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BOISE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

November 29, 2022

Present: Commissioners Steven Twilegar, Clay Tucker, and Ryan Stirm (via phone conference).

Pledge of Allegiance
CONSTITUENT INPUT:

MINUTES: Chairman Twilegar motioned to approve the minutes from November 22, 2022. The motion carried.

PLANNING & ZONING FINDINGS OF FACT: Chairman Twilegar motioned to adopt the findings of fact for the appeal for Castle Mountain Homes, LLC. The motion carried.

JUVENILE JUSTICE ANNUAL FINANCIAL RE-PORT: Chairman Twilegar motioned to accept the juvenile justice annual financial report, which was due the beginning of December. The motion was approved.

ROAD DEPARTMENT
VEHICLE PURCHASE:
Chairman Twilegar motioned
to approve the purchase of
a 2017 Ford F-150 from the
Idaho Bureau of Federal Surplus Property in the amount of
\$22,500 for the road department.

He then motioned to pay the State Bureau of Federal Surplus Property in the amount of \$22,500 for this F-150. All were in favor and the motions passed.

SHERIFF: Sheriff Scott Turner explained that the body armor is rotated out every five years and that this year's purchase had been budgeted for. Commissioner Twilegar motioned to approve this purchase for body armor replacement for expired body armor for the Sheriff's department in the amount of \$9,961. Commissioner Tucker seconded the motion and the motion carried.

BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT: Brent Ralston, field manager for the BLM based out of Boise, and Eric Grace, an Executive Director for a land trust also based out of Boise, introduced themselves.

Ralston gave an update on some of the projects they have been working on. He spoke about fuelwood and said they "are structuring a little bit of change with pricing. Right now we have a two cord minimum at \$12.50 a cord, for a \$25 permit. We are going to restructure that and we're going to go to \$6.25 a cord for a four cord minimum, for a total of \$25 per a permit." He ex-

plained, "A lot of that is really to get at one of the issues that we have in the southern part of the district, is the Juniper and the amount of Juniper, and we want to see more of it off the ground, rather than charging a whole lot more, we've increased the minimum cords for the same amount." He said this change was put into effect this year. Permits may be purchased online, or at the front desk at their BLM office in Boise.

Ralston spoke about the thinning done in the Charcoal Gulch area and around homes. The materials were piled and they plan on burning them next year.

Commissioner Tucker commented about the permits, "I know the Forest Service did the same thing on fuelwood permits. *I think it's nice*." Commissioner Twilegar added, "It can't hurt; that's for sure."

Ralston added that they are working on some right-of-ways around Idaho City. There was also an issue with an Idaho Power overhead powerline that went in, which was supposed to be buried because it was in the Idaho City historical district. The BLM is also working with Mayor Everhart on possible grant money for the rodeo grounds. Ralston said, "My understanding is that in order to successfully get grant funding that was being looked at, the property needs to be owned by either the county or the city. And that is a process that we can go through and actually patent those lands to the county or the city." He shared that there may be a bit of a cost associated with that process.

AVIMOR: The annexation and expansion was discussed. There is a property located near the development that a private landowner discussed donating to the BLM as a land trust of 320 acres to have it permanently protected. While touring the property, the BLM determined that it really was an important piece for elk habitat. There were also trails on it and

access for hiking and biking. The Land Trust of the Treasure Valley did the fundraising to purchase the property and now owns the property. Now, they hope to reach an agreement wherein the BLM will purchase the land. If this doesn't happen, they will maintain ownership.

Funding for the land is being reviewed at the National BLM office and being evaluated for purchase.

Chairman Twilegar thanked the gentlemen for coming in and for giving an update. He added, "If you need anything from us, please let us know."

SOLID WASTE: Paul Rekow said operations are starting to slow down at the transfer stations. He said they have started burning [brush piles] in Lowman, Idaho City, and soon in Garden Valley.

SHERIFF: Sheriff Turner reported that there has been an increase in Christmas tree hunters and car crashes, and said it was challenging over the weekend. He said that one of his deputies made a routine traffic stop of a reckless driver and found a large amount of methamphetamines. The vehicle was seized, passing though Horseshoe Bend on Highway 55. "We're actually pulling a lot of drugs off of the streets." Sheriff Turner continued, "We're going to take his stuff. There's a big push that we can seize cash and property for moving drugs. We're going to take it. We're sending a message that we don't want that here and we're going to take it." Chairman Twilegar said an enthusiastic, "Awesome!"

Sheriff Turner said Sargent Archer had written for a large grant and they were awarded the grant for over \$13,000 to buy new handheld breathalyzers for all the deputies to replace the old ones that cannot be serviced anymore. The sheriff added, "We're chipping away at grants." Twilegar was in favor of their efforts.

GRANT WRITER: Nancy Holbert said she was still un-

able to get on "grants.gov" and needs this worked through Clerk Mary Prisco. The grant writer said she was able to get some funding, is looking at broadband internet, and briefly discussed some other options.

ROAD DEPARTMENT: Curtis Dill reported that they are going down a list, "Today we're doing guardrails, because people keep crashing our guardrails. So, that's today's project."

IT: Commissioner Twilegar asked about remote video for the Commissioners' Room and when that could be accomplished. Technology was discussed and a new tv monitor. Acquiring an estimate and pricing was also discussed.

PROSECUTOR'S OF-FICE: Adam Strong recognized that whenever there's an uptick with the Sheriff's office there's an uptick with the Prosecutor's Office. They have seen "a little bit of an uptick in drug cases," but there have been a steady increase of sex cases over the past six to eight months. The Prosecutor's Office has also been dealing with a software company used by the

county.

PLANNING AND ZON-ING: Alex Gross said their inspector did more inspections - breaking previous record numbers - than in any previous October. He did well over one hundred, spread out all

throughout the county.

CLERK: Mary Prisco said they are processing annual reports. She mentioned that there was a conference for newly elected officials that she would be attending. Commissioner Tucker said he should also attend. She hopes to get more information on alternate software for county use.

BOISE STREET BRIDGE: Horseshoe Bend Mayor Pat Goff joined the meeting via phone. Commissioner Twilegar was under the impression that the city would take the bridge if the county replaces the Boise Street Bridge. An engineer, Trevor Howard, recapped that the bridge would be built without any matching funds needed from the county. The board will discuss this further, and then perhaps vote on moving forward with the city of Horseshoe Bend at the next meeting. Adjourned at 1:16pm.





Jim Davis 1946 - 2022

James "Jim" Gail Davis, 76, passed away on the 1st of December, 2022, in Boise, ID, his home for over 40 years.

Jim was born in Kentucky and raised mainly by his sister and a family friend affectionately known as "Dad Brown." He met Susan, the love of his life, in college at the University of Ohio. He swept her off her feet, literally, with a number of motorcycle rides, eventually marrying in September of 1967. Jim and Sue were married over 55 years, raising two children, Greg and Eric.

Jim is survived by his loving wife, Susan, his sons Greg (wife Brooke) and Eric (wife Jessica), grandsons Jacob and Austin (wife Ashley), granddaughters Paige and Mya, and newborn great-grandson

James.

Jim was an early, largely self-taught, programmer. He started in the era of punch cards, working on driver's licensing and government systems for multiple states and in multiple countries, including Germany and Canada. His computer science career enabled his love of travel: Sue and Jim explored every state in the United States, and traveled throughout Europe while living in Germany.

In addition to his love of travel, Jim was an avid photographer, puzzler, tinkerer, cinephile, lover of nature, and lover of planes. His love of aeronautics led him to get his pilot's license in the 70s, and lose many model planes in the mountains of Idaho in the 80s and 90s. He

drove all over the country for work and for pleasure, logging over 450,000 miles in his iconic Toyota Tercel.

Jim was a smart, funny, and mischievous person, up to the very end. He will be well remembered for his devotion and care for his wife, his dedication to his career, his respect and love for nature, and his orange fishing hats.

A memorial service will be held for Jim at the Relyea Funeral Chapel at 318 N. Latah Street, Boise, ID 83706 on 8 December at 3:00PM. We will follow the short service at Idaho Pizza for more stories and remembrances. His burial in the Pioneer Cemetery in Idaho City will occur later in the Spring of 2023.



an average of 5 per game.



Has the Idaho Transportation Department abandoned Highway 21? I have noticed several trends in road maintenance since they moved the Idaho City Foreman to the Orchard St shop in Boise. They have stopped cleaning the borrow pits, leaving old rockslides in place. In several areas the rocks are inches from the fog line. On a highway with very few places to pull off, they have created yet another obstacle for the traveling public. In not cleaning the borrow pits of old rockslides, they have created a ramp for new rockslides to land directly in the traffic lane. ITD has also seemed to abandon the practice of filling cracks in the roadway with sealant. So now we see these cracks, which are very often in the wheel path, filling with water, freezing and getting wider. At some locations potholes have begun to form from the freeze/thaw action. Then they close the highway due to a lack of personnel to plow the snow and keep it open. They used to hire temporary employees to assist with winter snow plowing.

I think the biggest problem ITD has is having a foreman

in Boise who does not see the day-to-day problems that occur and does not assign resources in a "maintenance oriented" manner. He and his family are not in danger on a highway that is rapidly falling into disrepair.





