Heating Up In Horseshoe Bend City Council

HORSESHOE BEND --

The following is a synopsis of the Horseshoe Bend City Council meeting on April 13, 2022. Twenty-six people were in attendance for the meeting, including three Boise County Sheriff's deputies. Joining in via the city's Zoom link were eight additional observers. All council members were in attendance.

Mayor Goff made the call to order at 7:00 p.m. then led the Pledge of Allegiance, and after unanimous approval of the agenda, minutes from the previous meeting, and the authorization to pay the city's bills, Goff opened the first of two public hearings.

First on the agenda was rezoning the city's property located at 382 Highway 55, which would be the first step in turning the property into a city park. City attorney Tony Pantera spoke to how the property, while originally intended as a well site, was now being considered for a potential park. The property sits on 1.8 acres, down from the 2.5 acres purchased due to a land transfer to Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) for the new ID-55 bridge improvements. The city received \$10,000 for the land transfer. (According to city treasurer Terri Nolan, an additional \$11,000 was taken in for rental of the property during

construction.) Pantera told the council that the city's comprehensive plan supports the rezoning for public use. (During Pantera's presentation, several people were speaking loudly in the audience. When they were asked to keep it down, one of the women responded by flipping the bird at the back of the requestor's head.)

Councilmember Martye White asked Pantera if he thought that anything illegal transpired in purchasing the property. Pantera responded, "No."

Councilmember Stephen Chartier asked if a study of the traffic flow near the property had been conducted. Pantera said, "I don't know that answer, I don't believe so."

There was no staff report presented. Mayor Goff asked for testimony in favor of the rezone. David Bailey, who recently went before the city for his own rezone and annexation request for the Deer Valley subdivision, spoke in favor of the rezone, saying it made sense. He stated that he has been working with the Horseshoe Bend Valley Chamber of Commerce on sketching plans and that information regarding the proposed park will go to ITD, but not for a formal traffic study. One other person in attendance indicated on the sign up sheet that they were in favor of the rezone but did not wish

to testify.

In opposition, former mayoral candidate Dave Jakovac commended the council for holding a public hearing on the rezoning. He proceeded to tell the council that the property in question had been purchased with misappropriated funds. He suggested that foul play may have occurred since the property's conveyance papers were notarized after the death of the previous property owner. He asked the council to consider having the property appraised and then auctioning it off. Jakovac's main complaint

seemed to be that the city didn't have a budget for a park and that no drawings of the proposed park have been made available to the public. He said that based on some local expertise, it would cost \$610,000 to build a park on the property, not including maintenance and upkeep.

Goff broke in to tell Jakovac that his three minutes had elapsed, but Jakovac continued, asking for the park to be put to a citizen vote before leaving the dais.

No one came forward as a neutral party.

Mayor Goff then asked for a rebuttal to the opposition. Pantera said, "I stand by my earlier comments."

The public hearing closed at 7:14 p.m.

Next on the agenda was the public hearing for the Woods' Veterans Memorial Park. Kaylene Woods opened the hearing by talking about the evolution of the city and how community members have always come together to take care of one another. She stated that she had been raised to give back and that the property the park is to be located on land previously belonging to her family. She told the council that while the park will be a huge undertaking, it will add "vast value" to the community and improve the value of adjacent properties. Woods sees the park be-

ing built in several phases with both grant monies and fundraising. She closed by saying, "I look forward to pushing forward and engaging with the community."

LaDona Bauer spoke in favor of the park. She told the council that her property sits right behind the park property and that she has no problem with the city "creating a safe, more beautiful place for the community to enjoy." Three others signed up in favor of the park but chose not to give testimony.

In opposition, Jakovac agreed that a veterans memorial would be something special to have in town, but he objected to its location. He also told the council that he believes councilmember Patti Burgess and Mayor Goff have a conflict of interest because of their relationship to the Horseshoe Bend Valley Chamber of Commerce and asked that they recuse themselves from any vote pertaining to the Horseshoe Bend Veterans Memorial. (Burgess currently serves on the executive board as the community coordinator and Goff's Idaho Pest Control business is a chamber member). Jakovac asked the council to state who was responsible for securing the grant that would enable putting in sidewalks on the western side of ID-55, to which Mayor Goff responded

Present: Commissioners Steven Twilegar, Ryan Stirm (via phone), and Ted Holmes

Pledge of Allegiance

CONSTITUENT INPUT: None

MINUTES: Chairman Twilegar motioned to approve the minutes from March 15th. The motion carried.

PLANNING & ZONING: Alex Gross, department head with the P&Z department, stated: "We are just getting absolutely overwhelmed with calls, applications, pre-ap [application] meetings, our phone is absolutely ringing off the hook. Sometimes all four of us are on the phone at once and it's still ringing." He said they were further ahead of building permits and applications than they have been in the past three years. He is concerned that they are not getting the work done, "You get interrupted and you have to figure out where you are again. And then mistakes were made and we've had a couple of those." Mr. Gross would like to close the office to the public on Fridays, "turn the phones off, lock the door, so that my staff and I have some time to focus on tasks..." [Ad on page 6] Commissioner Holmes said, "If that's what you think it will take to be effective, I'm for it!" Gross said he would like to try it. Chairman Twilegar was

in favor but recognized that the public may be upset. He said, "People are going to be mad about it, but if you can't get work done." Gross said that people are getting mad because it's taking so long and mistakes were made. He added, "I would rather not make mistakes." The commissioners encouraged the Planning and Zoning Department to try closing on Fridays.

SOLID WASTE: Some part-time employees were discussed. Chairman Twilegar motioned for several pay raises. These were approved.

GRASSHOPPERS: Grasshopper / Mormon Cricket season is coming and the county has a program planned. Paul Rekow said that the program primarily affect the hay growers in Horseshoe Bend. He said agricultural growers with five acres or more are eligible for assistance from the state. The application is online for the Squaw Creek Conservation District.

SHERIFF: There was talk of the snowpack.

PROSECUTOR: Adam Strong will have information under grants and contracts.

CLERK: Chairman Twilegar motioned to approve the Centerville Fire Station as a polling place for the May Primary Election. This was approved.

CASH RESERVES: Mary

Prisco said that she had a lot of information for the board and passed out paperwork. She went through the financial policy and fund balance, which composes the cash reserves. "That's what tells us how to go about determining what's restricted." Prisco said the financial policy, "directs us on our policy for calculating how much we want to have in cash reserves to cover the three month period where we don't get any property funding, which is the piece of our revenues."

Commissioner Holmes asked when the document was last updated. Clerk Prisco said it was last updated in 2013 and it was based off an accounting standard, "and that standard hasn't changed." She said the auditors also use that plan. She presented the 2020 county audit, and said that the 2021 audit would be done May 23rd. She said this was "super late" but it was because the program designers, Computer Arts, were not able to close Boise County's books. It was finally closed on February 21, 2022. "I hope that next year, that won't be the case," Clerk Prisco said.

She reviewed the financial statements from the 2020 audit, total fund balances, with four major operating funds. The fund balance section "splits out the non-spendable,

restricted, committed, assigned, and unassigned." She also presented the differences of cash reserves, and calculations for cash reserves that have accumulated over the years.

Commissioner Holmes asked if the county was using the same auditors year after year. Clerk Prisco said the dynamics of the company have changed a little within Bailey & Company, but the company has remained the same during her twelve-year tenure with the county. Commissioner Holmes relayed that he had spoken with a commissioner from another county and he said, "They do not use the same auditor year after year. The public looks at that as it could be a problem down the line, three or four years using the same auditor." Commissioner Holmes would like to use another auditor this year. "That's come to me from some of my constituents. Those are the people I work for and I'm just going to try to make that happen," said Holmes. Prisco reassured him that the board makes the decision who the county hires for the audit, not the clerk. However, she warned that there may be more work and expense involved with another auditing company. Holmes responded that banks only go two years at the max before changing auditors.

LEASE AGREEMENT: Prosecutor Strong spoke regarding the end of the 20-year lease for his building. He said

the rent was \$550 a month, but the owner wants to increase it to \$950 a month. There were some concessions made by the owner. A 5-year lease was discussed. Chairman Twilegar motioned to approve the agreement between the property owner and Boise County, May 1, 2022 to October 31, 2024, for \$600 and then after that \$650 for five years total. All were in agreement.

ADJUSTMENT OF THE GENERAL FUND: Clerk Prisco explained that the grant writer position was not budgeted for in the 2022 budget period. The adjustment will also cover the hiring of the maintenance employee in September. Commissioner Twilegar motioned to approve Resolution 2022-15 to increase the general fund for the 2022 budget.

FAIR HOUSING MONTH: Clerk Prisco said this was something we do every year, "another federal designated thing." Commissioner Twilegar said he had no problem with this and there were no other comments. He made a motion to approve the resolution to declare April Fair Housing Month. The motion passed.

SNOWMOBILE TRAILS: Prosecutor Strong said he did some "reformatting" of a previous ordinance from 2015 to prevent "wheeled vehicles" from going on the groomed snowmobile trails. He said

that he was off the hearing topic. Jokovac then got in one last statement before his time ran out. He told the council that he had contact with ITD and was told a merger lane would be needed for the property.

Former City Council candidate Kelly Jakovac followed. She also said that she wasn't opposed to a veterans memorial. She said she was unsure if the property purchase was legal, but she hadn't seen evidence of the city paying back the water fund for the purchase.

She stated that at the council's meeting in November, 2020, the veterans memorial was approved and was to be built in the existing city park. She asked when the location was officially changed, what the budget was going to be, and where any match funding for grants was coming from. Jakovac told the council that they were the "legislative branch of this city." She asked if the council had an engineering plan or an estimate for the construction and maintenance of the park. She hinted at a citizen filed lawsuit and questioned the city's priorities, noting that the current EMS response time is shameful, to which audience members told her to volunteer if she wanted to improve response times.

Mary Grover stated that she was concerned about the security of the park as part of the property is below the bridge and out of view. She worried about illegal activities occurring during "dark hours." Grover asked the council, "Why risk moving ahead with so many issues?" She then accused Mayor Goff of arrogance and leading the council around, adding, "There are citizens willing to sue."

Former mayoral candidate Jon Dufresne stated that he was neutral because he didn't have enough information to be for or against the park, but he believes the park was purchased illegally and he has the council meeting minutes to prove it. He then started talking about the executive session item on the agenda, discussion of pending litigation, which he assumed was a reference to the city's lawsuit against him.

Mayor Goff reminded him that they were in a public hearing about the park.

Dufresne closed by saying he wasn't against the park or the memorial, he just wanted to see due process done.

Bailey took the dais and said he was approached by the chamber to help with plans for the memorial. He thinks the location is "fantastic" and he has provided stamped engineering plans for the memorial. He also said he hired a surveyor to survey the site and provide topographical information. He told the council he was open to answering any questions from his perspective as an engineer. He added that the park didn't constitute a "warrant" from ITD in regards to a traffic study.

Dufresne spoke out that he agrees with rezoning the property for public use, so even if the park doesn't happen, the public might still be able to use the property.

Kelly Jakovac spoke out asking why no one has been able to see the plans for the park. Goff said, "It's a work in progress" and added that the only plans that have been completed are for the veterans memorial.

Kelly Jakovac directly asked Burgess if she thought it was alright for the city to have not paid back the water fund for the purchase of the property. Goff said, "We need to get along."

He went on to tell everyone that he has been talking to the elders of the community and they are in favor of the park.

Bauer stood up to say that if people were so worried about the cost of the park, why threaten the council with lawsuits? She asked everyone to come together instead of being so "snarky."

Grover interjected, "Rather than make this a kumbaya moment" she wanted the council to know that people are opposed to the way the park is being planned, demanding, "I want to see the plan." She wants the council to "follow procedure and do it right." Dave Jakovac called out, "How many parking spaces are in the design?" Goff told those assembled, "There are no plans yet," and closed the testimony at 7:49 p.m.

The council then deliberated the rezone. Burgess asked if the public would have access to the land if the rezone was approved but the park fell through. Pantera said the public could not access the land, as the rezone only allows for the land to be used for the establishment of public use (building, park, etc).

Councilmember Stephen Chartier asked, "When are these lawsuits about the park going to happen?" Pantera told the council they had the option to rezone the property, table the matter, or deny it by find-

ing it doesn't comply with the comprehensive plan. Councilmember White wanted to table the matter and Chartier agreed. A roll call vote to table the rezone was made with Chartier and White voting aye, and Burgess and Councilmember Curtis Corvinus voting nay. Goff broke the tie with an aye vote, tabling the matter for a future date.

The park was also tabled (this time unanimously) after Burgess asked Pantera about recusing herself from voting. Pantera told her if a vote directly has to do with the chamber, she should recuse herself.

Huckle and Sage requested approval to allow beer and wine purchased (not poured or served) on the premises to be consumed. The council voted unanimously to approve the request.

Kelly Jakovac spoke on Dave Jakovac's behalf regarding the veterans memorial. She said that after speaking with someone from ITD, they agreed that the traffic that would be created by the park wouldn't be a huge issue. She asked about whether the city had been approached about the installation of a traffic circle in town. Goff told her, "That's the first I heard of it." She told the council that an ITD spokesperson said that the idea was presented to the city clerk who turned it down. Goff asked her to send him any information she had on it. Jakovac requested a meeting with the mayor, indicating that she wanted to put all the animosity behind them. Goff agreed.

EMS report: Seven people passed training, with two scheduled to take the national registry test at the end of the month. Living quarters are being contemplated and a new class for trainees will be starting soon.

Public works: The crew is getting ready for spring and fine tuning the ozone generator.

Grant writer: Cheryl Pleak provided information about an available grant to provide for sleeping quarters for EMS. The grant would pay 15% of the cost, with the city being responsible for the remaining 85%. Goff indicated that the city didn't have the funds to cover 85% but added, "At least it gives us something to chew on." Pleak suggested a community workshop to work on the city's Capital Improvement Plan. She closed by saying she had poured her heart and soul into working on the new park, including talking to people that

wanted to donate to the park. She said that while change is hard and she hates it, and while it is sometimes difficult, everyone always gets through it. She would like to see everyone come together over the park.

Mayor Goff thanked everyone for coming. "We're not very bad people at all." He said he was open to meeting

with anyone that has concerns about the city and wants to talk. His email can be found on the city's website. He concluded the meeting by saying, "This whole nation, this whole world is in disarray. We don't need to be in disarray here."

The council went into executive session at 8:23 p.m.

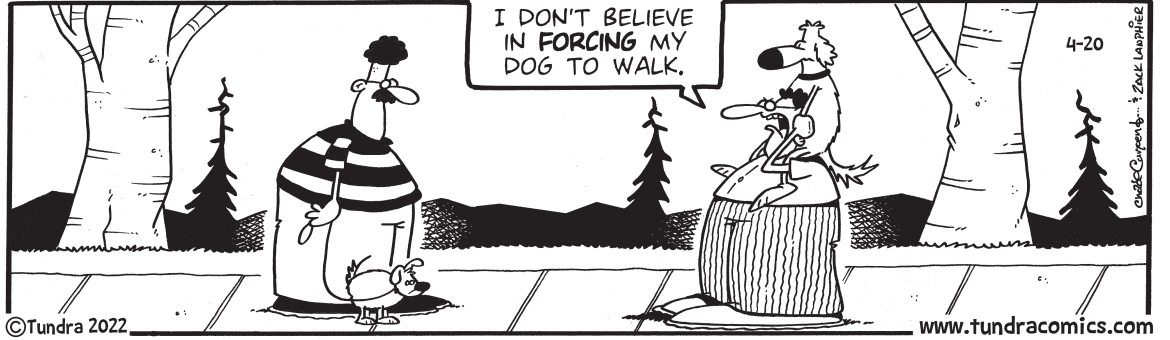

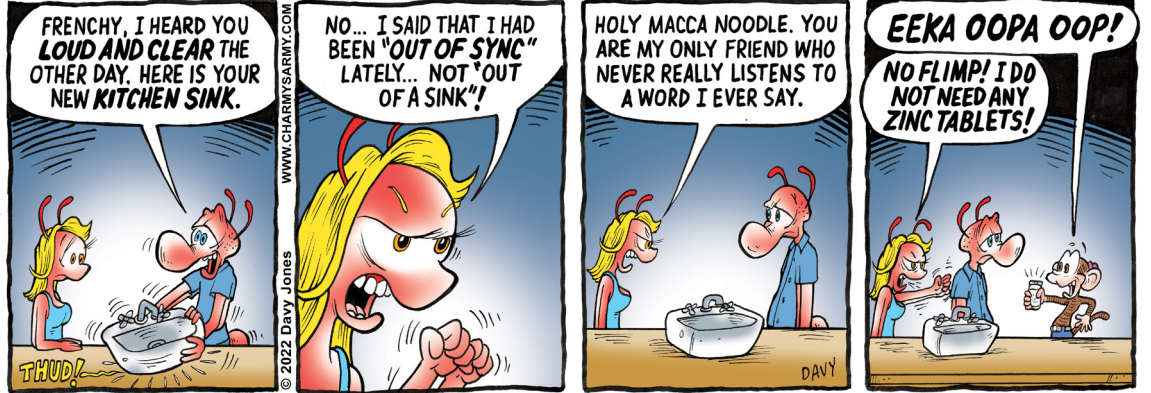

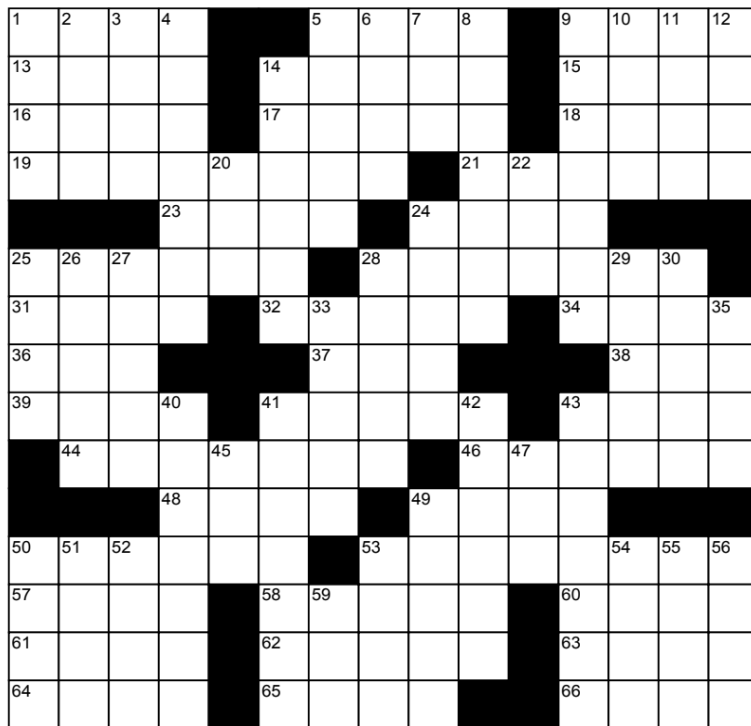

Samuel Doran Fanshaw III
1945 - 2021

Samuel Doran Fanshaw III, loving and devoted husband, father of two children, and grandfather of four, passed away at the age of 75 in Garden Valley, Idaho, on Friday, May 21, 2021. He was cremated, and a Celebration of Life gathering was held at his home in Garden Valley on June 19, 2021. His remains will be laid to rest at the Idaho State Veterans Cemetery in Boise, ID, on Thursday, May 12, 2022, following a brief service with military honors. A brick honoring Sam's military service will be placed in the Veterans Memorial Wall at Weilmunster Park in Garden Valley and will be recognized in ceremony on Memorial Day, May 30, 2022.

Sam was preceded in death by his mother, Mildred (1971), his father, Samuel (2003), and his younger sister, Maryellen Bobeldyke (2020). He is survived by his older sister, Ruth Viereck; his wife, Donna; his daughter, Jennifer Fanshaw; his daughter, Katherine Fitzgerald, and her husband, Michael Fitzgerald, whom he regarded as a son; his four grandchildren, Barry, Marguerite, Josephine, and Arthur Fitzgerald; and many cousins, nieces, and nephews.

Sam was born October 12, 1945, in National City, California, to Samuel D. Fanshaw Jr., and Mildred J. (Abshire). His family nickname was "Butch" because he, his father, and his grandfather all shared the same name. He grew up in Westminster and Long Beach, CA, and was the middle child of three. He attended Westminster and Bolsa Grande High Schools. As a teen, he enjoyed spending his time on the sunny southern California coast fishing and surfing. As a young man, he worked various jobs trying to find what suited him. Sam was a natural performer, and although he never pursued an acting career, he was once an "extra" in the 1970 movie *Tora! Tora! Tora!* while stationed in Hawaii.

Sam had a big Navy influence in his life, as his father, grandfather, and several uncles served in the Navy. In 1966, at age 20 and at the height of the Vietnam war, Sam enlisted in the Navy and served for four years. His early Navy training revealed he had a good aptitude for either sonar technician or radioman—he chose the latter. He was primarily stationed in Vietnam as a Radio Operator at

the Navy communication station (Navcomsta) at Cam Ranh Bay. In recent years, Sam reconnected with his Navy comrades who also served at Cam Ranh Bay. He attended a couple of group reunions, which he enjoyed very much.

After his return from Vietnam and his mother's death in 1971, Sam felt the need to get away for awhile. He hitchhiked across the United States having adventures we will never know about—except that he worked as a groom at a couple of horse racing tracks in New Jersey and Florida. He returned home to California in 1976 to settle back into life near his family.

Sam met the love of his life, Donna Hlifka of Erie, PA, in May 1977, in Anaheim, CA. After a four-year courtship, they were married in Yucca Valley, CA, on November 28, 1981. They lived in Long Beach, CA, until December 1983, when they moved to Coeur d'Alene, ID. They enjoyed living in northern Idaho but were relocated to Boise, ID, by Donna's employer in August 1984. After fully settling into life and jobs in Boise, they welcomed and raised their two beautiful, vivacious daughters, Katie and Jenny. They lived and worked in Boise for 33 years.

Sam's Navy and work career centered around the world of electronics and motors. For twelve years or so, he worked in the field of commercial heating and air conditioning maintenance. In his mid-forties, he decided to pursue a degree in electronics from Boise State University. He then entered the semi-conductor industry, working for Micron Technology in Boise for 16 years, until he retired in 2007. Sam always enjoyed tinkering with things—he was our go-to guy whenever something malfunctioned or needed an upgrade.

Sam's love and aptitude for electronics and radio communications led him to obtain his Amateur Radio "Ham" license in the late 1980's. He progressed through the various levels of licensing to the "Advanced" class. His call sign, which he was very fond of, was "N7IFG." This became his favorite hobby over the years, and most recently he was an active participant in the Boise County Amateur Radio Emergency Service (BCARES) club.

Sam enjoyed frequent traveling adventures with Donna, their daughters and grandchildren, other family members, and friends. There were always folks to visit around the country, as well as the beauty of the National Parks to experience. Camping and fishing in the mountains of Idaho was a favorite, where many cherished memories were made together. Another of his favorite destinations was anywhere by the ocean. Sam had a remarkable ability to drive long distances—perhaps fostered by his experience as a

young child riding back and forth across the country from California to Virginia and West Virginia, where his parents and grandparents were born.

Sam and Donna fulfilled a longtime dream of having a place in the mountains when they purchased a cabin in Garden Valley, ID, in 2015. They moved there full time in 2017. Their cabin in the mountains was a treasured refuge from city life, and it truly became their favorite home. The towering trees, fresh air, abundant wildlife, beautiful rivers, gorgeous valley views, and relaxed, friendly community of people brought a sense of peace to their lives. Sam loved and cherished his family, and his life was greatly enriched with the arrival of each of his grandchildren. He enjoyed playing with and teaching them about one thing or another. Favorite play times always involved chasing around the house and tackling. Going out for a meal then off to a park was also a favored pastime. It was a particular joy to have them stay over at the cabin where he enjoyed having them help mow the grass with the lawn tractor, giving them rides up the mountain in the 6-wheeler, and watching over them as they played in the river. He was very nurturing and was often seen carrying, holding hands, or tending to the needs of the children.

there was a problem with a variable fine, but with an infraction it's something people can just pay online rather than going to court. Chairman Twilegar said he would like to see the amount set at \$250, "one hundred bucks is - that's a sandwich at my place." Commissioner Holmes agreed, "That hurts a little more."

Chairman Twilegar motioned to enact the Ordinance 2022-02, a snowmobile trail protection with a change to penalty from \$100 to \$250 dollars as an infraction.

LITTERING ORDINANCE: Chairman Twilegar recapped Prosecutor Strong's proposal, "As this is written, there is currently an Idaho code statute that would charge as an infraction for the first two, \$150, \$250. And then a misdemeanor, but this just gives us the added bite, if we need to, to charge with a misdemeanor, starting at \$300 and then \$500, and then \$1,000, jail time." Strong said, "First offense minimum of \$300 fine and up to a \$1,000 fine. Second offense within ten years would be a minimum of a \$500 fine, up to a \$1,000 fine. And the jail on those, the first offense would be a mandatory of two days in jail. The second offense would be a minimum of five days in jail." However, community service could be paid within Boise County, picking up trash, at a rate of eight hours per a day.

Commissioner Twilegar said there has been an increase in trash. Sheriff Turner asked if there could be some restitution for other departments, should the road department be called in to clean up the trash. Prosecutor Strong said with a misdemeanor, "restitution is always an option."

Twilegar motioned to enact Ordinance 2022-01, Boise County's Littering Ordinance. All were in favor.

GARDEN VALLEY TRANSLATOR DISTRICT: Chairman Twilegar motioned to approve the new board members. The motion carried.

legar took some time to review the bills and then motioned to approve the budget items in the amount of \$160,575.70. All were in favor and the motion carried.

EAST BOISE COUNTY AMBULANCE DISTRICT: The board serves the board of directors for EBCAD. Melissa Potts said she's been "trying to convince Lowman Fire to take over extrication services for a while and I think they've been convinced." She said it really didn't make sense for the ambulance to provide extrication.

Twilegar motioned to approve an invoice for \$25,098 for the power load in Placerville. Much of the funds were from grant money.

He then made a motion to approve the agreement between the ambulance services for the Idaho Road Rally.

Potts said they had an orientation meeting for the EMT class and had sixteen students, "which is a pretty good-sized class." Two from Robie Creek, four from Wilderness Ranch, and several others are coming up from Boise that are part of Idaho Mountain Search and Rescue and contribute to our community. She said there are also students from Lowman, Placerville, and Idaho City.

Potts also talked about a possible new location for the Wilderness Ranch ambulance station, because the five year lease is up soon. Twilegar mentioned looking for grant money to build that station.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Coming out of the closed session, Commissioner Twilegar motioned to approve the non-medical assistance in the case.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: [Time 10:53am to 11:01am] Closed session for personnel issue and risk management with Planning and Zoning department head. Coming back into session, Twilegar said

there was no action required.

AMBULANCE DISTRICTS: Commissioner Holmes spoke of another commissioner in Gem County that set up an EMS system. He would like to form a district in our county. Prosecutor Strong spoke about the new law and how to form a new ambulance taxing district. A petition with fifty residents and their signatures would be needed, within the boundaries of the district, to proceed. It would be submitted to the Boise County Board of County Commissioners and then they would have public hearing. They would then hear from those for and against the forming of the district. If they approve the petition, then it would go on to the ballot for a vote to create the district. It would need to be 50% plus one vote to create the district. Strong said, "Those elections need to occur in either, I believe, May or November election of an even number year." It could be this November, "we're too close to the May election, obviously." He said that anyone could do the petition. Commissioner Twilegar asked if the cities in the county had to pass a resolution. Strong said, "If there are cities within the proposed taxing district boundaries, then each city's city council needs to pass the resolution consenting to be part" [of the incorporation.] They would have their own board that is elected.

Adjourned at 11:15am.

My wife and soulmate Sally is a retired high school teacher and taught psychology, health, and child development for 23 years.

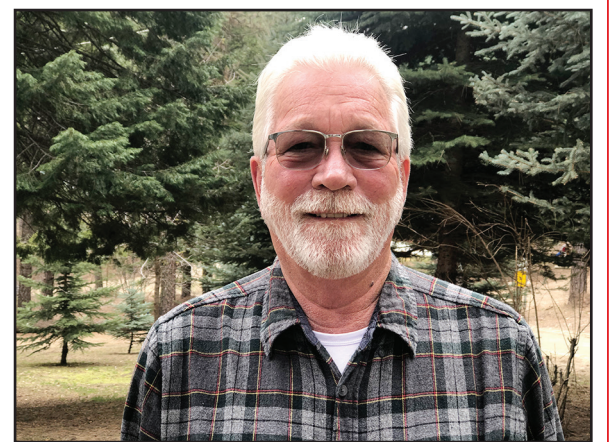
Here are just a few of the changes I would like to tackle ASAP:

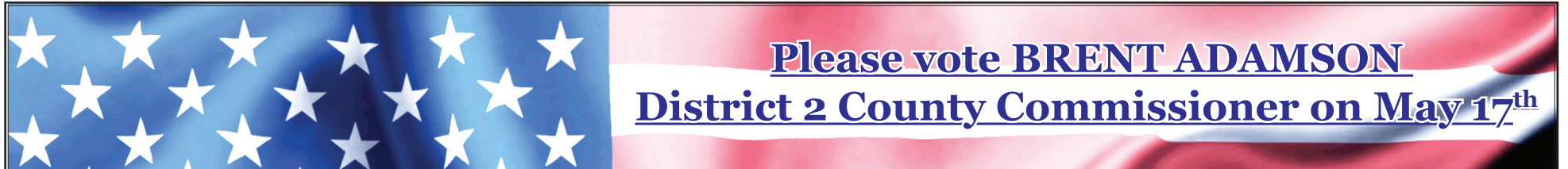

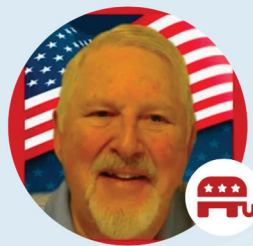

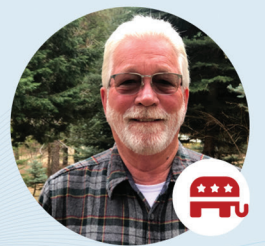

To: Citizens of Boise County

I heard some good news today, 4/12/22, at the Boise County Commissioners meeting in Idaho City. As many of you are aware, the state of Emergency Medical response and care in Boise County has ebbed and flowed over time as volunteers are found, trained, and then depart from their positions for whatever reasons. Some areas of the county have recently been without local ambulance services and EMTs for over 7 months. Specifically, the City of Horseshoe Bend has found itself in this situation since last August. Yes, the city did contract with a firm out of Boise to provide services while volunteers were in training for certification as EMTs. However, I have personal knowledge that this service has been less than ideal in a number of instances; when ambulance and medical care was needed it has taken up to an hour for an ambulance and medical personnel to arrive on scene. Fortunately, the city now has volunteers at or nearing the end of their EMT training and, hopefully, the situation will improve. Also, I am aware of difficulties in the past in staffing the needed numbers of EMTs and ambulance drivers on the east side of Boise County despite the best efforts of the Eastern Boise County Ambulance District (EBCAD) to provide services over a large part of the county. Again, EBCAD has worked hard to correct this situation and it has greatly improved as of late.

Today, our Board of County Commissioners announced that they are going to be looking into what it would take to possibly form a county-wide ambulance district to provide needed services across the entire county. This does not mean the end of our need for volunteers. It would mean formation of a dedicated agency to monitor the ambulance services and emergency medical services for all citizens of Boise County to try and avoid the recurrence of situations like those described above. The commissioners are planning to bring in a representative from Gem County to discuss how they were able to form a county-wide ambulance district to better meet the needs of their citizens.

Another topic discussed at the commissioners meeting today was the fact that property assessments will be coming out in the next couple of months. We are all probably aware that the recently concluded Idaho State Legislature had some movement to revamp the method of setting property taxes, but as too often happens in our legislature, nothing of really significant change came about. I had advocated that with an extra \$1.9 billion dollars in funds, this would be an excellent time for the state to step up and provide some relief to property owners across the state, but this did not happen. Instead, the governor of Idaho decided it would be better to give all income taxpayers a whopping \$75 dollar tax refund. Like most of us, I will not turn the money down, but I think the reserves could have been better used to help alleviate some of the burden of property taxes—we have people being forced to sell their homes because they cannot afford to pay the taxes, and this is not right!! Also, please be aware that if you have a belief that your assessment is incorrect you can contact the assessor's office in Boise County to discuss this issue.

We need to make sure that our state legislators are aware of our displeasure that this is still an ongoing issue and ask that they take in the next session of the legislature.
