Garden Valley Historical Society Launches "Generations in the Mountains" with the Alley Family

GARDEN VALLEY -- On Thursday evening, May 1, the Garden Valley Historical Society hosted its first-ever public event, proudly kicking off the *Generations in the Mountains* series by honoring the Alley family—one of Garden Valley's most deeply rooted families.

Held at the Garden Valley District Library, the event exceeded expectations, drawing over 45 attendees. Extra chairs were brought in to seat the crowd, and future events will include a microphone and speaker system to help everyone hear and enjoy the presentations.

The Alley family story in Garden Valley began in 1938, when Sterling Alley settled in the valley. Since then, their family has become woven into the fabric of the community, especially through their contributions to rodeo and ranching life. At the event, four of Sterling and Madelyn Alley's children—Steve Alley, Jan Youren, Linda Miller, and Monte Alley—along with grandchildren Judy Brincken and Sami Alley, and great-grandchild Jeff Severance, represented the family. Together, they shared stories, photos, and memories that spanned nearly a century of local life.

Many in attendance were surprised to learn just how far back the family's history reaches and how much of Garden Valley's story is tied to theirs. The Alleys' legacy includes the original rodeo arena in Garden

Valley, built by Sterling Alley in the 1950s. It was later moved to its current location off Anderson Creek Road in the 1970s. Nearly every weekend during the season, Sterling would take his children to rodeos across the state, requiring them to participate in every event. Prize money was used immediately for fuel and entry fees for the next competition.

The family's rodeo success is legendary. Judy Brincken was an all-around rodeo champion. Linda Miller earned the title of all-around winner for the entire state of Idaho in high school. And Jan Youren went on to national fame, earning her place in both the National Cowgirl Hall of Fame and the Idaho Rodeo Hall of Fame. Jan shared a story of appearing on *Conan O'Brien*, where she was asked how many bones she had broken. She humorously replied it would be easier to count the ones she hadn't—a rib and her legs.

There was no shortage of laughter, from tales of Sterling trying (unsuccessfully) to rope a moose on his land, to Steve and Judy being called on by neighbors to help corral a runaway cow. Steve also recalled a winter with up to six feet of snow—something he relished as a snowmobiler with no fences to worry about. "It was a great life, what can I say," he said with a smile.

The Historical Society extends a heartfelt thank you to Steve Alley, Jan Youren, Linda Miller, Monte Alley, Judy Brincken, Sami Allie, and Jeff Severance for generously shar-

ing their time, stories, and family history. We also thank the Garden Valley Library for their space, and the countless com-

munity members assisting with the collection, preservation, and distribution of community history. We look forward to fu-

ture *Generations in the Mountains* events as we continue preserving the rich heritage of Garden Valley.

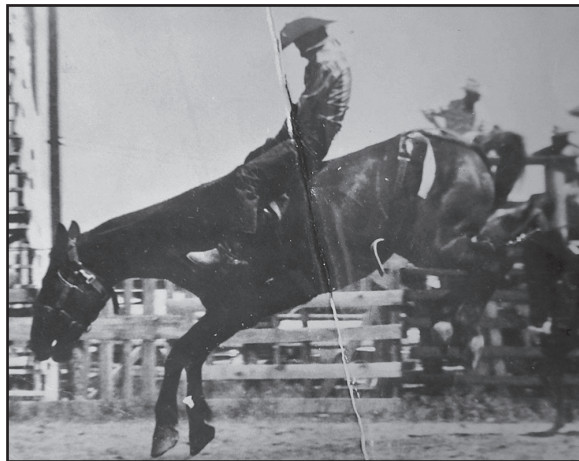

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Fire Tragedy and Loss of Life

GARDEN VALLEY -- On Sunday night, a fire in the Garden Valley area resulted in the tragic death of 15-year-old Tristan Stephens, a 9th grader at Garden Valley High School. Firefighters from Garden Valley, Horseshoe Bend, and Lowman responded to the scene after a propane tank explosion was reported at 10:30 pm on May 4th.

The community has set up an account at Mountain America Credit Union under his grandmother, Marla, and organized a vigil at Weilmunster Park. There are fundraising efforts by the Longhorn Restaurant & Bar and a gofundme

page at #MarlaStrong, led by Katrina Nelson.

The school is providing extra support to students. The Garden Valley Graphic Design class has designed hoodies and shirts to honor Tristan and are available at www.gvclothingco.com

The Idaho State Fire Marshal is investigating the cause of the fire.

April 29, 2025
Present: Commissioners Clay Tucker, Bob Callahan, and Lindy Lindstrom.
Pledge of Allegiance
CONSTITUENT INPUT: None
MINUTES: Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to accept three sets of minutes: 4/15, 4/8 and 4/22/2025. The motions carried.
SOLID WASTE: Candidates were interviewed for the position of administrative assistant for noxious weeds and solid waste, and a person was chosen for the role. Lindstrom motioned to approve the hire, and the motion carried.
MASS GATHERING: A mass gathering for the Garden Valley Spring Festival was brought before the board. Jordan Jones said it was within the City of Crouch and under their jurisdiction, and they already have a contract for four Boise County Deputies.
A music festival in Horsehoe Bend, Konnexion, was discussed, along with noise level and dust abatement. The event will be held June 27th through June 29th. Commissioner Lindstrom motioned for an approval of the event with stipulations and the motion carried.
RESOLUTIONS: Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve Resolution 2025-23 regarding the Road Department's new roller. The motion carried.
The prosecutor discussed Resolution 2025-24 and explained that the witness coordinator and sheriff's office programs are paid for through a certain grant. Lindstrom motioned to approve the resolution, and the motion carried.
Prosecutor Alex Sosa then spoke about another policy that was needed for reporting and auditing purposes, in reference to criminal events such as stalking and overall risk management. The policy would be sent out to all Boise County employees, if approved, and the prosecutor said it would modify the personnel policy. A motion was said to approve Resolution 2025-25 and the motion carried.
The cloud storage that was not budgeted or billed for correctly over the past two years was discussed. Lindstrom motioned to approve Resolution 2025-26, and the motion carried.
DEMAND WARRANTS: The first demand warrant was

from the sheriff's office to pay Idaho Power. Lindstrom motioned to pay Idaho Power in the amount of \$1,372.86. The motion carried.
Lindstrom motioned to pay the Grove Hotel in Boise for a conference in the amount of \$756. The motion carried.
EXECUTIVE: Prosecutor Sosa requested a "risks management" executive session, and that Chairman Tucker enter the closed session. [9:22 am to 10:00 am] No action was required.
DEPARTMENT HEAD MEETING:
PROSECUTOR: Sosa said, "Everything in my department is going well. Business is booming. We have a significant amount of search warrants that are being conducted. We've started working with the Internet Crimes Against Children group." He spoke about departments in the county looking to be more self-sufficient with income streams.
PLANNING AND ZONING: Alex Gross said that building permits were a little bit behind where they were last year, but they are starting to pick up. He said that the staff was also busy digitizing old building permits and plans.
Chairman Tucker asked for anticipated expected revenue and expenses for Gross' office, and asked, "Are building permits covering their costs?"
COMMUNITY JUSTICE: Amanda Leader said it was sentencing day and was busy. She reported that within the Barney Box for the community, there were drug deactivation pouches, medication lock boxes, and Narcan. Leader said that 15 Narcan doses were taken, and they are observing the takers.
Mental Health Month was discussed and a proclamation.
Leader said that unfortunately, the bats had returned to the building after all the work had been done on the exterior. She added, "I don't think there's as many yet, but if there were any ideas that anyone had to try, now would be the time before the rest of the colony's return." They are coming in the back of the building along the stairwell, although most of the holes are plugged up.
She also discussed electronic monitoring and had spent a lot of time at the jail.
EMERGENCY MANAGER: He has been working on several projects and has been working with landowners.

AMBULANCE: Having enough people to volunteer and cover the shifts has been an issue. "It's not a volunteer economy," Mari Adams explained. She added that all the ambulance rigs were now out of the shop, "[Unit] 14 and 13 are running absolutely amazing." Unit 15 was still being monitored prior to any patient transports. They are working to get EBCED, the new ambulance district, up and running.
SOLID WASTE: "Spray Days" are coming up soon. Weed management was discussed. The Garden Valley Station is now open three days a week, on Thursdays, and will remain open from May through September to help with the overflow of traffic.
ROAD DEPARTMENT: The crews have been working on Robie Creek Road over the past two and a half weeks. "We've pretty much built the entire road up," said the new Road Superintendent, "about 6 to 8 inches, for the most part." They are hauling gravel from Clear Creek and will soon be working in that area. The department will also be clearing ditches along Banks Lowman Road. He said they're fixing washouts and have been very busy. Dust abatement will follow.
ASSESSOR: Chris Juszcak said that they have been looking at building permits throughout the county and determining if they are ready to put on the tax roll.
He reported that the generator was hooked up and ready for the power outage.
Assessor Juszcak added, "I will be working on an evaluation for Bogus [Basin Ski Resort]. And I'll keep you guys informed on that." Commissioner Tucker commented, "It's very exciting," and Juszcak agreed.
CLERK: The outside auditing firm is currently working to gather information and generate a report.
AMBULANCE: Adams said that the new ambulance will be delayed again, and a date in September was given. The

ambulance was ordered several years ago.
LOCAL TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE: The feasibility study for the Gardena Bridge was discussed by LHTAC representatives. Grant opportunities for the replacement of the 100-year-old bridge were also discussed, including a connection with Highway 55. There would be one lane in each direction, with no weight restrictions, and it would be placed in a new location. Public meetings had previously been held and comments taken. Several different concepts were presented to the board. The LHTAC representatives were looking for support from the commissioners to take back to their board. Commissioner Lindstrom said, "I'm ready to give you my full

support." Chairman Tucker added, "Absolutely, I think, I mean if we can make this happen, it will be a good thing for a lot of people." A letter of support was discussed. Chairman Tucker said, "My only worry is getting it paid for and that's a big number." Commissioner Callahan agreed. The LHTAC board meets in June. The design will likely take 18 months, and then construction would likely last between two and five years in the future. There was some question whether to have the historic bridge demolished and removed.
EXECUTIVE SESSION: A motion was said to enter executive session to discuss pending litigation. [Time 10:59 am to 11:19 am] No actions were required.
Adjourned at 11:22 am.

IDAHO CITY -- Future conservation leaders gathered in Challis last week for the 2025 Idaho Envirothon, an annual environmental science competition challenging high school students to tackle real-world natural resource issues. Representing Idaho City, a standout team of five students placed 4th overall and earned 1st place in both Forestry and Wildlife—demonstrating exceptional knowledge and teamwork in the field.

The Idaho Envirothon is part of a national program designed to cultivate environmental literacy and stewardship among youth. Teams are tested on topics including Aquatic Ecology, Soils and Land Use, Wildlife, Forestry, and a current environmental issue—in this year's case, "Roots and Resiliency: Fostering Forest Stewardship in a Canopy of Change."

Idaho City's team featured Makayla Barber, Mary Plumlee, Nalani Barber, Rafe Grant, and Tyler Callagy, with guidance from dedicated advisors Jon Hegge and Kate Cockerille. Their top-tier performance in

Forestry and Wildlife highlighted their deep understanding of Idaho's ecosystems and the science behind sustainable forest and wildlife management.

This year's result continues a strong tradition for Idaho City, which has placed in the top five at the state competition for three consecutive years—a testament to the school's consistent commitment to environmental education and excellence in the sciences.

Winners of the Idaho competition will go on to compete in the National Conservation Foundation Envirothon, where students from across the U.S., Canada, and China gather to present innovative solutions to environmental challenges.

While the Idaho City team won't be advancing to nationals this year, their strong showing stands as a proud achievement for their school and community.

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Fire District Discussion with City

IDAHO CITY, ID — The City of Idaho City and the Idaho City Fire Protection District are continuing discussions regarding the future ownership of the fire station currently located on City-owned land. The building, constructed over two decades ago with grant funds on City property and leased to fire district since that time, has become the focus of recent negotiations aimed at resolving long-standing questions about its ownership and use.

For the past several years, the fire district has expressed interest in obtaining full ownership of the property to facilitate potential improvements and pursue future grant funding. In response, the City has made several good faith offers to reach a mutually beneficial agreement that respects both the district's operational needs and the City's fiduciary responsibilities to taxpayers.

"We've consistently communicated our willingness to work toward a solution," said Mayor Kenny Everhart. "Our Council believes the district's service is important, and we are not looking to remove them or increase their rent. We also have a duty to the residents of Idaho City and its priorities to ensure the

City is fairly compensated for the transfer of public assets."

The City has proposed a range of solutions, including outright sale, joint ownership, and flexible payment structures. One key consideration has been the value of the land itself, which was appraised at approximately \$350,000 if privately owned. The City's most recent offers have reflected a reduced value to support continued public use of the facility.

City Attorney Joan Callahan emphasized that, "The City has taken a collaborative approach, including offering to help the fire district pursue grant opportunities and bearing the legal costs associated with drafting agreements. We are committed to finding a fair solution for the District and the City."

Public interest in the matter

has been high, with some community members voicing concerns. "The City has never proposed evicting the district or disrupting fire services," said City Clerk Nancy Ptak. "We want to make that very clear. Our goal is a responsible, long-term solution."

Both parties have acknowledged a shared interest in reaching a resolution as they move forward. Idaho City leadership is optimistic that an agreement can be reached that honors the contributions of the fire district while upholding the City's responsibility to its residents.

Further updates will be shared as the discussions progress. The City encourages residents to stay informed through official meeting minutes and public notices.

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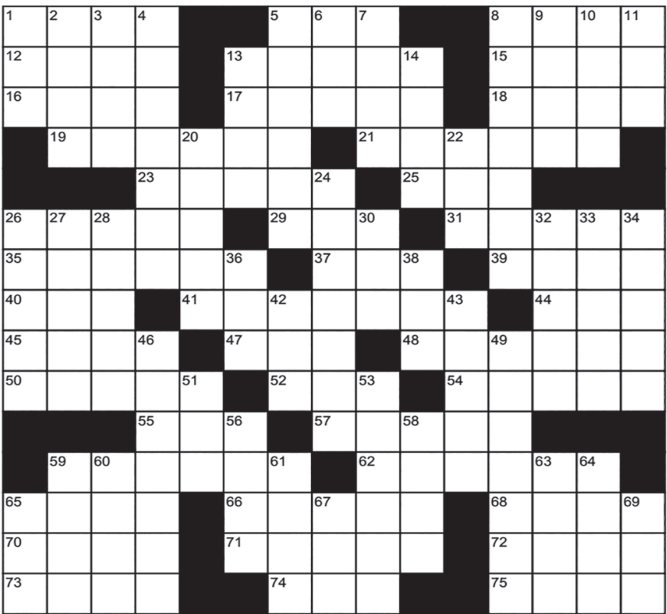

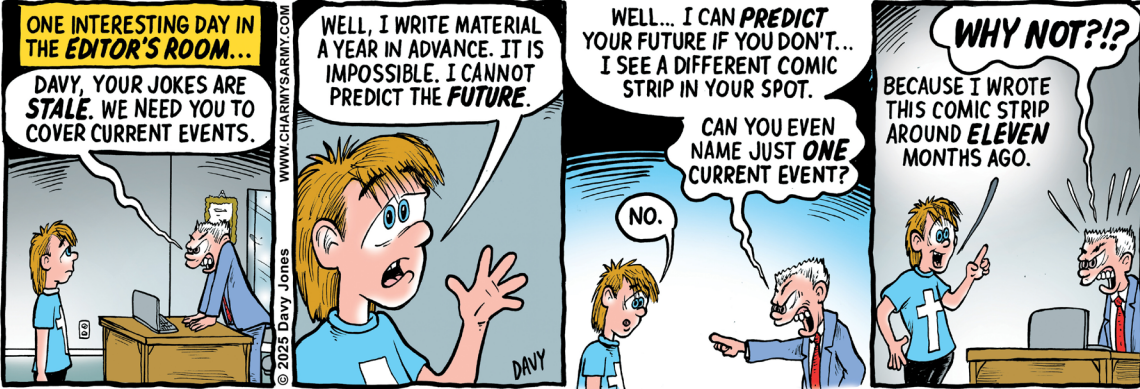

History of Garden Valley ~ Survivor of the Payette

GARDEN VALLEY -- Charles Ostner didn't set out to become a legend. He stumbled into it—quite literally—half-dead in the Idaho wilderness. He and a partner were prospecting, chasing gold and fortune. But when the partner lost hope and took off with the supplies, Ostner was left with nothing: no tools, no food, no horse. Just snow, trees, and silence.

He wandered the backcountry until his body gave up. Frostbitten and exhausted, he collapsed in an area known as Hardscrabble along the Middle Fork of the Payette River. By luck or providence, a man named John Welch—"Packer John"—found him and hauled him to safety. In a humble cabin, Ostner recovered.

It would have been easier to leave, to return to California where his family waited. But instead, Ostner stayed. He saw something in the valley—peace, perhaps, or promise—and sent for his wife and children. He became the first man to bring a family into that wild land, carving out a home where Alder Creek Road now meets the South Fork of the Payette River.

A bridge was needed, so Ostner built the first one across the South Fork. The Silver Bridge stood where it once did. What drove him wasn't glory—it was survival, determination, and the need to give his family

a future.

Born in Austria, Ostner had fled Germany after joining student uprisings in 1848. America was a new beginning. He tried his hand at prospecting in California for a decade, and again in Idaho's Florence Basin Mining District in 1860, where the promise of gold quickly soured into hardship. At one point, he was lost in the wilderness for nearly a month, found unconscious and starved.

Mining didn't work out—but art did. He purchased a share in a toll bridge in Garden Valley, which offered reliable income and, more importantly, time. He returned to painting and sculpture. His subjects were often horses, dramatic and powerful like the rugged land around him.

Then, in 1865, he began a four-year labor of love: carving a statue of George Washington from a pine tree near his homestead. Using a postage stamp

for reference, he honored both America and Idaho's pioneers.

Charles Ostner died in Boise in 1913. He was buried in Morris Hill Cemetery, a quiet man who had lived a remarkable life—one of hardship, courage, and creation. His legacy endures not just in a golden statue, but in the land, he helped settle, and the quiet

heroism of surviving and building in a place few dared to try.
