Thermal Imaging for Wilderness Ranch Fire

EAST BOISE COUNTY -- Last week, Wilderness Ranch Volunteer Fire District was gifted with five thermal imaging firefighting cameras from the Boise Fire Department. These cameras were in pristine condition, still in their original boxes, under two years old, with full battery strength, and even spare replacement batteries. Rural fire departments can rarely afford such cameras, yet are a necessary tool. The dona-

tion amount from Boise Fire came in at around \$10,000. Two cameras will be kept by Wilderness Ranch VFD and three will be distributed to other local fire departments that could best use them.

Thermal imaging cameras are essentially life savers. They can be used to find the source of a fire in a smoke-filled structure, measure the heat signatures throughout the building, detect fires behind

walls and doors, or even find a lost child in the forest at night.

Drew Bodie, Wilderness Ranch firefighter, said the gift all had to do with good relationships. The Wilderness Ranch Fire Chief, Colton McCarthy, had asked Boise Fire for two thermal cameras that were to be phased out of the department, and Captain Marcus Rainey was able to respond by giving Wilderness Ranch a total of five. Bodie said "It's

amazing, there's no way we could ever afford one, let alone two. It's big; it's like Christmas in July!" He said, while pointing the camera at a glass door in his home, registering 98 degrees outside, "this will help save lives and property." Bodie explained that, normally, it is impossible to see in a house full of smoke. Firefighters have to find their way by touch alone. The camera screen essentially clears the room of smoke, so that firefighters are able to see the structure, doors, furniture, and heat registers that could indicate a fire, an individual, or pet. Bodie went on to express his concern for the safety of their volunteers. He said that they don't know how hot a

room is until they get into it. These thermal imaging cameras will allow them to get readings prior to sending people into a burning building.

When meeting with Captain Rainey on Friday, July 29th, Bodie said the captain didn't realize just how important these thermal cameras were to the department, or why rural fire departments do not have them. The Wilderness Ranch VFD was very grateful and will be holding trainings for their volunteers to practice with these user-friendly devices. The live thermal images will help them to gauge their offense during a structure fire, to keep volunteers safe, and save property.

LOWMAN SCENIC SAFETY CORRIDOR Community Meeting

LOWMAN -- Angela Hellwege of Lowman is fed up. Fed up with people driving through residential zones along State Route 21 at 70 MPH and passing cars all while towing big campers. Fed up with continuously seeing deer and elk get hit by cars traveling too fast to see the animals licking the road (deer, elk and goats lick the road salt or magnesium chloride on the road from the past winter).

Angela Hellwege is also afraid someone else is going to get killed. This is not the first time portions of Highway 21's posted speed limit have been in question. The *World* reported back in 2020 on the tragedy of local Lowman resident Duffy Zeiber. Duffy was killed the afternoon of September 4, 2019 when riding his ATV while attempting to cross Highway 21 near the Soudough Lodge in Lowman, Idaho. He was struck by a west bound truck hauling a camping trailer. The impact was so great that the debris came to rest in many disconnected pieces,

about 200 yards further down the road. This was not the first time an accident occurred on this stretch of Highway 21. Only one week earlier, an accident resulted in one woman being air lifted to the hospital in Boise. The stretch of Highway 21 through Lowman, particularly near the Sourdough Lodge, where more businesses and residents are, has been the location of many accidents and near misses. Often, these accidents are a result of excessive speed, wildlife, or not driving appropriately for road conditions.

The community implored the Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) in 2019 to investigate what could be done to make this section of the road safer. The ITD responded by meeting with the Idaho State Police. ITD Public Information Officer, Jake Melder explained to the *World* in 2020 that the necessary meeting between all of the stakeholders had been postponed indefinitely due to the pandemic. Unfortunately, Mr. Melder is no lon-

ger employed by the ITD for follow-up. The *World* has attempted to contact the ITD to see where in the process they are, but have yet to receive a response.

The area of Hwy. 21 near the Sourdough Lodge in Lowman has seen a big uptick in residents as well as an increase in traffic. The area is clearly now a residential area, but the speed limit is still 55 MPH. The increase in population and traffic in Lowman, falling loose rocks, and wildlife, make for a very dangerous stretch of road.

The Lowman Community is fed up with the lack of political and ITD support they have been receiving. This is why Hellwege, along with several other residents, has formed a committee to get the necessary safety changes made. They have produced a list of goals for particular stretches of Hwy. 21 in Lowman. They have also scheduled a community meeting at the Lowman Fire Hall on August 16th 2022 at 6 pm.

Missing Person in Boise County

BOISE COUNTY -- As of Tuesday evening, August 2nd, James Daly has not been located. He was last seen in Boise County by two huckleberry hunters at the Mores Creek summit on July 29th. One of the ladies said he was on his cell phone, where there was reception. They asked if he was alright, and he responded that he was texting, so they went on their way.

Daly was reported missing since Wednesday, August 27th. The Boise County Sheriff's office has asked the public to please keep an eye out for this gentleman, as there is a good chance he is in Boise County. Deputies have been on the lookout for a couple of days and have checked many of the well-travelled areas. Sheriff Scott Turner was surprised that with all the people driving on the county roads, no one has found Daly yet.

Pledge of Allegiance

Present: Commissioner Steve Twilegar and Clay Tucker

Absent: Commissioner Ryan Stirm

MINUTES: Chairman Twilegar made a motion to approve the minutes from Tuesday, July 19th. The motion carried.

FOREST SERVICE: Quincy Chung, Fire Managing Officer and Ranger for the Boise National Forest, said they are working with the Boise County Emergency Manager to get the word out about a home assessment program. This program would include documenting details about a home, GPS location of the structure(s), if there's water accessibility, and any surrounding hazardous fuels. Chung said, "It would be way easier for us, than anytime -- ten, eleven, twelve o'clock at night, if we do have a wildfire pinged out within the county,

to go in and say we've got up this road - fifteen homes and they've already have been assessed." He said there has been some pushback, and explained that they are not fire marshals, "We are not going in to say, we will not defend a property verses this property. Simply, what we're trying to do is collect information." Chung said if Boise County were to have a large fire, as they did 2016, then they could hand over that structural assessment information to an incident commander. He said this would save a tremendous amount of time and allow firefighters to focus their resources.

Boise County Emergency Manager Trina Richardson said, "It would be like an interactive map. So, it would be useful for all the rural fire departments as well."

Chairman Twilegar asked about the pushback. Chung responded that people may be

getting the wrong impression about what they're trying to do. Twilegar said, "I would let you do [assess] it, but some people don't. *That's their right.*" Chung said, "We do have options to just put 'home - locked gate - permission needed.' And so, that would be something that's tracked on there, at least for somebody coming from from, say, Oregon, Nevada."

PROSECUTOR: Adam Strong said he would like to send their investigator and witness coordinator to a training that specializes in sexual crimes, which would be covered by grant funds.

COMPUTER ARTS CONTRACT: The one year contract was discussed with the prosecutor. Chairman Twilegar motioned to accept the agreement between Computer Arts and Boise County for the annual software support license and maintenance fees in the amount of \$53,410.77 and county sup-

port fees of \$10,918 and service on-site visit, per diem, hotel, and other travel expenses - \$600. The motion carried.

JUVENILE JUSTICE: Amanda Leader spoke about a grant they received last year and would like to apply again, in order to provide more mental health resources to the community and throughout the county. Twilegar motioned to approve the application for the grant.

DESTROY RECORDS: Leader said that before destroying some records, she realized there were two boxes that should not be destroyed, so they were pulled out. She asked that the motion to destroy them be rescinded. Commissioner Twilegar made a motion and it was approved.

CLAIMS REPORT: Chairman Twilegar motioned to approve the claims report in the

amount of \$105,332.30. That was seconded by Commissioner Tucker and the motion passed.

IDAHO RALLY: They canceled their event and Commissioner Twilegar motioned to reimburse Idaho Rally in the amount of \$1000.

DEPUTY: Counseling for one of our Boise County Deputies in the amount of \$3,450 therapy session. The motion was approved.

BUDGET: Clerk Mary Prisco led the discussion regarding next fiscal year's budget, fiscal year 2023, including the operating expenses and what's in the capital. She said there would be some increases in operating expenses, like fuel and utilities.

Each department discussed their needs and wants.

Lowering of Lucky Peak Reservoir



The Walla Walla District, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers announced that the routine drawdown of Lucky Peak to supply irrigation requirements would begin on August 14th. This would lower the lake by approximately two to three feet per day.

"Lucky Peak Dam is a 340 ft. tall rolled earthfill dam. Upstream of the dam is Lucky Peak Lake, a 12 mile long storage reservoir with 45 miles of shoreline and 3,019 acres of surface area. There are 4,079 acres of Corps managed lands used for public recreation, wildlife habitat and operation purposes. Lucky Peak Lake lies in three counties: Ada, Boise, and Elmore." *Photo by Eileen Capson*

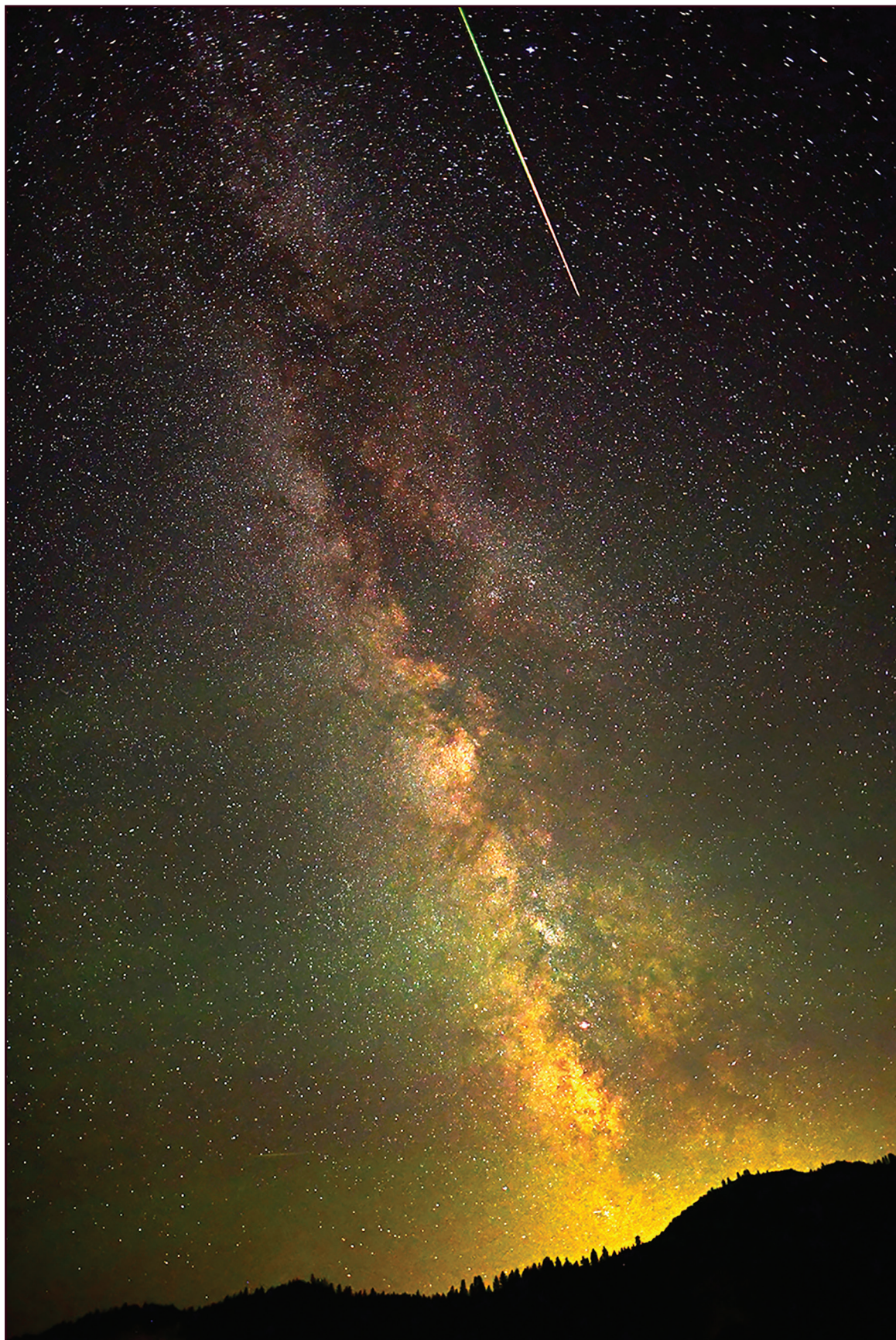

Accidental Wildfire Ignitions

BOISE COUNTY -- We have experienced a wonderful spring and early summer, cooler and wetter than expected. In fact, water hydrologists with the Idaho Department of Water Resources said that the Boise, Payette, and Weiser river basins are no longer in a drought status, as reported by Angela Kerndl of KBOI. We certainly have enjoyed seeing the foothills greener for longer this year, but as we watch the foothills turn brown, we need to remember that all that green foliage turns to "light" wildfire fuel. So, what does light fuel mean? It means the fuel is easy to ignite, it burns hot, and fire spreads quickly in it.

One of the most interesting certifications I acquired during my time as a firefighter was that of Wildland Fire Investigator. In that course I learned how many ways humans can ignite a wildfire by accident. The U. S. Department of Interior estimate that 90% of wildfires are caused by humans. So, I thought I would share a few of the ways humans accidentally start wildfires.

To begin, there is the obvious abandoned campfire that Smokey the Bear admonished us to "put out, dead out!" But what does that mean? Many people pour a bucket of water on their campfire and think it is good. Many times, the water hits the top of the embers

and forms a crust that insulates glowing embers below so that the water never reaches them. Given the right conditions, those embers can glow for hours, and a good breeze can pick up a burning ember and deposit it in the grass near the fire, leading to ignition. So, what Smokey is saying is to drown your fire, stir the ashes around, and carefully feel for hot embers with your hand. If your ashes are too hot for you to handle with your bare hand, your fire isn't "dead out."

Then there are smokes, you know, cigarettes, cigars, pipes etc. Cigarette manufacturers have been making self-extinguishing cigarettes that go out quickly. This has reduced the fire hazard of dropping your butt in the woods... but with the right wind conditions even these self-extinguishing cigarettes can start a fire, especially in "light" fuel like dry grass. Cigars are not self-extinguishing so if they are dropped into light fuel, they have a greater chance of igniting dry grass, and when you smoke a pipe, you are literally burning a light fuel. The best way to handle smokes is to field strip them. That means crumbling your tobacco in your hand. If you do not burn your hand your smoke is out. If it is too hot for your hand, it is too hot to drop in the woods.

Unattended children are not

well known for their ability to tell if something is a good idea or not. So, leaving them on their own even for a few moments while in the woods as you are unpacking the camping gear is not the best choice. That may be enough time for them to get their hands on a lighter or the matches you just put out to start the campfire, and that can turn a fun adventure into a wildfire crisis. Likewise, letting children have fireworks, including sparklers, without adult supervision may be a recipe for disaster. Did you know that sparklers burn at 1,200 degrees Fahrenheit? To put that in perspective, wood burns at 575 F and glass melts at 900 F, so you can imagine what happens to dry grass. The actual burning of the sparkler is not the only problem. The stuff that drips off the sparkler is extremely hot as is the stem of the sparkler after the sparkler finishes burning. Both residues of sparklers can ignite light fuel. Fireworks ignite, spark, and explode in an array of beautiful colors. That is why we buy them. So, mixing fireworks and light fuel is a recipe ready to start a wildfire. A new(ish) rage with shooters is exploding targets. It is cool to see them explode when you hit them. That explosion can start a wildfire, and the small ceramic balls in the targets that create an enhanced explosive effect are super-hot and are

strewn by the explosion several feet around the target. Those ceramic balls are one of the give aways fire investigators look for when investigating a wildfire.

Did you know vehicles start several wildfires each year? Hot catalytic converters are the heat source for wildfires when vehicles are driven or parked on dry grass and the grass comes in contact with the catalytic converter. Sports vehicles like ATVs should be equipped with spark arrestors, as should any equipment run by an internal combustion engine, like chainsaws, used in wildfire prone areas. You do not even have to be driving in the grass for your catalytic converter to start a wildfire. Malfunctioning catalytic converters can spit extremely hot ceramic beads out the exhaust pipe. When these ceramic beads bounce into dry grass, they can easily ignite the grass. Another common source of vehicular fire starts are dragging trailer safety chains on the roadway, which create sparks that can reach grass along the side of the road. When trailering, be sure your safety chains are adjusted so they do not ever reach the roadway. Speaking of sparks, the sparks created when your mower hits a rock are enough to ignite dry light fuel.

Burning debris is a common accidental fire start when the fire gets away from people or, more likely, embers from the debris are caught by wind and start spot fires, sometimes several yards from the burning slash/trash pile. To reduce this risk, we should all be aware of open burning season, times of the year when permits are required to burn, and no open fire season, like we are currently in. Naturally, slash/trash burns need to be supervised by an adult who has the equipment to control the burn and respond to any emergency should the fire get out of control. An immediate source of water, shovel, and rake are the minimum implements required.

Bottom line, common sense is the best way to stop human-caused wildfires. Remember Smokey's warning, "Only you can prevent wildfires."

Bats Infected with Rabies are Found in Boise County

BOISE COUNTY -- A bat was found to be infected with rabies on July 26, 2022 in Boise. On average, fifteen rabid bats are tested positive each year in Idaho. In 2021, an individual from Boise County actually contracted rabies when a bat scratched him when it flew near him and became caught in his clothing. This occurred in August, and the man fell ill in October, was hospitalized, and subsequently died. Central District Health said it wasn't until after the investigation into his illness that the bat exposure was discovered. Public health officials worked closely with the family and any healthcare providers that had contact with the individual and were given rabies preventative treatments, as needed.

Prior to that case, no human case of rabies and death had been reported in Idaho since 1978. While it is extremely rare in the United States to have a death due to rabies, it has the highest mortality rate of any disease. An estimated 60,000 Americans receive the post-exposure vaccination each year. Central District Health states that, without preventative treatment, rabies is almost always fatal. It infects the central nervous system, ultimately causing disease of the brain and death.

"Idahoans are reminded that bats can become infected with rabies. While bats can be ben-

eficial to our environment, people should be wary of any bat encounter, including waking up to a bat in your room, or any situation where there may have been a bite or scratch," said Dr. Leslie Tengelsen, state public health veterinarian.

Bats have very small teeth, so people often don't know for sure if they have been bitten. If you have contact with a bat or wake up to a bat in your bedroom, tent, or cabin, and are not sure if you were exposed, do not release the bat because it should be appropriately captured for rabies testing.

"Every year we have several people and pets exposed to rabies in our district, generally spring through fall," said Central District Health Communicable Disease Control Program Manager Lindsay Haskell. "We want our residents and visitors to Idaho to be informed of the risk of rabies, to take appropriate steps to limit risk, and to take action when necessary."

The only way rabies can be confirmed in a bat is through laboratory testing. You cannot tell just by looking at a bat if it has rabies. If the bat is available for testing and the results are negative, preventive treatment is not needed.

Even if the bat cannot be caught, treatment with the rabies vaccine and rabies immune globulin may be recommended, just in case the bat was rabid. Call your doctor or health

department to help determine if you could have been exposed to rabies and whether you need preventive treatment. Residents may report dead or dying bats to the Idaho Department of Fish and Game by calling (208) 465-8465.

To protect yourself and your pets from rabies:

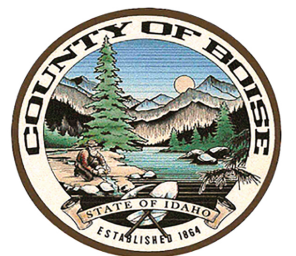
- Do not touch a bat with your bare hands. Be very suspicious of any bat behaving oddly or found on the ground
- If you come into contact with a bat, seek medical attention
- Save the bat in a container while using thick gloves or another method to transfer it into a container without touching it
- Contact your public health district to arrange for rabies testing.
- Always vaccinate your pets, including cats. Pets may encounter bats outdoors or in the home, and lastly,
- Bat-proof your home or cabin and maintain tight-fitting screens on windows. Bats can enter through holes the size of a quarter. Typically, bat-proofing is best accomplished after most bats have migrated away in the fall.

BLM acquires Boise Foothills land to help maintain open space and protect wildlife habitat

Boise, Idaho – The Bureau of Land Management has acquired 275 acres of land in the Boise Foothills to increase access to open space and protect important wildlife habitat. The property is located a few miles north of Barber Valley, overlooking Table Rock and downtown Boise. The BLM purchased the land from the Alta Harris Family Foundation, a non-profit organization, using money from the Land and Water Conservation Fund.

The land that the BLM acquired connects public land

that the BLM already administers to the north and east with the Idaho Fish and Game Boise River Wildlife Management Area to the southeast. The State of Idaho established the Wildlife Management Area primarily to protect big game winter range. The parcel that the BLM has acquired is considered crucial winter range for mule deer and Rocky Mountain elk. The BLM's acquisition of this property aligns with the America the Beautiful initiative that seeks to conserve fish and wildlife habitat and expand access to public lands and waters through voluntary conservation.

"The Boise Foothills, with the vast amount of open space

they provide, are one of the most iconic landscapes in the State of Idaho," said Tanya Thrift, BLM Boise District Manager. "Bringing this parcel of land into public ownership helps maintain the natural environment and helps ensure that wildlife can continue to thrive there."

"Dallas and Alta Harris were committed to protecting the environment, particularly to preserve areas for wildlife habitat and conservation. We believe that placing this land under the care of the BLM aligns with the wishes expressed by Dallas and Alta to protect our natural habitat," said Felicia Burkhalter, President, The Dallas And Alta Harris Family Foundation.
