Idaho City Fire Class & Training

IDAHO CITY - The Idaho City Fire Protection District hosted a Fire Service Training sponsored Interior Structure Live Fire Concept/Attack class on Saturday, February 15, 2025. They were joined by volunteers from the Clear Creek Volunteer Fire Department. The students gained confidence in their Personal Protective Equipment, which includes full-structure bunker gear and SCBA. They practiced running an Incident Command while on the exterior of a structure, coordinating with the attack team on the inside, and directing the ventilation team and truck engineer. While inside the burning container, the students experienced a 200 to 250F degree atmosphere. However, the upper half of the container exceeded temperatures closer to about 400 to 500F degrees at the top of the thermal layer. To give perspective to the atmosphere, the human skin starts to feel pain at about 111F, with

first degree burns starting at about 118F.

The firefighters practiced reading the smoke to understand the natural flow path, with attention to what the thermal layer was doing, and how actions performed by the firefighter changed these variables. Instructor and local firefighter John Ward said they used ventilation tactics, including hydraulic ventilation to pull smoke and heat out of the structure to control the thermal layer and neutral plane. The firefighters also practiced the proper application of water, using the nozzle to slowly control the fire. Ward added a caution that too much water applied hastily would bring the extreme temperatures of the thermal layer down on top of the firefighters, as it would push the neutral plane to the floor within seconds.

Ward reminded firefighters that water boils at 212F and then turns to steam. The conversion process has a 1,700 times expansion rate, and when you reach 1000F, that expansion rate goes to about 4,200

times the pressure from that process and pushes the extreme heat down very quickly. Ward said, "Learning when and how to properly apply water is a critical skill for firefighters, [and] the consequences of applying too much too fast could be fatal. Most PPE can start to fail at about 300F, which is when time becomes critical before full failure."

fore full failure." John Ward reminded the community, "Please remember to thank all of your amazing volunteers for what they do every day and the sacrifices they and their families endure when the tones drop and they get up from the dinner table or just finally got to sleep from a long day of work, to respond to the call and serve their community and those in it. If you are interested in serving the community, reach out to your local department, they can use help in all aspects of life, doesn't have to be the one fighting the fire, there are so many other jobs they need assistance with. Everyone has skills and abilities, please consider sharing them with your community."

Present: Commissioners Clay Tucker, Bob Callahan, and Lindy Lindstrom.

Pledge of Allegiance **CONSTITUENT INPUT:** None

MINUTES: Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve the minutes from February 4th, 2025. The motion car-

PLANNING AND ZON-**ING**: Elk Run subdivision plat was discussed by the Planning and Zoning Director Alex Gross. Lindstrom motioned to approve the signature for the partial plat amendment. The motion carried.

TREASURER: An RV was registered and double-taxed. Lindstrom motioned to approve the tax cancelation in the amount of \$67. The motion carried.

SHERIFF: The purchase of an ATV was explained by Clerk Mary Prisco as an expense that would be taken out of the "Wildfire Mitigation," Title 3 fund that would be used solely for search and rescue on public lands. Sheriff Scott Turner said, "This will replace the ATV that previously got wrecked." The department still has one ATV and the sheriff added that they will put tracks on the new one. Lindstrom made a motion to approve the sheriff's request to purchase an ATV in the amount of \$12,684. The motion carried.

SOLID WASTE: Lindstrom motioned to approve a new transfer attendant hire for up to 20 hours a week. The motion carried.

ROAD AND BRIDGE: A new hire was briefly discussed and Lindstrom said that he would like to table this discussion for executive session.

IDAHO CITY SNOWMO-BILE PROGRAM: A payroll addition was discussed for two individuals. Lindstrom motioned to approve the two payroll additions, "for as many hours as needed," and the motion carried.

COMPASS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: A committee meets once a month. Chairman Tucker motioned to have Commissioner Lindstrom represent Boise County. The motion car-

AUDIT: Clerk Prisco said that Prosecutor Alex Sosa had reviewed Boise County's engagement letter for an audit and that of East Boise County Ambulance District for FY2024. She said the "fieldwork" was scheduled for the

end of April and the beginning of May. Prisco said they were under a "tighter timeframe" due to the creation of EBCED and dissolution of EBCAD. Lindstrom motioned to approve the letter of engagement for Boise County and EBCAD for FY2024. The motion carried.

RESOLUTION: Lindstrom motioned to approve Resolution 2025-14, a Boise County resolution increasing the Justice Fund in the Sheriff's Department. Clerk Prisco explained that it was for the supplies account that had been "inadvertently missed" during the new budget. The motion carried.

CLAIMS APPROVAL RE-PORT: Commissioner Callahan looked over the costs and questioned the senior center's use of propane in the amount of \$5,000 for their generator. Sheriff Turner said it covered the senior center, but also the public television station, "because we have a backup" for public notification on that television tower. It also covers the sheriff's office with two 1,000-gallon propane tanks. There was also work done on the line to the senior center. For website services, the final bill, was for \$3,000. Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve the Claims Approval Report in the amount of \$252,879.36. The motion carried.

CERTIFICATE OF RESI-DENCY: Lindstrom motioned to approve the certificate of residency and the motion carried.

DEMAND WARRANT: Lindstrom motioned to pay a demand warrant for the Sheriff's ATV in the amount of \$12,684. The motion carried.

EAST BOISE COUNTY AMBULANCE: The ambulances were still having work done on them. A new taxing entity was discussed for EBCED and the moving of funds to this new account. Lindstrom motioned to approve the payment of \$40,000 to EBCED pursuant to the plan of dissolution.

PLANNING AND ZON-ING PUBLIC HEARING: The partial plat dissolution for Turner Subdivision was discussed. There were some issues brought up by the neighbors regarding a well lot. The applicant discussed their plan to combine the lots and said that it was not accessible. Two neighbors also expressed concerns. Everyone was in agreement, and Lindstrom motioned to approve the planning and zoning plat dissolution for Turner Subdivision. The motion carried.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Chairman Tucker motioned to go into a closed executive session to discuss hiring an employee. The motion carried. [Time 11:05 am to 12:07 pm] Chairman Tuck said after coming back into session said there was no action required. The hiring of an employee would be tabled.

FUTURE AGENDAS: An Idaho Department of Transportation meeting was discussed and possible dates.

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HORSESHOE BEND CITY COUNCIL MEETING

The following is a synopsis of the Horseshoe Bend City Council meeting that was held on Wednesday, February 12, 2025. All council members were present. Mayor Pat Goff made the call to order at 7:00 p.m. then led the Pledge of Allegiance. After unanimous approval of the agenda, minutes from the previous meeting on January 8, plus the authorization to pay the city's bills, Goff opened the meeting's new business by introducing Kurt Folke from Quest CPA who presented the city's audit via Zoom. Folke highlighted specific areas of the audit for the fiscal year ending on 9/30/2024 while the council followed along with the written audits they had been provided. Folke explained that his company had followed normal auditing procedures and stated that he believed all the numbers presented were accurate. He verified that the internal controls set in place by the city were properly followed. Audit highlights: The general fund had a positive year and covered all expenses and ended the year with a balance of \$63,155, which represents approximately 18 months of operating reserves and is six months more than needed. The water and sewer funds both ended with positive funds thanks to grant revenues, without those additional funds Folke said the city would have been closer to "breaking

even." He told the city that "everything is going in the right direction." Goff mentioned that more tax revenue would be coming into the city once the Deer Valley subdivision began building homes this spring. Councilmember Martye White asked what would happen if the grant money went away. Folke said that without grant revenue the city would be unable to fund large projects and that they would need to stop projects that had been started or find new sources of revenue. After the presentation the council unanimously approved the audit as presented. Also under new business was the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Cascade Raft. An MOU is an agreement between two or more parties, including government entities, that outlines how they will work together. City Attorney Tony Pantera stated that he had looked over the draft of the MOU and shared his concerns regarding the duration of the contract. He recommended that the council not take up the matter during the meeting. He added that contracts like the one presented renewed on an annual basis in Boise according to the Parks & Recreation Department. Cascade Raft is proposing entering into a contract with the city to allow them access to the Payette River via the Veterans Memorial Park for the purpose of renting tubes to floaters. Pantera said this type of agreement is new to him and he didn't have the answers yet to

all of his questions. He wants to pursue licensing agreements with any company that wishes to put out from the park. A question arose regarding parking if other companies were to use the park for floating but Goff said that off-site parking would be available at the school. The matter was tabled until the next meeting. The last order under new business was to approve signers on the city's checking account. Goff, City Clerk Gina Elmer, and City Treasurer Sarah Prince were unanimously approved as signers. Prince took over the role of treasurer after Terri Nolan retired last month.

Department Reports-

EMS: There were fourteen calls last month. There are two new trainees starting the hybrid class with a potential third signing on. The classes were paid for by an anonymous grant of \$10,000. The department is looking for more trainees. They are still ironing out the kinks with the new billing company but reported that the company said they "were doing good." Goff asked if "rider coupons" could be given to council members and city staff and said his school in Emmett is working to start medical courses which would prepare high school students for EMS careers. He indicated they would be involving Horseshoe Bend High School. (Goff is the superintendent of Payette River Technical Academy, a CTE school).

Public Works: Finished the

"filter business" which took 4-5 days but "went good." They are working on snow removal and supporting where they can. They are preparing for the removal of the Boise Street Bridge and the placement of half of the bridge at the Veterans Memorial Park, the other half is going to the city of Star.

Engineering: The department gifted the council members and staff with Post-it notes. The sidewalk project along Highway 55 is winding down and will be completed before the next meeting. They received a letter from Governor Little's office that funding from the Efficiency Grant the city had received for water plant upgrades had been paused and the department was unsure if it would fund due to the "uncertainty of Energy Conservation grants." Goff asked about

the start date for Deer Valley subdivision and was told that four building permits had been pulled, with 50 more expectedby October.

City Attorney: Pantera said he was in communication with Public Works on a "variety of issues" and that he was "keeping busy."

Mayor: "I don't have anything." White asked if the mayor could contact the sheriff about getting reports for the meetings, and Goff said he would make contact. White also asked about the status of the EMS mini house. Goff said that it would be ready in a "week or two." The meeting adjourned at 7:32 p.m. The Horseshoe Bend City Council meets on the second Wednesday of each month at City Hall, 112 Ada Street. Meetings start at 7:00 p.m.



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

Howard C. Goul 1930 - 2024


Howard C. Goul "HC" was born in Idaho Falls, Idaho to Mary (Cruikshank- Goul) Ihrig and Howard C. Goul. The family was living in Driggs, Idaho. Howard spent his childhood in Boise, Idaho, growing up on 8th Street, and graduating from Boise High School in 1948.

He sold the evening edition of the Boise Capital News on the "best corner" in the city, Sixth and Main, at age 8, often stopping at the back door of the Chinese restaurant across from the Boise Capitol, to pick up dinner for the family, on his way home. He was proud of becoming a licensed pilot at age 16, riding his bike to flying lessons at Floating Feather Airport. Howard, and members of the Boise High School ski team, traveled the dirt road to Bogus Basin and cleared brush and trees so the first T-Bar could be installed. They also groomed ski runs to earn their ski passes.

Howard attended Boise Junior College (now Boise State University), spent a year in Perthshire, Scotland with his aunt and attended college in Grenoble, France, where he became fluent in French. After leaving France, Howard attended college at The University of California Berkley, graduating in 1952 with a degree in Business Administration.

Upon his return to Idaho, Howard settled in Horseshoe Bend. Always an industrious worker, he became a cattle rancher and farmer. He was recognized for engineering and constructing an irrigation and pumping system on the ranch. In addition to raising cattle, he was a successful grower of award-winning alfalfa seed.

It was there that Howard met Jo Deen. Jo was home for summer break from the College of Idaho. They were married the following year, March 17, 1955. Soon after their marriage, they lost their home to a fire and moved temporarily to Boise. Howard commuted back to Horseshoe Bend until a new



home could be built.

Howard and Jo named their ranch The 7 Wine Glass Ranch. The name and cattle brand represented themselves, their five children, and Howard's favorite wine from his time in France, Chateauneuf-du-Pape.

In 1966, Howard and Jo sold the 7 Wine Glass Ranch and moved their family to Boise. At that time, Howard began a new career at Daly and Company as a stockbroker. After a few years as a stockbroker, Howard made a career change and started a construction business. He was an avid learner, entrepreneur, and innovator, and began home building and land development. He built the first "earth shelter" home in the Boise foothills and used foam core panels to build energy efficient homes in Boise and McCall. In 1974, he and Jo began construction of their dream home on Payette Lake in McCall. This was their favorite place on earth. For almost 50 years Howard worked on building and improving the lakeside

cabin, never getting tired of the beautiful view. Their children and grandchildren will always have fond memories of magical times in McCall.

Howard never officially retired, he spent many hours at his computer, with four large monitors, tracking treasury bills, the bond markets, and stocks. He had a wide range of interests that kept his mind engaged, a renaissance man, always learning, reading, and embracing modern technology.

Howard was preceded in death by his wife of 65 years, Josephine "Jo" Nellie Goul; mother and stepfather, Mary (Cruickshank-Goul) and Lue Ihrig of Horseshoe Bend, ID; sister, Kathleen Farmer of Berkeley, CA; and sister, Roberta "Bobby" Scripsema of East Grand Rapids, MI.

He is survived by sons, Dean (Peggy) Goul, Brok Goul, Ashley (Ferris) Goul; daughters, Tomi (Gary) McGee, and Liza Goul; granddaughters, Jennifer Staffne, Lisa (Cody) Sells; great-grandchildren, Payton, Landon; granddaughters, Kayla Goul, Kristin McGee (Lucas Snodgrass); great-granddaughter, Adeline; granddaughters, Erica McGee (Dylan Coonradt), Annie McGee Villanueva (Ikaika, Harley Goul Brinkman step-grandchildren, (Cole); JoLynn Taber, Amanda Taber, Orion Cooper, Tristan (Ashley) Cooper; great-grandchildren, Liam, Owen, and Grace.
