HORSESHOE BEND CITY COUNCIL MEETING

The following is a synopsis of the most recent meeting of the Horseshoe Bend City Council on Wednesday, May 14. This reporter missed the change of the meeting start time (meetings typically start at 7:00 p.m., this meeting began at 6:30 pm.) so we begin 10 minutes into the Water Rate Workshop. All council members were present, with seven audience members. City Attorney Tony Pantera arrived at 6:45 p.m. City Engineer Amy Woodruff led the workshop. Charts were displayed showing the water usage amounts of sample residential, commercial, and city properties. The workshop explored a proposal to increase the rate for customers using excessive amounts of water. The rate change was described as a "conservation effort" with the end goal being to encourage users to limit their water consumption.

Mayor Pat Goff indicated that the increase would probably only affect pricing during fire season, four months out of the year. Customers that use less than 5,000 gallons per billing cycle would not be affected. Goff said the reasoning behind the conservation effort was because, "we need the water." He added that the

city was unable to apply for USDA grants because the water rate was currently too low and the city will need help to fund a new water tank to replace the leaking cedar one at the north end of town. Woodruff made sure that the council knew the fee increase would not affect those with normal water usage, only those accounts that tend to water large areas of landscaping would see an increase. "It's a very serious problem for three months out of the year," she said. The city park was named as one of those big users, but Woodruff said plans to remove the park from the city water system would take place over the summer.

The Public Works Department will install a pump house and begin irrigating the park with water from the Payette River. During the summer the park uses water equivalent to 27 homes. A large church in the area uses the equivalent of 65 homes. Council member Martye White said, "We either pay now or we pay later." He added that he has been "irritated" by those using too much water. There will be a public hearing next month to discuss and decide on the conservation rate adjustment fee resolution.

Goff called a public hearing to order at 7:03 p.m. to discuss the Conditional Use Permit

(CUP) for Airlock, LLC. The business is owned by Daniel Barreto and manufactures gun suppressors. Barreto indicated that he had all the necessary state and federal permits to operate the business which will be located on the property of Barreto Manufacturing. Business hours will be Monday -Friday from 4:30 p.m.-6:30 p.m. Pantera said that it appeared as though all city codes had been complied with. Goff opened the floor to all opposed to the CUP-no one came forward, the same for those that were neutral. Four audience members spoke in favor of the CUP. Goff closed the hearing at 7:09 p.m. The CUP passed unanimously.

Updates. **Department** EMS: 12 calls last month, "nothing too exciting" according to the representative. "Fresh blood" will be joining the department soon, with two more recruits coming on board this summer. The department is worried about staffing levels when Deer Valley Subdivision completes building and new residents move in. Goff said that is the reason why the city is looking into creating an EMS District. The tiny house (to be used to house on-call personnel) is still without power.

Public Works: No update. **City Engineer:** Working on water system upgrades. Re-

searching grants to replace cedar water tank. Deer Valley Subdivision is "moving along," according to Woodruff. Mayor will need to meet with the Boise County Commissioners regarding Horseshoe Bend's Area of Impact (the area of impact is the geographical area where a city is expected to grow). The city's impact area is reviewed every five years by both the city and the county. The county is responsible for setting the area of impact but typically consults with the city. Woodruff says that the impact area boundar-

ies are "in theory a collaborative effort." The report must be submitted by the county no later than 12/31/2025.

City Attorney: Reviewed the agreement between Idaho Power and the city regarding waterline damage that occurred on March 4. The city is now part of the DigLine network.

Mayor: No Report.

The meeting adjourned at 7:21 p.m. The Horseshoe Bend City Council meets on the second Wednesday of each month at City Hall, 112 Ada Street. Meetings start at 7:00 p.m.

MINUTES: Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve the minutes from 4-29-2025 and the motion carried.

EMERGENCY MAN-AGER: A mass gathering was discussed, and the number of attendees was decreased; therefore, the Sheriff said the event really did not require a mass gathering permit.

COPIER: An \$8,000 copier was discussed for the Road and Bridge Department, which would include a maintenance plan. Clerk Prisco said it had a feature that is used all the time, the option to scan a document for email or digitizing. The copier would cost \$135.75 a month for 60 months. Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve the purchase of a Canon copier for the Garden Valley shop.

PAYROLL CHANGE: An employee passed his test to advance in the Weed Department. Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve this certified noxious weed sprayer at an increased pay level.

ROOF: A roof over the fuel station in Horseshoe Bend was discussed by the Sheriff. Lindstrom motioned to approve the bid in the amount of \$14,274.98. The motion carried.

ELECTRIC MONITOR-**ING**: Community Justice provided information on services for electronic monitoring systems and agreements. These are court ordered conditions, including alcohol and GPS monitoring. There are currently four individuals being monitoring. Amanda Leader said, "I've worked with a lot of folks who struggle with alcoholism. And this bracelet, if you will, is one of the most important things that can really help them, because it's a constant reminder. You have this thing on your ankle that's fit very snuggly,

you can feel it vibrate, I think, about every thirty minutes. And so, it's a constant reminder that's been very helpful for a lot of people. Typically, it's for those persons who have had multiple DUIs." Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve the agreement to partner with a company for the administration of electronic monitoring equipment, including GPS, breathalyzers, and continuous alcohol monitors. The motion carried.

CLAIMS APPROVAL: The claims report was reviewed by the board. Lindstrom motioned to approve the claims approval report in the amount of \$227,740.60. The motion carried.

AIR ST. LUKE'S: Lindstrom motioned to approve coverage for a couple of employees in the amount of \$110 and the motion carried.



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

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


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Construction Begins in **Deer Valley Subdivision**

SQUAW CREEK SOIL CONSERVATION: Arthur Beal, serving his 50th year as a supervisor for SCSC, said, "Conservation is a never-ending process, and I feel privileged to be a part of that." He spoke about the other agencies and groups that they work with, their five-year plan, budget,

and reporting to the state. He also spoke about invisible fencing for cows, which would be a tag on the animal's ear with a solar panel that would buzz when the animal got beyond the GPS coordinates. Beal said for 300 cows, it would be about \$20 per cow. He said to rebuild fencing is very costly, because the wooden fences had burned from the fires.




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






















Pon Yam Restoration

IDAHO CITY -- The Idaho City Historical Foundation continues their building restoration work with repairs to the exterior of the Pon Yam Chinese Museum and Cultural Center. T Gibson Masonry and Restoration has completed the exterior work on the Boise Basin Museum and the chimney on the Galbreaith House. All this work was made possible by the donations of our members and a generous anonymous benefactor. The Foundation is grateful to have the funds to do this badly needed and necessary work.

ICHF just wrapped up two weeks of projects with the Southern Idaho Corrections Institute inmates. Both sections of Pioneer Cemetery

were raked from top to bottom: a much-needed rebuild of the rotted porch deck was done at the Kenn Smith Wildfire Museum; the posts at the museum were repaired at the bottom where there was rot; the Logging Display was started at the park adjacent to the Territorial Penitentiary; the Kenn Smith Garden was weeded; the Museum bathroom was painted and wainscoting added; a new front step for Pon Yam, complete with handrails; and other small projects at other ICHF properties. We would like to thank the local restaurants who fed the crew delicious lunches every day - Trudy's Kitchen, Kayak Pizza, The Gold Mine, and Idaho City Grocery. 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Basin of Gold is Back in Print



IDAHO CITY -- The Idaho City Historical Foundation announces publication of a new edition of *Basin of Gold: Life in the Boise Basin, 1862-1890* by Idaho historian Arthur A. Hart. The history of Idaho City and the Boise Basin is the perfect gift for Father's Day, graduations, birthdays, Christmas, and more.

Here is the story of the 1862 gold rush, the arrival of the Chinese merchants and miners, gold dredging, the culture, the movers and shakers, the devastating fires that destroyed Idaho City twice, and the boom-and-bust perseverance of the people.

Originally published in 1986, every page of *Basin of Gold* is profusely illustrated with historical photos from the Idaho City Historical Foundation's archives. The book attempts to capture the flavor of life in the bustling mining camps that grew up after gold was discovered on Grimes Creek. It is an account of eye-witness descriptions of people and events—picturesque, witty, charming, and humorous.

Idaho historian Arthur Hart (1918-2020) believed that knowing local history strengthens a community, and as the







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Horseshoe Bend, Idaho: A Storied Past, A Vibrant Present

Nestled in the crook of the Payette River, in Boise County's scenic embrace, lies the town of Horseshoe Bend, Idaho – a place where the whispers of gold rush history mingle with the gentle murmur of a closeknit community. The town's very name, originally spelled Horse Shoe Bend, was derived from the dramatic U-shaped bend in the river that cradles it, serves as a constant reminder of the natural forces that shaped its destiny.

The story of Horseshoe Bend rises in the tumultuous year of 1862, a time when the discovery of rich gold deposits in the Boise Basin, a mere fifteen miles to the east, ignited a fervent rush of prospectors. This

influx of fortune-seekers required supply routes and winter havens, and the fertile valley along the Payette River proved an ideal location. Initially known as Warrinersville, after the enterprising A.J. and Daniel K. Warriner who operated a vital sawmill, the fledgling settlement provided lumber for the burgeoning mining camps. The harsh Idaho winters often drove miners down from the high country, further solidifying the need for a permanent community.

By 1867, the town had officially adopted the evocative name of Horseshoe Bend, a testament to the river's defining geographical feature. This era saw the rise of key figures who shaped the town's early infrastructure such as Felix Harris. Harris, a miner hailing from Kentucky, recognized the need for reliable transportation and constructed toll roads connecting Horseshoe Bend to the lucrative mines of Placerville and Centerville. Reportedly, Harris collected significant tolls, sometimes in raw gold, highlighting the economic pulse of the time.

As the easily accessible gold dwindled, Horseshoe Bend transitioned into a vital agricultural and logging center. The Payette River, once a potential source of gold, became a crucial artery for transporting timber harvested from the surrounding forests. Sawmills dotted the landscape, drawing on the river's power and facilitating the growth of the local economy. In 1913, the arrival of the Boi-

se Valley Railroad marked another significant turning point, connecting Horseshoe Bend to broader markets and facilitating the shipment of agricultural products and lumber.

For much of the 20th century, the Boise Cascade sawmill stood as the undisputed cornerstone of Horseshoe Bend's economy, providing employment for a substantial portion of the town's residents. The rhythmic hum of the mill and the scent of pine permeated the air, becoming synonymous with the town's identity. The closure of the mill in 2001 marked a significant shift, prompting the community to adapt and diversify.

Today, Horseshoe Bend, now the largest community in Boise County, has a population hovering around 750 residents and retains its small-town charm and strong sense of community. The annual Horseshoe Bend Community Day celebration showcases this spirit, bringing residents together for festivities and reinforcing their shared identity. While the echoes of the gold rush and the logging industry remain a part of its historical narrative, the

town now embraces a more diverse economy, with residents working in nearby Boise or finding opportunities in local businesses and services catering to outdoor recreation.

The Payette River continues to be a central element of life in Horseshoe Bend, attracting anglers, rafters, and those seeking the tranquility of its flowing waters. The surrounding Boise National Forest offers ample opportunities for hiking, camping, and hunting, drawing outdoor enthusiasts to the area. The historic downtown area, though smaller than in its boomtown days, still features remnants of its past, with some original buildings remaining as silent witnesses to the town's evolution.

Horseshoe Bend stands as a testament to the resilience of small communities, having weathered the boom and bust cycles of resource extraction and adapting to the changing times. It's a place where the natural beauty of the Payette River Valley intertwines with a rich history, creating a unique and enduring character that continues to define this Gem State gem.
