Idaho City Fire Works Together to Make Community Safer

IDAHO CITY – The Idaho City Fire Protection District held an extrication and stabilization refresher course over the weekend. A big shout out to the East Boise County Ambulance District EMTs for joining us. The guys and gals brought the tools out and went over them. Everyone took turns stabilizing the cars with cribbing, struts, chains, and rescue jacks. We reviewed the importance of making sure a vehicle doesn't move at all before proceeding. The trick is to get a good base under the vehicle and remove weight from the suspension. We covered safety tips on air bags and went over the hazards of electrical vehicles and the specifics to watch out for when working on them. The EMTs got to spend some time in a vehicle while it was being worked on so that they better understood the movements, sounds, and feelings inside with a patient. This is a great experience so they can help calm a patient and keep them informed about what is happening around them. This knowledge can bring a sense of peace to someone that is scared, hurt, or confused. The team then learned how to use the hydraulic Combi tool, which is a spreader/cutter in one. The team also practiced using the battery spreader and cutter to remove doors, completely open the sides of a vehicle, remove the top, and roll a dash forward to get someone unstuck if they become trapped. The team reviewed how to safely remove glass and cover and protect awesome Junior Firefighters riencing an emergency.

The Oath of Office for District 1 Commissioner was administered by Boise County Clerk Mary Prisco. Bob Callahan repeated back the oath to support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Idaho. He committed to "discharge the duties of the office of Boise County Commissioner... according to the best of my abilities. So, help me, God." Commissioner Callahan's family was in attendance. Chairman Tucker commented, "Congratulations, I'm excited to have you. Me and Lindy have been feeling lonely up here." Tucker asked Callahan if he had anything additional to say, but he did not and the meeting proceeded as agendized.

MINUTES: Chairman Tucker motioned to accept the minutes from July 2nd. Commissioner Lindstrom seconded the motion, and all were in fa-

HIGHWAY 55 DISCUS-SION: Prosecutor Alex Sosa gave an update as to the old State Highway 55, also known as Horseshoe Bend Hill. A public record from over twenty

ment between Boise County and the Idaho Transportation Department that ITD was going to "relinquish jurisdiction of this road from milepost 57.179 to 62.788 for a total of 6.09 miles total, and Boise County was to provide maintenance." In 2000, the county assumed possession; however, it has not received a lot of maintenance. Sosa said he thought it was, "everybody's intent that it was going to be abandoned and vacated legally as a public rightof-way." He disclosed that there was nothing on the public record stating that it was officially abandoned or vacated.

Road and Bridge Director Curtis Dill was asked about the road and he said they maintain the top section of that road, Summit Ridge. Chairman Tucker stated, "The reason that they changed the hill was because that whole mountain is a landslide."

CLAIMS APPROVAL RE-PORT: Dill answered a question from Chairman Tucker regarding dust abatement. Although a truck is still down, they plan to put down more dust abatement. Tucker motioned to pay the Claims Approval Report in the amount of \$247,996.19. All ayes, and the motion carried.

EAST BOISE COUNTY AMBULANCE: A new district and boundaries were discussed. A census of the population was discussed and hiring a company to do this research work. The clerk disclosed that the funds would come from the Boise County legal fund. An initial cost was expected to cost \$10,000. Tucker made a motion to authorize this work for dividing the districts for the new ambulance district in the amount of \$5,000. The motion was tabled.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: A motion was said to enter into a closed executive session to discuss a personnel issue. [Time 9:27am to 10:00am] Commissioner Lindstrom motioned

with East Boise County Ambulance and replace it with two part time positions, and revise the job description. The motion carried. Another motion was made to make a "sleep time policy" for EBCAD. All were in favor and the motion carried.

Alex Gross said that they have not received their new ambulance ordered back in 2021. And one ambulance was brought in to have the motor worked on and the cost was \$8,000, "which was at a very steep discount." He made the company aware that they had been having so many issues and really needed their new

ambulance, "that it was becoming a matter of life and death all because we've been having so many issues and ambulances being down. They're going to try to work and get us bumped up in their production line, but in the meantime, they have a loaner ambulance... that they are going to provide to us at no charge."

BUDGET WORKSHOP: Each of the Boise County departments presented individually their budget requests for the next fiscal year. The budget workshop spanned from the Tuesday meeting and continued on Thursday.

Adjourned at 11:53am.

IDAHO CITY -- We are thrilled to welcome David Leroy portraying William Wallace, the first governor of Idaho Territory and Washington Territory, speaking about Abraham Lincoln's favorite state, Idaho. With emotion, surprise, and humor, Leroy speaks about Lincoln's relationship with Wallace and significant moments in our state's early history.

David Leroy is the former Idaho Lt. Governor and Attorney General. Founder of the Idaho Lincoln Institute, he is a Lincoln scholar, noted speaker, and author. Raised in Lewiston and educated in Moscow, he holds a post-doctoral degree in trial practice and procedure from New York University. He served as Nuclear Waste Negotiator by appointment of President Bush.

David Leory and his wife, Nancy, live in Boise and are

principal donors of the fiveroom, 220-artifact "Lincoln Legacy Exhibit" on permanent display at the Idaho Archives Building, and of the Lincolnrelated history items exhibited in and around the Lincoln Auditorium at the Statehouse. As Chairman of both the Governor's Council of the United States Abraham Lincoln Bicentennial Commission and the related Idaho Commission, Leroy led the effort to move the oldest Lincoln statue in the Western United States to its position of honor in front of the Capitol Building in Boise.

HORSESHOE BEND -- A house fire damaged the upstairs of a home on Locust Street in Horseshoe Bend the morning of July 15. Horseshoe Bend Fire Department was dispatched at 6:22 a.m. to a potential structure fire on Adam Street, but upon arrival Fire Chief Jeff Johnson realized the fire was on Locust, directly behind the Adam location.

Two residents were found and removed from the burning home. Johnson said the department was able to contain the fire to the exterior and interior of a single room by their "aggressive fire attack."

The Horseshoe Bend Fire Department and the Boise County Sheriff's Department maintained a physical presence at the sight for most of the day. The cause is under investigation.

Chief Johnson was contacted by the Idaho State Fire Marshall's office who commended his crew on the "phenomenal job" they did. The Marshall's opinion was that the fire could have been as devastating as the whole house fire on Valley View in June. Chief Johnson said, "I can't say enough about my crew and their willingness to jump in. Not only did they do a great job working the fire, we also received a second call to assist EMS. My crew was able to switch gears, handle the secondary call, then come back and finish the job. All the makings of a full-time paid department." The Horseshoe Bend Fire Department consists of an
