Remains of Missing Hiker from 2016 Recovered in Backcountry

BOISE COUNTY -- Jack Thomas, 66, from Nampa went missing on June 15, 2016, while hiking alone on the Queen's River Trail in Elmore County. He did a Spot GPS check-in, but then was not heard from again.

In 2016, Elmore County and their search and rescue team, along with the Boise County Sheriff's Office, Idaho Mountain Search and Rescue, and the Idaho National Guard all searched, but found no sign of Thomas. Descriptive fliers were posted at trailheads to alert hikers to keep an eye out for this missing man. He was described on notices as possibly injured or lost, wearing a San Francisco Giants ballcap, silver necklace with a ring, a blue windbreaker, and he had his right knee wrapped. He had anticipated on heading up-

stream, southbound along the South Fork of the Payette River, between Fern Falls and Elk Lake. The family even hired a private search, but Thomas' whereabouts remained a mystery.

Recently, during the first part of August, wilderness hikers discovered clothing and a wallet belonging to Jack Thomas near a high mountain lake in Boise County. On August 7th, a search party consisting of a Boise County Detective, Coroner, Forest Service Law Enforcement officer, Idaho Mountain Search and Rescue, and a member from the Boise County Search and Rescue team all traveled one full day, and then the next day went in by horseback with contracted Sawtooth outfitters. It was an estimated 20-mile hike in to the location provided by the hik-

ers who found the belongings. Searchers were able to recover the remains that are currently waiting to be positively identified through the coroner. According to Boise County Sheriff Scott Turner, the searchers then rode out the next day, for a total of three days to make the recovery. The remains were not found in the area that Thomas had told family members he would be hiking.

HORSESHOE BEND CITY COUNCIL

HORSESHOE BEND -- The following is a synopsis of the Horseshoe Bend City Council meeting that was held on Wednesday, August 9, 2023. All council members were present. There were nine community members in the audience. Mayor Pat Goff made the call to order at 7:00 p.m. then led the Pledge of Allegiance. After unanimous approval of the agenda, minutes from the previous meeting of March 15, 2023, and the authorization to pay the city's bills, Goff opened the meeting with a public hearing to approve the 2024 fiscal budget. City Treasurer Teri Nolan asked the council if they had any questions regarding the proposed budget. No questions were asked. She went on to explain that she "over inflated the budget because of two grants coming in." No community members signed up to speak for or against the budget.

Next up was a public hearing regarding the recapture of \$10,000 in forgone property taxes. (Foregone property taxes are monies that could have been collected by the city in previous years but were not. When the city chooses not to collect the full amount of property tax due, the remainder not collected are called forgone taxes and can be levied for future use.) Nolan stated that the amount was an estimate as she hadn't received notice of the amount available and she was basing her estimate on the previous year's calculation. The forgone taxes would be put into the city's general fund.

When the public hearings closed, Goff began the city's new business. First up was the approval of the 2024 budget. A motion was made by Councilmember Martye White and passed unanimously. Next was an appropriation ordinance to set aside the 2024 budget monies. Councilmember Patti Burgess made the motion and it passed unanimously, after which city attorney Tony Pantera suggested that the council vote to set aside the three readings rule to "make sure they go by the book." Councilmember Jennifer Patterson made the motion and the aye vote was unanimous. Patterson then made a motion to approve the acceptance of the foregone taxes, which also passed unanimously.

Continuing with new business, the Horseshoe Bend Valley Chamber of Commerce presented a check to the city council totaling \$27,116.68. The monies were from the chamber's 2023 Freedom Fight Night and are to be used to benefit the Woods Veteran's Memorial Park. Chamber lead Kimberly Welsh told the council that the park was "an act of love from this community." She added that over 200K had been donated to the park project. The chamber showed the council news clips from local CBS and NBC affiliates that highlighted the Freedom Fight Night as well as videos compiled by

chamber members D & D Socials (a marketing company) and Storyteller Weddings (wedding photographers). All the clips can be seen on the Horseshoe Valley Chamber website. Welsh attributed the success of the fight night to the table sponsors and said all had committed to sponsor tables for the 2024 Freedom Fight Night. The council was then treated to swag bags that table sponsors received at the event. Welsh then asked the council to approve next year's event for June 29, 2024. Councilmember Stephen Chartier made the motion, which passed unanimously. Welsh also presented the city with a Freedom Fight Night poster signed by all the exhibition fighters.

Next on the agenda was City Engineer Amy Woodruff. Woodruff indicated that the project to build a sidewalk in town from the north side of the Payette Bridge to the canal on the west side of Highway 55 is underway. Woodruff said that the Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) has completed the design portion and the project will soon be going out to bid. The funding will come from a grant that Welsh and the chamber procured, along with funds from ITD. Welsh also volunteered the chamber's assistance with grant writing for the city, as the city is currently without a grant writer.

Next up was Racquel Pankau, who requested a second water meter installation at her property. Woodruff asked, "It's in the county, correct?" Goff replied affirmatively. Pantera said it wouldn't be allowed in the city, but it could be done at the discretion of the council. Woodruff asked the Pankaus if they would be willing to annex into the city, if and when the city wants to annex the property, and suggested the council make an ordinance for an annexation contingency for future water hookups. "You're not going to be annexed tomorrow," she told the Pankaus. Chartier motioned for the water meter to be installed and an annexation agreement to be signed by the property owners. The council voted unanimously to pass the motion.

Woodruff asked the council to authorize the mayor to notify the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) that the city plans to submit an application for a drinking water planning grant. The new plans will encompass new facility plans. The grant will provide 25K in funds, with the city supplying

25K as well. White made the motion which passed unanimously. Woodruff also requested the council vote to authorize the mayor to submit an application to DEQ for an emerging contaminants grant. The two-million-dollar grant will be funded as soon as the mayor requests and notifies DEQ.

EMS Update: Goff told the council that he was looking into forming a district board to oversee services with a paid EMT director. White said that he wanted a representative of Acute Rescue & Transport (currently serving as the city's EMS) to be present at all council meetings. Goff replied that the city currently had four EMTs but he would put in the request to Acute.

Public Works: The city water tank repairs were completed by a dive team and the leak is better, but there remains a slow leak. Repairs were estimated to be about 90% fixed. The tank is now completely filled (7-10 years since it was able to be filled completely) The need for a new tank is still imminent and a new look at grants/funding will be undertaken.

The department recently trimmed trees in the city park and completed maintenance on filters and weeds. Recent rainwater disrupted water quality for about six hours, but the crew was up all night monitoring and regulating.

White asked about stray dogs in the city and where they could be taken, Goff replied facetiously, "I can take care of them if you want." Public works said they have no place to take them, if they can't locate owners, and would like to see

some cooperation with the county in regards to a shelter. White replied, "As a city, it's our responsibility to take care of it." He added that they need to contract with another facility, and if they have the animal for more than seven days, they can euthanize it. White indicated that he hated that solution, because he loves dogs.

There was no further report from the city engineer.

No report from the city attorney.

Goff closed the meeting by thanking the chamber of commerce for all of their hard work.

Chartier asked when the Woods Veterans Memorial Park would be open. Goff suggested that they leave the gates latched but unlocked until the parking lot gets paved, so the gravel doesn't get torn up. The council was in agreement. Chamber Member Kaylene Woods suggested that a committee be formed to prioritize what needs to be done at the park.

The meeting adjourned at 8:09 p.m. The Horseshoe Bend City Council meets at city hall on the second Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m.

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David Leroy Presentation at the Library

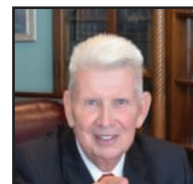

He served as Nuclear Waste Negotiator by appointment of President Bush.

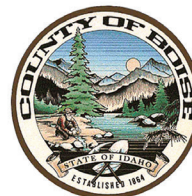

BOISE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS CONDENSED MINUTES TUESDAY, AUGUST 1st, 2023-Miners Exchange Building, Idaho City, Idaho, 83631
Chairman Twilegar called the meeting to order and the pledge of allegiance was recited. 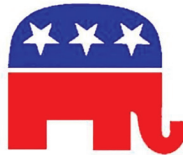

It's the LAW. Idaho Code 49-613 requires loads to be secured: Section (4) states that "No vehicle shall be operated on any public highway unless such vehicle's load is secured to prevent the load from becoming loose, detached or a hazard to other users of the highway."

It Saves Lives. Items which fall off or blow from vehicles can become roadway hazards and cause traffic accidents.

It's Litter. Litter blows or is thrown from vehicles and collects along our roadways, ditches and fence lines. Litter is not only unsightly but can harm wildlife and livestock.

It Can Cost You Money. Idaho Code 18-3906 provides that the first littering offence is an infraction (ticket) with a fine of \$150, a second offence is \$300 and a third can cost you \$1000 and time in jail.
