ITD Begins Installation of Interim Traffic Signal at the Intersection of Hwy 55 and Banks Lowman Road

BANKS - The Idaho Transportation Department will begin construction on an interim traffic signal at the intersection of State Highway 55 and Banks Lowman Road tomorrow to provide safe turning opportuni-

Historically, traffic on Banks Lowman Road has been unable to find sufficient gaps in the steady southbound traffic on SH-55, resulting in long lines of drivers waiting, especially on weekends. The signal was identified as the best solution based on a preliminary study of options and public feedback. It will save turning drivers' time, and the intersection will no longer require flaggers to safely operate during peak traffic in the summer.

This week, crews will begin constructing the foundation for the traffic signal, followed by installing utilities at the intersection. Additional work

includes the installation of signal poles and arms, signal heads, minor paving on Banks-Lowman Road, and guardrail installation. The traffic signal project is expected to be complete by summer.

ITD maintenance forces will manage traffic for the duration of this project, utilizing alternating lane closures and flaggers during some phases of the work. Travelers are encouraged to check 511.idaho.gov and plan for delays in work zones like this one, as all closures will be posted.

In addition to adding the interim signal this year, ITD is also working on a long-term intersection-widening tion. This year ITD will begin a comprehensive intersection planning and design process that will review bridge widening, hillside setback earthwork, and turn lanes to meet the growing regional and river area traffic mobility demands. The design and public outreach process will take multiple years

Idaho City High School 7 **Construction Over Spring Break**

IDAHO CITY -- Have you seen some construction happening over Spring Break at Idaho City High School? Superintendent Tricia Kelly for Basin School District wrote a ten-year facilities plan a few months back and submitted it to the state. The state awarded Basin School District with a

\$1.2 million facilities improvement fund!

The first improvement being made is a renovation of Idaho City High School's aging dry sprinkler system, which has been a major source of leaking pipes over the past 10 years. Superintendent Kelly commented, "This improvement

will contribute significantly to the safety of our students and save our buildings. We are looking forward to more improvements for Basin schools in the very near future and I am pleased that the state of Idaho and Superintendent Debbie Critchfeild recognize the challenges of our rural schools."

Present: Commissioners Clay Tucker, Bob Callahan, and Lindy Lindstrom.

SNOWMOBILE FUND:

Clerk Mary Prisco explained the negative cash for the 8A Idaho City Snowmobile Fund. She reported that there were two grants that have not been sent into Idaho Parks and Rec for reimbursement, amounting to about \$46,000. Her office has prepared those, and they are ready to receive signatures. The funds should come in within the next two weeks.

Further grants were discussed, with better communication with the county. Commissioner Callahan complemented those working on the program and helping it to grow. The representatives from the snowmobile program were excited about pursuing further grants, and providing improvements to the trails and parking.

One of the representatives

explained an ongoing issue of vehicles driving through the gates and onto the groomed snowmobile trails. There are currently two such vehicles stuck. He said, "We had one back in January where a lady and a guy drove up Granite Creek six miles on our groomed route. And then we had our fun run that weekend, where we had 140 snowmobile guests that come up to Idaho City and spend the weekend. But this lady and guy were stuck up six miles in the middle of the trail. There is no other piece of machinery in the county that can go get these people... I was requested to go get them. I took our groomer and Deputy Archer. So, we went up there, we spent four or five hours. I pulled them out. Got them spun around, pulled them all the way back down. We had to reconstruct the trail, because they ruined it. I submitted a \$1,200 invoice for pulling them out and reconstructing the trail, and I found out this morning that the county doesn't have that written into any ordinance." He said that as a program, they can't do that service "all the time." They need to be able to recoup some of their costs. Boise County Prosecutor Alex Sosa spoke about making it a misdemeanor with fines. One representative said they people in vehicles will ignore the signage, "They open the gate, and

push the gate open, with the sign on it." The program is interested in preserving snowmobile routes.

M2 AUTOMATION: All the security equipment under contract with the county was discussed, and the agreement for maintenance. Upgrades to the contract were also discussed. There was a discussion about changing out all the card readers at \$22,000. Assessor Chris Juszczak said that two card readers had gone down in the past six months and the technology is older.

Servers for the county are ten or eleven years old. Cameras and maintaining footage for 30 days was discussed and a larger server to accommodate this ser-

MINUTES: Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve the minutes from March 11th and the motion carried.

DEPARTMENTAL IS- SUPERINTEN-**DENT JOB DESCRIPTION** FOR SOLID WASTE: The commissioners looked over the description and considered separating solid waste and the weed department superintendent rolls.

There are currently two positions open in the solid waste department, including an admin and superintendent position. They will have to work out of the Horseshoe Bend office.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Commissioner Tucker motioned to go into a closed executive session to discuss a personnel issue. [Time 9:59 am to 10:26 am] No action was re-

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Chairman Tucker motioned to go back into executive session to discuss pending litigation. [Time 10:26 am to 11:01 am] As discussed in executive session, there were suggested changes for the solid waste superintendent job description, which were then motioned and approved.

ING: There was a property owner that had shipping containers on his property that did not know that he needed a building permit for, and he was charged additional money for being out of compliance. He then quickly got the permit, but asked that the additional fees be waived. Commissioner Callahan stated, "Although Planning and Zoning did have time into it, I think that we feel that a break is necessary." Chairman Tucker said, "I don't think that he was noncompliant on purpose, it was out of ignorance." Commissioner Lindstrom followed up and stated for the record, "Anything that's not on wheels, that's 210 square feet, needs a building permit." Chairman Tucker said, "Shipping containers, included." Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to reduce the noncompliance fee to \$350, "to make it right." The motion carried.

Commissioner Lindstrom then motioned to approve the inspection services contract, and the motion carried.

BOISE RIDGE RIDERS: The fee for conditional use permit (CUP) for camping out during the event was asked to be waived. Commissioner Callahan commented that the group does a lot for the community, including supporting the businesses, providing graduating student scholarships, and has even provided a large check to help fund school lunches for those students that were going without a meal. Planning and Zoning Director Alex Gross said that the group does a lot of preparation work before the Idaho City 100, brings business to the community, and then repairs the used trails after the event. Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to waive the Boise Ridge Riders' CUP fee for a club camp. The motion carried.

DEPUTY CORONER: The deputy coroner requested an annual FBI training, and it was within the budget. A motion was made, and the out-of-state travel was approved.

EMERGENCY MANAG-ER: There were six notices of mass gatherings of more than 100 people. Some were for weddings and were within the CUP. The Bogus Basin Hill Climb was discussed and the accommodations for the event. Lindstrom motioned to approve this event.

NETWORKING: IT would like to upgrade all the departments' firewalls, which will unify all the sites, no mater where employees are in the county. It was verified that the amount was in the budget. Lindstrom motioned to approve the purchase of networking equipment, up to \$4,700. The motion carried.

SHERIFF: Sheriff Scott Turner presented an annual agreement with Idaho Parks and Recreation. There was a question of training by Commissioner Lindstrom and the sheriff replied that there were two deputies trained in instruction on marine safety that instruct the class. Lindstrom then motioned to approve the agreement with Idaho Parks and Recreation with the Sheriff's department.

Friends of the Garden Valley Library is Revived

GARDEN VALLEY -- On Thursday evening (3-20-25), the Friends of the Garden Valley Library held their meeting. Billie DaVolt reviewed the previous history of the Friends of the Library, which went defunct in 2016. The group was revived in 2023 and have since been busy planning and hosting various events at the library. DaVolt presented the 2025 calendar of events to about three dozen people in attendance. Community members can join at the library or by contacting DaVolt at 208-462-4599. While there is no membership fee, donations are greatly appreciated to help offset the cost of the events.

The Director of the Garden Valley District Library, Sara Krantz, spoke about the grants the library has received and of those they are waiting to hear about. Successful grants have been received from the Idaho Community Foundation (\$7,000), Payette Forward Thrift Shop (\$1,600), Idaho Commission of Libraries (\$1,000), Idaho State Historical Society (\$7,000), Idaho Commission of Libraries (\$3,000), and a Summer STEM Grant through the Idaho Commission of Libraries (\$500).

The library calendar of events for adults and kids is available on the library Facebook page - Garden Valley District Library - or can be viewed at their website https://gardenvalley.lili.org.

An exciting addition to the library is being set in motion by Dawna Booth. She is using a \$7,000 grant to set up the GV Historical Society area in the library. Much time and effort has gone into this history collection of Garden Valley. This includes articles, photographs, family written and oral histories, and more. There is still a lot of work to do to scan information in. Another corner of the library has been set aside for the information Booth is gathering. She encourages community members to come in and contribute their knowledge and experiences to this project.

RESOLUTION: Clerk Mary Prisco spoke about the Fair Housing Act's annual agreement. Lindstrom motioned to approve Resolution 2025-17, April Fair Housing Month. The motion carried.

RESOLUTION: Prisco spoke about the seed money for EBCED. The authorized fund transfer was further explained for the ambulance district. Lindstrom motioned to approve Resolution 2025-18, EBCED seed money [\$40,000] and the motion carried.

RESOLUTION: Prisco explained that Idaho Search and Rescue purchased an ATV with Title 3 funds. It can only be used for search and rescue on federal public lands. The money and purchase had not been budgeted for in 2025. A motion to approve Resolution 2025-19 was to increase the FY2025 general fund – Title 3 Wildfire Mitigation Fund department budget for the purchase of a Title 3 ATV. The motion carried.

TREASURER: There was a stop payment of \$30, which the clerk said was necessary.

The amount was motioned to reimburse the Treasurer in the amount of \$30. The motion carried.

COMPASS: Commissioner Lindstrom attended this committee meeting. He said the meeting was short, but they are changing some bylaws for counties to determine who votes on projects. Lindstrom said it served Boise County well, "and I think it's important for us." He said there's an upcoming meeting in April where the grant writer will be present, "so we can show him concerns we have in Boise County." He encouraged department heads to be present. "COMPASS is a humongous organization. We only get out of them what we put into it. So, I think the more people, the more ideas, the more everything, the better." Commissioner Lindstrom said that the main issue is the condition of the county roads, and they would likely take them on a tour. "So, take them over some of Boise County's finest roads. Maybe make a loop."

Notice To Control Noxious Weeds - Idaho Code 22-2407. LANDOWNER AND CITIZEN DUTIES. It shall be the duty and responsibility of all landowners to control noxious weeds on their land and property, in accordance with this chapter and with rules promulgated by the director.

- (1) The cost of controlling noxious weeds shall be the obligation of the landowner.
- (2) Noxious weed control must be for prevention, eradication, rehabilitation, control or containment efforts. However, areas may be modified from the eradication requirement if the landowner is a participant in a county-approved weed management plan or county-approved cooperative weed management area.
- (3) The landowner shall reimburse the county control authority for work done because of failure to comply with a five (5) day notice, as outlined in section 22-2405, Idaho Code.
- (4) If an article is infested with noxious weeds, it shall not be moved from designated premises until it is treated in accordance with the applicable rules, or in accordance with the written permission of a control authority.

Cell Phone Use During an Emergency

BOISE COUNTY -- Every cell phone user in Boise County has experienced losing cell reception. Now, what happens if you are without reception when an emergency strikes? Most people have a few options. There are three different states of zero reception that a cell phone can be in. The first option is a display of no bars, with nothing else. A second state is no bars, but a satellite icon on the phone. The last state is an SOS icon.

In talking with Boise County Sherrif Scott Turner and the BCSO dispatchers, I learned that no matter what the status of your phone is, you should get to clear skies and try dialing 911. There is a chance that the call will go through to a dispatcher. This will work some of the time. The downside is that the dispatcher most likely won't be able to pick up your location. I suggest having an application on your phone that gives you the GPS coordinates for your current position. This way you can give the coordinates to the dispatcher, and they will know where to send help.

If your screen status displays the SOS icon, this will let you dial 911 and get through to a dispatcher. In this instance, the dispatcher should be able to learn your location and send the correct help needed.

When the satellite icon is displayed, you should still begin by trying to call 911, but if you don't get through, you can send a text message to 911. Sending a text message is slow, but if you follow the phone screen, it will point you in the direction of the satellite and send the message. This option will allow you to text people, also, although it doesn't necessarily mean you can receive a message back from them. I have evaluated this feature personally, and it works.

Be aware that the satellite and SOS options require you to have a phone that is three years old or newer and has the latest software. Each type of newer phone has these features, but they may function in slightly different ways from model to model. Read up on how to use each and be prepared in case of an emergency.

There are more options coming out this summer and later. T-Mobile is beta testing messaging through the Starlink satellite system. This is scheduled for release in July 2025. The end goal is to have phone service, with Starlink as an addition. Other major cell phone providers are working with other systems to offer the same type of service. T-Mobile will make their network available to non-T-Mobile subscribers for \$20 a month in July. My daughter is on the beta program and the text message delivery works well.

There are a lot of options to get emergency services when adventuring out in the wilderness. Think about it now and find the different methods that will get you the help you need. If I can help with anything, just reach out to me on social media and I will help as much as possible. And remember that you do need power for your cell phone. Keep it well-charged and carry some kind of jump pack or portable battery in your vehicle or when you are adventuring in the wilderness.

CuMo Exploration Project

BOISE COUNTY – The Boise National Forest recently signed a Decision Notice of No Significant Impact regarding the CuMo Exploration Project. However, this notice does not approve the commencement of operations. A copy of the Decision Notice and Finding of No Significant Impact can be found on the project webpage at https://www.fs.usda.gov/project/ boise/?project=64920 in the "Objection Period and Signed Decision" folder. A public meeting has not yet been scheduled.

Environmental groups have compiled a press release entailing their concern that the Idaho Copper Corporation (CuMo exploration project) would be allowed to build up to eight miles of new roads and clear 122 drill pads on National Forest and private lands near Grimes Creek.

The mining exploration company is trying to determine the quantity of critical minerals in the designated area, including molybdenum, silver, and copper. Should this project be allowed to proceed, the open pit mine would be one of the largest in the world and within the Boise River watershed.

"Just the exploration alone poses threats to our water quality, recreation, traffic, public safety, and wildlife—and it is a dangerous steppingstone to massive amounts of pollution in the Boise River headwaters from an open pit mine," said John Robison, Public Lands & Wildlife Director with the Idaho Conservation League.

Shaun Dykes, CEO of American CuMo Mining Corporation, led a tour of the remote proposed mining project in 2017.

In August of 2016, Dykes said the company had spent the past two years conducting a ground water study for the U.S. Forest Service. Judge Lodge had accepted this data and found in favor to proceed with further test drilling. Dykes explained, "There's no more ground water issues as far as they're concerned. In fact, we don't see any groundwater up there."

The land is located ten miles north of Idaho City and approximately three miles east of **Grimes Pass in Boise County.**

Idaho City Continues to Test Water Lines and Locate Breaks

IDAHO CITY – The city's public works team has been struggling to find where the leaks and breaks in the waterlines will lead them, excavating and analyzing where these breaks are occurring in the 50-year-old pipes running throughout the city. Residents are encouraged to report any noticeable leaks or water pressure changes to the City of Idaho City office on Main Street.
