

** Effective as of August 20, 2024, 8:34 AM, Highway 21 is closed from MP92 to MP107 from the Grandjean area to the Custer County line due to wildfire activity. This area starts at Forest Road 025RC (MP 92) which accesses Warm Springs Guard Station and air strip to the Custer County line MP107. This closure is to provide safety for firefighters completing strategic firing operations along Highway 21 to reduce hazardous fuels and limit fire intensity.

The community of Hanging Valley is in Level 3 "GO" evacuation status due to the Highway 21 closure. Evacuation information will be posted on the Boise County Sheriff's Office Facebook page. The Bonneville Campground is also closed effective immediately. For closure information, please visit Boise National Forest's website – Alerts & Closures.

During these critical fire weather days, the protection of communities, historic landmarks, and other values at risk are the primary objectives. Firefighters are utilizing all resources available including helicopters, fixed wing aircraft, and water scoopers; aircraft

are utilized as tactics, weather, smoke, and terrain conditions allow safe operations. Firefighter and public safety are always the highest priorities. Smoke will be visible and could impact roadways today, please follow the instructions of emergency responders and drive safely.

CURRENT STATUS/ **PLANNED ACTIONS:**

Middle Fork Complex: The Middle Fork Complex is comprised of the Bulldog and Nellie fires.

Yesterday on the Bulldog Fire, crews prepared the FS road 698 for holding the fire on the east side. An assessment of structures and other values at risk was completed in the Silver Creek area to the north, and lines held on the south/southeast edge. Today, firefighters will continue to improve and hold direct and indirect lines. The public is reminded that the Middlefork Road (FS Road 698) is closed at the Forest Service boundary just north of Lightning Creek and the Scriver Creek Road (FS Road 693) is also closed at the Forest Service Boundary for firefighter and public safety as crews continue to work to protect private property and structures in the vicinity of Crouch.

On the Nellie Fire, there was growth to the north and south with group torching, longrange spotting, and terrain driven spread. Active fire behavior occurred throughout the afternoon and evening leading to a 3,000 acre growth. Firefighters continued to provide for protection of the Deadwood and Scott



Mountain Lookouts and the communication tower. A wild-land fire module will assess the Deadwood Reservoir area to provide for infrastructure and historic structure protection. Firefighters will continue to identify potential control lines surrounding the fire area. The public is reminded that Forest Service Road #555 is closed at the intersection of Highway 17 all the way to the Forest Service Road #579 intersection.

Wapiti Fire: The Wapiti Fire had active fire behavior with group torching, long range spotting, and terrain driven runs. Crews continued structure protection throughout the day and night for Sawtooth Lodge, Bear Creek, Camp Creek, and Wapiti Creek Summer Home areas. An additional structure was lost due to showering embers in the Wapiti Summer Homes area. Fire is expected to continue to spread downhill and along the ridge lines to the west and north. Firefighters will be operating along Highway 21 and may conduct strategic fire operations if needed, to reduce heavy fuels and limit the intensity of fire spread. Smoke will impact the Highway 21 corridor today.

Bull Trout Fire: The Bull Trout fire is still 92% contained, with little heat observed yesterday. An engine continues to patrol the fire daily to ensure no changes in activity.

WEATHER AND FIRE BEHAVIOR:

Critical weather conditions on Monday created hot dry windy conditions that brought active fire behavior. Fire spread due to group torching with spotting up to ½ mile. Today, when the inversion lifts conditions will be elevated to nearcritical fire weather throughout the afternoon and evening. Winds will be from the southwest at around 6-12 mph with gusts up to 15-20mph possible. Isolated showers and thunderstorms may be possible east of the Sawtooth Range. These thunderstorms may bring gusty outflow winds that could cause fire to spread. Inversion will settle during the late evening and overnight with light winds across all areas. Due to weather conditions, fire behavior is expected to include group torching, short- and long-range spotting with terrain driven spread through dead and fine fuels again today. As dry weather continues, fuels continue to be very dry and will remain dry. Fire spread will be wind driven and align with slopes and fuel types.

CLOSURES, RESTRIC-TIONS, AND EVACUA-TIONS:

Middle Fork Complex: The Boise County Sheriff's Office continues to maintain the Level 2 evacuation notice for residents on and near the Middlefork Road between Stump Ranch Road up to Tie Creek Campground. The Boise National Forest issued an area closure for the fire (Closure #0402-06-59) effective August 12, 2024. The purpose of this order is to protect public safety during the fires.

Wapiti Fire: The evacuation order for Summer Homes and the Sawtooth Lodge remain in effect for the Wapiti Fire, as does the area closure issued by the Sawtooth and Boise National Forests (Closure #0402-05-94) effective August 12, 2024. This Order is for public and firefighter safety during fire suppression efforts of the

Wapiti Fire.


Bull Trout Fire: The Bull Trout Fire Area Closure (Closure #0402-05-93) remains in effect for the roads and trails within the perimeter of the fire. The Boise National Forest issued this order on August, 12, 2024. It will be rescinded as soon as it is safe to do so.



ORDINANCE NO. 386

Flat Fire Community Meeting in Idaho City

IDAHO CITY -- On August 19th, 2024, at 6:00 pm, over 60 attendees gathered at Ray Robison Community Hall in Idaho City to receive updates on the Flat Fire from the Great Basin Complex Incident Management Team 6 (GBCIMT 6). The meeting provided information on the fire's current status and the ongoing efforts to contain it.

The Flat Fire, located approximately 1 mile northeast of Pioneerville in Boise County, was first reported on August 5th, 2024, after a lightning storm moved through the area. As of the meeting date, the fire has expanded to 3,641 acres and is 14% contained. The

firefighting efforts have been extensive, with 332 personnel deployed, including 10 hand crews, 10 engines, 4 water tenders, 3 dozers, 1 masticator, and 4 helicopters.

Incident Commander Mack McFarland, assumed command of the Flat Fire on the morning of August 19th, 2024. McFarland and his team bring additional resources and management capabilities to the ongoing firefighting efforts. McFarland expressed his gratitude to the community, saying, "Thanks for welcoming us into your community. We are glad to be here. This is not the first time this incident management team has been to Idaho City and camped on the runway. We were here for the Walker Fire, Pioneer Fire, and now again here for the Flat Fire."


Crews have begun mop-up operations on the north and west sides of the fire, while on the east side dozer lines are being constructed and snags cleared. Efforts are also focused on containing the fire's southern edge to prevent it from establishing itself in the Elk Creek drainage.

During the meeting, Public Information Officer Kailie Leggett of GBCIMT 6 began by sharing key facts about the fire, including the number of acres affected, the level of containment, and the personnel involved in the firefighting efforts. Following Leggett,

Operations Section Chief Jesse Trembly of GBCIMT 6 provided an update on the operational aspects of the firefighting efforts. Trembly emphasized the work they are doing to prevent the fire from reaching the Idaho City watershed, which would potentially impact the city's water supply. Trembly noted, "The last couple of days have been extremely productive and successful as far as our firefighting operations."

Ken Larson, Fire Behavior Analyst for GBCIMT 6, provided an overview of the fire's behavior and current weather conditions. He noted that cooler weather is expected this week, with humidity levels in the fire area ranging from 20-25%. Winds are forecasted to continue from the south at 6-10 mph, with gusts up to 20 mph. Larson cautioned that these weather conditions could lead to increased fire activity.

In addition to the firefighting efforts, the Boise National Forest has implemented an Area Closure due to the Flat Fire. The Summit Flat Road (#380) between Pioneerville and Coulter Summit is closed for public





was received later in the day. The statement read: "Idaho City Mayor Kenneth Everhart signed a Local Disaster Emergency Declaration on August 14, 2024, due to the threat posed to the watershed that Idaho City relies on as its primary source of water. The City Council passed a resolution affirming the Local Disaster Emergency Declaration for an indefinite period. Idaho City is closely following new developments with the Flat Fire. There is no indication that the Flat Fire is a direct threat to any structures or residents within the City. The Declaration ensures that the City can respond immediately and access outside resources if and when necessary to protect the City's water system and water

Idaho City Declares Emergency

IDAHO CITY - An emergency Idaho City Council meeting was held on Thursday, August 15th to address the threat presented by the Flat Fire. President of the council, Tom Secor, explained the decision: "The last time there was a fire in the drainage above Idaho City, we did not declare an emergency soon enough and the funds that were, that should have or could have been available to us, we did not get to be a part of, because we literally were like a month behind." The city presented Resolution 2024-06 to establish a local emergency declaration. Secor said that the resolution will be posted on the city's website and that Boise County Sheriff Scott Turner wanted this resolution done as soon as possible so that it can move forward to the state level. Councilmember Mari Adams motioned to approve the resolution, which stated that the city council affirms a local emergency declaration. Councilmember Ashlev Elliott asked that Secor reiterate the purpose of the meeting for those community members who had newly joined the conversation via Zoom meeting. Councilmember Secor explained that the fire had not yet reached the Elk Creek drainage

as of that point, "but it is so close. It's scary." Elk Creek is the location of the city's water intake. Councilmember Ryan Huffington wanted everyone to know that proper attention was being paid to the fire and its developments.

Secor shared that he had witnessed the fire activity from Bear Run Road the night prior, and said, "It was unreal. It was actually pretty scary... Being that late at night, you would expect that [the fire] to lay down, it was not, it was crowning trees."

Mari Adams explained that the Idaho City Airport is the staging area for the Forest Service fire crews, and they have asked the public to stay away from the area due to the fire crew traffic. They will be landing planes and helicopters and need clear roads to get personnel in and out.

Sheriff Scott Turner briefed the council about the fire activity and current personnel on the fire.

One constituent asked how the fire could potentially affect their water, in the event it should cross the watershed. Secor responded that, "It has yet to be seen what it is actually going to be." The fire damage could result in mud slides,
