COUNTY COMMISS

May 20, 2025

Present: Commissioners Clay Tucker, Bob Callahan, and Lindy Lindstrom.

Pledge of Allegiance **CONSTITUENT INPUT:** None

MINUTES: Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve the minutes from 5-7-2025 and the motion carried. He then motioned to approve the minutes from 5-13-2025. All were in favor and the motion carried.

ROAD AND BRIDGE: A letter to COMPASS was discussed for pursuing grants pertaining to roads. Lindstrom motioned to approve the letter to COMPASS and the motion carried.

COPIERS: Clerk Mary Prisco spoke about two replacement copiers. Lindstrom motioned to approve one copier. The motion carried. Prisco then made a correction - the printer approved last week for the Road and Bridge Department will be a black and white printer, not color.

ROAD NAME: Alex Gross with Planning and Zoning presented three possible names for a road near Centerville and the Spanish Loop. Commissioners were concerned that the road be distinguishable from others within the county to help

dispatch in the case of an emergency. Lindstrom motioned to approve the name "Shortline Way." The motion carried.

LIQUOR LICENSES: A motion was said for each license by number and each motion carried.

SOUAW CREEK CON-**SERVATION DISTRICT**: A letter of support and intention letter of \$2,850 was discussed. The board motioned to approve the letter of support, and the motion carried.

DEMAND WARRANTS: A Planning and Zoning building permit was motioned for a refund in the amount of \$380. The motion carried.

Lindstrom then motioned to approve the demand warrant to Squaw Creek Conservation District in the amount of \$2,850. The motion carried.

A rim was "destroyed" on a loader. Lindstrom motioned to pay Les Schwab in the amount of \$5,109.28.

EAST BOISE COUNTY AMBULANCE DISTRICT: Mr. Gross discussed the Unit 12 ambulance, built in 2009 with about 80,000 miles, from Lowman. He said it needs a "check-up" because there are some issues with it. He estimated repair costs between \$12,000 and \$15,000.

There is another ambulance

with 4-wheel drive from Wisconsin that is \$75,000 and was build in 2012. EBCAD would like to purchase this ambulance. The district is also expecting to get the new ambulance [which was ordered several years ago] in July.

Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to move ahead on the "possible donated ambulance." The motion carried.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Chairman Tucker motioned to go into executive session to discuss exempt records. [Time 9:36 to 9:45am] Commissioner Callahan motioned to sign the release of lien, and the motion carried.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Chairman Tucker motioned to go back into executive session to discuss risk management. [Time 9:46 to 10:09am] No action required.

PUBLIC HEARING: A partial plat amendment for Trail Creek Meadow subdivision was discussed. Planning and Zoning Administrator Alex Gross gave an overview of the location north of Harris Creek Road. He recommended approval on 3+ acres and 6+ acre lots. Lindstrom [microphone turned off and difficult to hear] motioned to approve the plat amendment, and the motion carried.

BANKS LOWMAN

ROAD: Prosecutor Alex Sosa spoke about the controversial and longstanding transfer of Banks Lowman Road from the transportation department to Boise County. He said, "This has been a question, as I kind of want to say, that has plagued the county for decades." Sosa expressed the amount of time that it has taken to sift through historical records and recommended that the board sign a contract with a company to do this scope of work. He said the job would entail coming to the Boise County vault, going personally to state archives in Boise, public records requests, including federal requests, and sifting through all this information. Chairman Tucker said, "I like this. It's going to be answered one way or the other, finally. Been hearing about this about as long as I can remember. I told a bunch of people that I was going to solve this problem. This is my portion of solving it, I think."

Lindstrom motioned to approve the project up to \$40,000, and the motion carried.

EMERGENCY MANAG-ER'S SEALED BIDS: There mitted sealed bids for a project in Garden Valley, per a mile for a fire break. This would include clearing brush and limbing trees up to 25 feet from the road. Specific details of the bid were still under discussion by the board. This would be in the


















The Wild, Wounded, and Wondrous Life Francois Payette: Mountain Man Legend

BOISE COUNTY -- The cold bite of the Snake River gnawed at Francois Payette's bare skin as he fought the current, every stroke a desperate bid for survival. Stripped of his horse, his rifle, his clothes even his dignity — the French-Canadian mountain man clung to the one thing he refused to surrender: his freedom.

Such was life on the edge of the American frontier — brutal, raw, and unforgiving — and no one embodied it more fiercely than Francois Payette.

Born near Montreal, Quebec, the youngest of six children, Payette's life of adventure began early. As a teenager, he

floated lumber down Lake Ontario, braving treacherous waters to earn his keep. By eighteen, he had signed on with John Jacob Astor's ambitious Pacific Fur Company, embarking on a journey that would define a generation of explorers.


In 1812, Payette arrived at the mouth of the Columbia River aboard the ship Beaver, helping to build the storied Fort Astoria. But forts and fenced life could not contain a spirit like his. He quickly joined Donald McKenzie and the fearless Jack Weiser on an audacious mission: to trap and explore the vast, unknown Payette River Basin.

Together, their small, scrappy party traced streams from the Tetons in the east to the Great Salt Lake in the south, northward to the Salmon River country, and west to the towering Cascades. The land was pure, wild, and deadly — and the pay barely more than a pittance, \$200 to \$400 a year plus a cut of whatever furs they could wrangle.

Danger was a constant companion. Payette bore the scars of many battles, like the time he and an Iroquois comrade, Baptiste, survived a vicious ambush, each pulling arrows from their bodies. Worse still was the day Payette lost everything — ambushed again, stripped bare, forced to swim the freezing Snake River to escape certain death. Yet the very next time a horse thief dared steal from him near the mouth of the Payette River, Payette delivered frontier justice the only way he knew how — with a swift knife to the ribs.

Despite the violence and hardship, Payette built a family amidst the wilderness. Around 1830, he married Nancy Portneuf, the daughter of a French-Canadian trapper and an Indian mother. Together they had two children before Nancy's untimely death while visiting relatives in the Willamette Valley.

In 1834, Payette's life took a new turn when the Hudson's Bay Company appointed him commander of the newly built Fort Boise. There, Payette became a legend among emigrants heading west. Pioneers

like Narcissa Whitman marveled at the luxury of his table: duck, salmon, elk, bread, butter, and even loaf sugar (molded sugar). He entertained them with a Frenchman's flair — offering chairs, tables, and hospitality rare as gold in the fron-

But the world around him was changing fast. Wagon wheels carved deep scars across ancient trails. Settlers poured into the lands once ruled by buffalo and free-roaming tribes. The age of the mountain man was ending.

In 1844, Payette retired from

the Hudson's Bay Company. Some say he returned to Montreal; others claim he died on a bluff above the Snake River, buried by his son-in-law George Goodhart. Wherever he rests, his spirit endures stitched into the rivers, the forests, and even the very names on the map: Payette town, Payette River, Payette Lake, Payette County.

In a world that demanded everything and promised nothing, Francois Payette lived, fought, and carved out a legend that still runs wild across the American West.



Robert Pere McIntyre "Mac" was born to Robert and Kathryn McIntyre in Mammoth, Utah, February 4, 1942, died February 3, 2025, after a long battle with dementia and renal complications.

His family worked in a family-owned gold mine in Mammoth that was acquired after driving a herd of cattle from Texas to Utah many years earlier. Friday night dates were spent at building supply stores before they headed up to Garden Valley to continue the building on their property. Amazingly, they agreed on every detail of building except the carpet in the loft. However, once Mac and Brent Loveless installed it, Marion loved it.

Mac passed on his love of the outdoors to his children and grandchildren, including hunting with granddaughter Kimber McIntyre and grandson Alex Borgardts. He also took granddaughters Audrey and Piper McIntyre, and Natalie Summers to the shooting range to shoot targets. Mac and Marion joined a great group of friends in the Garden Valley Shooting club shooting clay birds. Mac




