Honoring Xinia, a Pioneer of Boise County

Xinia Idaho Jones journeyed back to her heavenly home on December 29, 2021. She was born November 11, 1929 to Lewis and Mabel Arbaugh in Pioneererville, ID on the ranch that her parents homesteaded in 1908. She lived there year 'round all her life except for the last 4 ½ years that she spent at River's Edge Rehabilitation in Emmett, Idaho.

Her childhood was spent helping the family with the Ranch. Weather and chores permitting, she attended classes in the old schoolhouse at the bottom of Grimes Pass. Her mother was a teacher herself, so she was taught mostly at home. There was always plenty of haying, hauling, preserving, tending to the animals, fencing, and chopping wood that needed to be done. That lifestyle lasted throughout her whole life as she continued to reside on the homestead.

She married James A. Jones

on June 10, 1962. Raising turkeys, rabbits, and chickens was always a source of income for Xinia. Many Thanksgivings were spent with one of her big, tasty birds squeezed into the oven. She also kept records for the National Weather Service for 60 years, for which she received many recognition awards. Xinia's door was always open to friends and family who came to enjoy the splendor of her alpine home. She was a "Mountain Woman" in every sense of the word. Her pet dogs and cats were devoted companions and an important part of her life.

Xinia was a member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and attended the Idaho City Branch/Ward. She had also served in the Boise Temple as an ordinance worker. Additionally, she was a faithful attendee at the Senior Center in Idaho City.

She is survived by her son,

Larry (Shannon); granddaughter Cassandra; great grandsons, Hayden Jones, Lucas Brock; great granddaughter, Allison Brock; and a huge host of nieces and nephews with greats and great-greats.

She is preceded in death by her spouse, Jimmy; her parents; brother, Jack; sisters, Ruth, Nettie, Nellie; and granddaughters, Jessica Lee Jones and Brittany Jones Brock.

Arrangements are through Potter's Funeral Chapel in Emmett. Services will be held Saturday, January 15th at 2 pm with a viewing prior to that from 1-1:45 at The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Idaho City on Hwy 21.

The family would like to express a deep appreciation to all those who gave of their time and efforts to help Xinia in her quest to remain on the homestead for so many years and to the staff at River's Edge Rehab & Assisted Living in Emmett for their loving care and kindness on Xinia's behalf.

December 28, 2021

Present: Commissioners Ryan Stirm, Steven Twilegar, and Robert “Ted” Holmes

Pledge of Allegiance

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Closed session for a personnel issue. [Time 9:05 am to 9:28 am] Chairman Stirm said there was no action required.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Closed session for pending litigation. [Time 9:29 am to 9:45 am] Chairman Stirm again said that there was no action required.

CONSTITUENT INPUT: A resident from the Mores Creek Rim Ranches spoke regarding a conditional use permit for a cell phone tower, an appeal set for January 12th with the commissioners. He was concerned that the cell phone tower company has “not been transparent” and that the company wanted the appeal set out until March. The proposed tower location is next to the Robie Creek Fire Department. He stated, “All of the people in the community are very upset about this and are trying to do what’s right and get the right communication out.”

MEETING MINUTES: Commissioner Stirm motioned to accept the meeting minutes from December 14th and the December 14th special meeting

minutes.

SHERIFF’S OFFICE VACATION ACCRUAL: Clerk Mary Prisco said there were exceptions in the Personnel Policy for the cutoff for vacation accruals. Commissioner Stirm stated that all county employees know, “we have to use or lose vacation time. Due to the nature of business that certain individuals do, they weren’t able to use that. So, we’re going to vote to make an exception to that policy to allow that individual to carry-over time into the next year.” Chairman Stirm motioned to approve that variance to the policy.

SHERIFF’S VESSEL FUND: Clerk Prisco said that they need to specify what the remaining funds in the account are to be used for, and a truck was discussed as a potential purchased with the remaining marine vessel funds. Commissioner Stirm motioned to approve the vehicle quote for \$36,159 from the Sheriff’s vessel fund. He then motioned to “upfit the truck” with communication equipment in the amount of \$10,403.50.

PAYING OFF THE LEASES: Commissioner Stirm presented a document, “This is for paying off all of the vehicles leases that we currently

have, instead of paying the lease.” He asked the Sheriff if it was fifty pages for signature, and Sheriff Turner replied that it was all the title paperwork that goes in with the check. Stirm motioned to have the Sheriff sign the vehicle lease contracts.

ROAD AND BRIDGE: The annual financial report was discussed with the commissioners for the Boise County Road and Bridge Department, which is submitted to the Idaho Transportation Department.

Purchase of a lowboy trailer was discussed to haul the grader equipment with ramps. Curtis Dill said that in the past they had to pay someone to help move their graders and “it can be pretty pricy.” Commissioner Twilegar asked how the tires were and Dill said pretty good. Commissioner Stirm motioned to approve the purchase of a lowboy trailer 2002 in the amount of \$3,846.

PUBLIC DEFENSE EXPENSES: Clerk Mary Prisco stated, “We spent almost \$200,000 in fiscal year ’21 on public defense expenses. That includes the primary public defender, the conflicts, the investigators. It also includes the unreimbursed expenses under the capital [punishment] case that we had. To the extent that

there’s evaluations ordered by the public defense, those are in there.” Commissioner Stirm pointed out that they had so few court dates.

Commissioner Holmes said he had a question, “I’ve always had a little bit of heartburn because of a lack of transparency with this and I think the public should know that we can’t do it as commissioners. But, you want to know where your money goes, and is spent. On this document, it doesn’t tell you how much time or who’s doing what. All it is, is a dollar amount going to the public defender’s office. I don’t like it; I like to see accountability and transparency. As far as I’m concerned, there is none with this, and that’s my personal opinion.”

Clerk Prisco explained that the capital crimes had to be totally confidential. Holmes continued by saying that it was taxpayer’s money.

Commissioner Stirm motioned to approve the primary defense commission’s indigent expenditure report for FY2021.

ELECTION CONFERENCE: The annual election conference is on January 4, 5, and 6th, and the clerk and the election clerk will both be in attendance. The deputy clerk

will also be attending on January 6th.

ASSESSOR / TREASURER TAX CANCELLATION REQUESTS: Treasurer Gina Turner and Prosecutor Adam Strong explained that residents have a year to apply for the homeowners’ exemptions. Commissioner Stirm motioned to approve a long string of tax cancellations, reading them into the record.

PLANNING AND ZONING: Mr. Alex Gross asked that the commissioners sign off on a final land plat amendment, which had been previously approved. It had also been signed by the treasurer and assessor. Chairman Stirm motioned to sign the plat amendment.

JUVENILE JUSTICE: Ms. Amanda Leader said she fully supported the idea of having a grant writer for the county, but expressed some concerns. “Each department would essentially benefit from their own grant writer,” and wondered if one department would be favored above others.

BOISE COUNTY SEARCH AND RESCUE: A mutual aid agreement was presented to the board. This will

be put on the agenda in two weeks.

BILLS: Commissioner Stirm motioned to approve the claims approval report dated 12/21/2021 in the amount of \$100,983.35.

DEMAND WARRANTS: Stirm motioned to pay engineering fees in the amount of \$855 for the Hass Subdivision project. He then motioned to pay \$169,466.84 for the vehicle lease buyout for the sheriff's vehicles. This was approved with all ayes, and the motion carried.

EAST BOISE COUNTY AMBULANCE DISTRICT: The governing board motioned to pay \$3,309 for EBCAD

scheduling software.

EMERGENCY MANAGER/ FORESTER: Ms. Richardson spoke about a class she took and passed. There's another conference she has in Boise next month. She updated the Board on the progress that has been made.

ASSESSOR: Mr. Chris Juszczak said they are just plugging away without any more job applications. "Right now we're starting to analyze our sales to help develop next year's values. You know, the number of sales slowdown in the winter time, but the dollar amount is not showing any sign of slowing down at all." He said that they were answering a lot of tax questions this year.

PLANNING AND ZONING: Mr. Gross said that building permits had slowed up a bit, but there are some developments starting next year [2022] already coming.

ROAD AND BRIDGE: Mr. Dill said, "Actually, the crew is doing great." They ran slightly behind schedule on Banks Lowman Road, due to a combination of traffic and new crews. The new grader is supposed to arrive in two weeks. "The cool part about this new grader and lease program, is that it's got a government fail-safe. If the grader goes down, *they're bringing us one.*"

WASTE SITES: When asked about this department, Mr. Paul Rekow joked, "Still

hauling trash. We haven't slowed down. We're still doing about 100 tons a week." He will be attending a noxious weed conference.

SHERIFF: "Busy, it hasn't slowed down," Sheriff Turner said.

COMMUNITY JUSTICE: Ms. Leader said their caseload was slow but is going up and increasing. She asked if there were opportunities for service in regards to grounds maintenance that she could add to their list.

PROSECUTOR: Mr. Strong said they have had a deputy prosecutor position open for three or four months and no applicants, but did get a few last week. Commissioner Twilegar asked if they had law degrees. Prosecutor Strong said they did.

He spoke in regards to the capital murder case, "He [Benjamin Poirier] pled guilty of first degree murder. He's supposed to be sentenced in January, but that's going to be happening in March. The family of the victim is very happy to be moving on from this stage of that." It has been two years the tragedy for which Poirier is

being sentenced happened in Horseshoe Bend.

CLERK: "Well, the biggest news that I have is I was successful in registering for the American Rescue Act funding for local governments," Clerk Prisco said. "We will be getting a payment of \$760,540." She plans on putting this in a separate trust account, "because there are very strict limitations" on what the county can spend that amount. "So, even if we don't spend it on anything, we get to earn interest on it and keep that interest."

She would like to get working on the personnel policy soon and update it.

BOISE STREET BRIDGE: Prisco addressed the emails she had been receiving directly regarding the Boise Street Bridge. She said, "I just want to get on public record that I have no authority over repairing any bridges in this county." Twilegar said he had been contacted by some of the businesses and individuals that wanted the job. He said, "There was a storm of all the people who didn't pay attention," when it was taken off the long-term



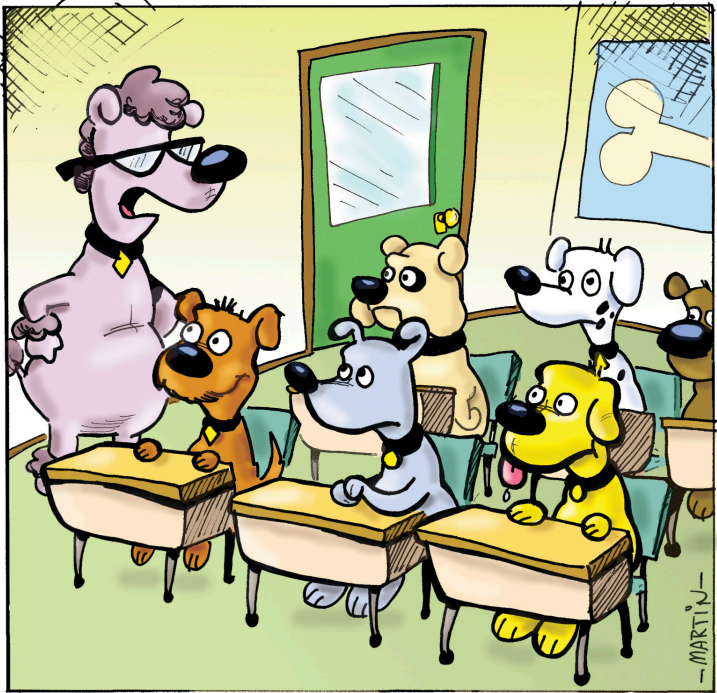

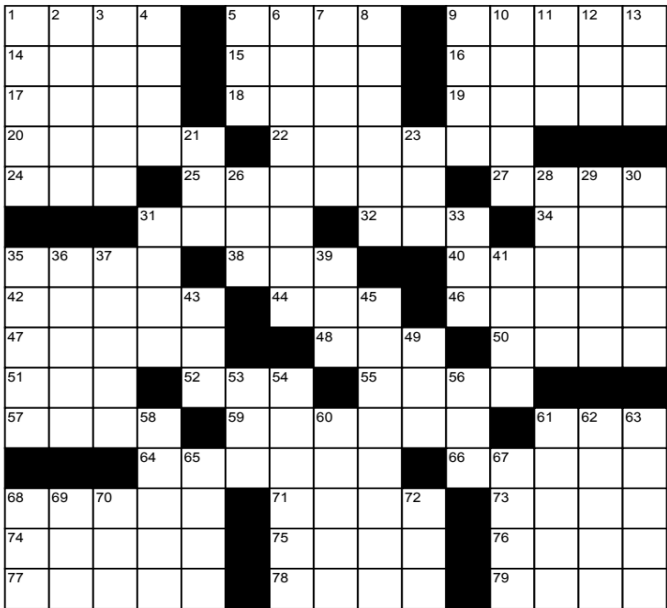

Horseshoe Bend Boys' Basketball

HORSESHOE BEND -- The Horseshoe Bend Boys Varsity Mustang Basketball Team was on the road over the winter break to participate in the Truckstop.com basketball tournament in New Plymouth. On Tuesday, 12/28 the 1A DII Long Pin Conference Mustangs (2-5 overall, 1-0 conference) fell to the 1A Sawtooth Conference Carey Panthers (5-4 overall) with a final score of 54-70. Sophomore Porter Larson was the high scorer of the game, coming out with

20 total points. Senior Decker Larson had 17 points, senior Colten Meyer had 13 points, while sophomores Nic Cooper and Kaelun Jones each had 2 points. Day two of the tournament pitted Horseshoe Bend against the 3A Eastern Oregon Conference's JV Vale Vikings (7-4 overall). The Mustangs came out on top in the matchup with a final score of 48-38. Meyer was on top of the leaderboard with 18 total points followed by D. Larson with 10 points, P. Larson with 9 points, Jones

with 4 points, Cooper with 3 points, sophomore Carson Drake with 3 points, and junior Blayne Meyer with 1 point. The third and final day of competition had the Mustangs squaring off against the JV New Plymouth Pilgrims (7-3 overall) from the A1 Western Idaho Conference. Horseshoe Bend fell to New Plymouth 44-54. P. Larson finished with 13 total points. C. Meyer had 11 points, D. Larson had 8 points, Cooper contributed 6, junior Jedi Graham had 4 points, and Jones had 2.

The varsity Mustangs are in Riggins on Saturday, January 8 to play in a 1A DII Long Pin Conference game against the Salmon River Savages (2-3 overall, 1-1 conference) at 4:30.

The team will be in Garden Valley to take on the Wolverines (4-1 overall, 1-0 conference) in conference play on Tuesday, January 11. JV tip off time is 6:00 followed by varsity play at 7:00. The Mustangs travel to Council on Thursday, January 13 for a Long Pin conference game against the Lumberjacks (4-3 overall, 2-0 conference). Tip off time is 6:00 for the JV team, 7:00 for varsity.

list. Prosecutor Strong recounted that, "The Board discussed it a few months ago and everyone that showed up at the meeting, right then said that they didn't want it fixed. They didn't want the traffic. They can go around." Commissioner Twilegar agreed. Commissioner Holmes put in, "and it's a lot of money."

FUTURE AGENDAS: The 501c3 for the Boise County Search and Rescue will be scheduled in a few weeks, and may need to be adjusted.

Commissioner Stirn addressed the proposed cell phone tower in Robie Creek, "We're going to reschedule the hearing date for the Horizon cell phone tower. Now, keeping with the policy that we have in place, we have picked the 17th of February at 9:30 am. The latest they could go would be the 1st of March. So, we're going to give them until the 17th

of February for that hearing." This would be on a Thursday. He continued, "That gives everyone time to handle what they need to handle, including our office."

Prosecutor Strong later said, as to other items to cover, "We ran out of time this morning in executive, and so I do have a quick update on a heavy lawsuit that we need to do."

Commissioner Stirn said there was a meeting with Central District Health before Christmas, and although he was not there, it was null and void because of an alleged violation. "I don't know exactly what transpired, but essentially the gist of it was the complaint was that because the meeting – the individuals were not physically allowed in the actual room with the board, that it was an open meeting violation. Therefore, they wanted everything redone." Chairman Stirn continued, "And it was a questionable thing because techni-

cally with COVID and everything, the law has changed a little bit with open meetings in regards to allowing the public to attend when it exceeds a certain number of people. But to be on the safe side, the board decided they would just re-hold the meeting and do everything again." He stated that there were no major decisions made during that meeting, just paying of the bills and a few other items on the agenda.

ROAD AND STREET FINANCIAL REPORT: Chairman Stirn motioned to approve the annual road and street financial report for the Boise County Road and Bridge Department. All ayes and the motion carried.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Closed session for pending litigation. [Time 11:14 am to 11:27 am] Commissioner Stirn said there was no action required.

Adjourned at 11:28 am.

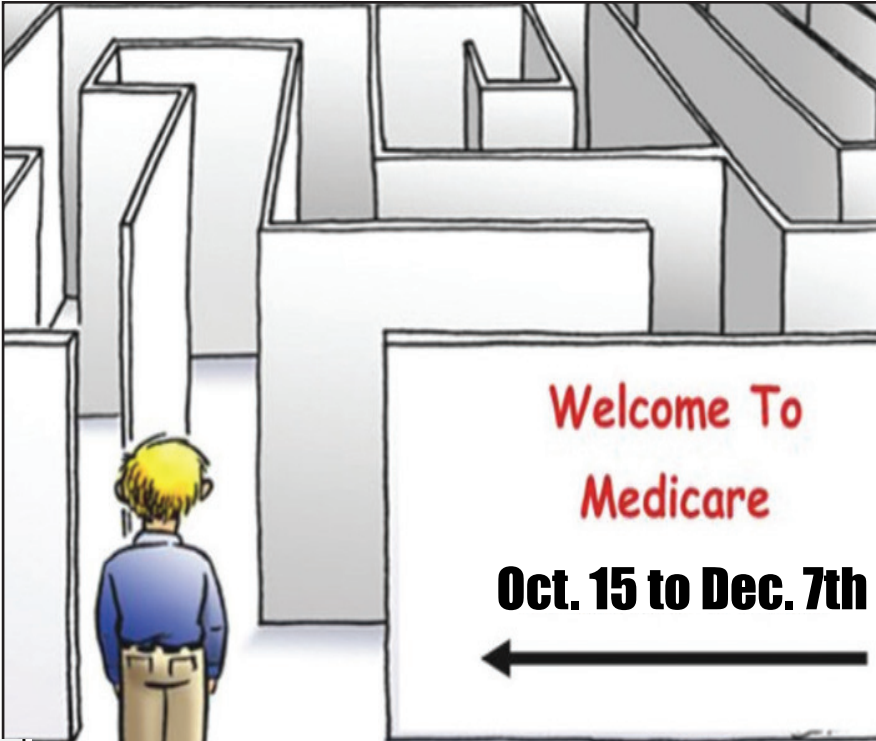
