Cold Case and Suspicious Death of Mark Carlson

BOISE COUNTY -- Mark Carlson, 17, came up to do some hunting in Boise County near Placerville on October 20th, 1974. He had let people know that he would be going with "friends," but never identified them by name. Carlson stopped off at a store on the way and the clerk later said there were other occupants in his 1965 blue Mustang. According to his sister, Connie Sheldon, Carlson had friends in the Idaho City area. Connie Sheldon believes that there may be ties there. Since Carlson's death in 1974, nearly fifty years ago, Sheldon has hired private investigators in hopes of gaining closure but no concrete evidence was ever produced. In addition, several key people of interest avoided being interviewed.

In 1974, October 20th was a Sunday, and the family knew that something was terribly wrong when Mark Carlson did not come home that night. They feared that he might have been lost, with no word of his whereabouts until the sheriff called.

Boise County Sheriff Jack Williams said a snowstorm had covered Carlson's body, which was not visible to searchers until early Tuesday morning, when he was found face down in a creek bed at Huckleberry Flat, below the Harris Creek summit. Search and rescue volunteers found the body about 100 yards from his Mustang. His valuables, including his watch, wallet, and other things were still on his person. His hunting jacket and bolt-action Sears rifle were not with the

body. There was mud caked on his clothing on one side, as though he had been dragged, or possibly dragged himself.

Some forty volunteers searched for the young man, and eventually found the body

under a branch, down in the creek, in a position that suggested he might have dragged himself up for a drink of water. [The loss of blood oftentimes produces an intolerable thirst.]

An autopsy was ordered to determine the type of gun used to inflict the wound that entered through his stomach and exited out his back. The report also indicated that there was a lump found on Carlson's head. It was reported that Carlson had been mortally wounded by the gun-

shot, and likely bled out in 20 minutes. His death was attributed to the loss of blood. One of the main veins leading to the heart had been severed, causing the authorities to suggest he may have been dragged to the water, potentially not having the strength to drag himself.

The gun was found two years later with one spent shell casing, a mile and a half away. That was a leading factor that indicated to Idaho State Police investigators that this was indeed a homicide case.

Mark Carlson was from a family of six kids. He swam at the YMCA and coached little league. He was a busboy for the Downtowner in Boise. He had just bought his first car

with the help of his parents co-signing on the loan, for a shiny blue 1965 Mustang. His sister, Connie Sheldon described him as too shy to have a girlfriend, he had never drunk alcohol or smoked, he didn't get into trouble, and yet, he was a little naive as a young 17-year-old. She worried that maybe someone envied him for the car he drove.

The Idaho State Police considers this an unsolved homicide and would appreciate any credible leads that could bring closure for this family. Please contact Crime Stoppers of Southwest Idaho, 208-343-COPS. They are offering a reward and the family is willing to match that for information that leads to an arrest.

Fatal Crash on Banks Lowman Road

IDAHO STATE POLICE NEWS RELEASE

BOISE COUNTY -- Idaho State Police is investigating a two-vehicle fatal crash that occurred at 4:05 PM on Tuesday, February 14th, 2023, in Boise County.

A female driver, 72, and a male passenger, 68, both of Nampa, were traveling westbound on Banks Lowman Road in a Chevrolet SUV, failed to stop at a stop sign, and were struck by a Ford van being driven by a 23-year-old female of Boise. The Chevrolet SUV

went off the road and into the embankment.

All occupants were wearing seatbelts. The driver of the Chevrolet SUV was transported to a local hospital by air ambulance. The driver of the Ford van was transported to a local hospital by ground ambulance.

The male passenger of the Chevrolet succumbed to his injuries at the scene.

All lanes of travel were blocked for approximately 2 hours and 10 minutes. This incident remains under investigation by the Idaho State Police.

February 7, 2023

Present: Commissioners Steven Twilegar, Clay Tucker, and Lindy Lindstrom

Pledge of Allegiance

CONSTITUENT INPUT: A gentleman spoke about a tire hazard in the road, a piece of metal sticking up in Placerville. Road Department Curtis Dill said that they didn't have the manpower to dig it up last year, but plan on taking care of the problem this spring. "We won't dig this time of year," Dill said.

Another gentleman from the Highway 21 area spoke about "the Boise County system of justice." He said he hired a man to build him a shop, but the individual walked away with \$15,000 and wasn't prosecuted. He then spoke about a neighbor confrontation and trespassing. The individual said he sold the house rather than get into another bad confrontation. There was a battery charge placed against him that he said the deputy prosecutor called and reported as dropped. He was upset that it didn't go to trial, because he was hoping to "educate." Several months later, he recounted that he went out to eat with friends in Emmett, and was pulled over for no front license plate. Four deputy vehicles showed up, he was told to put his hands on the vehicle, and he was handcuffed, "for failure to appear" in Boise County court and there was a warrant out for his arrest. He was then thrown in a dirty jail. He has retained a lawyer and stated, "The reason why I'm telling you all this today, is because, when your constituents come up to you and they ask you, why is Boise County being sued again? I want you all to be able to say to them, I met the man, I heard his story, and I get it."

MINUTES: Chairman Twilegar motioned to approve the minutes from January 31st. The motion carried.

POLLING LOCATION: Clerk Mary Prisco spoke about the March 14th election for the Horseshoe Bend School District levy. Chairman Twilegar motioned to approve the polling location at the Mutual Improvement Auxiliary Club, precinct #90, and absentee ballots to the Boise County Recorder's Office. This was seconded and all ayes.

FUNDS: Clerk Prisco said there was a time limit on when the board is required to allocate the funds. She presented

a remaining cash report for the accounts. Prosecutor Adam Strong addressed the restrictions.

JERUSALEM ROAD: Dill said there were a lot of people who travel that road this time of year for the access. "The concern that has been brought up... was putting a gate on a public land, because it is technically a public [land] access," says Dill. Prosecutor Strong said, "I'm not sure if there's any case law or statute on it. We're allowed to close the road for safety, for maintenance of the roads, for any of those types of things." It's still a county road, but Strong added that he understood it's primarily the people that live up there, and they let all their friends come up and use it. "So, we have a county road that has essentially been turned into a private road, but it's still being mostly maintained by the county." Strong encouraged the commissioners to make a decision on how they wanted to proceed, because the individuals are closing it off to the general public in which "all the county citizens pay for it." Dill reported that it was only closed seasonally. Twilegar said he had a problem with allowing only certain people in, but suggested that they close the road after hunting season.

Commissioner Lindstrom said he understood both sides, but said there are cattle that pasture on that land.

Dill said that they grade the road a couple times a year and there are a lot of questions that he wants answered.

Clerk Prisco offered an option of abandoning the road.

Sheriff Scott Turner said that it's been a problem, people get their vehicle stuck up there and they have to call for Search and Rescue. The gate has been damaged, there has been other property damage, and the lock has been cut several times. "We've had elderly people stuck up there overnight," the sheriff said. He said that it's public lands and people should have access to it, "I also have

the other side of it. When the gate's closed, it saves a lot of work for us."

Chairman Twilegar stated, "Well, the county's paying for it, which means taxpayers are paying for it. And only a handful of people have keys to access all of that land behind it. I think that's unwise and it's unfair. I don't like it." He added, "I'm a strong supporter of private rights or private ground, when this is a county road that's being funded by taxpayers, I don't see how we can in good conscience gate it or any other kind of road." Twilegar stated the gate is not working and that people are driving around it. Posting signs of "proceed at your own risk" and "not maintained," were discussed. There are a few landowners located behind the gate and to abandon the road would be more complicated with multiple landowners, the prosecutor said. A public hearing was also discussed.

PAYROLL ADDITION: Twilegar motioned to approve the road hire for the Road and Bridge Department.

SOLID WASTE DEPARTMENT: A truck purchase was discussed. Twilegar motioned to purchase a 2015 crew cab Ford in the amount of \$31,524. The motion carried.

TRASH COLLECTION: Permits for several trash collection companies were approved

individually through motions.

TAX CANCELLATIONS: Assessor Chris Juszczak spoke about two proposed tax cancellations. One was a "dry cabin" on federal land, and the other was a trailer that was removed and is no longer in this county. The prosecutor said that it was basically a shed, "and it's going to end up costing us more money," to auction it off. Twilegar motioned to approve the tax cancellation in the amount of \$431. All were in favor. The second motion was also ap-

proved in the amount of \$258. A third motion was made for a tax cancellation in the amount of \$352. The motion carried. Several other motions were said, which were approved. The tax cancellation on the dry cabin were \$1,388, and the motion was approved.

ROAD MAINTENANCE: Clerk Prisco explained regarding Road and Bridge maintenance, including old revenues and new revenues.

Basin School District Discusses Calendar Options for the Upcoming School Year

Slides were presented to the public detailing the options of an alternate school schedule.

IDAHO CITY -- A second town hall meeting for the Basin School District was held on Wednesday, February 8th, for parents and the community. The purpose was to discuss the pros and cons of calendar options for the upcoming school year. School officials also welcomed feedback and sent out a survey to gauge what the community wants as a whole. This information has been taken into consideration, graphed, and will be presented to the school

board, which will ultimately make the decision of which calendar option the district will adopt. The district wrote in an email, "Basin School District is continuing to seek stakeholder input from families and other community members as the district considers potential school calendar changes beginning next school year, 2023-2024. These options are intended to better serve students, families, and staff in a time of un-

precedented challenges. After gathering information through surveys, the initial town hall, committee meetings, and from the board, we have narrowed down our potential calendars to three models. Once the committee has completed this information-gathering process, we will make a recommendation to the board on February 21st during the regularly scheduled school board meeting."

will miss each of you, and that when I think back on my time here at GV Schools, I will remember each of you with fondness.”

“Please know that I poured my heart and soul into my role as your superintendent. I gave you my all. While in no way do I think I was perfect, or even close to it, I do feel like we did a lot of great things over the last 20 months. We made some great headway in many crucial areas and I know that our students benefited from our efforts. I always strived to make decisions with my students and my faculty and my staff at the forefront. I always asked myself how any potential decision would affect the individual student and the individual faculty or staff member of our school.”

“Garden Valley is a special place and will always hold a special place in my heart. My best friend in this life moved his family from Georgia back to Garden Valley in 1999. My family began visiting here shortly thereafter and we have made numerous trips to GV

over the last 23 years. He always begged me to move here. A few weeks before his death in 2020, on the Starlight stage, just before my last performance of the summer, in front of the audience, he pulled me out on stage and asked me to move to GV. I told him if a job became available, we might just do that. Less than a year later, the superintendent job came open and I applied, and here we are. So many of you, along with members of the community, welcomed me with open arms and made me and my family feel so welcome here, so much a part of this community, and so loved. For that, I will forever be grateful.”

On February 11th Thompson recognized the discontent from the community and addressed it in a letter: “I have been made aware of various communications, both on social media and via other outlets, that are directed at school board trustees, some of which are inappropriate and extremely hurtful. Some of these comments and communications are centered around my recent resignation

from the school district. To quote from the email I sent to the faculty/staff just prior to my resignation, “rather than focus on the reasons why I have made this decision, I ask you to help me make the best of these last 2 weeks we will have together.”

“I am respectfully requesting that these comments and communications please stop. While I can understand that there are incredibly strong emotions behind the comments, and that much of it is an expression of support for me as an individual and for what I accomplished in my tenure as superintendent of the school system, it is really in the best interest of the community that we all try to move forward and do what is best in the interest of the students at Garden Valley Schools.”

“As I also stated in my email to the faculty/staff, after much thought and consideration of the options facing me and my family, I ultimately decided to resign from the district. This decision was not made without much thought and thorough analysis. My wife and I felt it



was the best decision for us at this time. The school board and I met and we came to a mutual understanding for my exit from the district. I ask that you please try to understand that this was an excruciatingly painful decision to make, but ultimately, I do feel that it is in the best interest of everyone that I move on. “

“I appreciate the comments of support from everyone and I assure you that I have thoroughly enjoyed my time in Garden Valley. I will be leaving the area in the next few weeks and moving my family back to Georgia. I sincerely hope that everyone can come together

and move forward in helping the school board search for a new superintendent that will valiantly serve and lead the district in a positive direction. I wish you all the best and I will always hold a special place in my heart for Garden Valley and the Garden Valley School District.”

Automated External Defibrillators Needed for the Sheriff's Deputies

BOISE COUNTY -- The Boise County Sheriff's Office has recognized the need for AED's to be installed in each of the deputy's vehicles. Having this heart defibrillator handy, in the case of a cardiac arrest, can make all the difference between life and death. Deputies are often the first emergency personnel on the scene of an accident, or responder to a residence's call.

Boise County Sheriff Scott Turner reported that they currently have one AED in the office, and three are on order for the deputies. Two of them were purchased using grant money,

and the third was paid for by a private donation. The sheriff's office would accept donations towards the purchase of more AEDs. If any civic organizations or individuals wanted to donate smaller amounts, it would all add up, and become more doable. These lifesaving devices cost in the ballpark of \$1,600. Donations can be dropped off at the sheriff's office or mailed in as a check.

The department would like to have a total of seven, and were offered a special deal through the American Red Cross of \$300 off, should they purchase them during the month of Feb-

ruary, "Heart Month."

Horseshoe Bend Ambulance carries a Life Pack machine that registers vitals and works as an AED. Idaho City Fire Department has three AEDs that they received through a grant. The county offices in Idaho City have ordered one, but it has not arrived yet due to a national back order.

An individual collapsed last summer, outside the county offices, and employees of the county were unable to save the gentleman with CPR alone.

The Boise County Board of Commissioners intends to use federal funds made available under Title III of the Secure Rural Schools and Community Self-Determination Act of 2000 and all remaining funds received from that time through the receipt of funds in 2022. These funds can only be spent for certain purposes set forth in 16 U.S.C 7142.

Proposed uses of federal funds
The County proposes to obligate the funds, as set forth in PL 114-10, as follows:

Funds to carry out activities described and sanctioned by the Firewise Communities program:

\$129,908 to pay salary, benefits, and operating costs of the Boise County Fire Mitigation Forester and to assist homeowners with professional management advice and modification of fuels within the home ignition zone.

The Forester will provide to Boise County homeowners living in fire-sensitive ecosystems education on mitigation best practices for community wildfire risk reduction, and home landscaping that can increase the protection of people and property from wildfires.

This proposed amount would be for the salary and benefits of the Forester, expenses for transportation, office and operations for the Forester, revision and maintenance of the Boise County Community Wildfire Protection Plan, and wildfire hazard mitigation and response planning, per the Boise County Community Protection Plan.

Assist homeowners with professional management advice and modification of fuels within the home ignition zone.

Funds to reimburse the County for emergency services performed on Federal land: \$15,234 for the Boise County Sheriff

This amount would be to reimburse the Sheriff for anticipated search and rescue emergency services performed on federal land and paid for by the County.

The reimbursement will be for the salary or wages of emergency response personnel deployed during an emergency response, the replacement of equipment, material and supplies expended, damaged or destroyed during an emergency response, the repair of equipment damaged during an emergency response, and the maintenance of vehicles, equipment, and facilities during an emergency response.

Public comments

The County is holding a 45-day comment period which will end at 5:00 pm on March 18, 2023. The board is also sending this proposal to the Southwest Idaho Resource Advisory Committee pursuant to Section 302(b)(2) of PL 110-343. Please send the County any feedback, suggestions, or concerns that you may have regarding these proposed uses of these federal funds. Comments on this proposal may be sent by mail to the Boise County Board of Commissioners, c/o Boise County Clerk's Office, PO Box 1300, Idaho City, ID, 83631, or by email to kcoffelt@co.boise.id.us.

Following the 45-day comment period, and after taking into full consideration the comments received, the Board will issue a decision on the proposed use of funds. If, in the future, the Boise County Board of Commissioners decides to use these funds for a different project that meets the legal requirements other than the ones described above, a subsequent public notice will be issued for a 45-day public

comment period.
