HORSESHOE BEND CITY COUNCIL

Due to the lack of a quorum, the regularly scheduled Horseshoe Bend City Council meeting on Wednesday, January 11, 2023 was moved to Tuesday, January 17, 2023. The following is a synopsis of that meeting.

All council members were present, city attorney Tony Pantera attended via Zoom. There were no spectators in the audience. Mayor Pat Goff made the call to order at 7:00 p.m. and then led the Pledge of Allegiance. After unanimous approval of the agenda, minutes from the previous meeting, and the authorization to pay the city's bills, Goff opened the meeting with new business.

First up on the agenda was the approval of the city's business liquor licenses. No changes were noted from last year, with the exception of the new owners of the Long Branch. All licenses were approved unanimously.

Next on the agenda was the approval of a bid to purchase a new backhoe. Public Works representative Jobie Catherman presented two bids; one for just a backhoe, the other for a backhoe plus fork attachments. Catherman told the council, "I'm kind of either way on it, they're kind of handy to have." Councilmember Stephen Chartier responded, "Well, if we need it." Catherman indicated that public works has been borrowing resident Dave Wallace's backhoe since the city's backhoe broke down. Catherman said public works uses the backhoe ten to twelve times per year, mostly for water main and sewer line repairs. Councilmember Martye White inquired if there were any grants to be had that could possibly help with the purchase, to which Goff replied, "No." Catherman told the council that he looked for a grant, but couldn't find one. The new tractor would have 4-wheel drive, unlike the previous backhoe, which has 2-wheel drive only. Goff asked about the lease options Catherman responded and that there were three options, a 3-year, 5-year, or 7-year lease. Councilmember White expressed his concerns over purchasing a John Deer backhoe, because repairs can only be done by authorized dealers, or the warranty becomes void. His other concern was, "It's a hell of a lot of money." The

old tractor cost \$28K, in comparison to the new backhoe at \$146k. "If we're going to be digging up sewer lines, we need the equipment to do it. I think it's good to have the equipment to do it," Goff said. Councilmember Patti Burgess jokingly said, "44 years isn't that old," referring to the age of the old backhoe and then questioned if the purchase was allocated in the budget. Goff replied that it was and that the city could replace three pieces of equipment with the purchase. Catherman agreed with Goff's assessment and said the replaced equipment could go to a surplus sale. The city discussed the different lease terms and decided the 5-year would be best. Following that plan, the city will end up paying \$168,392 for the backhoe, with a \$1.00 final payment buyout. The lease allows for 500 hours to be put on the equipment per year and Caterman said they would never hit those hours. Councilmember White continued to lament the manufacturer choice, stating, "I wish we had another option than John Deere," adding, "John Deere is under a lawsuit right now." (John Deere is currently embroiled in a right to repair class-action lawsuit that was filed last year. The lawsuit alleges that John Deer violated the Sherman Act, a federal antitrust act.) Councilmember Curtis Corvinus made a motion to purchase the backhoe, but city attorney Pantera objected and asked that the wording "pending review by legal counsel" be added to the motion. Corvinus amended the motion and it was seconded by White. White then asked Catherman to keep looking for a different manufactur-

er, as he couldn't believe that


nothing else could be found. Goff told White, "The supply chain is broken." He then went on to say, "I know John Deere leaves a bad taste in people's mouths, so does Case, (Horseshoe Bend's previously purchased backhoe). It's like Ford, Chevy or Dodge." Goff called for a vote and the amended motion was approved unanimously.

There was no report from the EMS Department.

Public Works: Catherman told the council, "It's been a pretty busy month." The department has been working with the county on the Boise County bridge project and a wastewater discharge permit. DEQ has named PFA and PFO contaminants as forever contaminants and public works has been receiving training on how to deal with their threat to the water system. Catherman suggested the city sign up for a preliminary self-test (as well as signing on to a class action lawsuit) to get funds to help with future clean up. He added that both plants have been running well. Catherman concluded by stating, "We'd be wise to be proactive," referring to the PFA and PFO contaminants. Chartier said it seems "it's like the next asbestos." **Engineering:** They are ready to submit a planning grant to receive funding for the future emerging contaminants that Catherman mentioned in the public works report. They are also working Photo by Tracy Koslosky

on improving the ozone disinfecting, making sure it is doing what's needed. They are currently working in conjunction with public works on the Boise Street bridge. Pantera said there was a hearing on the Canyon Street mobile home park, with no meaningful changes in fact. He stated that he would reserve any comments for a future executive meeting.

Goff adjourned the meeting at 7:31 p.m.






