### City of Idaho City Appoints Ryan Heffington as Mayor

**IDAHO CITY** — The City of Idaho City is pleased to announce the appointment of Ryan Heffington as Mayor following a public appointment process conducted by the City Council.

A mayoral vacancy occurred after the former mayor resigned due to no longer residing within Idaho City limits. In accordance with Idaho Code § 50-608, the City Council accepted letters of interest, reviewed submissions, and conducted applicant interviews during a public meeting process prior to making the appointment. Ryan Heffington was officially appointed on May 20, 2026, and will be sworn in during the City Council meeting on Wednesday, May 27, 2026, at 6:00 p.m.

Heffington previously served on the Idaho City Council and brings experience in local government, community engagement, and municipal collaboration to the role.

"Ryan's familiarity with the community and his willingness to step into this position make him a strong fit for Idaho City at an important time," said City Clerk Nancy Keeton. "The Council appreciated the thoughtful interest shown throughout the process, and we're looking forward to continuing to move important city projects forward together."

Heffington said he is honored to serve the residents of Idaho City and looks forward to working collaboratively with

City staff, council members, local organizations, and community members.

"I care deeply about this community and the people who call Idaho City home," Heffington said. "I'm grateful for the opportunity to serve and look forward to supporting the city's ongoing priorities while continuing to build strong relationships throughout the community."

### Homemade by Dorothy Celebrates 40 Years of Idaho Craftsmanship

**IDAHO CITY** — Anna Baumhoff, Manager of Homemade by Dorothy, moves through her workspace with the ease of someone who has lived every chapter of the company's story. During a recent interview, she seamlessly directed family members on labeling tasks, printed materials for another order, and greeted her husband before sending him off on an errand.

"It's still very much a family-run company," she said has defined the business from its earliest days in the Centerville area, when local residents longed for jams made from the wild berries growing in the mountains around them.

#### Roots in Boise County Tradition

Anna recalled her mother, Dorothy Baumhoff, who spent four years in the 1980s preparing lunches for the Idaho Senate while they were in session. Dorothy later completed a Master Preserver's Course through the University of Idaho Extension and began teaching canning classes to Boise County residents.

Her husband, Oscar, was serving as a Boise County Commissioner at the time, and the couple's home became the center of a growing cottage industry. Dorothy's passion for canning — and her desire to give back to the community — led her to start producing jams and jellies for local fairs.

The business grew slowly at first. After Dorothy was diagnosed with cancer and her youngest started high school, the family and the business production moved to a second home in Boise, and continued spending weekends and holidays at the family home in Centerville. The business grew every year even as Dorothy battled her cancer, a battle she lost in 1991. In 1992, Anna joined her sister and father and assumed the management of the business, and "things kept happening and getting bigger."

#### A Business That Grew by Word of Mouth

Homemade by Dorothy never needed heavy promotion. A feature in Food Finds in 1991 brought a wave of phone orders. Then in 1995, Anna appeared on QVC for the Buy Idaho program — very pregnant at the time — and the pancake mix and syrup sold out in just two and a half minutes.

Today, production is still done entirely in-house. Recipes remain unchanged, made in small batches, poured by hand, and cooked on a regular stovetop. Even new products, such as the Huckleberry Balsamic Vinegar, are introduced only every few years to maintain quality and tradition.

"The berries we buy today are sourced exactly the way Dorothy set it up," Anna said. "It has always been a family business — the whole family."

#### 40 Years of Idaho Craftsmanship

Homemade by Dorothy's story began in 1985, when Dorothy made five wild-berry jellies in the Miners Exchange Bar kitchen for the Idaho City Arts & Crafts Fair — selling out on Saturday, making more after the bar closed, and selling out again on Sunday.

From there:

**1986** — Dorothy shipped her first orders to the Made in Idaho Store in Idaho Falls.

**1987** — She connected with a label company and began professional branding.

**1988** — Homemade by Dorothy was trademarked; the signature Sawtooth Sourdough Pancake Mix was added.

**1991** — Dorothy passed away after a seven-year battle

**1992** — Anna left her state job to run the company full-time.

**1995** — Featured on QVC.

**2001** — Featured on the Food Channel's Food Finds.

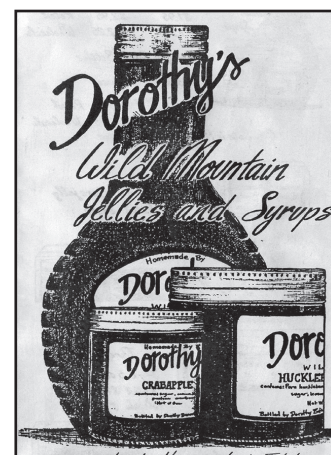
**2011** — Named SBA Home-Based Business of the Year for Idaho and NW Region 10.

Today, the company distributes products across Idaho, Washington, Montana, Utah, Oregon, California, and beyond.

## City of Idaho City Encourages Early Summer Water Conservation

IDAHO CITY — As summer temperatures begin to rise, the City of Idaho City is encouraging residents to take simple, proactive steps to help conserve water throughout the season.

At this time, no water restrictions or alternate watering schedules are in place. City officials are instead focusing on community awareness and voluntary conservation efforts to help reduce strain on the water system during peak summer usage.

The City is asking residents to be mindful of outdoor watering practices, particularly during the hottest parts of the day when evaporation is highest. Watering lawns and landscaping during the early morning or evening hours can help improve efficiency while reducing unnecessary water loss.

"This is really intended as a friendly reminder and an opportunity to work together as a community before conditions become more difficult later in the season," said City Clerk Nancy Keeton. "Small changes in watering habits now can make a meaningful difference for the overall system as we get into later summer months."

Residents are also encouraged to periodically check irrigation systems, hoses, and outdoor spigots for leaks or unnecessary runoff.

The City appreciates the community's continued cooperation and commitment to helping preserve local water resources throughout the summer months.

Additional updates will be shared through official City of Idaho City communication channels as needed.

## Beloved HSB School Counselor Retires

**HORSESHOE BEND** -- After 16 years with the Horseshoe Bend School District, and more than three decades in education overall, school counselor Jason Hennig is retiring, leaving a legacy of compassion, leadership, and dedication to students and staff alike. Hennig's career in education began during the 1992-1993 school year in the Meridian School District. He later joined Horseshoe Bend in the mid-1990s as a school counselor while completing his school psychology internship, before spending several years in the Boise School District.

In 2012, he returned to Horseshoe Bend, where he has remained ever since. "I kind of 'cut my teeth' in this community in the mid-1990s as the school counselor," Hennig said. "Many things have changed, yet many things have stayed

the same." Originally inspired by athletics, Hennig first envisioned a career teaching and coaching football and baseball.

He earned a degree in Elementary Education with a Special Education minor and began teaching special education while coaching sports at Meridian High School. It was there that influential colleagues helped steer him toward counseling and psychology. "I was particularly impressed with a specific school counselor as well as our school psychologist," he said. "Subsequently, I obtained my master's degree in School Counseling and my Education Specialist Degree in School Psychology."

Hennig still laughs when recalling his very first day on the job. "The high school had just built a new portable classroom right next to the football field," he said. "The principal gave me the key and said, 'Welcome and good luck.'"

Throughout his career, Hennig built strong relationships with students, colleagues, and families. Among his fondest memories is working alongside his wife, Amy Hennig, a middle school English teacher in the district. "I am in awe

of her relationship skills with students, her compassion, her high level of expectations, and her giftedness as a teacher," he said.

Hennig also cherishes his years coaching baseball and working with fellow coaches Scott Christenson and Chris Koslosky. Hennig credited district leadership, including Superintendent Dennis Chesnut and Principal Cora Larson, for creating a culture centered on collaboration, family, and student success.

One memory that has stayed with him involved a middle school student with a big dream. "As we were walking through the HSB gym foyer where the trophy cases are, I asked the student what their main goal was by graduation," Hennig recalled. "The student replied, 'I want to be on that Wall of Fame.' That student ended up on that Wall of Fame four years later."

Over the years, Hennig witnessed dramatic changes in education, especially in technology. "In Special Education, we used to handwrite IEPs on carbon copy paper," he

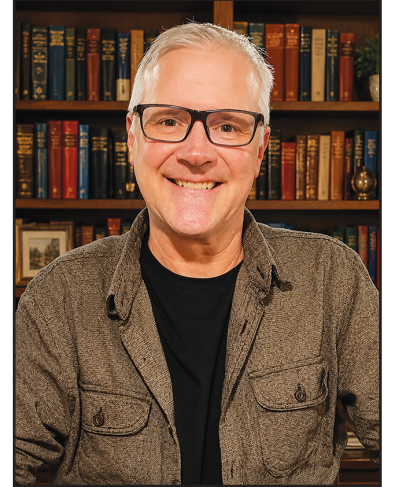
said. "When email first came around, I once sent a summary of a meeting in ALL CAPS. The teacher was not amused."

Despite those changes, Hennig believes the heart of education has remained constant. "The community has generally trusted one another and always found a way to help their neighbor when in need," he said. "The support for our schools and athletic programs has always been incredible."

When asked what he hopes students remember most about him, Hennig's answer reflected the values that guided his career. "I hope they remember my kindness, empathy, professionalism, and hopefully my cheesy sense of humor," he said.

As retirement begins, Hennig is looking forward to spending more time with family and pursuing long-held interests. His plans include attending Nebraska Cornhuskers football games with his father, golfing, helping care for his parents in Coeur d'Alene, and continuing his quest to visit every Major League Baseball stadium.

Still, he does not expect to stray too far from Horseshoe

Bend schools. "With Amy still teaching here and us living in Avimor, I'll possibly substitute teach and definitely attend many more HSB sporting events," he said. For those entering the teaching profession, Hennig offered simple but heartfelt advice: "Always remember why you entered the profession of education and stick with it, good times and bad, because it's always about the students."

## Residents Raise Questions about Airport Loop Trail at Forest Service Meeting

**IDAHO CITY** — The U.S. Forest Service held a community meeting on Wednesday, May 20, at the Ray Robison Community Hall to answer questions about ongoing projects in Boise County. Specialists from Timber and Minerals were present, along with Idaho City District Ranger Joshua Newman, to address concerns and provide updates.

A major topic of discussion centered on rumors that bicycles would “take over” the Airport Loop walking trail as part of recreation planning along the Highway 21 corridor. Newman clarified that the Forest Service recently held a collaborative meeting with a local mountain biking group, during which a concept was discussed to add more non-motorized trail opportunities in Idaho City. He emphasized that no proposal exists, no location has been selected, and the Airport Loop is not being taken over.

“Clearly, we’ve already heard from the community. They don’t want it at the airport,” Newman said. He added that the Forest Service is exploring other possible areas for a non-motorized bicycle trail and continues to examine maintenance and funding needs for recreation along the corridor.

Idaho City Clerk Nancy Keeton noted that the Airport Loop is heavily used by locals and visitors year-round, including snowshoers in winter. Increased use, she said, would impact city facilities such as restrooms, streets, and the visitor center. She asked to be kept informed directly rather than learning updates from unreliable sources, “so we’re not scaring the local citizens.” She also requested that press releases be sent to *The Idaho World*.

Newman reiterated that discussions are in the very early developmental stage. “Nothing is actually proposed — this is just something we’re throwing darts at,” he said. More information may come this fall. He added that the normal process is for the Forest Service to develop a proposal and then publish it, including in the newspaper.

Newman outlined a possible timeline: in a best-case scenario, a proposal could be ready this winter, reviewed next summer, with on-the-ground work the following year. “We are still multiple years out in the best-case scenario,” he said, noting that two to three years is possible, but three to five years is more realistic.

Newman also emphasized

that the mountain biking group is not pushing to access the Airport Loop and is mindful of local concerns. They are already considering other locations. Keeton said that was helpful information for the community to hear.

Newman relayed that no county commissioners had attended their collaborative meetings, but the Boise County Sheriff did attend one meeting. The Idaho City Ranger offered to hold additional informational meetings in Idaho City to keep the public updated as planning continues.

**Ron Twilegar**  
1959 - 2026

Ron J. Twilegar passed away on March 5, 2026. He was born September 18, 1943, the fourth child of Roy and Dorothy Twilegar. He spent the first years of his life in Vancouver, Washington, where his parents worked in the shipbuilding factories of World War II. After the war, the family returned to Idaho, where Ron attended Garfield Elementary, North Junior High, Boise High, and the University of Idaho.

His parents divorced when he was eight, and he lived with his mother in such poverty that he began working to feed and clothe himself selling newspapers late into the night in downtown Boise. Six years later his mother left for California. He was truly on his own at

14, living with his sister, Dolcencia, who at 16 was already married. She became his surrogate mother. His fondness for her continued later in life when he ensured his children spent time with her family.

Despite these challenges, his passion for politics began to develop, and he successfully ran for eighth-grade class president at North Junior High - his first campaign. His slogan was "Go out on a limb and vote for Twig."

The father of his good friend, John Greenfield, admired Ron's resourcefulness and inspired him to become the first in his family to attend college and eventually law school. Ron was determined to find a way out of the poverty he had known as a child, and believed education was the way to do it. He saved enough for one semester's tuition and enrolled at the University of Idaho. He enlisted in the ROTC and joined the Phi Gamma Delta fraternity, where he worked as a hasher in exchange for room and board.

In his early twenties he married Elizabeth "Betsy" Condon just before departing to fulfill his military service in Vietnam as a Second Lieutenant in the U.S. Army. Afterwards, the couple settled in Washington, D.C., where Ron worked as an aide to Senator Jim McClure while completing law school at George Washington University. Eventually, he and Betsy moved to Boise to begin their family while Ron pursued a variety of business ventures and began his pursuit of public service - his true passion.

In 1974, Ron became the first Democrat from Ada County to serve in the Idaho Legislature in 38 years when he pioneered door-to-door campaigning to win election in District 19, representing Boise's North End. That victory became a steppingstone to his 1976 campaign for the Idaho Senate. Despite Gov. Andrus' support of his Republican opponent, Ron won the Senate seat and, in 1980, was elected Senate Minority Leader by the Democratic caucus. Ron retired from the Idaho Legislature in 1982 and was elected to the Boise City Council in 1984, where he served until 1987.

As a council member, he focused on downtown Boise and helped resolve the long-standing debate over whether to support a regional mall (now Boise Towne Square) or a downtown mall. Ron opposed the downtown mall, advocating instead for preserving Boise's historic

buildings, and as the 1st Chair of the CCDC led the process to develop what became the Boise Centre on the Grove. His vision and determination helped shape the vibrant downtown Boise that exists today.

He developed a love of running and hiking mountains in his mid-thirties. In 1983, he and Betsy founded a children's race called the Capitol Classic now known as the St. Alphonsus Capitol Classic, which continues to this day. He and Boise friends ran and completed the 1984 Paris Marathon. He led a group of family friends and their children to climb Mt. Borah, the tallest mountain in Idaho.

In 1995 he married Jacqueline Groves and adopted her two sons. The family travelled extensively and had many adventures together including living and working in Ecuador for three years where Ron taught Entrepreneurship at the

Universidad de San Francisco de Quito. On their return, the couple remained active in state and local politics, culminating in Ron's successful run for Boise County Prosecutor in 2012. While their relationship ended in 2014, they remained friends to the end of Ron's life.

Ron's favorite saying was, "You don't go, you don't get."

He is survived by daughters Megan and Amy Twilegar; sons Scott and Matthew Simpson; Elizabeth Pursley; Jacqueline Groves; sister Kristina Weiss and nine grandchildren. His son, Tyson Twilegar, preceded him in death in 2023.
