A New Era Dawns for Garden Valley Market as Longtime Owners Retire

Change is brewing in the heart of Garden Valley! After 23 years of dedicated service to the community, Greg Simone and Gerold Dennett are passing the torch of the Garden Valley Market to a new owner on July 1st.

This past Thursday, June 26, folks gathered for a heart-felt open house, during which Greg Simone and Gerold Dennett thanked the community for their support and the community expressed gratitude to Greg and Gerold for their enduring commitment. Since moving to Garden Valley in 1995, these two have been integral to the town's fabric. Driven by a de-

sire to work where they lived, they first acquired the market in 2002 at its original spot, the historic Old Merc. Nine years later, recognizing the need for a larger, more modern space, they built the current market in 2011. Their entrepreneurial spirit didn't stop there; for a time, they previously owned and operated the Sawtooth Lodge and the local Chevron. Now, they're eagerly anticipating a well-deserved retirement amidst the beauty of Garden Valley.

Greg reflected on their journey, sharing, “**This opportunity has been life-changing for us. We have a group of dedicated friends and employees. Some have worked**

for us for 22 years. It has expanded our purpose, and we have enjoyed our involvement with the Chamber of Commerce, the local school and serving on various committees.” Their community contributions are vast, including beloved initiatives like the annual Halloween Trunk N Treat and the New Year's Eve Lantern Lighting.

Gerald's connection to the Valley runs even deeper. He shared cherished family anecdotes, recalling how his grandfather, Otto, spent summers building roads in the area, and his grandmother's weekly trips to Pine Flats for a bath. These stories highlight his many happy memories of summers in the Valley and visits to Silver Creek Plunge, underscoring a lifelong bond with the area.

A Warm Welcome to Devin Trone

The reins of the Garden Valley Market will now be in the capable hands of Devin Trone, who has been a familiar face in the community as the owner of MediCap Pharmacy for the past eight years. A pharmacist for over 27 years, Devin also owns pharmacies in Meridian, Caldwell, Parma, Nyssa, and Cascade, with four of his children actively involved in the family businesses.

Devin expressed his enthusiasm for this new venture, stating, “**We love rural Idaho, and are happy to be here and a part of the community. We**

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Fire in Idaho City

IDAHO CITY -- Mary Ellen McMurtrie shared her experience of discovering a fire on the Buena Vista Trail one Sunday morning. She initially thought the smoke was from a burn barrel, but soon realized it was coming from a fire in the forest. After calling 911 and directing the firefighters, they quickly arrived on the scene and extinguished the flames before any trees were burned. They used a portable pump to draw water from a pond to douse the fire. Later that afternoon, the firefighters returned to drench the area further, ensuring the fire was completely out. Mary Ellen was reminded of the good people in the world as she

walked back to her house.

Idaho City Fire Chief Terry Teeter reported that the fire grew to about ¼ of an acre and was contained by clearing a line around it. The fire, burning mostly in pine needles and lower limbs, was not a significant threat to homes near the Idaho City airstrip. The fire department used water from a nearby pond to control the fire, with approximately six Idaho City volunteers and five from Thorn Creek VFD responding to the 911 call.

In a related incident, thoughts have turned to the firefighters ambushed by a sniper in northern Idaho, with flags ordered to fly at half-mast by Gov. Little.

June 24, 2025
Present: Commissioners Clay Tucker, Bob Callahan and Lindy Lindstrom.
Pledge of Allegiance
CONSTITUENT INPUT: None
CLERK/TREASURER JOINT QUARTERLY REPORT: Clerk Mary Prisco said the report was from the quarter that ended on March 31st, 2025. Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve the report, and the motion carried.
PROCEDURE MANUAL: Prosecutor Alex Sosa explained that the personnel policy would be changing due to new legislation effective on July 1st. Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to accept Boise County Resolution 2025-31 adopting the procurement policy and procedural manual. The motion carried.
CAPITAL ASSET POLICY: Prosecutor Sosa said that the policy had been “updated and revised.” Lindstrom motioned to adopt Resolution 2025-32 to adopt the Boise County Capital Asset Policy.
WILDFIRE HAZARD POLICY: Prosecutor Sosa said the language came from another rural county with similar challenges. Chairman Tucker asked if anyone wanted to add anything regarding road maintenance or grazing. Both Commissioners Callahan and Lindstrom agreed that it would be a good idea to include these two topics. Tucker explained that there were pre-existing roads that could not be utilized because they had not been maintained. Callahan said there was currently some grazing by sheep. Lindstrom added, “There used to be a lot more [grazing], which cleans the forest.” He would like to table this policy, and the prosecutor will provide proposed language. Sheriff Turner stated that some Forest Service roads had been shut down and there’s not a maintenance schedule. Callahan stated, “A lot of them are impassable and overgrown.”
TWO RAVENS: Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve the amended contract for the Lowman Two Ravens at Tall Pines.
CLAIMS APPROVAL: Commissioner Callahan had some questions regarding the East Boise County Ambulance District and another for the prosecutor. Sosa explained that they had a jury trial coming up and requested to cover the

costs for two witnesses from out-of-state. However, he explained that the money would be reimbursed through a grant for anything related to sexual assault or domestic violence.
Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve the claims approval for \$279,641.79. All were in favor and the motion carried.
WILDFIRE HAZARD POLICY: Prosecutor Sosa would like to add language regarding roads, including, “The U.S. Forest Service has not adequately maintained public Forest Service roads sufficiently and has restricted access and closure of public roads. It exacerbates the response time and resources to conduct necessary mitigation efforts and wildland firefighting efforts.” He added, in terms of the grazing, “The U.S. Forest Service has not adequately conducted fuel reductions, commercial timber harvesting, mechanical thinning, public land grazing, or other necessary mitigation efforts at a scale or pace that meets the current wildfire threat.” Callahan cautioned there may be some “blowback from the Forest Service.”
EXECUTIVE SESSION: Prosecutor Sosa suggested going into executive session to discuss “soon to be pending litigation” regarding Arrowrock Road. Chairman Tucker motioned to go into the closed session to discuss pending litigation. [Time 9:24 am to 10:03 am] No action was required.
EAST BOISE COUNTY AMBULANCE: Director Mari Adams said that they are still having problems getting volunteers and their call volume had increased 20% from last year. They are hoping to get their new ambulance by the end of July and another from Wisconsin. They have another ambulance from Air St. Luke’s.
EXECUTIVE SESSION: Commissioner Tucker motioned to go into executive session to discuss risk management with the department heads. [Time 10:05 am – 10:52 am] No action was required.
JUVENILE JUSTICE: Amanda Leader spoke regarding medication boxes. [However, she was not near a microphone and was difficult to hear.]
SOLID WASTE: Kari spoke about the damage on the building in Lowman. She said, “We’re getting really busy at our sites... We are becoming busier and busier as the popu-

lation grows.” She informed the commissioners that the person overseeing the Weed Department had a meeting with the Department of Energy, “There’s a disposal site of radioactive materials, black sands, in Lowman with a cover cap on it. And they hire the noxious weed department to do the vegetative abatement at that site. So, anything from cutting pine trees that are growing up through the cap to noxious weeds.”
ROAD DEPARTMENT: Jeremy said that they are “extremely busy.” They are hauling material to Clear Creek and fixing the jagged rock. Guardrails in Garden Valley have been repaired, and striping is expected to start soon, up to mile marker 28, and chip sealing will begin on the 7th of July. He said they are almost finished with the bypass on the Middlefork, and doing gravel on that road.
CORONER: Pam said that it was “kind of nice” because there has not been a lot going on. She is focused on getting her deputies trained.
FORESTER: Jordan said that they have two contracts in place with contractors to work on Two Ravens and Terrace Lakes. There’s also a contract for Wilderness Ranch that will seek bids. He spoke about Chipper Days in Lowman and said that the event went very well.
He also said that there was a training in which five or six fire departments in the county participated. Jordan would like to prepare an evacuation plan for each of the zones.
ASSESSOR: Chris Juszcak spoke about upcoming appeals for property taxes. He said that he was short-staffed and losing a long-term appraiser who will be moving. He has two open positions.
SHERIFF: Scott Turner said that they were “busy, busy.” He also helped Jordan with the training. He added that they are having issues with Highway 55, due to the number of crashes. They are preparing for the 4th of July.
PROSECUTOR: Alex Sosa said his office is doing well, especially since three new officers graduated from POST. He’s prioritizing getting prosecutors out with these deputies, so they can do ride alongs, “to answer any of these new law enforcement deputy’s questions. I just finished one up last night at 1am, myself, so I think

that would be a good way to build strong relationships with those new deputies. Make sure we’re all on the same path going forward.”
Sosa is working on getting cases quickly moving through the court.
CLERK: Mary Prisco spoke about goals. [However, she could not be heard due to audio issue.]
She reported that the county would receive increased funds for PILT.
BUDGET WORKSHOPS: Clerk Mary Prisco led the discussion and directed commissioners to spreadsheets. Many

questions were addressed the previous week during the regular commissioners’ meeting. There was an increase of about \$470 per an employee for the year for health insurance, “which isn’t bad.” She spoke about estimated property taxes for the next fiscal year were at about \$300,000 increased property taxes from the previous fiscal year. Commissioner Tucker asked if that included new construction and Clerk Prisco confirmed that it was.
Budget requests from different departments were reviewed with the Board of County Commissioners.



Mary Ellen McMurtrie wrote: "I am so grateful to IC Volunteer Firefighters, and the Forest Service Idaho City crew. It was really close to our house. Whew. I spoke to the Forest Service Investigator, and he wasn't sure what started it, but there was a campfire ring..."

Welcome Home, Bud Jones: A Hero's Journey to The Wall

IDAHO CITY -- On June 17, 2025, Lavon "Bud" Jones, USMC and founding member of VFW Post 142, returned to Boise after participating in a deeply moving Vietnam Veteran Honor Flight to Washington, D.C.. Greeted by cheering supporters and fellow post members, Bud's homecoming was a heartfelt tribute to his service and sacrifice.

Bud was one of 22 Vietnam veterans who made the journey to visit national monuments and, most poignantly, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall, which bears the names of over 58,500 fallen service members. In a powerful gesture, Bud left behind a plaque signed by Idaho City's VFW Post 142, honoring friends and comrades lost in the war.

The experience stirred profound memories for many of the veterans, some visiting the Wall for the first time. The Honor Flight program, which has flown more than 300,000

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

Atlanta History

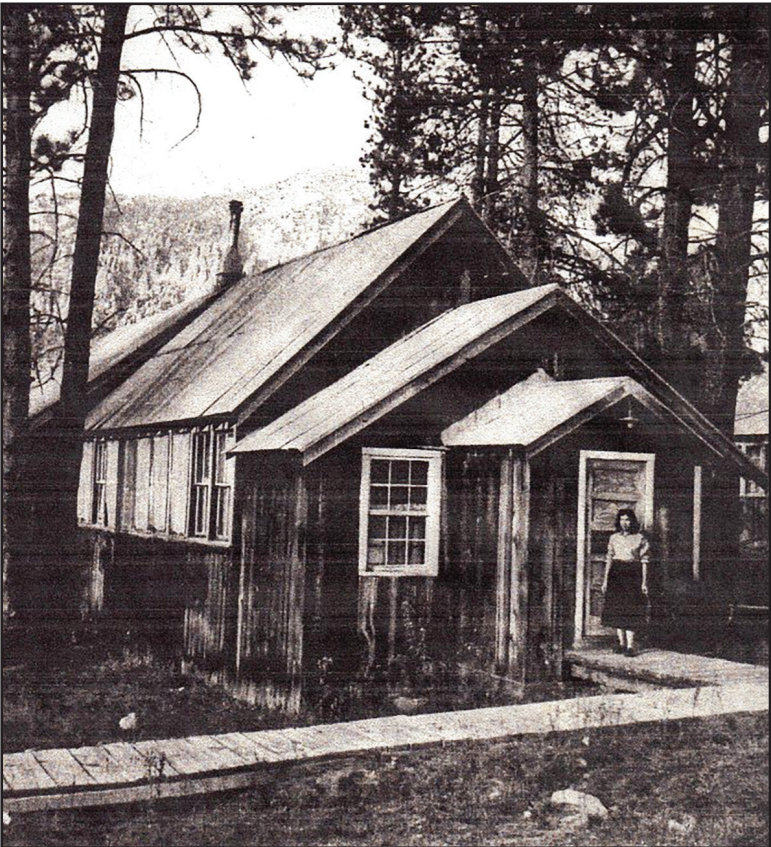
Idaho History 1800 to Present ~ By Skip Myers

Atlanta, Idaho -- With accumulated mining productions estimated at over \$16,000,000, Atlanta, Idaho was one of the more productive mining areas in Idaho. However, due to the extremely remote location, it took several years for any significant production to occur after the initial ore discoveries in 1863, and almost 70 years for the district's mining industry to be fully developed. John Stanley and party made the initial Atlanta claim discoveries in the summer of 1863 but kept the locations secret. By August of that year, many miners had set out from the Boise Basin in search of Stanley's treasure, but most returned empty-handed. Stanley returned to the Atlanta area in 1864 prepared to work the previous discoveries and explore the area more thor-

oughly. At this time, the Yuba River district was formed, named after the river where most of the initial placer mining activity was located. Word got out and by October around a hundred men were working placers on the Yuba River. In November of 1864, a significant ore discovery was made that would become known as the Atlanta lode. The discovery would result in Atlanta being transformed from a minor placer mining area to a lode mining district with great potential. However, the area was remote, and development of the new mines would prove to be exceedingly difficult. Despite the discovery of the Atlanta lode, the Yuba River district remained a small placer mining area for several years until mills were constructed

that supported initial attempts at lode mining. Still, Atlanta's difficult location continued to slow development of the mines and it wasn't until 1868 that enough capital was raised to start mining in earnest.

As Atlanta grew, the Atlanta School was founded. There, first through eighth grade were taught. My Dad, Warren Myers, and his brother went to school there. My dad attended school through the 6th grade and his brother, Orville Myers, through grade eight in 1920-1921. Mrs. McNanama was their teacher. The Atlanta two-room schoolhouse, after serving for nearly 70 years, was condemned in 1998 due to its worn-out condition. A teacher named Claudia Wander was hired to teach the small number of students in Atlanta around 1998, and the school building later became the town's library and community center. Schools in Idaho were generally established after the influx of miners in the 1860s following the discovery of gold. Early schools in Idaho were often one-room schoolhouses catering to students of different ages. Atlanta remains a great town to sightsee and catch a glimpse into the history at the core of Idaho's character. The Beaver Lodge has been located near the center of town since 1978. They have a full bar, restaurant, and five rental cabins. Their front porch is the local gathering place where you may encounter all manner of discussion and good company.
