GARDEN VALLEY SCHOOL Replacement Supplemental Levy

Dear Residents of Boise County,

The Garden Valley School District will hold an election on November 4, 2025, to consider a Replacement Supplemental Levy. This two-year levy would maintain current educational pro-

grams and operations when the existing levy expires at the end of this school year. The proposed levy represents an estimated annual cost increase of \$7.27 per \$100,000 of taxable property value, or about \$3 per month for a home valued at \$500,000. It would replace, not combine with, the current \$400,000 levy.

Idaho school districts often rely on supplemental levies for basic operational support due to our outdated state funding formula from 1994. Garden Valley's levy rate remains below that of many similar districts. While the district pursues grants, with more than \$160,000 awarded last year alone, grant funds are typically limited in scope and duration.

What the Levy Supports:

Staff Salaries & Benefits for Staff Retention: retaining teachers and support staff for smaller/non-combined core courses and elective courses

like Art, Theater, PE, and Spanish

Extracurricular Activities & Transportation: athletics, clubs, and student travel

Technology, Vocational Studies, Training & Development: essential connectivity, courses like auto mechanics and graphic design

Full-Day Kindergarten

Classroom Support

Special Education Student Needs and Support: maintaining services and compliance

BOISE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

* continued **September 30, 2025 Present: Commissioners** Clay Tucker, Lindy Lindstrom, and Bob Callahan.

ADMINISTRATION PO-**SITION:** There were three candidates for solid waste and noxious weeds administration position, and one was chosen. A motion was said to offer a payroll change to this individual and the motion carried.

HIRE A NEW POSITION FOR IDAHO CITY TRANS-FER STATION: A new position for the transfer station was discussed, because the Idaho City dump is getting busier. Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to offer less than 16 hours a week to an individual and the motion carried.

KINDS AND LEVELS **BUDGET:** Clerk Mary Prisco discussed the kinds and levels chart that had been created to offer employees comparable and competitive wages. A formal approval and adoption will be in the works. Later in the meeting, Lindstrom motioned to approve Resolution 2025-55 to adopt the Boise County kinds and levels charts. The motion carried.

APPRAISERS: Assessor Chris Juszczak encouraged the board to pay out comp time to his four appraisers. Lindstrom agreed that it was a good idea, and Commissioner Callahan explained that the comp time accumulated due to being shortstaffed in that office. Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve the request for a comp time payout to certain reevaluation fund employee appraisers and the motion carried.

SNOW REMOVAL POLI-CY: The county road superintendent said, "I don't think my graders should be out plowing snow on dirt roads when I have less than four inches [of snow]; the reason why is they're taking away material off that road." He said the problem is that they are losing material, and it's a waste of time and money. This would only apply to dirt roads.

SKID STEER: Commissioner Lindstrom motioned to approve county skid steer equipment repair in the amount of \$4,577.49 and the motion carried.

POLLING LOCATION: Lindstrom motioned to approve the agreement for polling places at Wilderness Ranch Fire Station for zero dollars for the November 4th election. He then motioned to approve the

polling facility at the Lowman Emergency Service Station (\$0), Centerville Fire Station (\$80), and the motions carried.

SOUTHFORK ROAD: An engineer evaluated the repair costs, erosion control, and the amount covered by a \$100,000 grant. Lindstrom motioned to approve the application for the emergency grant for the Southfork Road through the Local Highway Technical Assistance Council for \$100,000 and the motion carried.

AWARD: The forester discussed grant money to make a firebreak for Robie Creek. Lindstrom motioned to approve the FEMA wildfire mitigation grant in the amount of \$580,500. The motion carried.

Boise Basin Logging History Comes to Life in Idaho City Park Display

IDAHO CITY — The Idaho City Historical Foundation has taken a major step in preserving the region's rich logging heritage with the installation of the first piece in a new outdoor display near the Territorial Penitentiary. This week, volunteers moved a massive log—measuring 17 feet and 11 inches in circumference—donated by Samule Aarons and stabilized by custom bands built by Henry Reimann.

The effort was supported by community members Tom Secor, Scott, Kurt Gindling, Dale Keleman, and Linda Strohmeyer, who helped transport and position the log. The Foundation is actively seeking stories, artifacts, and personal accounts to enrich the exhibit and invites anyone with logging history to call 208-850-1014.

Logging has long been intertwined with the identity of Idaho City, a town born of hard work and gold mining. Established in 1862 after George Grimes discovered gold, Idaho City quickly earned the nickname "Queen of the Gold Camps." At its peak, it was the largest city in the Northwest, and many of its original buildings still stand today, offering visitors a walk back in time.


One of the most vivid chapters in the region's logging his-


tory unfolded in the 1920s. On July 22, 1926, the last log train rolled off the Clear Creek spur of the Boise-Payette Lumber Company near Camp #2, just northeast of Pioneerville. The spur had been built in 1924 to salvage timber devastated by a bark beetle outbreak that began in 1920 and reached crisis levels by 1922 along Grimes Creek.

Under a Forest Service contract, the Boise Lumber Company raced to harvest marketable timber before it deteriorated. The Forest Service's "Selective Logging" policy allowed only usable trees to be cut, leaving younger green timber standing—a practice visible in surviving photographs from the era. The same train also hauled logs from the Placerville area during its brief operational window.

As the Idaho City Historical Foundation continues its work, the new logging display will serve as a tribute to the labor, resilience, and environmental challenges that shaped the Boise Basin's timber industry. It's a reminder of the region's legacy—and an invitation to help preserve it.

Varsity Volleyball: Horseshoe Bend kept its perfect league record intact with a pair of dominant home victories this past week, sweeping Greenleaf Friends Academy on Wednesday, 10/8, and Council on Friday, 10/10. With the wins, the Lady Mustangs moved to 16-5 overall and 10-0 in conference play. Horseshoe Bend overpowered Greenleaf Friends Academy at home on Wednesday, 10/8, with a convincing 25-7, 25-8, 25-5 victory. Junior Kimber Jones dominated at the net with 11 kills, 6 digs, and 1 ace. Freshman Brooklyn Hess matched the ace count with 10 of her own, along with 8 kills, 4 digs, and 1 assist. Freshman Vilate Wilson recorded 2 kills, 10 aces, 7 digs, and 1 assist. Sophomore Aubrey Penney finished with 3 kills and 2 assists. Freshman Trinity Catherman added 2 kills, 2 aces, and 2 digs. Sophomore setter Malia Goff directed the offense with

21 assists and added 2 digs, 1 kill, 1 ace, and 1 block.

On Friday, 10/10, the Mustangs hosted Council and again came out on top in straight sets: 25-14, 25-22, 25-9. Hess led the attack with 14 kills, 2 aces, and 18 digs. Jones followed closely with 12 kills, 11 digs, 1 block, and 1 assist. Junior Celeste Wilson added 4 kills, 1 ace, 10 digs, and 1 assist. Penney posted 3 kills, 1 block, and 2 digs. Goff facilitated the offense with 30 assists and contributed 3 aces, 3 digs, and 1 kill. V. Wilson served up 5 aces and had 3 digs. Catherman helped anchor with 14 digs, 2 aces, and 1 assist.

Varsity Junior Volley**ball:** The JV squad fell in straight sets to Greenleaf on Wednesday, 10/8, with the Grizzlies taking the match 25-22, 25-9.

Upcoming Matches: The Lady Mustangs are set to close the week with two key matchups. On Wednesday, 10/15,


they travel to Tri-Valley for a rematch with the Titans. JV will take the court at 6:00 p.m., followed by Varsity at 7:00
