Colored Pencil Society of America Exhibition Brings Fine Art to GV

GARDEN VALLEY -- Have you ever been interested in creating a work of art using colored pencils? On Saturday, September 6, the Colored Pencil Society of America held an exhibition at the Garden Valley Center for the Arts. The building was alive with conversation, color, and community as visitors enjoyed food, fun, and fine art. Attendance was strong, and the event gave local residents and visitors alike a chance to see how versatile and stunning colored pencil works can be.

The exhibition was hosted by the Boise Chapter of the CPSA (Colored Pencil Society of America). Lorraine Bollinger, founding member and current president of the Boise Chapter, exhibited three of her own pieces. According to their website: “Founded in 1990, the CPSA is a nonprofit organization for colored pencil enthusiasts working to promote colored pencils as a fine art medium by sponsoring exhibitions and workshops, being involved in product research, and educating the public in general. The organization strives to elevate the medium, educate others about it, and encourage innovation with its use. The Boise Chapter was started in 2023 to provide color pencil opportunities to the local Treas-

ure Valley and beyond. There are members locally as well as ‘satellite’ members who join us on zoom.”

Lorraine’s leadership has helped bring the group’s mission to life in Idaho, ensuring artists across the Treasure Valley and beyond have a place to share their work and inspire others. Among those in attendance and featured in the exhibition were Deb Dorband, VP., Larry Juell, Treasurer, Heather Jenkins, Membership, Katie Swain and Melaine Elkins. “Each member brings their own flavor to our eclectic chapter,” explained Lorraine

Award winning artist, Jeff George, presented two of his works. Jeff is a professional artist and signature member of CPSA, with a remarkable career that began in Southern California where he worked as an illustrator, specializing in pen and ink and stippling art. He later worked at Lakeshore Learning as an Illustrator and Designer. Now, his colored pencil work has earned him national acclaim. Jeff is the only three-time winner of the CPSA “Cippy” Award for Best of Show at the annual CPSA International Exhibition, the world’s largest colored pencil event.

For visitors who may not be familiar with colored pencil as a medium, the exhibition of-

fered an education in technique as well as artistry. Colored pencil drawings are created through a process of layering - artists apply light coats of color repeatedly to build depth and smooth blends. Typically, a light sketch is created first, often with the help of a grid for accuracy, and then artists begin coloring with the lightest shades before gradually adding darker tones. This patient layered approach allows colors to mix naturally and results in soft, luminous images.

The choice of surface plays an equally important role in the finished work. Paper with significant “tooth,” or texture, is often used to grip the pigment and allow for multiple layers, while smoother papers are better for detailed finishes. Some artists experiment with black paper for a dramatic effect. Others, like Jeff and Lorraine, have explored the use of drafting film - a unique, non-absorbent surface that allows easy erasing, effortless blending, and colors that appear exceptionally vibrant.

For Garden Valley, the event was more than an art show, it was a celebration of creativity and community. The Center for the Arts continues to serve as a hub for cultural events, giving residents access to exhibits, and opportunities to engage with artists of national recognition.

By hosting groups like CPSA, the Center highlights Garden Valley as a place where the arts thrive alongside the natural beauty of the mountains.

BOISE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

September 2, 2025

Present: Commissioners Clay Tucker, Lindy Lindstrom (via phone), and Bob Callahan.

Pledge of Allegiance

CONSTITUENT INPUT: None

MINUTES: Commissioner Callahan motioned to approve the minutes from August 19th, August 26th, and August 28th [emergency meeting] and the motions carried.

GRANT WRITER/MANAGER: Clerk Prisco said this was placed on the agenda at the board's request. The board has reached out to several counties and will also reach out to COMPASS.

HR POSITION: Prisco said the position has been under the clerk and will reach out with other counties for a job description.

ROAD AND BRIDGE: Chairman Tucker said that there was a request to purchase a "portable fluid conditioning cart," for maintenance of machinery. The board thought it was a "good idea" and moved forward with a motion for \$3,669.64, which was approved.

SCHOOL DISTRICTS: The state taxes for the school facilities funds were discussed.

Clerk Prisco recapped that the state sent their revised number to the school districts and may need additional time to get L2 forms back to the clerk's office, so she recommended requesting a seven-day extension. Callahan made a motion to extend the filing date and the motion carried.

EMERGENCY DECLARATION: Commissioner Callahan said that he had spoken with Idaho City Mayor Ken Everhart, and it was recommended that the board continue with the resolution. Clerk Prisco recounted that the board of commissioners had met the previous Thursday for an Emergency Declaration to discuss a resolution. Callahan motioned to approve Resolution 2025-46, "A Boise County Resolution to declare a disaster emergency, in conjunction with the city's resolution for their water system, which does effect residents of our county and our county offices." All were in favor and the motion carried.

OPIOID SETTLEMENT: Opioid settlement agreements by manufacturers were presented to the board, reviewed by Prosecutor Sosa, and the board motioned to accept these. Clerk Prisco said that these litigations

had been going on for years. Commissioner Callahan motioned to approve the Opioid Settlement agreements and the motion carried.

SNOWMOBILE: Another grant for the Idaho City Snowmobile fund was awarded for trail grooming and more signage. Callahan motioned to approve the grant agreement in the amount of \$5,436.79 with a match of \$1,087.36. The motion carried.

LIQUOR LICENSES: Several motions were made to approve liquor licenses.

DEMAND WARRANT FOR EAST BOISE COUNTY AMBULANCE: A motion was made to approve the payment of \$4,700, paid for by donation, to transfer the powerlifts over to the newer ambulances. The motion carried.

Director Mari Adams said there was a shortage of volunteers to help with runs on the ambulance.

Alex Gross gave an update on the new East Boise County EMS District and said that the new board passed their budgets for 2025 and 2026. He added that new staff had been hired and would be starting on October 1st.

Junior Celeste Wilson had 3 kills and 10 digs while her sister, freshman Vilate Wilson, had 3 kills and 1 dig. Sophomore Aubrey Penney had 3 kills, 4 digs and 1 assist. Sophomore Malia Goff had 3 aces, 8 digs and 23 assists. Freshman Trinity Catherman had 20 digs. The team traveled to Nampa Christian on Thursday, September

4 where they took the loss against the Trojans 27-29, 25-15, 18-25, 25-18, 15-9. Stat leaders were Jones with 24 kills, 2 aces and 9 digs, Hess had 12 kills, 3 aces, 27 digs and 1 assist, C. Wilson had 3 kills, 14 digs and 1 block, Goff had 1 kill, 3 aces, 11 digs, 3 blocks and 38 assists, V. Wilson had 1 kill, 2 digs and 5 blocks, Catherman had 2 aces, 17 digs and 2 assists and Penney had 4 digs and 1 block. Water System Update for Idaho City

IDAHO CITY - During a special meeting September 3rd, 2025, the City of Idaho City reported strong progress in stabilizing the municipal water system following last week's storm-related disruption. The City's primary storage tank is now full, and bacteriological test results could arrive as early as Thursday. Until testing confirms the absence of bacteria, the current boil water advisory remains in effect.

The boil water advisory will remain in place until accredited laboratory results confirm the water meets all safety standards. City staff are in daily contact with the Idaho Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) and will lift the advisory upon receipt of satisfactory results. The Mayor's emergency declaration issued last week qualifies the City to seek state and federal assistance related to the incident; after review during last night's special meeting, the City Council did not extend the declaration. Community conservation played a decisive role, stretching what was expected to be roughly a day and a half of available water into nearly three days.

To bolster system resilience and reduce future risk, the City and its partners are advancing several near-term actions. The second storage tank is being filled and balanced to increase reserve capacity. Contractor pump-testing for the new wells (infiltration gallery) is being procured and, pending successful results, the wells will be connected to provide a cleaner raw-water source to the sand bays. Design work for highway isolation valves is complete and awaiting Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) approval. Once permitted, the City will install these valves to better isolate and locate leaks along the highway corridor. Repairs to the reverse-osmosis (RO) system are underway to add redundancy to treatment capacity. Public Works will also closely monitor creek conditions and, when sediment levels are high, temporarily shut off that source to prevent sand bay clogging.

Mayor Ken Everhart thanked residents, local partners, and volunteers for their rapid response and continued cooperation. "This community came together at a critical moment—from cleaning

the sand bays to conserving water—and that teamwork made the difference," said Everhart. "We appreciate everyone's patience as we complete required testing to ensure the water is safe."

A very special thanks to Idaho City Public Works Department, Tami Claus, Nick Mancera & Austin Day, City Hall, Kaleb Goodlett; Councilor Tom Secor, Boise County Sheriff Scott Turner, Boise County Emergency Manager Jordan Jones. Thanks also to the Basin School District teachers who came, Natalie Kulick and Jason Roeber. Coach Roeber also enlisted the help of about half a dozen high school football players. Idaho City Officer Jake Nye was there, and two representatives from Idaho Rural Water brought up the water trailer and then stayed and helped with the cleaning. Carter Elliott and Becca Barrow with the Chamber of Commerce provided lunch for the volunteers in addition to purchasing 200 cases of water that were distributed to residents. Thanks to Idaho City Grocery, Bobby Mathews for donating drinks and snacks throughout the day. The Idaho City Fire District helped donate a large number of cases of water to the citizens of Idaho City. Thank you to the City of Horseshoe Bend for donating \$500 to help with costs. Mayor Everhart once again expressed his thanks and added that this recovery would not have happened at the speed that it did if it were not for the commitment of this community to help in a time of need.

Residents should continue to follow the boil water advisory until the City issues an official update lifting it and monitor the City's official communication channels for the latest information and guidance.

UPDATE: Idaho City, Idaho — September 5, 2025 —After receiving clear bacteria testing, the Boil Order is no longer in effect, and alternate watering days may begin, keeping conservation in mind. No other updates as of September 9, 2025.



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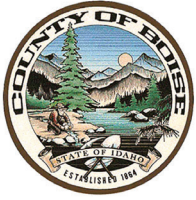

#2025-04**

**BOISE COUNTY FAILURE TO OBEY
STATE HIGHWAY 21 CLOSURE
ORDINANCE**

ESTABLISHING AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING IT IS A MISDEMEANOR TO FAIL TO OBEY STATE HIGHWAY 21 CLOSURES; PROVIDING THAT THE BOISE COUNTY SHERIFF SHALL HAVE THE AUTHORITY TO CLOSE STATE HIGHWAY 21; PROVIDING SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF BOISE COUNTY, IDAHO AS FOLLOWS:

Section I – TITLE

A. This ordinance shall be known as the Boise County Failure to Obey State Highway 21 Closure Ordinance.

Section II – PURPOSE

A. In as much as State Highway 21 within Boise County receive sufficient snowfall that it is impractical for the County to police said roadways during heavy snowfall periods; and in as much as the County has the duty to police said roadways and to secure the roadway system within Boise County; and in as much as the cost and feasibility are not within reasonable demands of Boise County, necessitating the closure of certain roadways.

B. For purposes of public safety and the regulation of State Highway 21 closures within Boise County.

C. To protect motorists during the winter time, when they travel past avalanche road closures on State Highway 21 within Boise County.

D. To protect first responders who have a duty to respond to endangered public who violate such closures, which often demand more tax payer resources and which places those first responders needlessly in harm's way.

E. To protect State Highway 21, as violators of closures damage roadways, trails, foliage, and the like, which require tax payer resources to remedy such harm.

Section III – DEFINITIONS

A. "Public roadway" means any portions of any highway or road used for vehicular travel, whether paved or not, which is controlled by Boise County, any State of Idaho agency, or a federal agency.

B. "Closed road" or "closed" shall mean any public roadway that is designated by a "Road Closed" sign or the like posted on or adjacent to the public roadway, or a designated physical barrier in any lane of travel on such road, such as a law enforcement vehicle with traffic lights activated, stop gate, locked gate, or plastic, concrete, or metal barricade.

C. "Motor vehicle" means every vehicle that is self-propelled, and for the purpose of titling and registration meets federal motor vehicle safety standards as defined in Idaho Code § 49-107. Motor vehicle does not include vehicles moved solely by human power, electric personal assistive mobility devices, personal delivery devices, electric-assisted bicycles, and motorized wheel-

chairs or other such vehicles that are specifically exempt from titling or registration requirements under title 49, Idaho Code.

D. "Off-highway vehicle" or "OHV" means an all-terrain vehicle, motorbike, specialty off-highway vehicle or utility type vehicle as defined in Idaho Code § 67-7101, to specifically include snowmobiles.

Section IV – VIOLATION AND PENALTIES

A. Failure to Obey State Highway 21 Closure. It shall be a violation for any individual to operate a motor vehicle or OHV upon State Highway 21 when closed within Boise County.

B. Penalties. A violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars (\$1,000), or by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding six (6) months, or both.

Section V – EXCEPTIONS

A. This ordinance shall not apply to any Boise County, State of Idaho agency, or federal agency working in their official capacity; nor shall it apply to vehicles used by public utility or communication companies for facility and/or equipment maintenance purposes that are accessing property in the closed area.

B. This ordinance shall not apply to any landowner who is traveling the shortest distance to return to their residence located in the State Highway 21 closure area; nor shall this ordinance apply to any landowner who is leaving for any other purposes.

Section VI – AUTHORITY FOR CLOSURE OF ROAD

A. The Boise County Sheriff, or his designee, shall have the authority to temporarily close State Highway 21 whenever the closure or restriction of use is deemed necessary for the safety of the public, as stated in Idaho Code § 31-2202(13)(d).

Section VII – SEVERABILITY

A. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this title is held to be invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this title and they shall remain in full force and effect.

Section VIII – EFFECTIVE DATE

A. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, and publication according to law.

Section X – AUTHORITY

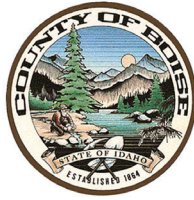

**BOISE COUNTY SNOWMOBILE
TRAIL PROTECTION ORDINANCE**

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING BOISE COUNTY ORDINANCE #2022-02 AND ESTABLISHING AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING THAT THE OPERATION OR ACTUAL PHYSICAL CONTROL OF A SELF-PROPELLED VEHICLE WITH WHEELS ON GROOMED SNOWMOBILE TRAILS WITHIN BOISE COUNTY IS A MISDEMEANOR; PROVIDING THAT OPERATING A TRACKED ATV OR UTV ON TRAIL 380 IS A MISDEMEANOR; PROVIDING PARKING A SELF-PROPELLED VEHICLE WITH WHEELS ON A GROOMED SNOWMOBILE TRAIL WITHIN BOISE COUNTY IS AN INFRACTION; PROVIDING SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF BOISE COUNTY, IDAHO AS FOLLOWS:

Section I – TITLE

This ordinance shall be known as the Boise County Snowmobile Trail Protection Ordinance.

SECTION II – PURPOSE

To protect groomed snowmobile trails within Boise County from damage inherent with use of such trails by self-propelled vehicles with wheels.

To protect Boise County from the cost and expense of repairing and maintaining groomed snowmobile trails throughout the county after such trails have been used by self-propelled vehicles with wheels.

To protect the public from the hazards and dangers that occur if self-propelled vehicles with wheels are operated on groomed snowmobile trails during the period of time when snowmobiles or other vehicles equipped with snow tracks can or may operate on said trails.

Section III – DEFINITIONS

All words and phrases used in these sections shall be given their ordinary, commonly understood and accepted meanings.

"Off-highway vehicle" or "OHV" means an all-terrain vehicle, motorbike, or utility type vehicle as defined in this section. "All-terrain vehicle" or "ATV" means any recreational motor vehicle designed for or capable of traveling off developed roadways and highways with three (3) or more tires and fifty-five (55) inches or less in width, with a wheelbase of sixty-one (61) inches or less, and with handlebar steering and a seat designed to be straddled by the operator.

Utility type vehicle" or "UTV" means any recreational motor vehicle other than an ATV, motorbike or snowmobile as defined in this section, designed for and capable of travel over designated roads, traveling on four (4) or more tires and having a maximum width less than eighty (80) inches. A utility type vehicle must have a minimum width of fifty (50)

inches and a minimum weight of at least nine hundred (900) pounds.

"Motorbike" means any self-propelled two (2) wheeled motorcycle or motor-driven cycle, excluding tractors, designed for or capable of traveling off developed roadways and highways and also referred to as a dirt bike, trailbikes, endurobikes, trials bikes, motocross bikes or dual purpose motorcycles.

"Self-propelled vehicle with wheels" means every vehicle that moves with wheels that are in contact with the ground, which is directed by an operator, upon which any person or property may be transported.

"Snowmobile" means any self-propelled vehicle under two thousand (2,000) pounds unladen gross weight and less than eighty (80) inches, designed primarily for travel on snow or ice or over natural terrain, that may be steered by tracks, skis, or runners.

"Groomed snowmobile trail" means any trail prepared or posted for travel of snowmobiles, vehicle equipped with snow tracks or for skiing. Posting is sufficient if signs, designating use of the trail for snowmobiles, are located at regular trail heads. Maintenance of the trails, on a regular basis, is immaterial to violation of this ordinance. "Actual physical control" shall be defined as being in the driver's position of the vehicle with the motor running or with the vehicle moving.

Section IV – VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES

It is lawful to drive, operate, or be in actual physical control of a snowmobile or tracked motorbike on groomed snowmobile trails in Boise County.

Exceeding maximum width. It is unlawful and shall constitute a misdemeanor for any person to drive, operate, or be in actual physical control of any OHV or on-highway vehicle with wheels, or an OHV, even if it is tracked, if that OHV is more than seventy (70) inches wide on groomed snowmobile trails in Boise County, unless exceptions in Section V apply.

Exceeding maximum width on Trail 380. It is unlawful and shall constitute a misdemeanor for any person to drive, operate, or be in actual physical control of any tracked or wheeled ATV or UTV on Trail 380 for the approximate 3.5 miles between Mores Creek Summit to the junction of Trail 314, unless exceptions of Section V apply.

Parking a wheeled vehicle on or off a groomed snowmobile trail. It is unlawful and shall constitute an infraction for a self-propelled vehicle with wheels to park on a groomed snowmobile trail or for a self-propelled vehicle with wheels to drive on a groomed snowmobile trail and to park off a groomed snowmobile trail, unless exceptions of Section V apply.

For purposes of this Subsection D., the registered owner of the self-propelled vehicle with wheels unlawfully parked, left or found unattended, shall be held liable for payment of any fines, towing expenses or impoundment fees, as applicable. Unless, however, the registered owner can prove that the self-propelled vehicle with wheels was stolen or was used against the will of the owner. In such case, the person in control of the motor vehicle at the time of the illegal parking shall be held personally liable.

Service of the citation upon the registered owner or person in control of the self-propelled vehicle with wheels shall be deemed complete upon the officer hand delivering the citation or by leaving a copy of the citation on or with the self-propelled vehicle with wheels.

Penalties for Subsection B or C. Any person convicted of the violations listed in Subsection B or C shall be punished by:

A minimum fine of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250); Incarceration up to ninety (90) days; and, Making reasonable restitution to either Boise County's Grooming 8A or 8B Program, which shall be determined by the grooming area that was harmed, for the cost to repair damage to the groomed trail, towing out any immobilized vehicle in violation of this section, or for any other reasonable harm, which shall be a rebuttable presumption calculated at a cost of two hundred and twenty five dollars (\$225) per hour of Boise County Grooming 8A or 8B Program's time.

Penalties for Subsection D. Any person convicted of the violations listed in Subsection D shall be punished by: A fine of seventy five dollars (\$75.00). The liable party shall also be subject to any applicable court costs, fees, towing expenses and impoundment costs.

Section V – EXCEPTIONS

This ordinance does not apply to snowmobile trail grooming vehicles operated by Boise County employees or contractors.

This ordinance shall not apply to emergency or search and rescue vehicles, regardless of type; nor shall it apply to Boise County Sheriffs vehicles which are specifically designed for travel on snow; nor shall it apply to vehicles used by public utility or communication companies for facility and/or equipment maintenance purposes.

This ordinance shall not apply to Snowcats that travel only on the portion of Forest Service Road 698, otherwise known as Middle Fork Road, and Forest Service Road 671 to Silver Plunge Resort.

Section VI – SEVERABILITY

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this title is held to be invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this title and they shall remain in full force and effect.

Section VII – EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, and publication according to law.

Section VIII – REPEAL

The provisions of this ordinance shall repeal all previously enacted resolutions or ordinances pertaining to the operation of vehicles on groomed snowmobile trails, specifically Boise County Ordinance #2022-02.

Section IX – AUTHORITY

This ordinance is adopted pursuant to the authority vested in Boards of County Commissioners in the State of Idaho under Idaho Code §§ 67-7112

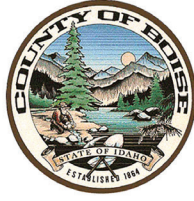

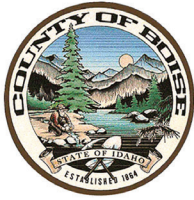

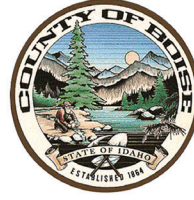

The Boise County Board of Commissioners intends to use federal funds made available under Title III of the Secure Rural Schools and Community Self-Determination Act of 2000 and all remaining funds received from that time through the receipt of funds in 2025. These funds can only be spent for certain purposes set forth in 16 U.S.C 7142.

Proposed uses of federal funds
The County proposes to obligate the funds, as set forth in PL 114-10, as follows:

Funds to carry out activities described by the Community Wildfire Protection Plan:

- \$121,764 to assist homeowners with professional management advice and modification of fuels within the home ignition zone and cover Wildfire Mitigation Department personnel while they work on these activities.

- Conduct Home Risk and Wildfire Mitigation Assessments on private properties throughout Boise County and have a centralized location to store and enter this data.

- Cover the salary and benefits of the personnel in the Wildfire Mitigation Department, as needed, while working on the projects listed for Title III funding uses.

- Aid communities by hosting volunteer days (e.g. Chipper Days events) for area neighborhoods in Boise County to come together and reduce hazardous fuels including disposal of woody debris.

- Design and implement fuel breaks and hazardous fuel reduction projects on private properties.

- Assist various local volunteer fire departments/fire protection districts by purchasing water tanks for water storage to be placed in areas of need within the jurisdiction of the departments/districts to address fire mitigation and suppression in the area.

Funds to reimburse the County for emergency services performed on Federal land:

- \$10,000 for the Boise County Sheriff for anticipated search and rescue emergency services performed on federal land and paid for by the County.

The reimbursement will be for the salary or wages of emergency response personnel deployed during an emergency response, the replacement of equipment, material and supplies expended, damaged or destroyed during an emergency response, the repair of equipment damaged during an emergency response, and the maintenance of vehicles, equipment, and facilities during an emergency response.

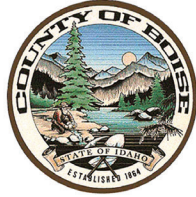

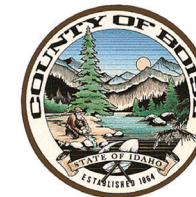

BOISE COUNTY FIRE SEASON PREVENTIVE BURN ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING BOISE COUNTY ORDINANCE #2017-01; ESTABLISHING AN ORDINANCE MAKING IT A MISDEMEANOR TO START, FUEL OR MAINTAIN FIRES IN BOISE COUNTY OUTSIDE OF THE LIMITATIONS SET HEREIN; PROVIDING THAT CERTAIN PERSONELL SHALL HAVE AUTHORITY TO EXTINGUISH FIRES; PROVIDING SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF BOISE COUNTY, IDAHO

AS FOLLOWS:

Section I – TITLE

A. This section shall be known and cited as the Boise County Fire Season Preventative Burn Ordinance.

Section II - PURPOSE

A. In recognition of historically frequent and large wildfires throughout Boise County and the many severe fire seasons throughout the past decade, the danger of catastrophic fire in Boise County is likely to be extremely high in the future.

B. To protect safety, the promotion of the health and prosperity and the improvement of the morals, peace and good order, comfort and convenience of the county and the inhabitants thereof, and for the protection of public and private property situated within the county.

C. To restrict fires on both public and private property during the times of year in which fire threats are most severe.

D. Portions of this ordinance are based on the Idaho Fire Code, which is the 2015 international Fire code, adopted by Idaho code § 41-253

Section III – DEFINITIONS

A. "Approved fire structure" means any of the following:

i. An incinerator that is constructed in accordance with the International Building Code, the International Fuel Gas Code, and the International Mechanical Code. Machinery that is not equipped with an effective means for arresting sparks shall not qualify as an incinerator;

ii. An incinerator that complies with National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) standard 211;

iii. A fully enclosed metal stove, grill, or sheep herder-type stove, any of which is outfitted with a chimney that is at least five (5) feet in length that is equipped with a spark arrester consisting of a mesh screen with screen opening of 1/8 inch or less.

B. "County closed season" means July 1 to October 20 of each year, unless otherwise adjusted by the Board of County Commissioners by resolution.

C. "Ground fuel" means all combustible materials commonly found on the ground including but not limited to surface litter, leaves, pine needles, bark, duff, tree or shrub roots, punch wood, peat, and sawdust.

D. "Solid wood fuel" means firewood, charcoal, pellets, and untreated timber products. Rotten wood, wood chips, and sawdust are not solid wood fuel.

Section IV – VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES FOR FIRES DURING THE COUNTY CLOSED FIRED SEASON FOR APPROVED FIRE STRUCTURE

A. Clean adjacent ground fuel. During the county closed season, no person shall act intentionally or with criminal negligence to start, fuel, or maintain any outdoor fire, whether inside or outside of an approved fire structure, without clearing any and all ground fuel for a minimum of 10 feet (3048 mm) in all directions from the fire.

B. Penalties. A violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars (\$1,000), or by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding six (6) months, or both.

Section V – VIOLATIONS AND

PENALTIES FOR FIRES DURING THE COUNTY CLOSED FIRED SEASON FOR NON-APPROVED FIRE STRUCTURE, I.E. CAMPFIRE RINGS, RESIDENTIAL FIRE

A. Restricted fire size. During the county closed season, no person shall act intentionally or with criminal negligence to start, fuel, or maintain any outdoor fire which has a fuel area that is either more than 3 feet (914 mm) in diameter, or more than 2 feet (610 mm) in height, unless the fire is entirely contained in an approved fire structure.

B. Fire to be attended. During the county closed season, no person shall act intentionally or with criminal negligence to start, fuel, or maintain any outdoor fire that is not entirely contained in an approved fire structure without ensuring constant attendance by a person at least 18 years of age until the fire is fully extinguished, which means that there are no coals or heat emitting from the remains of the leftover material or ashes.

C. Extinguishment equipment with fire. During the county closed season, no person shall act intentionally or with criminal negligence to start, fuel, or maintain any outdoor fire without ensuring providing adequate means that is available for immediate utilization in the extinguishing of a fire, unless the fire is entirely contained in an approved fire structure. Such adequate means are a minimum of one portable fire extinguisher complying with Idaho Fire Code Section 906 with a minimum 4-A rating or other approved on-site fire-extinguishing equipment, such as dirt, sand, water barrel, garden hose or water truck.

D. Unsafe/erratically combustible fire fuel prohibited. During the county closed season, no person shall act intentionally or with criminal negligence to start, fuel, or maintain any outdoor fire that is not entirely contained in an approved fire structure burning any trash or any materials other than solid wood fuel, and reasonably necessary amounts of typical fire starter materials that are not prohibited by law, such as IDAPA 58.01.01.603.

E. Clean adjacent ground fuel. During the county closed season, no person shall act intentionally or with criminal negligence to start, fuel, or maintain any outdoor fire, whether inside or outside of an approved fire structure, without clearing any and all ground fuel for a minimum of 10 feet (3048 mm) in all directions from the fire.

F. Penalties. A violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars (\$1,000), or by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding six (6) months, or both.

Section VI – EXCEPTIONS

A. The following fires and

persons are exempt from the requirements of this ordinance:

i. Any Federal, State or local officer or member of an organized rescue or firefighting force in the performance of an official duty;

ii. Fires within city boundaries.

Section VI – EXTINGUISHMENT AUTHORITY

A. The authority of the fire chief or officer of the fire department in charge at the scene of a fire to direct operations and extinguish or control any fires is as provided in the International Fire Code 2015, adopted by Idaho Code § 41-253, and any other pertinent provisions of Idaho law.

B. Idaho Code § 41-253 further authorizes that when any particular fire creates or adds to a hazardous situation, or an unauthorized fire exists, the Boise County Sheriff, Sheriff's Deputies, or their designees, are authorized to extinguish or to order the extinguishment of the fire.

Section VII – SEVERABILITY

A. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this title is held to be invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this title and they shall remain in full force and effect.

Section VIII – EFFECTIVE DATE

A. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, and publication according to law.

Section IX – REPEAL

A. The provisions of this ordinance shall repeal all previously enacted resolutions or ordinances pertaining to the preventative burns, specifically Boise County Ordinance #2017-01.

Section X – AUTHORITY

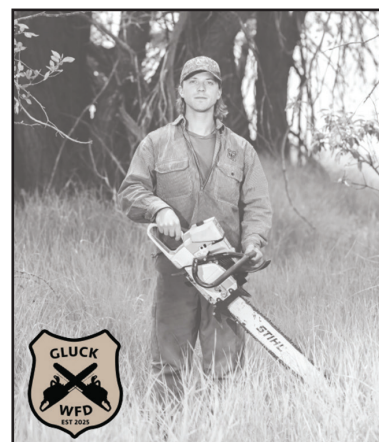

Generations in the Mountains: Stories of Mail, Maps and Community

GARDEN VALLEY -- The Garden Valley Historical Society hosted its second *Generations in the Mountains* presentation on August 28th at the Garden Valley District Library, drawing another group of residents eager to learn and share stories from the community's past. Following the success of the May 1st kickoff, this event centered on the history of the post office and the routes that connected Garden Valley and Crouch to the outside world. We were privileged to be joined by Judy Meserth, who served as Garden Valley's postmaster from 1981 to 2009 and shared much of the history she and the community had collected over the years.

Judy guided attendees through a series of maps, photographs, and anecdotes, beginning with an 1865 tracing of the valley that showed rivers and trails but no major roads, and no path from Banks. This set the stage for a discussion of Julia Mills, the valley's first postmaster in 1875, and how the naming of Garden Valley itself grew out of that moment.

Much of the evening highlighted how the post office served as the hub of community life. Stories ranged from the Castle family homestead—where flour sacks stood in for mailbags and where young James Castle, later recognized as an important Idaho artist, scavenged scraps for his drawings—to the 1915 construction of the Banks–Lowman Road, when neighbors came together to cut through the canyon.

Laughter and surprise punctuated the evening as tales were

told of carriers who braved avalanches, blew boulders off the road, or hauled mail on foot when horses couldn't get through the snow. Attendees also reflected on the rivalry that, for a time, split the valley into two post offices—Garden Valley and Crouch—and how that identity has endured.

The event ended with an invitation for community members to suggest future topics, ensuring the valley's history continues to be remembered and retold together.
