HORSESHOE BEND -- It's a three-peat for the Horseshoe Bend Lady Mustang Volleyball team, who went undefeated throughout the Idaho 1A State Volleyball Tournament in Lewiston. On Friday, October 27th, Horseshoe Bend defeated the Deary Mustangs 25-12, 25-9, 25-11 and then went on to take the win against the Mackay Miners 25-16, 25-12, 25-13.

On Saturday, the Mustangs found themselves facing off against a fellow Long Pin Conference team, the Council Lumberjacks. Horseshoe Bend came out on top 25-8, 25-10,

25-14, which set the Mustangs up to play in the championship game against the winner of the Council Lumberjacks and Grace Lutheran Royals matchup.

Council defeated Grace Lutheran and sent them to a repeat on the court against the Lady Mustangs, who came out with the Idaho 1A State Championship title for the third year in a row! They defeated the Lumberjacks 25-15, 25-11, 25-16.

Basin School Levy

IDAHO CITY -- On Thursday, October 26th, the Basin School District held a Town Hall Meeting for the community to discuss the upcoming school levy vote on November 7th. The ballot will impact all those residing within the school district boundaries, and the levy is asking for a total amount of \$792,000 over the next two years. The levy will replace the current levy rate of \$45.70 per \$100,000 taxable assessed value for homeowners, which is due to expire on June 30, 2024. The new supplemental levy, should it pass, estimates an annual cost to the taxpayer of \$73.11 per \$100,000 of taxable assessed value. Superintendent Brian Hunicke explained the predicament, the State of Idaho only provides between 68 and 80 percent of the annual budget for each school district and the local community is planned to "make up the difference." He pointed out that the big expense this time for the levy would be the school's sprinkler system, that normally has a lifespan of 10 to 12 years. However, Idaho City High School was built in 1995, and the system has been routinely in need of repairs, costing upward of \$30,000 over the past several years, and it is only getting worse. He explained that the piping was rusting out with "pin holes" where the water escapes, and that this is now occurring on a daily basis. To reconstruct the sprinkler system, the cost would be at least \$300,000, an estimate from one contractor, but others have quoted over \$1 million dollars to replace the whole system. Hunicke said it's become a critical issue now, because the thought had always been, "Why rebuild it if it's not broken?" He assured the public that there was not an immediate risk; however, the fire sprinkler system is failing. "If there's a fire, there's a huge pump in the boiler room and it will still put out a fire with plenty of pressure."

Other expenses include bus drivers, of which Hunicke was proud to announce that the school now has a full crew. The school would also like to purchase two 4-wheel drive vans for transportation, either to use when there is a reduced num-

ber of students in one area, or to bring small groups of students to sporting events like cross country. He has been scouring the internet for auctions, hoping to come across a good deal. In this way, they could pay less than the projected amount of \$30,000 and return the remaining amount to the taxpayers. Hunicke explained, "I can tell you that we are bargain shoppers, we're scavengers."

Technology and laptops were also discussed as a key component needed for a student's future, and it was explained that there was not a lot of money for rural schools. Elementary Principal Jamie Pilkerton also addressed that laptops allow for the school to individually assess reading and math skills, place the students, sometimes two grade levels ahead, and keep them engaged with learning programs. She said it's very difficult to give students that individualized help, but these programs make that happen with the use of computers. The computers have also allowed students to move forward with college credits, while still attending high school. Superintendent Brian Hunicke also explained rising costs, "Every time we fix something, they double the costs," which includes food prices, and that is the reason for the increased levy amount asked of the taxpayers, from \$45.70 to \$73.11 per \$100,000 of taxable assessed value of a home in Boise County. Should the levy not pass on Nov. 7th, the school will try again in May of 2024, or ask for an "Emergency Bond." Superintendent Hunicke said the school does not "want to ask for the money, but what do we do?"

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

Wolverines Win at State and Advance to Quarter Finals

The varsity football team won their first round at the state playoffs last Friday, 53 to 36, and have advanced to the State Quarter Finals. The team beat Clark Fork in Bonner County and now face off against the Camas County team in Fairview on Friday, November 3rd, at 3:30pm. The Garden Valley School has invited the public to "decorate your car" and come to the school that morning, at 10:15 a.m., for a State send off

Statistical leaders in the Clark Fork game included Tacoma Kelly with 8/14 passing, 3 touchdowns, and 1 interception. He added 91 rushing yards and 2 rushing touchdowns, which also included 12 tackles. **Trevor Corn** rushed 19 times for 222 yards, had 2 touchdowns, and 8 tackles. 

Boise Ridge Riders Repair Unauthorized Trails

BOISE COUNTY -- The Boise Ridge Riders, in a collaborative partnership with the U.S. Forest Service, Idaho Department of Parks & Recreation, and the Treasure Valley Trail Machine Association (TVTMA), have recently completed a project aimed at repairing damage to unauthorized trails in the Boise National Forest near Idaho City.

This cooperative effort brought together volunteers from the Boise Ridge Riders, a local motorcycle club dedicated to responsible off-road recreation, along with government agencies and the TVTMA, a nonprofit organization committed to preserving and enhancing trail opportunities. The collective goal was to take action to restore the ground and construct fencing and barriers to deter future use of these illegal routes.

"Being part of this collective endeavor fills us with pride," stated Kent Funkhouser, the current President of the Boise Ridge Riders. "We are devoted to standing by our community and collaborating with agencies to promote responsible use of our trail system for the generations to come."

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





CITY COUNCII NG FOR IDAHO CITY

IDAHO CITY -- Brent Adamson represented the Fire District at the Idaho City Council meeting on Wednesday, October 25, 2023. He outlined the history of the district's building for the council. In about 1994-95, the Idaho City Fire District acquired a government entity grant to build a firehouse, and the city of Idaho City was asked by the firefighters to administer this grant. When the firehouse was completed, the city neglected to transfer the deed back to the volunteers, which was thought to be

the agreement among all the volunteer firefighters that put in much of the labor and additional funds to construct the firehouse.

Adamson pointed out that the city did not build the Idaho City firehouse, "It was a grant, a firefighters' grant that built the firehouse. Idaho City administered this, but it was the firefighters' grant. There was \$30,000 dollars to fund building the property... And the firefighter volunteers, their sources, engineering, and dirt, and using their own equipment. That is what we found."

Mayor Ken Everhart spoke: "Given all that, still the Idaho City Fire Department is an entity of the City of Idaho City." He pointed out that the grant was given to Idaho City. Adamson disagreed, "No, it wasn't." Mayor Everhart continued: "It was given to who? It was given to the Idaho City Fire Department, that is not individual people, that is an entity of Idaho City. You can't keep saying it was given to the firefighters, a grant is not ever granted to individual people like that. It was given to the Idaho City Fire Department, which is an entity of Idaho City."

Council Member Secor added his remarks, "This was the Idaho City Fire Department, it was a budget item in there, the whole

time I was on the Council, until the district transferred."

Mayor Everhart continued, "It was just like our Police Department or our Public Works department, it was an entity of Idaho City, the Idaho City Fire Department... We are not giving away a huge asset that belongs to the citizens of this town. For all the years that it was there, we have been responsible for all the upkeep, we are responsible for all the taxes and everything else on that whole facility. We do not feel, and I still don't, that it is in the best interest of the citizens who supported that fire department for 20 years, that we just give it away. That doesn't seem to be right. This whole fiscal plan for us as a governing body of the city can't just give that away. That doesn't seem like a good fiscal plan to me. So, granted, the people on the fire department volunteered, just like they volunteer to fight a fire. I volunteer too many hours. I don't expect someone to give me something for it, I volunteered to do it. So, I don't think it's appropriate to just give it away."

Councilmember Secor stated, "I've said this before that the Fire Protection District was formed as a scare tactic."

Councilmember Elliott requested to talk about the offer.

Brent Adamson replied, "We are well aware there has been a lot of money spent in the interest of the building. In the heart of the people, the firefighters, they believe that it's theirs and should have come with the Fire Protection District. You're talking hard reality, and they are talking with their heart. I don't disagree with what you're telling me. So, I've had several conversations with the firefighters and we would like to make a donation to the Idaho City Public Works building fund of \$65,000 in exchange for a transfer."


The mayor turned the proposal over to the City Attorney Joan Callahan. She quoted Idaho Code and said, "It requires that whenever the City Council proposes to convey or exchange or offer for sale any real property, it shall first declare the value or minimum price if any, it intends to receive as a result of such conveyance." Callahan advised that an intended exchange and a minimum dollar value be proposed at a public meeting. She added, "Following that declaration, you need to publish a summary of the action taken by the council and the paper or otherwise provide public notice. There needs to be a public hearing before the City Council and that must be published within a 14-day notice." Callahan continued, "So if this was an offer you would be wanting to entertain it. It sounds like you are wanting to propose it as an exchange. Cash for one purpose or a gift for property rather than a straight purchase of \$65,000 for the building."

"That Adamson explained, isn't the hard-core potential of the problem. The fire department does not want to buy the building, because they feel it's theirs, right?"

Callahan replied, "We cannot give away real property. There has to be something of value, and once or when that exchange is through, you're supposed to be accountable for that amount or exchange... In regards to the grant,

if the original funds were federal funds, they were for specific purposes. Idaho code says that there has to be additional conditions on the convenance land. The other thing I would note is, for the disposition, the council needs to do all things necessary to exchange the property owned by the city for real property of equal value. So, if you are exchanging property for property, it needs to be of equal value."

Mayor Everhart clarified, "So, this is a standard fact, this is an asset of the city. Other interests, like those firefighter volunteers, or whatever that case may be, for 20 years it was administered, and it was maintained, and everything

was done by the city. Paid for by the residents of the city. There were no funds paid by what is now the Fire District. So, nobody outside of Idaho City for 20 years had any financial responsibility for that

Avalanche Team in Lowman Preparing



News Release

LOWMAN—The Idaho Transportation Department's (ITD) avalanche team is back in Lowman as they prepare for another season and new challenges. Every winter the team monitors conditions and prepares to close roads when necessary for the safety of travelers and maintenance crews.

The four-person team has more than 70 years of combined experience. The team is stationed in Lowman, 20 miles from an avalanche-prone section of State Highway 21 that spans eleven miles from Grandjean to Banner Summit. The team also closely monitors U.S. Highway 12 near the Montana border.

According to the avalanche team leader, Bill Nicholson, there are more avalanche paths now than when he started over a decade ago. A wildfire burn scar has changed the landscape.

"When I first got here there were 62 avalanche paths, but on one side of the canyon there was a forest fire. All the trees are now gone. There are not any anchors in there anymore. This area that was not even considered a problem has now

become one of our biggest problems. We have around 70 avalanche paths now," Nicholson said.

Another difference this winter brings is El Niño. The National Weather Service predicts a milder winter, but Nicholson says less snowpack can sometimes make conditions even more difficult. He says nothing is the same from year to year, so they will use their experience and tools to examine the snowpack like they would any other year. The team relies on specialized weather reports from the National Weather Service, as well as mini weather stations that have been placed in risky areas.

Prior to this program, the road was closed for months at a time, typically from the first big storm and then not reopened until April or May. That closure timespan has now been shortened to 15 days or less.

There are only three highways in the United States that fall under the 'High' category in the Avalanche Hazard Index: SH-21 in Lowman, State Highway 210 in Utah, and U.S. Highway 550 in Colorado.

Friends Make Cycling to Sourdough a Tradition Despite Multiple Sclerosis

LOWMAN -- Howard Olivier of Boise and his friend Wyatt Wood from Northern California have made a tradition of riding their bicycles from Boise to the Sourdough Lodge in Lowman. Howard and Wyatt met in 1981 on a ride hosted by the Grizzly Peak Cycling club in Northern California. The next year on April 17, 1982, Howard had his first multiple sclerosis (MS) attack while on a ride. He was 23 years old. Howard continued to ride, though doctors were not sure exactly what had happened. Howard and his wife Megan moved to Boise in 1984. The same year, a second MS attack confirmed Howard has the disease. Multiple sclerosis (MS) is a potentially disabling disease of the brain and spinal cord (central nervous system). There's no cure for MS. Despite the diagnosis, Howard and Wyatt made their first ride to the Sourdough Lodge in Lowman

in 2000 and continued the tradition for 6 years. Unfortunately, the friends were unable to complete the ride for a few years. They returned to the tradition in 2021, but Howard was too sick to do the ride in 2022. Despite having to walk with a cane, Howard was again able to do the ride with Wyatt

this October. It was the 19th time they accomplished this feat! Howard said riding the bicycle helps him control the MS symptoms. He has ridden more than 6000 miles this year, including 22 miles to the top of Bogus Basin!

Treasurer's Corner ~ Information Regarding Upcoming Property Tax Relief from New 2023 Legislation

BOISE COUNTY -- In the 2023 Legislative Session, the Idaho Legislature passed several bills to provide property tax relief based on the Fiscal Year 2023 State surplus. These bills include House Bill (HB) 292, HB 258, and changes to the Property Tax Reduction Program (PTR) (formerly known as "Circuit Breaker"). The purpose of these new bills and changes is to reduce the property tax burden for owners without shifting costs between types of property.

Three types of property tax relief from HB292 will be available in 2023:

School District Facilities Fund (SDFF) will be paid to eligible school districts' bonds and temporary supplemental levies using State money to contribute to a reduction in property tax. Relief will be reimbursed based on average daily attendance. Not all school bonds will be eligible, but those that are will be reflected as a savings on the tax bill. This money is reimbursed directly to the schools with bonds or levies that are eligible for this relief.

Homeowner Tax Reduction (HTR) provides a relief to the

property of taxpayers who own and occupy their home. This tax relief credit is applied only to parcels with a Homeowner's Exemption (HOE) and will be paid by the State, reflected as a credit on your tax bill. This is a percentage of the home's value and is calculated using the sum of the HTR lists provided statewide divided by the amount allocated in the Tax Relief Account held by the State. HOE must have been applied for by the 2nd Monday in July to be eligible for the credit. Applications after this date may still receive a HOE, but not the additional HTR credit. If your property already qualified for a HOE, you do not need to reapply. HTR will not apply to newly built homes completed in 2023.

Additional Property Tax **Relief (ATR)** is for all property owners based on a percentage of the property value. After \$50 million from the State Tax Relief Account has been applied to HTR, 50% of the remaining funds will be allocated to all properties and will be distributed to urban renewal agencies, if applicable. This will also be reflected as a credit on your tax bill that will be paid by the State directly to the county on your behalf.

HB258 provides property tax reduction benefits to veterans with 100% service-connected, permanent disabilities. This bill allows for a one-time application rather than annual requalification.

Changes to the PTR program include increasing the income and property value thresholds and making the program more accessible to seniors and disabled property owners. The SDFF, HTR, and ATR will reduce the tax amount owed prior to applying the PTR payment.

The State of Idaho will disburse these credits directly to County governments, to then be distributed to the local taxing districts similar to other State replacement money. Any property tax relief that your property is eligible for will automatically be applied to your tax bill and will be reflected as a credit.

The Idaho Association of County Treasurers (IACT) and the Idaho Association of Counties (IAC) have provided answers to frequently asked questions regarding this tax relief that can be found at idcounties.org/resources/hb292property-tax-relief/.

building or anything to do with it. Now you're asking those residents who paid for that for all those years to give it away... I appreciate your information, but you're not going to change my opinion on that. I really think that facility really belongs to the city. Whether it was built by a grant and primarily by the fire department volunteers is beside the point. The point is, it was administered and for all intents and purposes, unless you can show me otherwise, it is owned by the city, and I don't feel it is right to give it away. You know as well as I do that the property and facility is worth far more than \$65,000, but you guys are not rolling in dough down there either. I appreciate the offer, but that property by the fairgrounds goes for \$14,000 to \$15,000 per lot because of its location."

Council Member Secor offered no further comments, Council Member Adams suggested that they needed to do the research, follow the attorney's suggestions, and go through the appropriate

Council Member Elliott mentioned that the grant built the building, and personally she felt the firefighters should own it, but she upholds the council's decision and the proper procedures to ob-

Mayor Everhart summarized "What I got from Joan (Attorney Callahan) is that we would need a vote from the City Council to start the process of a public hearing."

Attorney Callahan stated: "First of all, we need an appraisal, second part is to negotiate. They have kind of given you a first offer, although you can't take any action tonight. It seems to me, you have a potential willing seller and a willing buyer, and it's coming to agreeable terms that would be appropriate. To be mutually agreed upon. Once you have a comfortable level with 'yes,' we are willing to sell for this amount, 'yes,' we are willing to buy for the same, that's when we would go to the public process. Then all that would be put into the record at a council meeting, publishing notice in the paper, setting a hearing of a minimum 14 days, and scheduling a council meeting. Then have a public hearing before you make your decision." She added, "Now we have two parties willing to negotiate, now we just need to negotiate and see if we can come to terms with acceptable proposals. I would say it's hopeful, especially where it could be in the form of their minutes from their meeting deciding to make the offer, so we know it's a bona fide offer. Brent Adamson offered this evidence, and it was accepted as a bona fide

Mayor Everhart said the council was going in this direction, to accept the proposal, but wants an official appraisal and to complete all other procedures before this becomes an action item on a future agenda
