### Garden Valley Library Celebrates a Year of Growth and Gratitude

**GARDEN VALLEY** — As the fiscal year draws to a close, the Garden Valley Library is celebrating a year of tremendous growth, community connection, and heartfelt gratitude. With the support of generous grant funding, careful financial stewardship, and the enthusiastic participation of the local community, staff and our wonderful Friends of the Library members, the library has accomplished more in the past year than ever before.

Thanks to \$19,325 in grant funding, the library was able to launch several new initiatives and enhance existing programs that have had a meaningful impact on patrons of all ages. One of the most visible and exciting additions is the new Children's Garden, a vibrant outdoor space where kids can get their hands dirty and their minds engaged, learning about gardening, soil health, plant life, and local wildlife.

The library also offered an expanded calendar of community programming, highlighted by the Creative Aging art series. This popular series brought in accomplished instructors to teach wood carving, watercolor, and colored pencil techniques, offering adults a chance to explore new creative outlets in an enriching and welcoming environment.

In keeping with its commitment to inclusivity, the library also expanded its collection of “Kid's Kits” and children's materials, with a focus on accessibility for children with cognitive, physical, or sensory challenges. These specialized resources ensure that every

child in the community has the opportunity to enjoy, learn, and grow through reading and play.

For those with vision impairments or reading difficulties, another grant allowed the library to significantly grow its large print and audio CD collections, ensuring that literature remains accessible to all.

Summer brought even more excitement with an expanded Summer Reading Program, made possible by additional grant support. With fun events like a color run, tie-dyeing day, raft-building competitions, Smokey Bear's birthday celebration, and a nature crafts day, the program saw a record-breaking 105 children register—up from 68 the previous year. Young readers earned points for every hour spent reading and were able to redeem them for prizes, encouraging a love for reading and learning all summer long.

The library also hosted a free community concert, adding music to the mix of engag-

ing activities, and launched a meaningful new partnership with the Garden Valley Historical Society. Together, they created the “Generations in the Mountains” speaker series, where long-standing local families share stories of Garden Valley's rich history with newer generations.

Community programming expanded even further through events hosted in partnership with the Friends of the Library,

including quarterly author visits, a well-received class on the Wild Orchards of Idaho, and meet-and-greet gatherings. These events continue to strengthen connections among local residents while fostering a love of learning and local culture.

All of this was accomplished while the library managed to pay off its bond early, a testament to sound fiscal management and a reflection of the staff's commitment to responsible growth.

As the Garden Valley Library looks ahead to another exciting year, the staff would like to ex-

## Boise National Forest Begin Prescribed Fires

**BOISE COUNTY** — Boise National Forest is planning prescribed fire operations starting mid-September, pending all required approvals. We estimate this work to continue through January as weather conditions allow. We use prescribed fires to help reduce overgrown vegetation to help protect local communities, infrastructure and natural resources from wildfires.

Those areas may close to the public for several days for public safety. Watch for warn-

ing signs along roads near all prescribed fire areas before and during burns.

Residents may experience smoke during the prescribed burns. Go to <https://fire.airnow.gov/> to find more detailed information about air quality. When driving, slow down and turn on your headlights when you encounter smoke on the road.

# BOISE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

**September 9, 2025**

**Present:** Commissioners Clay Tucker, Lindy Lindstrom, and Bob Callahan (via phone).

**Pledge of Allegiance**

**CONSTITUENT INPUT:** None

**MINUTES:** Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to accept the minutes from September 2<sup>nd</sup>. The motion carried.

**CLERK:** Grant writer and HR Director job descriptions were discussed. Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve the grant writer job description and the motion carried.

**REPLACEMENT OF REPEATERS:** Sheriff Scott Turner advised the board regarding the replacement of the current repeaters and their cost to set up. He said, "This really addresses all of our issues with all of our radio systems in every site around the county." Chairman Tucker was assured by the sheriff that there was still time enough before winter to get this system installed and programed. Commissioner Callahan asked if this system would "fix some of the dead areas," and the sheriff replied that it would. Sheriff Turner commented that there are di-

rectional antennas where there should not be directional antennas, and this will replace the dysfunctional antennas. He added, "We're not going to fix all of our dead areas, because it's natural with our terrain, but it does address everything that we can address and have the means to address." Chairman Tucker asked if the prosecutor was satisfied with the contract, and he replied that he was and notice of the contract was placed in the *Idaho World*.

Clerk Mary Prisco stated that "the only way that we really can pay for this is through using the cash reserves account, also known as fund balance." She spoke about the additional amount allocated by the government for Covid funds concerning additional costs associated with emergency responses. She said, "there is comfort in using" this money "because this is a big dollar amount, \$553,000." Chairman Tucker said that everything seemed to be in order and that it is, "absolutely necessary and vital to replace or repair our repeaters." Sheriff Turner added that they had tried to acquire federal and state grants, worked with some of the fire departments, "the

reality of it is, is funding for these types of grants just is not really out there anymore." He said they did try to find other funding sources to help pay for this project, "and we've exhausted those efforts." Commissioner Callahan agreed that it was "definitely a need and not a want at this point."

Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve the communications agreement for purchase and installation in the amount of \$552,757.38. All were in favor and the motion carried.

**COMPUTER EQUIPMENT:** Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve the request to purchase computers equipment, which is in the budget, up to \$25,000. The motion carried.

**RESOLUTION:** A resolution for the Idaho City snowmobile trail maintenance, for which a grant was received, was reviewed by the clerk and presented in a resolution to amend the budget. Lindstrom motioned to approve this resolution to amend the budget to increase the snowmobile budget to include the grant award.

**E911 FUND:** A grant received was designated for

emergency services, to cover "certain capital equipment," the clerk said. Lindstrom motioned to approve Resolution 2025-48 to increase the E911 fund and the motion carried.

**NOTIFICATIONS:** Clerk Mary Prisco spoke regarding the annual amount for the sheriff's office of money set aside to run AlertSense. Lindstrom motioned to approve the increase to the E911 fund and the motion carried.

**RESOLUTION:** Lindstrom motioned to increase the Boise County Road and Bridge fund through Resolution 2025-50 and the motion carried.

**RESOLUTION:** The clerk recounted a sheriff's vehicle that was totaled and another vehicle that needed upfitting. She said that "The vehicle account, in the Sheriff's deputy department, is very overdrawn. Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve Resolution 2025-52 to increase the Justice Fund and the motion carried.

**RESOLUTION:** A surplus vehicle from the sheriff's office was transferred to the City of Idaho City. Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve Resolution 2025-53, a surplus and transfer of sheriff's

department vehicle. The motion carried.

**CLAIMS REPORT:** Lindstrom motioned to approve the claims report in the amount of \$85,491.48. The motion carried.

**EAST BOISE COUNTY AMBULANCE DISTRICT:** A donation of \$5,000 was made to EBCAD for the cost of the exchange for the power loads for the two ambulances. Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve Resolution 2025-04 amending the EBCAD budget.

**EXECUTIVE SESSION:** The Timber Mountain Ranch common area was to be discussed with Prosecutor Sosa. A motion was said to go into this closed meeting. [Time 9:52 am to 10:17 am] No action was required.

**DEMAND WARRANT:** Lindstrom motioned to approve the demand warrant to Bank of America in the amount of \$1,258.11. The motion carried.

**EXECUTIVE SESSION:** Lindstrom motioned to go into executive session to discuss risk management and pending litigation. [Time 10:18 am to 10:33 am] No action was required. Adjourned at 10:40 am.

## Wind Quintet Serenades Garden Valley with Classical Mastery

**GARDEN VALLEY** — On Thursday, September 11th, the Garden Valley Library transformed into a haven for classical music lovers as a distinguished Wind Quintet took the stage for a special evening performance. The concert was organized by Doug Beasley, affectionately known as “Swingman” on GV Radio, where he spins jazz and hits from the '50s and '60s. Off the airwaves, Beasley is a seasoned French horn player with the Las Vegas Philharmonic Symphony and a frequent substitute with the Boise Philharmonic.

During a lively interview with Jan Solecki—aka “Slick

Gourmet”—on GV Radio, Beasley shared his excitement about bringing top-tier musicians to Garden Valley. He rallied a group of his talented colleagues from across the country to form a quintet for the occasion.

The ensemble featured Allison Emerick, principal flutist of the Boise Philharmonic; Lauren Blackerby, principal oboist of the same orchestra; Carmen Izzo, clarinetist with the Las Vegas Philharmonic; R. Doug Beasley on French horn; and Matthew Schuler, bassoonist from the Lexington Kentucky Philharmonic.

Together, they performed a rich selection of classical

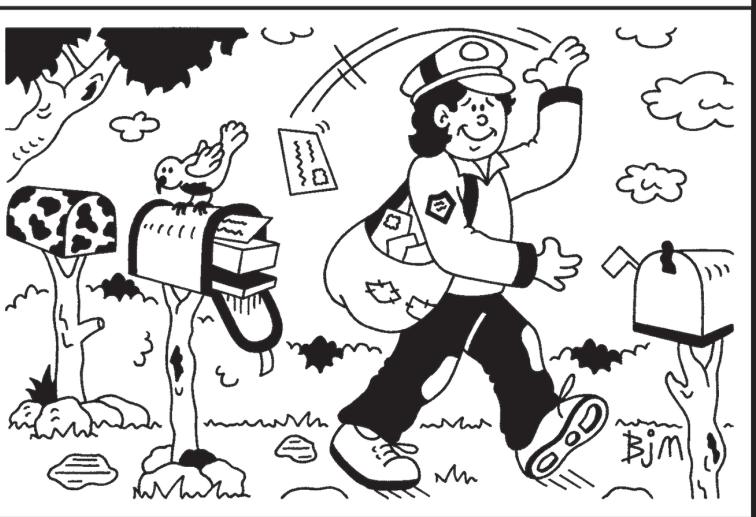
works, including pieces by Bach, Beethoven, and several celebrated French composers. The audience was treated to a blend of elegance, precision, and heartfelt artistry that filled the library with timeless sound.

The concert not only showcased the extraordinary talent of each musician but also highlighted the power of collaboration and community. The event was funded by the Friends of the GV Library and the Music Performance Trust Fund. Garden Valley residents were reminded that even in a small town, world-class music can find a home.

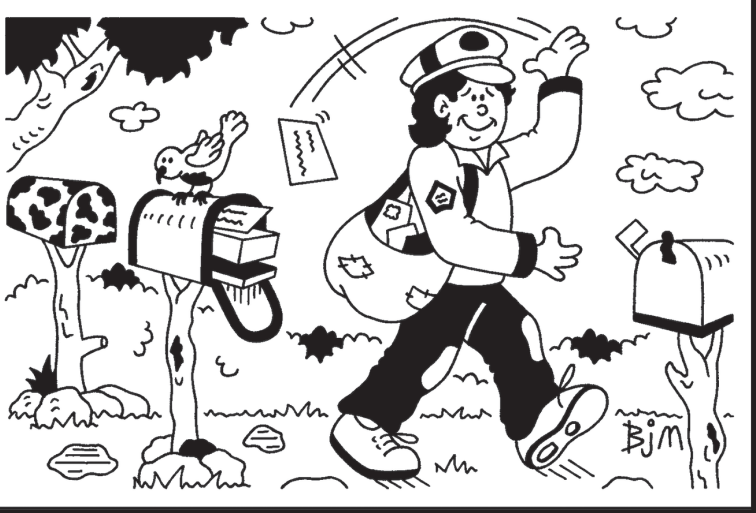

## Fall Sports in Horseshoe Bend

**Varsity Volleyball:** The Lady Mustangs traveled to Greenleaf on Monday, 9/8 where they won a decisive match against the Greenleaf Friends Academy Grizzlies, 25-8, 25-4, 25-6. Statistical standouts were junior Kimber Jones with 11 kills and 7 aces. Freshman Vilate Wilson had 5 kills, junior Celeste Wilson had 4 kills, 8 aces, 2 digs and 1 block, freshman Brooklyn Hess had 3 kills, 15 aces, 3 digs and 3 assists, sophomores Malia Goff and Aubrey Penney each had 1 kill, with Goff putting up 3 aces and 17 assists and Penney adding 2 aces and 1 block. Freshman Trinity Catherman had 3 aces and 2 digs.

The Mustangs hosted the Cascade Ramblers on Wednesday, 9/10 and took the conference play match win 25-6, 25-4, 25-9. Stat leaders were Jones with 16 kills, 4 aces, 4 digs and 1 assist. C. Wil-

son had 7 kills, 6 aces, 5 digs and 1 assist, Penney had 5 kills and 1 block, Goff had 1 kill, 1 ace, 5 digs and 28 assists. Freshmen Catherman and V. Wilson each had 2 aces with Catherman contributing 5 digs and V. Wilson adding 2.

The Lady Mustangs delivered a strong performance at the Idaho Classic Tournament at Mountain View High School in Meridian over the weekend, showcasing grit and skill on the court. In Saturday's pool play, the team secured victories over Liberty Charter and Oakley before narrowly falling to Nampa Christian in a tough crossover match. Undeterred, the Mustangs returned Sunday to top their pool with wins against Declo and Filer, earning a spot in the Gold Bracket. The semifinal against Malad turned into a three-set thriller, with the Mustangs emerging victorious and advancing to the championship match.

There, they faced a talented Ambrose squad and ultimately fell short. Despite the result, it was a standout weekend filled with competitive volleyball and a stellar team effort by the Mustangs. The Mustangs are currently 2-2 overall and 2-0 in regular season conference play.

**Junior Varsity Volleyball:** At Greenleaf on Monday, 9/8 the JV Mustangs fell to the Grizzlies 25-18, 25-22. Against the Cascade Ramblers at home on Wednesday, 9/10 the team lost 25-21, 25-16.

**Horseshoe Bend Football:** The Varsity Mustangs suffered a dramatic loss on the road, Friday, 9/12 in Bruneau. The team went down 0-44 in the non-conference game against the Rimrock Raiders. The team has a bye on Friday, 9/19. Following the tough loss, the bye week arrives at an ideal time for the team to reassess and make necessary adjustments.

FOR BOISE COUNTY SOLID WASTE  
DEPARTMENT**

**WHEREAS**, the Boise County Board of Commissioners has the authority to set fees in relationship to transportation of, and disposal of, solid waste, pursuant to Idaho Code 31-4404; and

**WHEREAS**, the Boise County Board of Commissioners has reviewed Resolution #2024-01, in conjunction with the current costs of operations; and

**WHEREAS**, notice of public hearing was published in the Idaho World newspaper on July 2, and July 9, 2025; and

**WHEREAS**, a public hearing was held on this matter on July 15, 2025, where the Boise County Board of Commissioners considered the setting of fees to ensure that they are reasonably related to the County's cost as required by Idaho Code 31-870.

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Boise County Board of Commissioners RESCINDS Resolution #2024-01; and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Boise County Board of Commissioners adopts the following fee schedule of Solid Waste fees, by type and use of property parcel:

**CATEGORY:**  
**L** Bare lots: Residential, Commercial and Platted Land.  
FEES: \$11.70

**R** Residential: House, Manufactured Home, Permanent RV, Condo, Apartment, Private & USFS Cabins.  
FEES: \$155.93

- Conduct Home Risk and Wildfire Mitigation Assessments on private properties throughout Boise County and have a centralized location to store and enter this data.

- Cover the salary and benefits of the personnel in the Wildfire Mitigation Department, as needed, while working on the projects listed for Title III funding uses.

- Aid communities by hosting volunteer days (e.g. Chipper Days events) for area neighborhoods in Boise County to come together and reduce hazardous fuels including disposal of woody debris.

- Design and implement fuel breaks and hazardous fuel reduction projects on private properties.

- Assist various local volunteer fire departments/fire protection districts by purchasing water tanks for water storage to be placed in areas of need within the jurisdiction of the departments/districts to address fire mitigation and suppression in the area.

**Funds to reimburse the County for emergency services performed on Federal land:**

- \$10,000 for the Boise County Sheriff for anticipated search and rescue emergency services performed on federal land and paid for by the County.

The reimbursement will be for the salary or wages of emergency response personnel deployed during an emergency response, the replacement of equipment, material and supplies expended, damaged or destroyed during an emergency response, the repair of equipment damaged during an emergency response, and the maintenance of vehicles, equipment, and facilities during an emergency response.

**ORDINANCE NO. 393 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF IDAHO CITY, BOISE COUNTY, IDAHO, TO PROHIBIT PUBLIC URINATION AND**

**DEFECATION, AND FOR PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.** WHEREAS, the city council has determined that the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of Idaho City would best be served by prohibiting public urination and defecation. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF IDAHO CITY, IDAHO: **Section 1. PROHIBITION OF PUBLIC URINATION:** A new Section 3 of Chapter 2 of Title 5 of the City Code of Idaho City shall be created as follows:

**5-2-3: PUBLIC URINATION OR DEFECATION:** No person shall excrete human waste, including urine or feces, in any public place not designated as a public restroom or in any place exposed to public view.

**Section 2. REPEAL:** Chapter 2 of Title 4 of the City Code of Idaho City, as codified by Ordinance 149 on May 9, 1978, is repealed.

**Section 3. SAVING CLAUSE.** Ordinance No. 149 repealed by this ordinance, shall remain in force to authorize fees and the arrest, prosecution, conviction and punishment of a person who violates Ordinance No. 149 prior to the effective date of this ordinance.

**Section 4. SEVERABILITY:** The sections of this ordinance are severable. The invalidity of a section shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections.

**Section 5. EFFECTIVE DATE:** That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon passage, approval and publication according to law.

**ORDINANCE NO. 392 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF IDAHO CITY, BOISE COUNTY, IDAHO, TO DEFINE AND PLACE A LIMIT ON THE DURATION AND FREQUENCY OF YARD SALES AND FOR PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.**

WHEREAS, the city council has determined that the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of Idaho City would best be served by limiting garage/yard sales;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF IDAHO CITY, IDAHO: **Section 1. Limitations on Yard Sales:** A new Chapter 3 of Title 3 of the City Code of Idaho City shall be created as follows:

**3-3-1: GARAGE/YARD SALE:** No yard sale may be held unless in compliance with this chapter.

**3-3-2: DEFINITIONS:** For purposes of this chapter, a yard sale means a general sale open to the public conducted from or on a residential

premises (single-family homes, duplexes, mobile home parks, or apartments), to dispose of tangible personal property consisting of more than three (3) items for sale.

Personal property shall be defined as property which is owned, utilized, and maintained by an individual or member(s) of his or her residence and acquired in the normal course of living in or maintaining residence. Items or merchandise purchased for the purpose of resale shall be prohibited.

**3-3-3: DURATION:** No yard sale may last more than three (3) consecutive days in any seven (7) day period.

**3-3-4: COMPLIANCE WITH OTHER ORDINANCES:** Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to prohibit or interfere with the enforcement and abatement of nuisances as otherwise provided in this Code.

Nothing in this chapter shall prohibit the lawful operation of a business or occupation licensed under this Code.

**3-3-5: REMOVAL AND CLEAN UP:** Within one (1) day after the conclusion of a yard sale, all remaining property shall be removed from areas within the public view. Failure to remove property may also constitute a nuisance and be subject to Chapter 1 of Title 4 of this Code.

**3-3-6: PENALTY:** A. A first violation of this chapter shall be an infraction punishable by a penalty not to exceed fifty dollars (\$50).

B. A second violation of this chapter within three (3) years of the commission of the first offense for which the person was convicted shall be an infraction punishable by a penalty not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100).

C. A third violation of this chapter within three (3) years of the commission of the first offense for which the person was convicted shall be a misdemeanor and be punishable by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars (\$1,000), by imprisonment not to exceed six months, or both.

D. Each twenty-four (24) hour period that a violation continues shall be a separate violation.

**Section 2. SEVERABILITY:** The sections of this ordinance are severable. The invalidity of a section shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections.

**Section 3. EFFECTIVE DATE:** That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon passage, approval and publication according to law.

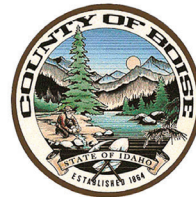

## The Discovery That Forged a Territory: The Story of George Grimes

**BOISE COUNTY** -- A trip this week down the Southfork Road and up to Grimes Pass sparked an interest in its namesake, George Grimes. In the summer of 1862, the rugged mountains of what was then Washington Territory were a vast, unexplored expanse. Prospectors, following the gold discoveries in North Idaho, fanned out across the terrain in search of a new fortune. Among them were two determined men, George Grimes and Moses Splawn, whose fateful journey would lead to the strike that put the Boise Basin on the map and gave birth to a new territory.

The two men, along with D.H. Fogus, were leading three separate prospecting parties and joined forces to explore the area. Moses was told by a member of the Bannock Tribe that they could find gold in abundance in the Boise Basin. After a difficult flooded Snake River crossing and a cautious ascent to avoid the local Shoshoni, their persistence paid off. On August 2, 1862, a week after the party's arrival, they made their first gold strike on Boston Bar, near present-day Centerville. This group of 12 prospectors, commonly known as the "Grimes Party," had found what many were searching for.

However, the new-found fortune was short-lived for George Grimes. As the story goes, that gold was found on the hunting grounds of the Bannock Tribe and they were upset about the idea of more prospectors invading their land. So, they attacked Grimes' party, killing him.

Splawn told the story to a local paper, recounting facing what seemed like 20 guns fired in their faces at the top of a hill. Grimes fell just as they reached the top. "His last words were, 'Mose, don't let them scalp me.'" Thus perished a brave and honorable man at the time when he

stood ready to reap his reward. We carried him to a prospect hole and buried him amid silence."

Grimes was hastily buried in a makeshift grave that would remain unmarked for more than 60 years, until a monument was finally erected on a hill that is now called the Grimes Pass Cemetery. In 1923, Dr. Francis Thomson, the Dean of Mines at the University of Idaho, worked to add a grave marker. Today, Grimes Creek and Grimes Pass bear George's name, serving as a permanent tribute to the unfortunate prospector.

While an ongoing rumor in the Boise Basin suggests the local tribes were not involved in the shooting, those who returned to Walla Walla, Washington, credited the incident to a "disaffected Bannock or Shoshoni." Regardless of the true circumstances, Grimes' death was a somber moment.

News of the discovery, carried by Splawn and his party, and \$5000 in gold, triggered a massive rush. Thousands of prospectors poured into the Boise Basin, leading to the rapid establishment of boomtowns. J. Marion More, another member of the discovery party, is credited with helping to establish the camp that would become Idaho City. Mores Creek is named after him. Other members of the first group were Joseph H. Branstetter and John Reynolds.

The first town in the Boise Basin was Pioneerville, which was settled on October 7, 1862. It was originally known as Hog'em or Pioneer City. By the fall of 1863, just a year after the strike, communities had swelled to astounding sizes. Idaho City, then called Bannock City, had a population of 6,275, making it the largest town between St. Louis and San Francisco. Other thriving towns included Placerville

with 3,254 residents, Centerville with 2,638, and Pioneerville (Pioneer City) with 2,743.

This rapid growth, however, was as fleeting as the gold itself. By the time of the first census of Idaho in 1870, the population had plummeted. Idaho City's numbers had dropped to just 889, Pioneerville to 477, Centerville to 474, and Placerville to 318. The boom had gone bust, and the thousands of hopeful prospectors had moved on, leaving behind a new Idaho Territory that was established on March 4, 1863, largely as a direct result of the population surge driven by the Boise Basin gold rush.

Though George Grimes never got to reap the rewards of his discovery, his tragic story is forever linked to the founding of Idaho. He and Moses Splawn's find didn't just uncov-

er gold; it laid the foundation for a new territory and a new era for the American West.
