 in Cascade before heading to the District Tournament in McCall on Saturday, October 16.
