Crowfoot Shooting Range Approved

Crowfoot Shooting Range Approval in Avimor September 1, 2022

Present: Commissioners Steven Twilegar, Clay Tucker, and Ryan Stirm (available by phone).

Chairman Twilegar stated that there would be no further testimony to the public gathered to hear the outcome of the proposed Crowfoot Shooting Range. The public hearing was an appeal made by the homeowners in opposition of the approved Boise County Planning and Zoning conditional use permit for the gun range. Twilegar recapped that the previous week the Boise County Board of Commissioners had heard testimony for and against the shooting range, then the period for public comment was closed, and the commissioners decided to table the decision until September 1st.

There were concerns over traffic, fire, and noise. Chairman Twilegar said, "And the noise is an obvious concern, but we are bound by the statute. We could allow higher levels to 80 decibels, but we can't go as low as 64. So, we're bound by Idaho Statute in that respect."

Commissioner Stirm refrained from commenting on the matter, but stated that the board knew where he stood firmly against the approval. Commissioner Tucker said he would like to add an additional condition of approval, stating: "That the applicant shall install onsite water retention... as well as correct connections for

a firetruck to draft or receive water." He also spoke about condition six, regarding sound, "buildings and houses constructed which have a building permit, or have been issued on the date this approval is signed, if tests have failed, applicant will cease operation until mitigation of sound is sufficient to comply with Idaho Code." In regards to condition number seven, he would also like to limit the caliber size.

Commissioner Twilegar offered his suggestion that they have at least a 3,000 gallon unit on site, with a two inch hose, gas or diesel motor propelled pump, tested every two to three months. He spoke further regarding noise tests and the caliber, then said, "Crowfoot, I think they need to provide a comprehensive safety plan that includes fire mitigation."

The board went into a closed executive session to discuss legal ramifications, for a period of 17 minutes.

Coming back into session, Chairman Twilegar said he would make a motion that would contain additional conditions, including a fire suppressing system of 5,000 gallons that could fit a firehose and had a gas or diesel propelled pump. The sound will need to comply with state law, and if it fails will discontinue operations. Twilegar said the comprehensive safety plan will include fire mitigation and, "The safety plan will be reviewed by a certified range safety individual prior to open-



One of many local residents voiced their concerns for safety, the possibility of stray bullets over Highway 55, noise, and fire. There had been a very recent fire on Pearl Road, where the range would be situated, and the fire was not attended to by Eagle Fire District, as described in the proposed plan for fire mitigation. Testimony from the public was heard on August 18th and a final decision to approve with added conditions was made by the Board of County Commissioners on September 1st.

ing the range for sound test or normal operation." He also set "a maximum projectile diameter shall not exceed .375 caliber for center fire rifles."

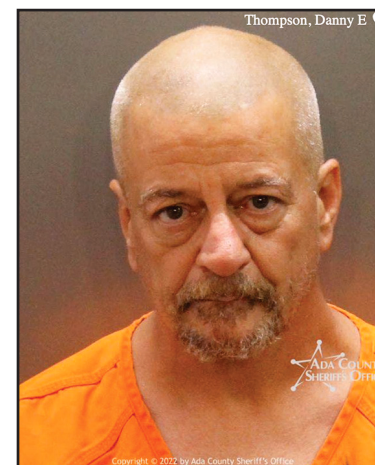
Chairman Twilegar then motioned to uphold the Planning and Zoning Commission approval of the Crowfoot Shooting Range with the findings and conditions, with the modifications of conditions that the Boise County Board of Commissioners have discussed. Commissioner Tucker seconded, and Commissioner Stirm opposed the decision. The motion carried.

Commissioner Twilegar thanked everyone for being there and for their input.

Sheriff's Corner Update:

IDAHO CITY – Danny Thompson was brought in by the Marshal's Taskforce, an agency the Boise County Sheriff's Office reached out to concerning this fugitive, who was regarded as extremely dangerous. Deputies responded on August 27th to a residence south of Idaho City where they found several 9mm shell casings, but were unable to locate the suspect. There were reports of sightings of Thompson still in Idaho City on Tuesday, August 30th, and officers were staked out along Highway 21 making routine stops. Thompson was brought into custody on August 31st and booked at the Ada County Jail on 1st degree murder and unlawful possession of a weapon by a convicted felon. The Boise County Sheriff's Office would like to thank the U.S. Marshals, Boise Police, and the Ada County Sheriff's Office.

On Tuesday night, August 30th, a four door passenger car went into one of the old dredge ponds along Highway 21 at mile marker 35.5. A passing motorist reported seeing tail-lights. When the officers and Thorn Creek Fire arrived, Deputy D. Gomez shed his clothing and dove down, attaching a winch line to the vehicle. The female driver was unresponsive, but after nine rounds of

CPR, they were able to get a pulse before Life Flight arrived on the scene. Unfortunately, the Nampa woman who often came up to visit friends in Idaho City, Anna Reyes 49, passed away at the hospital.

On Saturday afternoon, September 4th, an accident occurred about 1/4 of a mile out of Placerville when an ATV hit square on the driver's side of the postal delivery man's truck. There was damage done to both vehicles, but the condition of the ATV driver and/or whether there was a passenger is unknown. The postal worker had a gash on his forehead, according to a witness and was complaining of a headache. He was Life Flighted to a Boise hospital and his condition has been reported as improving.

August 30, 2022**Present:** Commissioners Steven Twilegar, Clay Tucker, and Ryan Stirm**Pledge of Allegiance****CONSTITUENT INPUT:** None**MINUTES:** The minutes from August 23rd were motioned to approve, seconded, and approved.**SUBDIVISION APPLICATION:** The final plat application for Pioneer Estates was approved after the public hearing and by the commissioners several weeks ago, P&Z Administrator Alex Gross said. He added that the "FCOs" were ready for their approval and signature, also the land plat was ready to be signed.

Commissioner Twilegar motioned to approve the final plat application for Pioneer Estates subdivision. The motion carried. Chairman Twilegar then motioned to approve "the findings of fact and conclusions of law and order in the matter of Pioneer Estates subdivision." All were in favor and the motion carried.

AVIMOR LETTER: Mr. Gross recounted that "the City of Eagle had sent out a notice to us that Avimor has made their application to Eagle for annexation of their development in Ada, Boise, and Gem County... and they asked for comments." The letter was drafted by Gross and will be reviewed by Prosecutor Adam Strong. Commissioner Tucker commented, "I've still got to do a lot more research on what actually happens in annexing to actually have an opinion." Gross said the comments were due by next Tuesday (September 6) and that all of the materials were available on Eagle's website.

Commissioner Twilegar would like to put this topic on the agenda for the following week and make a decision on it.

SUBDIVISION: A subdivision by Danskin Station in Garden Valley was discussed regarding Central District Health, annexing, and small lots under 2 acres that were developed back in 1974. Commissioner Stirm recounted some history and said, "Nobody lives there, currently, they just own the property there. Because they can't have houses there because they have no water, they have no septic."

Gross said that on a future agenda he would be bringing information on Old Mill Acres

and Duquette Pines. Public hearings for October 11th were discussed.**JUVENILE JUSTICE:** Amanda Leader said their building has had a bat problem for many years and referred to it as a "bat palace. Yeah, if you look at the siding, it looks like a paradise for bats and I don't know how many there are." They tried netting and an irritant, but now "they're chewing into our building. They're trying to get into the building. Well, they leave every October, and that's great. But you can look at our building right now, every single window has bat urine on it, there's feces everywhere. The very back window is even worse."

Commissioner Tucker stated that bats are protected. Commissioner Stirm joked, "Can we build them a better palace farther away?" The cost for bat removal is \$5,000. Leader spoke about caulking the building, after the bats leave for the evening, and then they can't come back in again. Tucker said, "They're hard to get rid of, I know that." Stirm mentioned there was a rabies death in Boise County, first one in around 50 years, "Well, I definitely don't want to see a workman's comp complaint from a bat attack, or rabies shots."

APPEAL CELL TOWER ISSUE: Prosecutor Strong said, "We're going to try and keep the legal bills on this as minimal as possible. We've already done some of the filings ourselves. This is for the appeal on the cell tower issue."**REPUBLICAN PARTY:** Chairman Twilegar motioned up to three and a half percent increase as a hedge for the Republican contract. All were in favor.**VETERANS' PARK:** A park on Main Street, on a small lot, was deeded to the Idaho City Historical Foundation twenty-five years ago and the lease has run out. Commissioner Twilegar suggested to lease it at \$1 a year, and Beth Wilson, president of ICHF, will bring it back to the board to decide.**ROAD AND BRIDGE:** Curtis Dill said that the Boise Bridge was rated pretty high for potential funding. He said he was disappointed that the Gardena Bridge rated low.**EMERGENCY MANAGER:** Twilegar motioned to receive money for an agreement in the amount of \$23,775. This

will help pay for the emergency manager position. All were in favor.

LIQUOR LICENSES: There was a long list of retail alcohol beverage licenses, which were each motioned and approved.**911 PHONE SERVICE:** Commissioner Twilegar motioned to approve a 911 phone service in the amount of \$1,653.49. All were in favor.**JUVENILE JUSTICE:** The department will be putting games together for kids for Idaho City Days.**EMERGENCY MANAGER:** Trinia Richardson said that they were "working on active shooter training" with the sheriff's office, Idaho City Police, and at the school.**ROAD & BRIDGE:** Dill said he hired another person from Horseshoe Bend, "hopefully, starting tomorrow." He said they are starting to wind down on the dust abatement and what they are able to do this year. They will start hauling in sand, all the trees are cut down, and they're worried about erosion. Water levels are too low and so they can't grade the roads. They joked about doing a rain dance.

Dill reported that the fuel tanks for county use were looking good so far and that the county is on track to have them in before the snow flies.

SOLID WASTE: There was an incident in Lowman when an employee got his days switched and didn't open the dump.**PLANNING & ZONING:** Gross reported that they were really busy.**SHERIFF:** Commissioner Twilegar asked the sheriff about his weekend. Sheriff Turner replied, "Our weekend was extremely busy. I would like to say that it was slowing down, but that's far from the truth. We're having a pretty good run-in with some major stuff here over the last week. It's really busy. We're still trying to get caught up."**ASSESSOR:** Chris Juszcak said that 2021 was completely done. He spoke about the circuit breaker reduction program [for disabled veterans, etc.], "There was a new law that went into effect this year, that if your property is 150% higher than the median value in the county, you're no longer eligible for this property tax reduction. There is a deferral program through the State Tax Commission, but

you have to own your property free and clear to go and do that."

Juszcak spoke about the computer software and switching from Computer Arts. This software from the tax commission will work with the Treasurer and Assessor's office.

CLERK: Mary Prisco said they were still working on the budget, which the board will need to approve. The County Commissioners will also need to review the taxing districts.

She also pointed out, "We've got year-end coming up rapidly, so we've already started on looking through the financials and making adjustments, correcting errors." She said there would be some resolutions that come before the board to correct the budget.

MONTGOMERY STREET: The ownership of Montgomery Street in Idaho City was in question and whether the county owned it. Prosecutor Strong said, "The default is, the roads that are within an organized city... are the responsibility of the city." He said there were some things that could change that. The city has said there was a deed to the county, but that has not been produced.**BOISE COUNTY PUBLIC HEARING ON THE BUDGET:** Clerk Mary Prisco made a presentation on the FY2023 proposed budget and said there would be time for questions at the end. She spoke about the property taxes, cash carryover, expenses, and department revenues. She

said the budget was larger. The salaries increased 6.5%, benefits increased 6.4%, operations were 7%, and capital increased 31.3%. Prisco said, "This final budget, which is less than the tentative budget that was published, reflects up to 8% cost of living increase for each employee. And one of the questions that I had of myself, and a few other people have asked me is, why are the salaries then only 6.5%. I think the primary reason for that is that in the [FY] '22 budget." She explained, "So, we fully funded the liability for outstanding vacation approval and compensated assets approvals." She spoke about the Road and Sheriff Department. Clerk Prisco said, "The medical piece of health insurance did go up 9.5% from fiscal year 2022." She added, "In the fiscal year 2023 budget, there is \$55,348 of property taxes that Boise County could take, could levy for, but has chosen not to."

She reported that the county received \$541,000 from the state sale's tax for the county's road and bridge department, and a second part of less than \$200,000. Prisco said, "That allowed some changes with the department that were really needed, in terms of being able to raise the compensation to a level for the equipment operators that we can hopefully recruit candidates at those wages and also retain the employees that we currently have." There

were a few employees that were offered greater than the 8% increase. She later said that she pulled information from the Idaho Department of Labor, which pulls from national data, "and the July 2021 to July 2022 cost of living percentage was 8.5%. So, I think that 8% is validated."

PUBLIC HEARING PORTION: Past Garden Valley Commissioner Jamie Anderson asked questions regarding the budget amounts. She said, "I found some discrepancies in the tentative published budget and the budget that you [Clerk Prisco] presented on these pages today." Clerk Prisco responded to her question regarding the coroner's budget, "The rule of, you can only go down [from the published tentative budget], comes from the state tax commission."

Anderson then asked about fund balances, cash carryover for 2021 was \$2.1 million, and 2020 was \$1.47 million. She questioned, "How does the county sustain those kinds of fund balances, that we didn't use that kind of cash every year?" She said the county now has \$1,875 in a savings account.

Clerk Prisco responded, "Cash carryover, cash reserves is looked at for each year, individually. It is not like a revenue stream." The financial policy for the county, "requires that we keep, we hold back - to your point, a certain amount of dollars in case of an emergency. So, we're doing that every year."

Jayne Reed of Garden Valley said, "I am bothered, to put it mildly, at the \$15.3 million dollar budget" and the increase. She asked if it was going to continue on that trajectory and Commissioner Stirm answered, "At the rate we're going with the current federal administration, people are paying a million dollars

for a \$300,000 house in this county. Your taxes are going to not go up, I mean they're going to go up the standard amount. Most likely, but that increases your budget. You've got a county less than forty miles away from here that's paying their people three times what we're paying our people and we have to compete with that." He also discussed capital projects expenditures and the possibility of buying a building for the prosecutor's office.

Reed then had complaints about the paving the county had done. After living on a dirt road for 49 years, she said, "*Dust keeps people alive.* It tells you when people are coming around the corner or over that direction, when you're driving on a dusty road." Commissioner Twilegar asked, "You like dust?" She quickly replied, "You bet!"

There was a lengthy discussion about inflation and keeping employees.

Commissioner Tucker asked Clerk Prisco further about the cash carryover and the amount that would not need to be taxed. She responded that property tax was the most stable revenue that the county has for roads and employment. Prisco spoke about the capital projects fund, "That is a savings account, in that, it's for setting us up for long-term changes that we would otherwise have to do a bond for, i.e. tax people for. Obviously, *it might not pass.* But, my point is that, there is no other way that I know of to save towards those large capital expenditures."

EBCAD: Acting as the governing board for the East Boise County Ambulance District, Commissioner Twilegar asked the director to state her name for the record. Melissa Potts recounted the number of calls to service they responded to. "In 2021, we responded to 452 calls. The previous year, we had 354 calls. So, every year, there's more and more people in the valley, people at risk. We get busier and busier. So far this year, we're at 263, which is putting us pretty much where we were at this time last year." She added that with growth and people discovering Boise County, the numbers are going to continue to climb.

Potts discussed property taxes, their budget, and budgeting for a new ambulance.

There was no public discussion.

Chairman Twilegar made a

motion to adopt a resolution for the FY2023 EBCAD budget. The motion carried. He then made a motion to have EBCAD operate on "a cash basis and carryover" of fund balances for the FY2023 budget. All were in favor.

BOISE COUNTY PROPOSED BUDGET DISCUSSION: Chairman Twilegar said for the record that he appreciated the spirited debate, "It's been a painful year for everybody. They're seeing their values of their houses going up, taxes, all that good stuff. It's hitting all of us. I think it's an emotional issue, but the idea that we've been sitting here doing *nothing* for three months is of course no true. We have hammered this out here in great detail."

He asked the clerk to continue and said they had some new information, "Again, for the record, this is totally an estimation. We have no way of actually knowing it." Clerk Prisco clarified, "The reason why I say it is an estimate is because we're still somewhere in the middle of the process... This estimate estimates the 2023 fiscal year property tax for 2022 tax year at 0.001982383." Commissioner Stirm stated: "Which I would like to point out, for the record, is one percent lower than last year." Clerk Prisco and Commissioner Twilegar said, "It's more than that."

Commissioner Tucker asked about the maximum levy rate, "We won't have anything overmaxed, will we?" Clerk Prisco replied, "No." She said she had it built into her spreadsheets to never go over. Prisco added, "Because the assessed values have grown so much, the max levy rate for each of the county funds - it's like we're so far off from the max amounts, *it's crazy.*"

Commissioner Twilegar thanked the new commissioner for his "good questions" and asked if anyone else had any questions. No one did, so he proceeded with a motion to adopt Resolution 2022-29, a Boise County resolution adopting the Boise County budget for fiscal year 2023." Commissioner Tucker seconded, and all were in favor. The motion carried.

Chairman Twilegar then motioned "to adopt Resolution 2022-30, a Boise County resolution to operate on a cash basis and carryover of appropriate fund balances into the year 2023 budget." Commissioner

Stirm seconded and all were in favor. The motion carried.

Clerk Mary Prisco clarified on the cash carryover, "Not every single fund dollar amount is going to agree into the revenue budget detail sheet. And the reason why is because some of those funds have transferred and it's not the same as cash carryover. A transfer is literally a transfer." She said it may cause some confusion and offered, "So, road and bridge [department] for example, we've got \$270,000 transfer between the general fund and road and bridge fund. It is really a revenue item for road and bridge, and it's not using road and bridge's cash reserve at all."

Commissioner Twilegar asked if the clerk had anything else to share for clarification on the record. Clerk Prisco replied that she didn't and laughed, "Glad this is over." Twilegar said for the record, "I think we all are. Thanks for your hard work. Thanks for everybody's hard work. I know this is a horrible time of year... made to pound this out." Commissioner Stirm commented, "It's amazing that we did this in one day. *Good job, guys.*" Commissioner Twilegar clarified with a chuckle, "For the record, we did not do it in one day."

Adjourned at 3:28 pm.

Be Bear Aware in Boise County, Avoid Conflicts and Encounters



Boise County residents can help avoid bear conflicts by storing food and garbage properly

BOISE COUNTY -- After recent black bear break-ins to homes in Crouch, F&G staff reminds residents that they can help prevent human-bear conflicts

In late August, Idaho Fish and Game staff in the Southwest Region received multiple reports about a black bear breaking into homes in Crouch, with conflicts centered around the Castle Mountain and Terrace Lakes neighborhoods.

"This bear in Crouch has actually broken into area residences seeking and obtaining food rewards, which is obviously concerning behavior," said Regional Wildlife Manager Ryan Walrath. "We are currently working to trap this animal, but want area residents to be aware that there are measures they can take to help prevent 'bad' bear behavior from escalating to this point, or from happening in the first place."

With fall approaching, Idaho's black bears are on the move and preparing for denning season, seeking out and gobbling up food to help them pack on the pounds.

This annual race to put on as much weight as possible before going into hibernation begins in mid-summer and lasts into early fall. Not coincidentally, this time of year is when Fish and Game staff receive the most reports of human-black bear conflicts in Boise County neighborhoods and elsewhere in Idaho. In most cases,

the conflicts arise from human behavior more so than bear behavior.

Conflicts happen when bears are able to score an easy meal in town.

Heading into the winter, black bears can pack on as much as 30 pounds per week and add about 4-5 inches of body fat prior to denning. To do that, they need to consume around 20,000 calories per day, so bears are continually on the hunt for food that's high in protein and fat.

In more rural towns like Crouch, which are located on the urban-wildland interface and sit right in the middle of bear habitat, bears will always move through town looking for good smells and food. Unfortunately, they often find human food sources – such as garbage, pet food, or bird feeders – all of which are high in calories and readily available. That's when the problems start.

"In the vast majority of cases, it's not a bear problem – it's a people problem. Bears are being provided with an easy meal and becoming habituated to humans, and that's when we see unwanted and unsafe bear behaviors escalate," Walrath said.

It usually goes from bad to worse.

Finding food inadvertently provided by people is bad for bears and people, and it often ends with a dead bear because when the animals find a regular food source in neighborhoods, they become less fearful of people.

"They can grow impatient or even pushy in their search for food and may not leave when you try to scare them away, because the promise of food overcomes their fear of people," Walrath added. "And that is a dangerous situation."

When it becomes evident that a bear has become excessively ha-

bituated to that food source, or has lost its wariness of humans (such as the bear breaking into homes in Crouch), biologists and conservation officers often have no choice but to trap and kill the bear. In cases like these, the habituated bears cannot be moved, because research shows they will quickly travel long distances to seek out human foods in their new locations.

"We cannot responsibly move a habituated bear knowing it will likely visit the nearest campground or neighborhood and cause a potential safety hazard," said Regional Supervisor Josh Royse. "We use the adage, 'A fed bear is a dead bear,' because whenever a bear becomes habituated, that is almost always the only option. It's not a part of the job that any of us enjoy, but it is almost always the

only appropriate course of action in the interest of public safety."

Keeping bears wild and away from homes takes effort and cooperation.

Luckily, there are a lot of things that people can do to prevent black bears from becoming habituated, protecting both the residents in their neighborhood and the black bears moving through it.

The key to keeping Idaho bears wild is to not allow them to access human food sources around neighborhoods and homes. Black bears have been roaming North America for the last 500,000 years – they are well-equipped to survive without human food by foraging primarily on grasses, buds, forbs, insects, berries, and occasionally meat.

Bears are extremely intelligent and can learn very quickly to asso-

ciate people with food. The presence of unsecured human food sources like residential garbage, bird feeders, dog food, chicken coops, or even fruit trees causes human/bear conflicts that rarely end well for the bears, and often means a messy, and likely unsafe, situation for a property owner.

"This is why we put so much emphasis on preventing bears from getting food rewards from humans. Once the bear becomes habituated, which can happen after getting into an unsecured garbage can only a handful of times, almost without fail, our only option is to euthanize the bear," Royse said. "We absolutely don't want to see that outcome. For this reason, you continually see us implore the public to do everything they can to not contribute to the problem."

Idaho Fish and Game

Following the steps below helps protect both you and the bears:

- Remove bird feeders between April and mid-November
 - Feed pets inside
 - Get a bear-resistant trash can and use it properly; don't tamper with latches, prop them open, or over fill them. If you don't have a bear-resistant can or if there is too much trash to fit in the can, keep it in a garage until the morning of pickup.
 - Do not keep coolers, refrigerators, or freezers outside
 - If a bear has already visited your place and found food, take the above steps right away. The bear will likely pay you a couple more visits, but if it finds no food, it will eventually move on

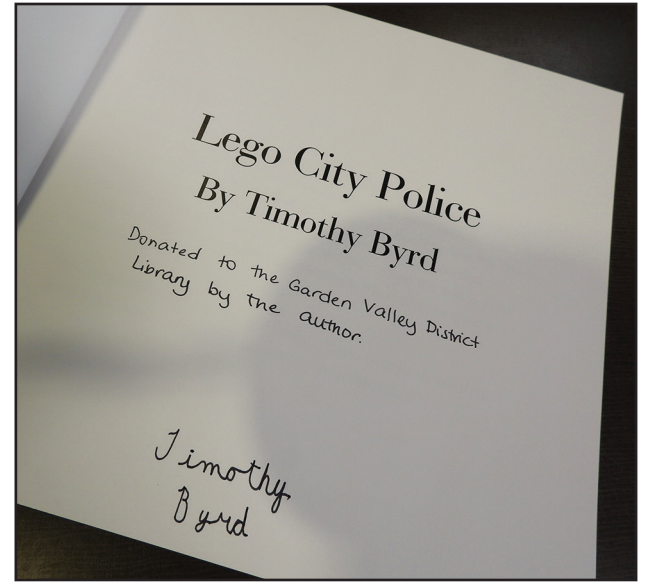
Timothy Byrd from Garden Valley writes 'Lego City Police'

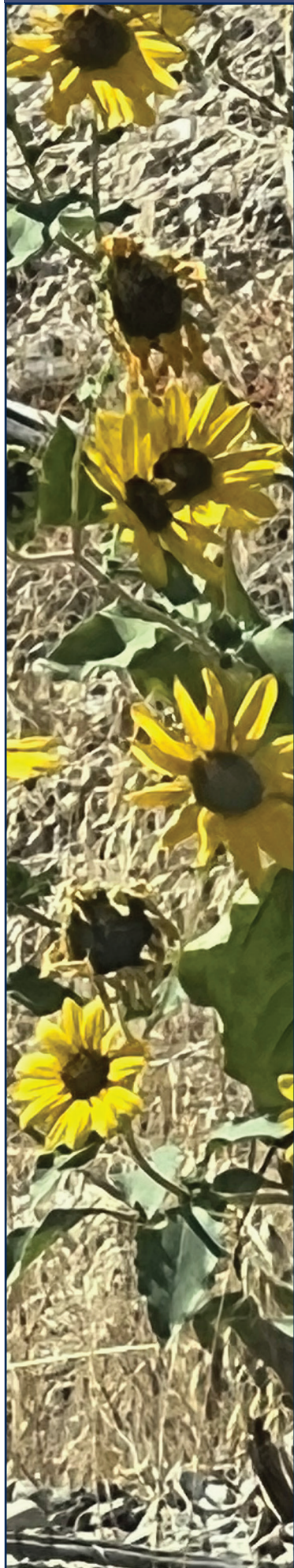

ANNUAL APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE FOR FISCAL YEAR 2022-2023
