CDH Supports Youth in Boise County

BOISE COUNTY -- Central District Health recently awarded Boise County community partners with \$65,000 to foster positive experiences for youth in our area. Aimed at promoting family engagement through sports scholarships and events, the Youth Alcohol and Substance Use Prevention (YA-SUP!) program helps youth overcome adversity and realize their potential. These programs were implemented from March through August of 2024 and included field trips, STEM events, and family game nights for Basin School District. The school also sponsored parent workshops and offered resources for parents. Boise County's Community Justice received bicycles and team scholarship money to aid youth sports. The newly formed Idaho City Youth Soccer League was the recipient of this grant, and with it they were able to purchase sports equipment including nets, balls, flags, cones, jerseys, benches, scoreboards, safety guards, and equipment storage

bins. Horseshoe Bend's youth were afforded an opportunity to take trips to Boise, Seattle, and San Diego, which were coordinated through Community Schools Director Kelsey Williams to finance the travel and sporting events entry fees.

Lyndel Strong with Idaho City's youth soccer league said, "With the help of many community volunteers and the HOPE Grant we were able to more than double the size of our program this year and get more kids the experience of being on a team and building those connections. I'm a big believer that there's more to sports than the physical things you learn."

Project Coordinator Heather

Allan explained, "Healthy Outcomes from Positive Experiences (HOPE) describes four positive building blocks that are necessary to ensure positive childhood experiences: secure relationships, safe environments, opportunities for belonging, and opportunities for emotional growth. They promote optimal child development and reduce adverse childhood events and related trauma." She added, "We know that the absence of positive childhood experiences may be more damaging than the presence of adverse childhood experiences, and the higher the number of positive experiences a child has, the better overall health outcomes they have."

GARDEN VALLEY -- The new high school baseball field has been an endeavor that showed lots of potential, but with some additional funding the dream has become a reality. Countless volunteer hours have been poured into this project at each step of the way. Additionally, some very generous private donors contributed to complete the fence, place the sprinklers, and seed the field.

Frank Trabbie started the nonprofit to continue what the school district could not financially achieve, the completion of their own baseball field with the ultimate goal of seeing our high school seniors play

on their own home field and cheered on by their community.

Several generous donations have been received, including help from a Terrace Lakes golf course, Payette Forward donated \$6,000, and Severance Sand & Gravel and Knife River each donated four loads of sand for the field. There are still donations needed to complete the project, including the building of the backstop and dugouts. Those interested in helping out with this "build it and they will come" project, whether big or small, monetary donations may be dropped off at the Garden Valley School.

BOISE COUNTY -- The "State Closed Season" for burning has been extended by the Idaho Department of Lands, due to abnormally dry conditions and fire activity. The department will reevaluate these set measures should Boise County receive significant

moisture, but until that time, fire permits will not be allowed. According to county ordinance 2017-01, the outdoor burning ordinance ends at midnight on October 20th; however, burn permits through IDL, if available, will still be required.

Present: Commissioners Clay Tucker, Bob Callahan and Lindy Lindstrom

Pledge of Allegiance

CONSTITUENT INPUT: None

MINUTES: A motion was said to approve the minutes from October 8, 2024. The motion carried.

WILDFIRE ADMINISTRATOR JOB DESCRIPTION: Clerk Mary Prisco said they would address this next week.

ROAD AND BRIDGE JOB DESCRIPTION: Road and Bridge Superintendent Curtis Dill said they were working on a job description for an equipment operator with a few changes. Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve the amended job description for Road and Bridge. The motion carried.

RADIO ESTIMATES: Dill said he had talked with multiple departments regarding mobile and handheld radios. They are finalizing their order. Community Justice Administrator Amanda Leader addressed some concerns about the state of the radios and communication in her department. Chairman Tucker said that they would like to start with the road department. Commissioner Callahan spoke about "trying to get everybody on the same page" and put in one order instead of going to three different suppliers. There was talk of encrypted radios for emergency responders and community justice. Sheriff Scott Turner said he would have the radio order quote prepared for next week's meeting. Community Justice may combine their order with the sheriff's order. The road and bridge department, planning and zoning, East Boise County Ambulance District, and solid waste would all be combined with their radio order. Clerk Mary Prisco discussed procurement law and the use of federal funds. Sheriff Turner stated

that the radios for his department were budgeted for standard operations. Commission Lindstrom motioned to approve up to \$39,500 to Intermountain Communications for radios for the road and bridge department, planning and zoning, solid waste, noxious weeds, and EBCAD. All were in favor and the motion carried.

Community Justice provided a quote for two handheld radios and one vehicle radio. Commissioner Callahan said, "It's a safety thing, especially if they're out on calls and they can't get out to anybody. And that is a problem. I guess if their radios are only five watts now and bumping them up to fifty..." Commissioner Lindstrom added, "This is bringing us to 2024, to where we should be." He then motioned to approve the quote in the amount of \$6,538.54. The motion carried.

ROAD AND BRIDGE DEPT: A software purchase was discussed to help stay competitive with future grants. Dill said it would help with, "our sign maintenance, our road maintenance, keeping track of our lifespan of asphalt." The contract was reviewed by the county's prosecutor. Lindstrom motioned to approve the quote and agreement for \$7,100. This amount would just be for the first year, after which the amount was projected to decrease to \$4,300 a year. The motion carried.

BUILDING DISCUSSION: Clerk Prisco discussed funds for building costs which would cover the repair and upkeep of county buildings. Lindstrom commented that "this will save us money in the long run." He then motioned to approve the quote from a construction company in the amount of \$26,300 for the road and bridge building.

The Community Justice building bat problem was also evaluated by a company that was familiar with this issue. Commissioner Callahan report-

ed that the person who came out said, "The type of [wood] stain that was on there - *he does a lot of work up like in the McCall area and Cascade area* - and he said that for some reason the bats are attracted to it... He said after we do this, we shouldn't have any problems. It's just trying to keep the bats out." Some of the boards will need replacing, trim fixed, the holes will be sealed, and the whole building will receive two coats of WoodScapes Natural Sealer. Chairman Tucker said this was "a better plan than we had before," and Commissioner Lindstrom agreed.

Lindstrom motioned to approve the quote for construction in the amount of \$8,700. The motion carried.

SHERIFF: Sheriff Turner said there had been a painter up in the area and he asked him for a quote "to keep up with the maintenance of it [the Sheriff's building]. To make it last as long as we can." He said they would also "caulk some of the cracks and fix some things, and make it last a little longer." Lindstrom motioned to approve the quote for the construction company in the amount of \$9,800 to paint the Sheriff's building.

COURTHOUSE: There was a bid for painting the wood on the courthouse, including sanding the posts and applying a coat of "super paint." This would not include painting the brick. Lindstrom motioned to approve the quote in the amount of \$7,600 to paint the courthouse. The motion carried.

SNOWPLOW: Clerk Prisco said this snowplow would be paid for through a grant. Lindstrom motioned to approve the quote for a snowplow in the amount of \$11,337. All were in favor and the motion carried.

PATHOLOGY SERVICES: Pathology services through Ada County were discussed. Lindstrom motioned to approve the (annual) agreement between Boise and Ada

Counties.

ROAD DEPT: There was concern that the county prosecutor was not available to review agreements and documents in a timely manner. Chairman Tucker said he would speak with Prosecutor Alex Sosa.

IDAHO TRANSPORTATION DEPT. CONTRACT: Sheriff Scott Turner said it was a yearly contract that they renew each year with ITD (Idaho Transportation Dept.) to put in for "mini-grants." He said that at certain times of the year, they will make additional money available for more traffic control. Lindstrom motioned to approve the contract with ITD, traffic enforcement grant agreement for highway safety, 2025. The motion carried.

CLAIMS APPROVAL:

Clerk Mary Prisco explained the two claims approval reports between each of the two fiscal years, 2024 and 2025. Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve the claims approval report for FY24 in the amount of \$250,090. All were in favor and the motion carried. Lindstrom motioned to approve the FY25 claims approval report in the amount of \$60,418. All were in favor and the motion carried.

BANKS LOWMAN RD: Curtis Dill said they had put in for the grant for chipseal on the first part of the Banks Lowman Road for 2025. Chairman Tucker said, "Some striping on that road would be good."

CATERING PERMIT: Lindstrom motioned to ap-

The streets of Crouch were lined with vendors, games, and activities for the first annual fall festival. The event proved to be a big success and many hope this will truly become a yearly event.

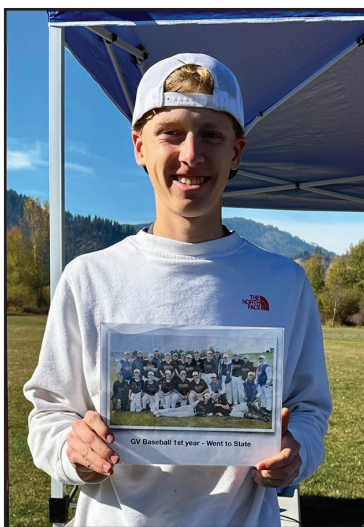

prove a catering permit, #101. The motion carried.

COMMUNITY JUSTICE: Lindstrom motioned to approve the demand warrant to "Satellite Tracking of People" in the amount of \$310. Two commissioners were in favor, but Chairman Tucker said, "nay." However, the motion carried. [No explanation was given.]

HORSESHOE BEND SCHOOL DISTRICT: Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to pay the demand warrant for the Horseshoe Bend School District in the amount of \$1,972. All were in favor and the motion carried.

EAST BOISE COUNTY AMBULANCE DISTRICT:

Director Mari Adams notified the board that they had finally received a machine for nitrous oxide, laughing gas for pain, for the ambulance. She said only the lead EMTs would be allowed to administer it, per the state physician commission. Every team member will still receive training on nitrous oxide, including the benefits and what safety precautions must be followed. Garden Valley EMTs notified Adams of the use of the gas. EBCAD will need to have every chart reviewed by a doctor when the gas is used. Emergency responders are not allowed, by state law, to have lights on their personal vehicles that have the color blue. Yellow, red, and white lights are acceptable.

Lindstrom motioned to approve that the EBCAD vehicle use police. All were in favor and the motion carried.

Adams updated the board that the loaner ambulance was supposed to be picked up that day, but there was an issue, "It is still a work in progress."

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Closed session to discuss a personnel issue. [Time 10:16am to 10:55am] There was no action required.

TRAIL CREEK MEADOWS SUBDIVISION: The plat final decision for the board will be presented by Planning and Zoning on November 26th at 11am. The planned subdivision is located off of Harris Creek Road.

Adjourned at 10:54am.

Aside from being a volunteer EMT with East Boise County Ambulance District I also volunteer with Centerville Fire, Boise County Search and Rescue, and as a dispatcher. Outside of being an EMT my other 3 positions in this county also HEAVILY rely upon the ambulance service for this county! Could you for one moment put yourself at the other end of a 911 call whether it's your spouse, child, grandchild, parent, or grandparent calling 911 for help for themselves or you? The fear, the panic, the stress or trauma they are feeling or going through. No matter what role I may be working in during any call, it tremendously weighs on my heart and soul to get you or your family member the best care possible expeditiously.

Now imagine calling 911 only to hear, "I'm sorry there is no ambulance available to you or your family member in need" or "I might be able to get you an ambulance out of Boise City but I don't know when, or if they will be there." EMS is NOT an essential service, so if Ada County doesn't have the

resources available, they won't be sending any. If they did happen to have an ambulance available, how long would it take them to get to you? Could they find you? Could their ambulance make it on our roads to you? Do their ambulances have 4-wheel drive for winter or our crazy dirt roads? On a good day with light traffic in a regular passenger vehicle, it takes about an hour to an hour and a half to get from Boise City to Idaho City on the highway. Change any factor of that and you're looking at 4 hours to never.

Quite a few people think that if the "yes" for the new formation of the new ambulance district doesn't go through everything will be ok because "we still have EMT's" which is further from the truth! If the formation of the new district fails then all emergency medical services for the east side of the county will fail, EMT's have no medical director or license to practice under or even a legal jurisdiction to practice in.

Voting yes for EMS not only helps ensure the health and safety of our community, but it will also help to provide the resources we so desperately

need to maintain sustainability we need for the required supplies and maintenance needed to keep us in service. It would allow us to have actual paid EMT's staffed and dedicated, to keeping an ambulance in service and available at all times, and allowing us to have multiple ambulances in service at times staffed by volunteers. So please vote yes for EMS on November 5th, please show us the love and support that we so tirelessly and unwaveringly continue to show our community.

An Outside Perspective on EMS Services in East Boise County

EAST BOISE COUNTY -- Threats to our health and well-being come in all shapes and sizes. While many surprise medical conditions arise as a result of an acute situation, others quietly propagate illness until it rears its ugly head when we least expect it. Some conditions are obvious while others are obscured by factors that are outside of our control. It can be

easy to grow complacent with regard to preparing for hazards that are less observable. I had the pleasure of working on a limited basis with the East Boise County Ambulance Service over the past weeks and got the opportunity to witness what is required to successfully help others survive these concealed medical risks.

I have served in the US Army for 26 years, during which I have gained experience in threat mitigation and acute treatment of injuries and illnesses. My history also includes qualification as a firefighter and two years of volunteer service in Washington State. It was my pleasure to be accepted for direct observation and volunteer service with the East Boise County Ambulance District (EBCAD), through the US Army's Career Skills Program, as I prepare for my

retirement. I was a personal witness to the commitment and self-sacrifice that local residents make to provide for the medical needs of their fellow community members. During my internship, I have observed a level of care and compassion that serves as undeniable evidence of a true willingness to protect, grow, and nurture those most vulnerable within this community. But this willingness alone is not sufficient to maintain the level of care that this community requires. It is obvious to an outside observer that EBCAD is operating with one arm tied behind their back.

On multiple occasions I had the privilege of being a part of medical assessments and life-saving interventions. I saw the look of panic dissipating from family members' faces as the selfless volunteers of EBCAD

arrived on scene. I watched and listened carefully as these volunteers assessed, treated, and transported patients in urgent need of medical care. I attended carefully planned and competently executed training where valuable skills were reinforced in preparation for common, rare, and emerging medical threats. I attended meetings centered on ensuring that the quality and quantity of care, equipment, and personnel remains or grows in sufficiency to meet the needs of this community. Never once did I perceive any evidence of waste; every supply is carefully allocated to the specific need it was designed to meet, without any excess. There are no surpluses to be expended in any regard. Resources in this district are quite obviously stretched to their breaking point. EBCAD is a strikingly selfless and fiercely supportive element of this community's medical wellness, and the only immediate medical care available locally. They have put in the work, and are thoroughly aware of the immediate, and long-term preparedness that this service requires to continue operating at a level this community needs

and deserves.

I certainly can be regarded as an outsider, and would expect those that are inherently opposed to shouldering any additional cost associated with meeting the medical needs of this community to regard me as such. However, I have no dog in this fight, and that may provide a unique perspective. After considering arguments on both sides, and witnessing first-hand the struggles this ambulance district experiences multiple times daily, I believe that the need for change outweighs the cost it will impose. In closing, I have enjoyed my time in East Boise County, I have appreciated the opportunity to interact with its unique and friendly residents, and I am hopeful that you decide to empower the remarkable people who respond to your medical emergencies with the resources they require to provide the service that this community deserves.

Idaho Constitutional Amendment HJR 5

Legislative Council's Statement of Meaning, Purpose, and Result to Be Accomplished

This proposed constitutional amendment provides that only Idaho residents who are citizens of the United States are eligible to vote in elections in the State of Idaho and that noncitizens are not eligible to vote in any election in the State of Idaho. Currently, Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Idaho provides: "[e]very male or female citizen of the United States, eighteen years old, who has resided in this state, and in the county where he or she offers to vote for the period provided by law, if registered as provided by law, is a qualified elector." This provision does not expressly prohibit noncitizens from voting. The proposed amendment adds language to provide that only United States citizens may vote in elections in the State of Idaho.

Statements FOR the Proposed Amendment

1. This constitutional amendment is needed to clarify that United States citizenship is a requirement for eligibility to vote in Idaho elections because the current language does not expressly prohibit noncitizens from voting. The proposed amendment will ensure that individuals who are not citizens of the United States do not vote in any government election in the State of Idaho.

2. The amendment is also needed to clarify that the right to vote shall not be granted in the future to individuals who are not citizens of the United States. Noncitizens have been granted the right to vote in some local elections across the United States. Legislation to expand voting to noncitizens has been considered in other states and cities in the United States.

3. Allowing noncitizens to vote in Idaho elections could lead to concerns regarding election integrity and allow for foreign influence in Idaho elections. The proposed constitutional amendment will protect the State of Idaho from such issues.

Statements AGAINST the Proposed Amendment

1. The proposed constitutional amendment is not needed because United States citizenship is currently required for participation in Idaho elections. Under current law,

the Idaho Secretary of State requires citizenship and proof of residency with respect to individuals who register to vote, and it is a felony for an individual to provide false information on an Idaho voter registration form. Additionally, federal statute provides that it is a crime for a non-citizen to vote in any federal election.

2. Election fraud involving voting or attempts to vote by noncitizens is not a significant issue in Idaho. Adding additional language to the Idaho Constitution in an effort to solve a problem that is not occurring could inadvertently create new problems or add an additional barrier to registering to vote by new citizens and state residents.

3. The proposed amendment undermines local control of local elections. The amendment would foreclose any opportunity in the future for the Idaho Legislature or local governments in Idaho to authorize noncitizens to vote in certain elections that might directly affect their interests.

Amendment Text

Section 2. QUALIFICATIONS OF ELECTORS. Every male or female citizen of the United States, eighteen years old, who has resided in this state, and in the county where he or she offers to vote for the period provided by law, if registered as provided by law, is a qualified elector. No person who is not a citizen of the United States shall be a qualified elector in any election held within the state of Idaho.

ITD Avalanche Team Assesses Wapiti Fire Damage on Hwy 21

LOWMAN – The Idaho Transportation Department’s avalanche team is back in Lowman preparing for the upcoming winter season. The team recently conducted an aerial assessment to evaluate changes in the corridor caused by the Wapiti Fire.

“The aerial survey gave us a clearer understanding of the risks,” ITD Avalanche Team Leader Bill Nicholson said. “We feel reassured as it pertains to avalanches. However, the fire has increased the potential for mudslides and debris flows. Our team is ready, and we remain focused on keeping the highway safe for travelers just like we do every year.”

Another difference this winter brings is La Niña. The National Weather Service predicts colder temperatures and increased precipitation for the region. Excessive moisture in areas impacted by wildfires could result in a heightened risk of flooding and slides.

ITD’s avalanche team is stationed in Lowman, 20 miles from an avalanche-prone section of State Highway 21 that spans from Grandjean to Banner Summit. Every winter, the team monitors conditions and makes the decision

on when to close roads due to avalanche danger.

There are more than 70 avalanche paths along SH-21. The ITD avalanche team also closely monitors U.S. Highway 12 near the Montana border.

There are only three highways in the United States that fall under the ‘High’ category in the Avalanche Hazard Index: SH-21 in Lowman, State Highway 210 in Utah, and U.S. Highway 550 in Colorado.
