Idaho City Fire Seeks Deed to Expand and Qualify for Grants

IDAHO CITY -- On July 24, 2024, a community meeting organized by the Idaho City Fire Protection District (ICF-PD) took place at Ray Robison Community Hall. The focus of this meeting was the ongoing conversation with the City of Idaho City regarding the ownership of the local fire station property. Despite a thunderstorm causing a power outage, around 50 community members still attended the meeting, highlighting the community's investment in the issue at hand.

This meeting followed a previous discussion held on March 20, 2024, during which the Fire District proposed an offer to the City of Idaho City of \$50,000 to purchase the land on which the fire station resides. The City proposed a counteroffer of \$350,000 from the Fire District for the property and building a figure the Fire District sees as a deviation from previous discussions.

Brent Adamson, the Fire Commissioner, led the meeting and provided a detailed history of the Idaho City Volunteer Fire Department's development. He emphasized the crucial role that community volunteers and prior grant funding played in constructing the facility in the late 1990s and highlighted the Fire District's efforts to operate safely and efficiently, despite limited financial support from the City.

Adamson expressed his grat-

itude for all of the Idaho City first responders, particularly the volunteers, "...they work for a passion, not for a living."

A key issue discussed in the meeting was the Fire District's need for the deed to the property in order to secure a new grant for expanding the facility. Without the deed in their possession, the Fire District is unable to pursue funding for necessary upgrades, such as adding another bay for a fire truck and expanding the training room. An expanded training room would benefit the fire department and support broader community use, including the ability to host CPR training sessions for first responders.

In an effort to promote transparency, the Fire District expressed its willingness to present the prior grant paperwork and other relevant documents to the public, highlighting key information within these documents. Both the highlights and full versions would be available to read online.

During the meeting, signatures were collected to illustrate the public's opinion about the issue and what entity should possess the deed to the land. An attendee expressed their concerns - "We can't have a fundraiser and come up with \$350,000. We're totally dependent on signatures and word of mouth and people helping. I can tell you, having been a volunteer... we can't do it by ourselves. We need everybody's

help, and we would really appreciate it."

The outcome of the meeting and the subsequent negotiations between the Fire District and the City of Idaho City remain uncertain. The Fire District continues to underscore the urgency of resolving the dispute to facilitate the muchneeded expansion and continue providing essential services to the community. ICFPD and the Idaho City community remain committed to ongoing dialogue with the City to reach a resolution that addresses the needs of the Fire District and the Idaho City community.

Wildfire Safety Tips for Pets and People

wildfires ravage several western states, the Humane Society of the United States is urging residents to prepare a disaster plan which includes their pets and other animals.

Remember, if it isn't safe for you, it isn't safe for your animals. Evacuating requires planning and preparation to ensure safety, especially for families with animals.

"Wildfires are raging across several states—now is the time to prepare if you live in an atrisk area," said Celia Jackson, disaster response program manager, the Humane Society of the United States. "It is critical for people with animals to include them in preparedness and evacuation plans."

Stay up to date with evacuation orders and other information from local authorities, which can be found here. Keep in mind, officials throughout the region are urging people and animals to stay indoors due to poor air quality caused by the fires.

It is advisable to have a disaster kit for your pet ready in your home at all times so you are able to evacuate with your pets at a moment's notice. Some items that should be included:

- 1. Food and water for at least 5 days for each pet. Also bring bowls and a manual can opener if you are packing canned pet food.
- 2. Medications for at least 5 days and all medical records,

including vaccination history. Keep these stored in a waterproof container. You may also consider storing them digitally on a flash drive or online.

- 3. Make sure your pet is wearing a collar with tags for identification. Microchipping your pet is ideal as collars can be easily removed.
 - 4. Pack a pet first aid kit.
- 5. Litter box with extra liter and a scoop.
- 6. Sturdy leashes, harnesses and carriers to transport pets safely.
- 7. Current photos of you with your pets and descriptions of your animals.
- 8. Comfort items, which may include a pet bed or a special toy, to reduce stress.
- 9. Written information about your pets feeding schedules, medical conditions and behavior issues along with the name and number of your veterinarian. This information can also be kept digitally.

Helpful tips for the safety of animals amid a wildfire:

1. If it isn't safe for you, it isn't safe for your pets. Never assume that you will be able to return home to your animals if you leave. If you are in a threatened or impacted area, call your local office of emergency management or follow guidance on their official website to verify that there will be shelters in your area that take people and their pets. Have a list of hotels and motels that accept pets in a 100-mile radius of your home. Keep in mind that in a catastrophic event, local hotels will fill quickly. If possible, make

arrangements with friends or relatives to ensure that you and your pets are able to seek shelter in their home. If housing together is not an option, know pet boarding options and requirements. As a last resort, connect with your local animal shelter to determine if they will offer temporary boarding during the time of crisis. They may too be impacted by the disaster and unavailable to house animals.

- 2. Have a plan in place for when you are out of town or cannot get home to your pet when a disaster strikes. Find a trusted neighbor, friend or family member and give them a spare key. Ensure that they know your pets feeding and medication schedule, and if using a pet sitting service, find out ahead of time if they will be able to help in the event of an emergency.
- 3. If you stay home, do it safely. If your family and pets have not been told to evacuate yet, identify a safe area of your home where you can all stay together. Close off or eliminate unsafe nooks and crannies where frightened cats may try to hide. Move dangerous items such as tools or toxic products that have been stored in the area. Bring your pets indoors as soon as local authorities say trouble is on the way. Keep dogs on leashes and cats in carriers, and make sure they are wearing identification. If you have a room you can designate as a "safe room," put your emergency supplies in that room in advance, includ-

ing your pet's crate and supplies. Have any medications and a supply of pet food and water inside watertight containers, along with your other emergency supplies. If there is an open fireplace, vent, pet door or similar opening in the house, close it off with plastic sheeting and strong tape. Listen to the radio or follow official channels online to stay up to date on evacuation orders or other announcements.

4. If the electricity goes out. If you're forced to leave your home because you've lost electricity or for any other reason, take your pets with you.

5. Include horses and farm animals in disaster preparedness plans. Individuals looking for assistance should call the county in which they are located and ask for guidance, including if they have an emergency shelter or location for animals. It is also advisable to call local animal control to flag the property so it is on the radar of emergency officials, and make sure all animals have access to fresh water.

If you have a horse or large animal at a boarding facility or barn, ensure the locks to the barn doors are operational and easily able to be opened in the event of an emergency.

- · Have trailers lined up and ensure that you have enough vehicles to move the amount of horses at your barn/facility.
- In extreme danger with limited time, let your horse or large animal into a larger enclosed area that has been tamped down and is out of the line of fire. Ensure the safety of first response personnel by not allowing the horses to run free.
- If you are evacuating, let your large animals out into a paddock or corral. Cut off their access to return to a barn or stall as they will naturally retreat back to where they are fed or cared for, even if the structure is on fire. Consider using non-toxic spray paint to spray paint your phone number on their body for reunification purposes.
- 6. Wildlife: Do everything vou can to allow fleeing animals to pass through your property. Wild animals have strong fight or flight responses and are extremely resilient. The assistance/guidance of a professional wildlife rehabilitator is likely needed if the animal requires intervention. IF you are not in the line of fire, you can consider providing access to fresh water.

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



Brush Fires in Horseshoe Bend Close Highway 55

HORSESHOE BEND -- Those traveling on scenic byway ID-55 in Boise County, just north of the Avimor community, were detoured on Wednesday, July 24 and Thursday, July 25 due to two separate brush fire incidents. Wednesday's fire was caused by a vehicle that caught fire on the southbound shoulder. The fire spread quickly and jumped the highway. Traffic was closed from Avimor to Horseshoe Bend Hill from approximately 3:30 p.m. until 8:40 p.m. The fire, which burned 1,500 acres, was fully contained by midnight.

On Thursday, another brush fire occurred approximately two miles north of Avimor on the northbound side of the highway and forced another complete closure from approximately 4:00 p.m. to 7:45 p.m. The fire consumed two acres of brush. Travelers were forced to go through Emmett via Highway 16 to Highway 52 to reach Horseshoe Bend and areas further north.



Re: Idaho World Vol. 161, No. 42 Wednesday July 24, 2024 "Pulled Over in a Traffic Spot." Interesting piece of journalism but somewhat disturbing from a personal rights guarantee. The following is very problematic "The law is vague on whether passengers must or not. If you are a passenger, and it is requested by the officer, you can object, then it is recommended to provide the license." You have the "courts system to settle disagreements." Hold the phone a minute. Sounds to me like an illegal search if the officer asks or demands for passengers to provide a drivers license or any other form of identification. To me, there is no legal basis for passengers to comply with the request or demand. In addition, "You have the courts system to settle disagreements" is very misleading. You may not get your day in court for years and it is not clear what an officer can or will do if there is passenger refusal.


Many years ago, when I was in college in Southern California in the early 1970's, the San Diego police department and the county sheriff's department (neither known to care much about individual civil rights at the time), had an unofficial policy, related to me by a San Diego detective. Officers were to stop at least 10 "Heads" a shift. For those of you unfamiliar with the term "Heads," it applied to hippies and hippie-looking folks. Turns out, that there was a pretty good probability that at least one or two stopped on a shift had an outstanding warrant. Some years later the police and sheriff's departments were hammered by the courts for illegal stops and seizures. Sound like Mr. McCreary is advocating for a similar policy. Be very interesting to have the

County Attorney weigh in or a Civil Rights attorney in Idaho to comment. Nothing like advocating murky police procedures! A big shout-out to probable cause!



> EAST BOISE COUNTY **AMBULANCE**: A motion was made for a part-time position and the motion carried. Another motion was made for a fulltime position and the motion carried. The "Sleep Policy" was discussed for a 24-hour shift - the current policy means that five hours of a 24-hour shift are

unpaid. However, if there is a call, the person on call must still respond. Lindstrom motioned to approve the EBCAD Sleep Compensation Policy.

There were major concerns regarding the building that houses the ambulance and the volunteers waiting for a call.

Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to make repairs up to \$8,000 for the Unit 14 ambulance. The motion carried.

Comp-time reimbursement and payout were discussed. Alex Gross said that they were also supposed to have a loaner ambulance, in lieu of the new ambulance ordered several years ago, but the ambulance district in Washington has not delivered the loaner vehicle. There has been a renewed push to get the Unit 14 ambulance fixed. Cutting costs in the budget for next year was discussed, and Gross pleaded that the voters be aware that they really needed the redistricting to pass, for this very reason. Otherwise, this entity cannot continue to exist.

Proactive Public Safety Power Shutoff

BOISE COUNTY -- Idaho Power sent out text notices a day prior to the expected windstorm that was due to arrive last Wednesday, July 24th. There was a possibility that the power company would use a "public safety power shutoff," or PSPS. A PSPS is when a company like Idaho Power proactively turns off the power to an area where wildfire is a risk due to extreme weather conditions. Sven Berg, an Idaho Power representative, explained that although that notice went out to 53 zones expected to experience a high risk of wildfire due to wind, it only became necessary for two zones to implement the PSPS

precaution. Boise County was not affected by this shutoff, rather Berg explained that all the customers in Horseshoe Bend, Garden Valley, Idaho City, and throughout the county experienced a weatherrelated outage. There were approximately 25,000 customers without power on July 24th tributing factor in their decision making. Although it may be hot, and this weekend it is anticipated to reach 107 degrees in Boise, there will not likely be the high wind component, triggering the threshold set by Idaho Power.
