"Finished Business" for Horseshoe Bend State Champions

-- Throughout the 2021 Volleyball season, the Horseshoe Bend Lady Mustang Volleyball team's moto has been "Unfinished Business." After a tough loss in 2020 to the Tri-Valley Titans, who came in to the tournament as a play-in team and ultimately won the state title, the Lady Mustangs felt they had something to prove. They finished in 3rd place in last year's 1A Division II state competition but set their sights even higher this year.

Traveling up to Lewiston, after a HUGE send-off from the school and community on Thursday, October 28, the Mustangs, who ended their season undefeated (15-0 overall, 10-0 in conference), met up with the Hansen Huskies in Match #1 of tournament play on Friday, October 29 at 9:00 a.m. The Mustangs took the win in 3 matches (25-11, 25-16, 25-16) and advanced to Match #7 against the Rockland Bulldogs at 4:00 p.m. The ladies defeated the Rockland team in 3 matches (25-16, 25-18, 25-15). The win against Rockland sent Horseshoe Bend to match #12 at 11:00 a.m. on Saturday, October 30 against their fellow Long Pin Conference rivals the Council Lumberjacks.

A close first game (25-23) had the Mustangs digging deep to take the next games 25-6, 25-16, and the match victory.

At 4:00 p.m. the Horseshoe Bend team found themselves vying for the state title as they took on the Rockland Bulldogs for the second time in the tournament. The 25-10, 25-19, 25-20 win gave the Mustangs the 1A DII Idaho State Volleyball Championship title and they officially changed their 2021 season motto to "Finished Business."

The team is composed of senior Lilly Fellom, senior Kloe McReynolds, senior Kenzie Renfro, sophomore Olivia Bauer, sophomore Abby Howerton, sophomore Kaylin Penney, sophomore Alaina Rane, sophomore Torey Tschida, sophomore Annelie Wilson, freshman Aliyah Meyer, and freshman Ashlyn Wolsleben.





Forest Service Prescribed Fires

Southwest Idaho spring prescribed fire burning planned

BOISE COUNTY — Southwest Idaho interagency fire managers anticipate favorable spring weather conditions for planned moderate complexity understory burns and low complexity pile burning operations. Prescribed fires are designed to reduce hazardous vegetation (fuels), large wildfire potential to communities, and improve wildlife habitat. Pile burning is designed to reduce hazardous vegetation (fuels) generated from logging, non-commercial thinning operations, and administrative site clearing.

Weather and conditions permitting, prescribed burns are scheduled to start in October and continue through February. Approximately 410 acres are planned for ignition in 2 project areas within the Boise National Forest. In addition to understory and broadcast burning, a number of landing and hand piles are planned for ignition in 17 different locations within the Boise National Forest.

Public and firefighter safety is always the top priority in all public land fire operations. Fire managers develop burn plans with prescriptions that account for safety, specific fuels/weather conditions, and potential smoke impacts. All prescribed burns are closely evaluated and are only approved when favorable conditions are present.

Prescribed burns may affect people sensitive to smoke and may impact access to burn areas and travel routes. Fire officials strongly advise forest visitors and homeowners to prepare and plan activities around the proposed dates and locations of burns and to use extreme caution near prescribed fire areas.

Please be aware of firefighters and equipment in the area and on roadways, comply with posted notices and drive slowly in areas with decreased visibility.

All planned burning during this time frame will be pile burning, which will generate smoke but have low probability of fire spread beyond the footprint of the piles due to time of year, weather, and adjacent fuels conditions.

Information and signs will be posted on roads that access burn areas in advance of ignitions and will remain in place through burn completion.





We think "Rest in Peace" doesn't really fit Jean Brown. We imagine her running and hugging and letting out a huge yahoo!





Idaho City Council Meeting Notes

IDAHO CITY -- On September 22, Mayor Phillip Canody was absent, and Council President Tom Secor called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. The first action item was paying the bills from September 9, 2021 through September 22, 2021 in the amount of \$17,2347.61. All council members, Tom Secor, Ken Everhart, and David Martin agreed, and the action was approved.

Ken Everhart made a motion to open the public hearing of the 2021-2022 Fiscal Year budget, this was seconded by David Martin and Council member Tom Secor agreed. They asked for comments or concerns from citizens. There was no input, none were in attendance to comment. City Clerk Nancy Ptak provided copies for everyone present and announced that it had been published in the Idaho World, on September 8, and 15, 2021. Council Member Ken Everhart read the budget and noted there were no public comments, and made a motion to close the public hearing. This was seconded by Council member, David Martin, and Council member Tom Secor agreed.

The Engineer's report stated that there would be a charge order for the well cap on the RO system. The prestart to check all items will happen on the 4th of October and the start update should be the 18th of October.

Under new business there was a request for a lot combination in the Mores Creek Crossing. Kent and Tiffany Johnson presented the council with the necessary documents, and it was noted that they still needed a letter of acceptance from the HOA before taking it to the county to have it recorded. They will be required to have a survey in order to adjust the property lot line description for taxing and parcel information. Mr. Jonson said he would get the necessary documents and submit them to Clerk Ptak. Everhart made a motion to approve the lot combination for Mores Creek Crossing lots 27 and 28, contingent on approval from the HOA of Mores Creek Crossing. This was seconded by Council member David Martin and all agreed.

2021/2022" for potential use in subsequent years as described in Idaho Code #63-802, et, al, in the amount of \$9271.00. This was seconded by David Martin and all agreed.

Council member David Martin made a motion to approve Resolution 2021-04 "Setting Fees for Various City Fees for Permits and Use for Fiscal Year 2021/2022," this was seconded by Ken Everhart and approved by all.

Council member Ken Everhart moved that pursuant to Section 50-902, Idaho Code, the rule requiring that ordinances be read on three different days, two readings of which may be by title only and one reading of which shall be in full shall be dispensed with and that Ordinance No. 365 be considered immediately. This was seconded by David Martin and all council members agreed.

Ken Everhart moved that Ordinance No. 365 be in effect now (immediately) before the council and be approved, this was seconded by David Martin, and all agreed.

The Historical Preservation Commission, represented by Rhonda Jameson, informed the Idaho City Council of a letter of intent from an applicant who would be on the next agenda.

Doug Pottinger asked the council members if a canoe would be allowed in the pond at the Visitor's Center for the "Mountain Man" participants during the Idaho City Days event? He was told "no" by Chief Otter and the council members. It would require life vests, lifeguards, and would not be advised or allowed.

Under the Public Works Department, Tami Claus asked the council about pouring concrete at the "doghouse" for the RO System. They suggested hand mixing since it was a small area. Tom Secor offered a mixer she could use. She continued her report: The sewer plant battery on the generator had to be replaced and the yearly maintenance will happen. The computer went out and will be replaced with one from City Hall and IT will pull information off the old one and load it on the new one. The sand bays should be done by next week, and she is looking for volunteers, and will contact the county probation office and see if there are people who need some hours to serve.

The Law Enforcement de-

partment, Chief Otter ad-

dressed the council and stated the new computer system is up and running. He is just waiting for the cameras to get connected. His new car still needs to have items finished and will not be done until November.

Clerk Ptak gave an update on some information that may help people with past due water accounts and will put it on the next agenda. It is a program through WICAP, and Idaho City will need to be set up as a vendor in order to receive the funds from the State of Idaho.

City Attorney Joan Callahan said she is having some students working pro bono. They will work on RV ordinances; overdue water, and sewer bills. The meeting adjourned at 6:40 p.m.

The regular City Council meeting for October 13, 2021 was called to order by Mayor Phillip Canody at 6:07 p.m. All of the council members were present. Tom Secor, Ken Everhart, H.D. Hillyard, and David Martin.

After the Pledge of Allegiance, the council agreed to pay the bills dated September 23, 2021 through October 13, 2021 in the amount of \$28, 033.08.

The audit for 2019-2020 was conducted by Bailey and Company, presented by Cassie Zattiero. This audit will be available at City hall and digitally. Clerk Ptak will put it on the website, also.

A communicable disease policy from ICRMP was presented to the council by Clerk Ptak. This will be reviewed and added to the next agenda.

A new member of the Historical Commission, Rebecca Emery, was appointed. Council easy task due to availability. RO system is still getting some finishing touches before operation, chemicals need to be ordered for startup and figuring out shelf life and the amount that the city will be going through for the RO. They are also installing insulation in the meters to be winter ready.

Council man Ken Everhart suggested Public Works director Tami Claus should order new batteries for the meter readers. He has not heard much about the water right issues, but he does know the engineers are looking into it and in contact with the city water master.

Chief Otter was unavailable. Clerk Ptak gave updates regarding the new hotspots, emails and phones ordered or being put into place. The new police officer Archuleta will be starting full time in November.

Clerk Ptak gave an update on the end of fiscal year billing and procedures. The comments on the audit were addressed as policies in place already, such as bank statements and vouchers getting the required signatures. Considering the city had to deal with a lot during the COVID-19 shutdown, it was minimal. Clerk Ptak thanked the council for doing their due diligence in trying to keep some sense of order and compliance throughout the last year. Council had been given updates on the water and sewer billing delinquencies. She also hopes to have a year end balance.

City Attorney Joan Callahan has been working on the past due water and sewer accounts and has been contacted by one of them to start up a payment agreement, the others need more work done to make sure of the proper ownership of the properties. She is still working on ordinances and hopes to have them available for the upcoming meeting. She has also received a student that was a city clerk in the past, a great fit for the local tax proposal.

Brittany Crawford addressed the council as one of the "outstanding water and sewer bills" that may be getting a lien on the property if counsel makes that determination. She told them the property is for sale and is hoping to have it sold quickly and then the proceeds would go to the outstanding bills, she has had an offer on it and should know soon. Council thanked her for coming forward and will wait to see what happens in the next few weeks. She was hoping to not to have to get a loan to pay the bills but would if needed.

Mayor Phillip Canody has been in contact with the Forest Service District Ranger regarding the beaver dams along Elk Creek near the airport, the concern is that there could be flooding, and it would be harmful to critical city infrastructure, i.e., the sewer plant, not to mention the sheriff's office and other buildings in the area. The district ranger has been in contact with a trapper and someone to remove debris. The mayor just wanted the council to keep this in mind for the future; it will most likely be an ongoing issue.

Citizen Tony Bell asked the city council if there could be more signs or something to deal with speeding traffic on Elk Creek. The City Attorney, Joan Callahan, stated there were signs posted, council members and Mayor Canody explained that the new hire for the police department will be doing mostly traffic duties.

Regarding ordinances and resolutions:

Ken Everhart made a motion to approve "A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Idaho City, Idaho, Reserving the Forgone amount for Fiscal year member Tom Secor made the motion and it was seconded by Council member David Martin with all in agreement.
